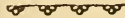

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sandown qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House on the second Tuesday of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk.
2. To choose one Selectman for three years.
3. To choose a Town Treasurer.
4. To choose one or more Road Agents.
5. To choose a library trustee for three years.
6. To choose a Town Trustee for three years.
7. To choose all other necessary Town officers.
8. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town charges.
9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for highways.
10. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Town poor.
11. To see how much money the Town will vote for Memorial Day.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for the control of White Pine Blister.
13. To see if the Town will vote to divide the interest of the \$1,000 deposited in the Manchester Savings Bank

among the several denominations in proportion to their taxes.

14. To see if the Town will vote to buy a tractor snow-plow and raise money therefor.

15. On petition of William Yale and eleven other voters to see whether the Town will vote to give authority to the Derry Electric Company to install three street lamps along the Hampstead-Sandown-Derry-Chester road between the Sandown-Hampstead and the Sandown-Derry line, at no expense to the Town of Sandown other than the monthly charge of \$1.11 per light subject to a 10% discount if paid on or before the tenth of the month i. e. an annual charge for three lights of \$36.00.

16. To see how much money the Town will vote for Old Home Week.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provision of the will of Sophronia W. Carrier, deceased, reading as follows: I give and bequeath to the Town of Sandown the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, in trust, however the income or such portion thereof as may be necessary to be expended, in forever keeping my family burial lot, the lot of my Father and Mother,—Laevi Sanborn and Aurelia Sanborn; and the lot of Cyrus W. Hills, adjoining lots located in the North Burying ground in Sandown, N. H. in respectable condition and proper repair.

19. To act upon any business that may come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 8, 1927.

To the School Board and Citizens of Sandown:

Herewith I submit to you my seventh annual report as superintendent of schools.

MORE RELIABLE REPORT CARD MARKS

Short weekly tests in reading and arithmetic, grades 3 to 8, are now supplied to the teachers. These same tests for the 5th grade have been given to very many pupils of that grade in many towns and cities throughout the United States, and we know the scores those pupils made. By comparing our 5th grade pupils' marks with those made in the other towns and cities, our teachers have a reliable guide for judging just how well our pupils are doing. The same is true for each grade.

ASK TO SEE THE NEW ARITHMETIC PRACTICE EXERCISES

This year the schools have been supplied with some new practice exercises in arithmetic. They are bound in book form and called "The Arithmetic Work Book." We are expecting them to raise our arithmetic work to a higher standard. They are for grades 3 to 8.

MORAL INSTRUCTION IN THE SCHOOLS

The *religion of behavior* and conduct includes the principles of honesty, reverence, courtesy, kindness, courage, temperance, fair-play, justice, thrift, industry, etc., including many such characteristics.

In our efforts to build those principles into the characters of our children the following measures are taken :

1. No teacher is given a license in this State whose moral character has not been certified to by three persons, and her license is permanently taken away if immorality is proved.
2. The Bible or Bible stories may be read in the morning exercises.
3. The morning session is opened with prayer.
4. Inspirational poems or psalms are memorized.
5. Reading books are chosen that contain some character- building literature.
6. The lives or accomplishments of great men are described in books used.
7. The teacher in her discipline and playground supervision attempts to require the pupils to follow those principles in their school life.
8. Various other ways, as stories told, discussions, dramatizations, etc.

The *religion of belief* is left for the Sunday schools of the Church.

As these principles are sectarian and vary according to the denomination of the church, no attempt is made to teach them in the schools. These include such items as the following :

1. Was Jesus a divine being, or was he a perfect man?
2. Is it true that Jonah was in a whale three days?
3. Must a person be baptized to be acceptable to God?
4. Will Christ return in person to rule on earth 1,000 years?
5. Did Peter really found the church in Rome?
6. Did the crucifixion of Christ relieve us from the consequences of our own sins?

SCHOOL OBSERVANCE OF HOLIDAYS

Labor Day, Columbus Day, Armistice Day, Thanksgiving Day, New Year's Day, Washington's Birthday, Fast Day, Flag Day, Memorial Day and Arbor Day are the *ten* holidays that occur while school is in session.

In New Hampshire seven of these are so-called "legal holidays." The term "legal holiday" does not mean that schools must not keep, or that banks, factories and stores must close; it merely means that if a note or check is dated as payable on that day, it cannot be collected until the next succeeding business day.

To close school on each of the ten holidays would shorten each pupil's school year by two weeks.

Columbus was a deep student of geography and mathematics. It is quite certain that he would prefer our boys and girls to celebrate his discovery of America by regular attendance at school where special attention to his life, courage and perseverance was given, and their knowledge of geography and mathematics increased by loyal work in their regular lessons. He would not prefer that the school be closed and that the pupils spend the day in idleness.

A similar argument applies to nearly all the other holidays.

The following shows the number of errors per 100 words made in a written composition test given in 1921 and in 1927. The center column is the number of errors per 100 words; each figure at the right or left represents a pupil of that grade. The 7, 7, 5 at right of 5 errors shows that in 1927 two 7th grade pupils and a 5th grade pupils made .5 errors per 100 words.
