# Commissioners' Report.

### To the Inhabitants of Sullivan County:

In compliance with the laws of New Hampshire, it becomes the duty of the Commissioners, as well as other officers of the County, to present to the people their report, which by a change of the law by the last Legislature, is for twenty months, the law now requiring the report to be made January 1st, instead of May 1st, as formerly.

#### COUNTY FARM AND ALMS HOUSE.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Willard have continued their labors as Superintendent and Matron, and we feel confident that for industry, kindness and interest for the inmates, they are hard to excel.

Miss Eliza Willard has charge of the Insane, and we are warranted in saying that she has worked a great reform in that department.

The increased cost per week is accounted for from the fact, that the inventory returned is less, by nearly eleven hundred dollars, than in previous reports, we having reduced the appraisal of farming utensils, household furniture and miscellaneous articles.

A cordial invitation is extended to all to visit the institution and have an opportunity to form an intelligent opinion of the same.

FINANCIAL CONDITION OF THE COUNTY.

The County is now owing three thousand dollars and a small amount of accrued interest, which becomes due October 15th, 1893, the debt being reduced six thousand dollars since May 1st, 1891.

With gratitude for confidence bestowed and kindness received, we respectfully submit our report.

### Chaplain's Report.

To the Honorable Commissioners of Sullivan County:

Regular religious services have been held as usual, since the last reports for the county were made, at the County Farm. There have been ten deaths at the Institution during the past twenty months. Funeral services for two of those who have died were held in other places by other clergymen and seven of those, who have died, were buried by friends in different cemeteries remote from that belonging to the County.

Last June, Mr. Charles L. Walker, of Salem, Mass., delighted and profited the family at the Farm, by an exhibition of some fine Bible pictures with the aid of a stereopticon. Children's Day was observed one Sabbath in June. The ladies of the Claremont W. C. T. Union have made their usual semi-annual visits, coming loaded with gifts and tokens of good will. These visits are seasons of pleasure an 'profit.

A Sunday School was organized last May, and meets every Sabbath afternoon in the dining hall of the main building, with Miss Cora D. Whipple and Mrs. Wm. H. Whitmore as teachers. About thirty attend the school, although the number of children at the Farm is now smaller than usual. Lesson helps, and papers are used in this work. A cabinet organ for these different services would be helpful and appreciated.

The Superintendent, Matron and Assistants are doing much for the comfort and welfare of those committed to their charge, while our Commissioners are excellent supervisors.
