TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.]

To the inhabitants of the Town of Salem, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house, in said town, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at six-thirty (6:30) of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to raise any more money for the repairs of highways than the law requires.

ARTICLE 4. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer to hire, with the approval of the selectmen, such sums of money as may be needed for general purposes in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 6. To see what action the town will take relative to lighting the streets, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to accept Federal aid on Rockingham road, and raise fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) for the same.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow such sum or sums of money and to issue notes or bonds of the town therefor, as shall be necessary to pay the expenses incurred by the town in defending the appeals of the Arlington Mills from the assessment of its 1923 and 1924 taxes.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), or any part thereof, for the removal of snow from the highways.

ARTICLE 10. By request: To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) or any part thereof, for the use of Ernest W. Young Post, No. 63, American Legion, to be expended in the observance of Memorial Day in the year 1926.

ARTICLE 11. By request: To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700) or any part thereof, above the sum required by law, for the support of the Salem Free Public Library, for the year of 1926.

ARTICLE 12. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100), or any part thereof, to defray the expense of improvement and maintenance of the town common and adjacent public land.

ARTICLE 13. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum not exceeding fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500), for the purpose of providing police officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 14. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400), to be expended for the control of the white pine blister rust in town.

ARTICLE 15. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), or any part thereof, for the purchase of fire hose, chemicals, and any other necessary equipment that may be required for the maintenance of the fire department.

ARTICLE 16. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), for the purpose of having the books of the town and school district audited by a certified public accountant.

ARTICLE 17. By request. To see if the town will vote to install five (5) street lights from Pine Grove cemetery to the Albert E. Searle poultry farm, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 18. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the street lights down Pleasant Street to the

property of Napoleon Guenette on Hedgehog Road and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 19. By request. To see if the town will vote to install three (3) street lights from the residence of James H. Wilson to Dunlap's corner, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 20. By request. To see if the town will vote to install four (4) street lights at Hampshire Roads and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 21. By request. To see if the town will vote to purchase a tractor and snow plow and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 22. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200), for repairing the road from Wilson's corner to Daniel Merrill's corner, with cinders.

ARTICLE 23. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), or any part thereof, for repairing School Street with cinders, commencing at Ewins' corner and continuing until the appropriation is expended.

ARTICLE 24. By request. To see if the town will vote to repair Martin Avenue with cinders and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 25. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200), or any part thereof, to repair the road on the westerly side of Edgar Blodgett's house from the electric car track on Peabody's Hill leading to the residence of Davis Bradford.

ARTICLE 26. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), or any part thereof, to repair the highway from the residence of A. A. Philbrick to the residence of J. H. Wilson.

ARTICLE 27. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), or any part thereof, to repair the road leading from the foot of Providence Hill to the new road near the residence of Fred K. Duston.

ARTICLE 28. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), or any part thereof, to be expended on the mail road from Woodbury's corner to Schultz's corner.

ARTICLE 29. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or any part thereof, to build a tarvia-treated gravel road from Canobie Lake depot toward North Salem.

ARTICLE 30. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300), or any part thereof, to repair Point A Road, so-called, between the Fairmont House and Hall's crossing.

ARTICLE 31. By request. To see if the town will vote to repair with cinders, Brookdale Road from the Charles Cross place to the residence of William G. Davis and raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), or any part thereof, for the same.

ARTICLE 32. By request. To see if the town will vote to have the selectmen establish street bounds on our main thoroughfares.

ARTICLE 33. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200), or any part thereof, to maintain danger signals and paint road stripes on our streets where needed.

ARTICLE 34. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), and apply for an equal amount from the state, the same to be used in rebuilding part of state aid road on Brady Avenue.

ARTICLE 35. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), and apply for an equal amount from the state, the same to be used in macadamizing one mile of state road, or any part thereof, from the residence of Horace Beaudette to the residence of George A. Brown.

ARTICLE 36. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), the same to be used for the purpose of purchasing a piece of land at

the Depot Village and erecting suitable buildings for the purpose of housing our road machinery.

ARTICLE 37. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise one hundred dollars (\$100), or any part thereof for the purchase of a piece of lowland to be used for a public dump.

ARTICLE 38. By request. To see if the town will vote to start building sidewalks and raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000), to start building the same under direction of the selectmen.

ARTICLE 39. By request. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to construct a sidewalk from the Centre to the high school, and from the high school to the depot and make the necessary appropriation for the same.

ARTICLE 40. By request. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500) to remove the dangerous conditions and congestion of traffic (especially on racing days) at the junction of Main and Pleasant Streets and authorize the selectmen to make the necessary changes at that point.

ARTICLE 41. By request. To see if the town will vote to appoint a Commission of five (5) including a civil engineer, to investigate the conditions at the junction of Broadway and Main Streets, Salem Depot and devise a plan for removing the dangerous conditions in that square and secure estimates of the expense of the same. This Commission to report at a future meeting.

ARTICLE 42. By request. To see if the town will vote to forbid the use of the arm or leveler on snow plows used by the Massachusetts Northeastern Street Railway in the town of Salem, N. H. The use of which makes some roads nearly impassable.

ARTICLE 43. By request. To see if the town will vote to appoint a superintendent of streets for one (1) year, salary to be fixed by the selectmen or a committee of three from the floor.

ARTICLE 44. By request. To see if the town will vote to replace the small water pipes on School Street with a six inch main and raise the sum of thirty-seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,750), or any part thereof for the same.

ARTICLE 45. By request. To see if the town will vote to replace the small water pipes on Martin Avenue with a six inch main and raise the sum of thirteen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,350), or any part thereof, for the same.

ARTICLE 46. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the six inch water main from the residence of Percy J. Call on Clinton Street to Policy Street and raise the sum of two thousand one hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,150), or any part thereof for the same.

ARTICLE 47. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend its water main from No. 8 schoolhouse to the residence of A. G. Kelley and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 48. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend its water main from No. 8 schoolhouse to the residence of Osker Jamagochian and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 49. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend its water main from Hall's crossing to the property of Napoleon Guenette, and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 50. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main down Broadway to the residence of William F. Dimlich and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 51. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend its water main from the house of James Peters to the residence of Albin Kinzler and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 52. By request. To see if the town will vote to extend the water pipe on Policy Street, north from the present terminal opposite the residence of E. L. Brown, to the pumping station and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 53. By request. To see if the town will vote to transfer the balance of the Levi Woodbury gift from the town treasurer to the water board treasurer to be used to install an auxiliary pumping unit at the pumping station, at the discretion of the water board.

ARTICLE 54. By request. To see if the town will vote to authorize the water board to install meters on all services and raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 55. By request. To see if the town will vote to allow J. J. Gallagher and Company the right to set poles and string wires in and upon the highways of the said town for the purpose of supplying electricity for heat, light and power with the understanding that they will give the following rates for the term of ten (10) years:

Lighting

Price, less 10 per cent, by 10th of month. 14 per kw.h. Minimum charge, \$1.50 net per month.

Heating and Refrigeration

First 10 kw. 14. All over $.07\frac{1}{2}$, less 10 per cent, by 10th of month. Minimum charge, \$1.00 net per month.

Power

1 to	150 kw. h. per month,	$.10\frac{1}{2}$
over	150 kw. h. per month,	$.09\frac{1}{2}$
over	250 kw. h. per month,	$.08\frac{1}{2}$
over	400 kw. h. per month,	$.07\frac{1}{2}$

Minimum charge, \$1.00 per h. p. Primary meter rates, .01 per kw. h. higher on the first 1,000 kw. h. where lighting is included. 5 per cent added if bills are not paid before the 10th of the month.

ARTICLE 56. By request. To see what action the town will take towards municipal ownership of the Salem Electric Company and raise money for the same by the issue of bonds or notes.

ARTICLE 57. By request. To see if the town will vote to have the Salem Electric Company remove all poles and wires placed by them in the highways where it interferes with other utilities.

ARTICLE 58. By request. To see what action the town will take in regard to taxes due from former collectors.

ARTICLE 59. By request. To see if the town will vote to have the selectmen compile a record of all business done each month, bills paid, etc., and have same printed in the Lawrence daily papers for the benefit of the people.

ARTICLE 60. By request. To see if the town will vote that from this date the salary of no town officer can be raised except by a majority vote of the people in town meeting assembled.

ARTICLE 61. By request. To see if the town will appoint a building commission of five (5) to draw up a town ordinance regulating the location, sanitary conditions, fire protection and foundations of all buildings built or moved into any part of the town. This commission to be composed of one selectman, one civil engineer, one builder and two business men. Said commission to report at the next regular or special town meeting.

ARTICLE 62. By request. To see if the town will vote to elect at the town meeting of 1927 a town manager to take the place and perform the duties of the present water board, highway agents, supervisors of cemetery, and such other duties as the town may determine.

ARTICLE 63. By request. To see if the town will vote not to have any snow carted away only that which is in the squares and an obstruction to traffic, no snow to be carted from in front of buildings.

ARTICLE 64. By request. To see if the town will vote to dispense with the plowing out of sidewalks in time of snow, as the sidewalks are not used, persons preferring to walk on electric road or on the streets.

ARTICLE 65. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) from the estate of Louisa J. Woodbury, as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Sylvester O. Woodbury lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 66. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) from Emma F. Coburn, as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Rawson Coburn lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 67. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) from Louise Connor, as a perpetual fund the interest to be expended in the care of the Nathan Connor lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 68. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) from Warren Cluff and Chester Brown, executors under the will of Ellen S. Bennett, as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Ezra Bennett lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 69. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) from A. G. Kelley as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Benjamin P. Kelley lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

ARTICLE 70. By request. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) from Sarah F. Coburn, as a perpetual fund, the interest to be expended in the care of the Alburtus Coburn lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

There have been several outbreaks of contagious diseases during the past year: three deaths from diphtheria, in one case the death taking place before the doctor was called, and in the other two antitoxin not being used sufficiently early to cure the disease.

In all cases of children taken sick with a sore throat and a foul odor to their breath the doctor should be called at once.

There were no deaths from measles, scarlet fever, or whooping cough.

The State Board of Health has asked for and received samples of milk sold in our village, for inspection. Their reports showing it to be in the main of good quality and free from dirt.

During the summer months many sample bottles of water from Canobie Lake were sent to Concord for analysis, but so far as known no cases of sickness were traced to bad water from that source.

REPORT OF THE SALEM FIRE DEPARTMENT.

I would respectfully submit the following report of the Salem Fire Department:

During the year the efficiency of the department has been greatly improved by the installation of the new Gamewell Fire Alarm System, which was put into operation on August 15 and which has been very efficiently operated by the local telephone operators. The alarm has functioned very satisfactorily and has never failed to bring out sufficient men to man the fire truck, so that there has been no delay in getting to a fire.

The company has answered thirty-two calls during the fiscal year, and in no case where the alarm has been received in time has there been any serious damage. The Wentworth barn and the Garabedian farm buildings were the only cases where there was a total loss, and in both of these cases the building had fallen in before the fire department arrived, notwithstanding a quick response was made in each case as soon as the alarm was given.

The American-LaFrance truck purchased in 1924 is in first-class condition, and there is on hand at the present time 1,700 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ " fire hose, 12 hand chemicals, 17 shovels, 8 pails, and a good supply of tools all in good condition. There is no immediate need for additional supplies, but I would recommend a small appropriation to cover any emergency that might arise during the year.

I wish to express my hearty appreciation for the manner in which the members have responded to the calls during the year and also for the efficient assistance rendered in their work.

There is urgent need of a hydrant on Gordon's Hill and also on Martin Avenue, and I trust this will receive the attention of the proper authorities at an early date.

REPORT OF FIRE ALARM COMMITTEE.

The special committee appointed to install a fire alarm system wish to submit the following report:

Shortly after the town meeting of March 10, 1925, the committee met and organized, with C. H. Borchers as chairman and A. M. Rolfe as secretary.

It was agreed to accept the proposal of The Gamewell Fire Alarm Company to install an alarm system which could be operated by the local telephone operator.

This, however, necessitated some delay, as we were obliged to get permission from the telephone company to install this system in their office. This was finally obtained through the courtesy of Manager F. L. Towey, who rendered valuable assistance in procuring the necessary permit.

The committee also were obliged to get permission from the Boston & Maine Railroad to cross their track with its wire in order to enter C. H. Borchers' factory, where the whistle machine is installed.

All this took considerable time, but on April 23 a contract was signed with The Gamewell Company and the system was put into operation at midnight, August 15. There were a few minor adjustments made after this date.

The system has given very satisfactory results, and the Fire Department has never failed to have from eight to twelve men on hand to answer calls at short notice since the system was installed.

The total amount expended for this work was \$2,588.68, or \$88.68 more than the amount called for. This overdraft was caused largely by putting in several more phantom boxes than we originally planned, which we found necessary in order to have the whole town covered.

We believe the installation of this system has already been the means of cutting down the town's fire loss considerably, and is a valuable asset to the town.

REPORT OF OLD HOME WEEK COMMITTEE.

Your committee was chosen under Article 24 of the 1925 Warrant, and it was voted to publicly celebrate the One Hundred and Seventy-Fifth Anniversary of the town during Old Home Week. Three hundred dollars was voted to defray the expense of the same.

It was soon evident that the town should also fittingly dedicate the Woodbury High School before it was opened for school purposes in September, 1925. It was the sentiment of the school committee and the community at large that one adequate celebration for all three events was all that should be imposed upon the town.

The matter of financing the affair was given careful consideration, and the committee accepted Dr. Tilton's generous offer of his publication, "Salem Beacon," as an avenue for the publication of an anniversary book consisting largely of advertising matter, but containing a record of the events of the day, matters of historical interest to the town and illustrations, so that the book has proved of historical value.

From the treasurer's report appended hereto, it will be seen that the committee realized approximately one thousand dollars from this source and that disbursements were made according to that report.

The main feature of the celebration was a parade in the morning which would have been a credit to any of our neighboring cities. A lunch was served to all at the noon hour. The formal dedication of the high school building took place in the auditorium of the Woodbury High School, at which time former citizens of Salem recalled the early history of the town and commended Salem on its progress. It is to be hoped that these speeches may be made a part of

the permanent record of the town. The day was properly brought to a close with fireworks witnessed by several thousand residents and visitors and guests from nearby cities.

The committee wishes to thank every one who had a part in making the day a memorable one for Salem.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS TO THE SCHOOL BOARD.

To the School Board and Citizens of Salem:

It gives me pleasure to submit my third annual report of the schools of Salem:

The year 1925 is significant in the annals of Salem public school history. The erection of Woodbury High School marks the completion of a well-rounded school system. The confusion which existed at the Depot School because of the crowded conditions has given way to an orderly, well-organized four-room school. The seventh and eighth grades formerly housed there have been transferred to the high school building. In the fall of 1924, a modern two-room building was opened at Hampshire Roads and the quality of the work in this district has been consequently improved. Citizens of Salem will take justifiable pride in and obtain adequate returns for these splendid investments.

HIGH SCHOOL.

During the year 1924-1925, seventy pupils attended high school out of town at a total cost of \$10,522.21 for tuition and transportation. This means a per capita cost of \$150.03. During the current year 107 have been enrolled in Woodbury High School, and the cost of support will be approximately \$11,700. This makes the per capita cost for all money spent for high school purposes \$109.30. This represents a saving of approximately \$41 in per pupil cost. This figure is substantially lower than the average total per pupil cost in secondary schools of New Hampshire.

FUNDAMENTALS.

Emphasis has been laid strongly on the acquiring of good ability in the three R's. The needs of pupils in these fields are frequently diagnosed and remedial drills provided. It may be stated that pupils of Salem schools measure well up to the average achievements of elementary pupils of the state. Much stress has been laid on the ability to use

correct English also. Teachers provide daily opportunity by well-organized plans for pupils to improve their proficiency in this field.

OTHER SUBJECTS.

Much effort has been made to make study of the social sciences more effective. Frequent discussions on the teaching of history and geography were held. Supplementary material in these fields was provided, map equipment brought up to date, and methods of instruction improved. Promotion of better citizenship and a broader sympathy for the people of all nations is a fundamental aim in the field of instruction.

The teaching of health and care for the health is done on an efficient basis. The need of good food, proper recreation, sufficient rest, ample exercise are stressed throughout the teaching of physiology and hygiene. Teachers employ numerous devices for getting home to pupils these fundamental needs. It is a noteworthy fact that they display keen interest in taking better care of their physical bodies. The work of the teachers is carefully supplemented by the services of a well-trained health nurse. In the short time during which health supervision has been employed, concrete measurements of results show that the work done is of lasting importance. Attention is called to the health report elsewhere.

Careful instruction is given on the effects of alcohol and narcotics in the human system in the elementary school. The economic waste consequent to the use of alcohol and other narcotics are stressed in secondary school courses. The whole organization of subject matter in this field and methods employed in presenting it are calculated to get the attention of the child.

In music, pupils are taught to read the "notes" and are given opportunity for appreciating various types of good music. It affords opportunity for relaxation and creates an atmosphere of charm about the school room. Music has a potent influence. One of the ancient citizens of

Athens asked to give a reason for the greatness of the city replied, "Athens owes its greatness to the fact that it is a singing city." Your attention is called to the report of the supervisor of music elsewhere.

SUPERVISORY UNION 55.

The supervisory union exists mainly for the purpose of electing a superintendent of schools and fixing his salary. It is made up of Salem, Plaistow, Hampstead, Newton, Atkinson, and South Hampton. The following data will be of interest:

I have completed three years of service in this union. During this time I have made 2,481 visits to teachers, attended 143 School Board meetings, conferred at some length with chairmen of school boards 188 times at their request, and have written approximately 3,000 letters regarding school business. This does not comprise the complete report of the activities of your superintendent, but it shows the character of the service which has been rendered.

TEACHERS.

The teaching force of Salem has been steadily improving. The following tabulation will show the character of the training of teachers:

Two had a year of experience, five had two years of experience, four had three years of experience, one had four years of experience, four had from five to ten years of experience, and two had more than ten years of experience.

Teachers are devoted to the interests of their pupils. It would require a long volume to enumerate the many kindnesses which they have performed for their pupils. They are doing vital service in the lives of your boys and girls.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC.

To the Superintendent and School Board:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report as Supervisor of Music in the Salem schools.

In the annual reports I have more than once given the aims of the work in detail, but this year I will give a quotation from a new outline of our series of text-books: We seek "to develop power and enthusiasm in participation and enjoyment in listening."

Within the past two years the "New Educational Music Course" by Ginn and Co. has been introduced. This course is a revised and greatly improved set of books. As our books wear out we are replacing them with this edition. So far, grades two and three at the Center and Depot schools have been supplied with "Introductory Music," and grades four and five at the Depot schools with "Elementary Music." "Intermediate Music," a book of special charm and beauty, is being used at schools one, five, eight and nine. In the Junior Department of the Woodbury High School, "Junior Music," an attractive collection of three- and four-part songs and belonging to the same series, is being used. To see the pleasure which the pupils take in the new books makes us long for the time when all shall be enjoying them.

At the Woodbury High School three periods a week are devoted to music. One period to the Junior High School, which consists of part-singing and musical appreciation. At each lesson the class hears one or two selections written by the world's foremost composers. A note is made of the composition and composer in preparation for a music memory contest. The other two periods are given to voice culture; that is, to the development of pure tone, proper placement of the voice and clear enunciation. A glee club has been formed by the girls, which meets once a week at the close of school.

In looking back over the year's work, I find in every case co-operation and pleasant classroom associations. In conclusion, let me thank the Superintendent, School Board and teachers for their continued interest and support.

WOODBURY HIGH SCHOOL.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Salem:

The first half year of the history of Woodbury High was completed on January 29, 1926, this period including nineteen weeks of active school work.

The first enrollment was especially gratifying in number, but more especially in the quality of young men and women who presented themselves for instruction.

The first faculty was composed of Headmaster Seward F. French, Mr. Maurice Sargent, Miss Alice Taylor, Mrs. Marian Smith, Miss Marion Turner, and Miss Mary Fisk. These six persons gave all they had, but because of the unexpected increase in enrollment it became necessary to secure the services of another teacher, and Mr. Marcellus Brown was added to the staff. The present faculty, seven in number, are now teaching practically every period of the day. Much of the success the school has enjoyed thus far has come from the unselfish coöperation of Supt. H. G. Blount, the School Board and faculty with your Headmaster.

During this first semester the following enrollment has been recorded: Class I, 35; Class II, 30; Class III, 53; Class IV, 30; Class V, 15; Class VI, 10; Total, 173.

Mrs. Eva Thompson, instructor in music, has regular classes in both Senior and Junior High School, and her work is of the highest order.

The standing of the school is quite high, although in time when organization has been more thoroughly completed and the pupils settled in their own school, should be higher. The school has been approved by the State Department of Education.

The outside activities have been developed with care and consideration on the part of those in charge. The school has been represented by football, and there are at present teams in basketball for both boys and girls. It is expected

that a baseball team will be organized in due time. These teams have been supported by public donation and the student body. Such teams mean much to the school as a means of meeting outside people interested in similar activities.

The Glee Club is working, and will give their annual programme in the near future.

The Manual Arts Department has turned out many fine pieces of work and, as far as possible, is on paying basis. The various pieces of furniture or whatever made is intended to be useful in the home. No work is permitted to leave the department until completed to the best of the worker's ability.

The Home Department has held an exhibition of work done as a part of an afternoon demonstration in Home Decoration. In the fall canning, etc., was carried out quite completely, and some very fine clothing has been made by members of the class.

The Commercial Department is popular and especially fine results are being obtained. The Headmaster office work uses girls from this department.

During the first half year only a few people have visited school. The faculty urges people, and especially parents, to visit school. We would like to explain any part of our work to you and have the pleasant feeling of knowing the parents personally.

At any time the Headmaster can be of any public service, please feel free to call him at either the office or his home.

REPORT OF SPECIAL BUILDING COMMITTEE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Salem:

The Special Building Committee reported in the Town Report of 1925 the work accomplished from March 15, 1924 (which was the date of appointment), up to the awarding of the contract for the erection of the Woodbury School.

The contractors' bids on the plans and specifications of Architect James E. Allen for the Woodbury School were as follows: Kelly Bros., \$112,560; E. W. Pitman, \$115,628; Louis Cyr, \$111,699; Louis McAloon, \$115,345.49; E. A. Peabody & Son, \$110,300.

March 14, 1925, the citizens of Salem voted to raise the sum of \$4,626.06 to reimburse the committee for this amount, spent in settlement of claims and obligations arising from the abandonment of plans and contracts for the four-room elementary school building. This reimbursement made the original \$60,000 appropriation complete, plus the gift of \$50,000 made \$110,000 with which to carry the proposition of our high school through. As the lowest bid, that of E. A. Peabody & Son, was over our appropriation and the architect's fee was also to be included in our appropriation, the committee deducted the equipment figure from all the bids. The bid of E. A. Peabody & Son amounted to \$97,925.17, and was accepted and contract signed.

The sum of \$163.05 (market value) was allowed by E. A. Peabody & Son for sand, spikes, lumber, etc., left on the school site by the contractor of the elementary four-room school building.

Architect James E. Allen's fee was 6 per cent of the contract figure of \$97,925.17 minus \$1,000 which was paid by a former committee at the time Mr. Allen drew the plans.

The plans as drawn called for no auditorium. The citizens realizing the need of an assembly hall for educational purposes called a public meeting to talk the matter over.

Messrs. Charles H. Borchers, John Peabody, and Levi Woodbury each offered a thousand dollars toward the cost of a hall.

March 14, 1925, the citizens voted to add the auditorium and appropriated \$10,000 toward the cost.

The signed contract for the erection of the auditorium was \$12,965, which included the architect's fee, but not the equipment.

May 4, 1925, word was received of the death of Mr. Levi Woodbury. Mr. Woodbury was deprived of his one great desire, that of living to see the Woodbury School of Salem completed and used by our young people.

A framed picture of the late Mr. Woodbury was presented by his widow and family to the town to be hung in the school.

The plans and specifications called for lockers in the wardrobe rooms, but as the cost was high the committee voted to install wardrobe racks.

May 22, 1925, Mr. Chester T. Woodbury, chairman of the Old Home Week Committee (succeeding the late Mr. Levi Woodbury), invited the Building Committee to meet at the Town Hall on May 23. The two committees decided to dedicate the new school building on August 29, Old Home Day.

The committee voted to purchase desks, chairs, tables, etc., in dark finish, likewise the woodwork of the building was stained to match.

A bronze tablet with the following inscription was presented to the town by Mr. John Peabody:

WOODBURY HIGH SCHOOL

Erected 1924-25

named in honor of Levi Woodbury
in recognition of his assistance to the
Town of Salem
in the erection of the building

The auditorium chairs were purchased by the school board, with the understanding that the bill would not be due until March, 1926.

The amount of \$97,925.17 deducted from the appropriation of \$110,000 left the committee \$12,074.83 with which to purchase the furniture and pay the architect's fee; so the books and supplies could not all be purchased out of this amount.

Mr. Fred Gardner of Lawrence loaned a new Gulbransen grand piano, for our use in the auditorium Old Home Day, free and without incumbrances.

The dedicatory exercises were held in the spacious auditorium, which was filled to overflowing with interested citizens and friends.

Chairman C. H. Borchers read a letter from Miss Esther M. Barlow, who donated one hundred dollars in memory of her father, the late Richard H. Barlow, for a wall picture to be hung in the school.

When school opened the enrollment exceeded the expected number, likewise the committee found it necessary to purchase more equipment such as desks, chairs, table, etc.

SCHOOL WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the inhabitants of the Town School District in the Town of
Salem qualified to vote in district affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Woodbury High School on Saturday, the thirteenth day of March, 1926, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following articles:

1. To choose all necessary district officers.
2. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$5.00 (five dollars) on a thousand of the equalized valuation of the town.
3. To see if the district will vote to make any alterations in the sums of money recommended by the School Board for the support of schools and the payment of statutory obligations.
4. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the following amounts: Deficit for high school tuition and transportation, \$3,647.14; high school books and apparatus, \$2,100; high school auditorium seats, \$1,356.64; also to authorize the School Board and treasurer to borrow said amounts in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$500, or any part thereof, for the improvement of school grounds.
6. To see if the district will vote to accept the following gifts toward payment of the high school auditorium: C. H. Borchers, \$1,000; John Peabody, \$1,000; the late Levi Woodbury, \$1,000.
7. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$250, to make alterations and repairs on No. 3 school building.

8. To see if the district will vote to install telephones in any or all of the following school buildings: Nos. 1, 6, 8 and 9, and raise money for the same.

9. By request, to see if the town school district will vote to increase the number of members of the School Board from three to six and to elect the three additional members, one for the term of one year, one for two years, and one for three years, and to elect two each following year, and to raise the sum of \$300 to pay the salaries of the same.

10. To see if the school district will vote to ratify the action taken under Article 6 in the School Warrant of March 14, 1925, relating to the appropriation and the issue of notes or bonds to defray the cost of the high school auditorium; and re-authorize the School Board to issue notes or bonds to the amount of \$10,000 in retirement of a vote of that amount now outstanding, said notes and bonds to extend over a period not exceeding twenty years.

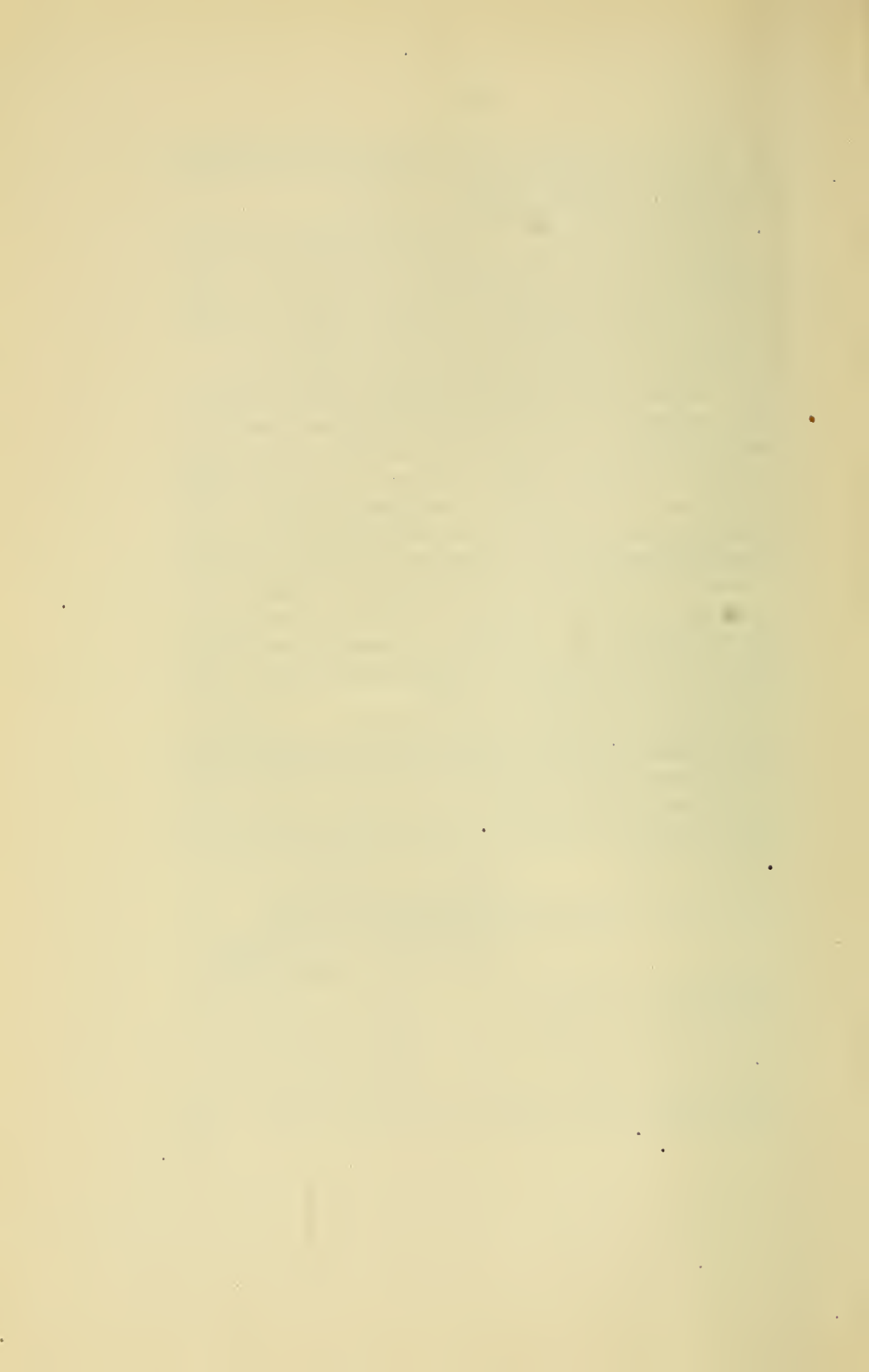
