#### REPORT FROM THE ROUND ROOM - 1977

The report from the Round Room for 1977 is made without the help of Bob Bristol who has in the past made the Sutton Town Report interesting as well as award winning. We hope that this one will provide every one the necessary information to make the best decisions for the coming year.

1977 has been a busy year for the Town Officers with all the work necessary looking after town affairs plus all the changes in procedures that came after the Legislature convened. The biggest problem was caused by the late date that the General Court finally adopted a Budget.

We were beset with the usual road problems that seem to crop up every year plus a few extra ones such as a lot of winter rains which with the cold weather made for icy roads requiring a lot of sanding that often blows away as soon as the sanding truck gets out of sight. The big rain we had in late March washed out most of Birch Hill Road and some of Baker Hill Road. These roads required a lot of extra work and gravel (which seems to be precious around here). The cost of these emergency repairs amounted to over \$5,000.00, for which we applied for Federal Disaster Relief. However, we received none and the cost came from the Highway Maintenance Budget. This amounts for the lions share of the overdraft. Some of the overdraft could have been rightfully charged to the dump for equipment and labor used in pushing the refuse over the bank. The Gasoline used by the Police Cruiser has also been charged to Town Maintenance. Were this charged to the Police Dept. it would account for most of the Police Dept. balance and would help put the Town Maintenance account in balance. There was also a carry over from the 1976 in the TRA account that was necessary to pay from the Town Maintenance in the amount of \$1,027.93. These items totaled just about equal the Town Maintenance overdraft. TRA money was used in oiling part of Roby Road. There is a healthy balance left over to be used before July 1978, and has been proposed to oil Shaker Street. The Class V Maintenance (Duncan) money was spent on Chalk Pond Road starting in Sutton Mills village and going up the hill. This was a difficult place to work at best because of the terrain. As usual, the money ran out long before what was projected was completed. The residents on that road have long suffered from conditions there and we hope that the project will soon be completed.

While upkeep of our roads requires about 50% of the Towns tax dollars, other forces are at work that sometimes invade our budget to an unexpected degree. Take for example, the Kezar Lake pollution problem. The problem is not yet solved and the emergence of the FORE group into the fray has presented us with more legal problems and legal costs than were anticipated.

Legal costs to the town will continue to be a significant consideration due to the growing complexity of town, State and Federal Governments. At the local level, we have costs to uphold our zoning and building ordinance. Either sections of the ordinance are uninforcible in which case they should be thrown out or revised, or a legal action must be taken by the town to uphold the sections of the ordinances as they stand.

The effect of the current use assessment continues to erode the tax base in ever increasing amounts. The value of assessed property "lost" to Current use valuation amounted to \$1,891,570.00 in 1977. Without current use, the 1977 tax rate would have been \$20.20 per thousand instead of \$22.00 per thousand. In other words, every property owner paid \$1.80 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation to make up for the tax deficit in assessed valuation. The other side of the coin is without the current use provision our town might grow at a rate far in excess of its wish as expressed in the questionaire circulated two years ago. This expansion of the town could ultimately cost the tax payers much more than the \$1.80 per thousand we experienced in 1977.

Much timber was cut out in 1977 and while the tax revenue to the town was substantial, it is not a revenue source which grows every year. Rather it is cyclical and this year we reaped the benefit.

This year we completed the perambulation of the Sutton-Warner town line that was unable to be finished in 1976. As usual this was the most enjoyable part of being a Selectman and we were accompanied by former Selectman, Robert Bristol, Fire Chief Carroll Thompson and Joseph Dorrington, Selectman from Warner.

Included in the 1977 town report is a copy of the town's Master Plan adopted by the Planning Board. The Planning Board and the Selectmen felt this was a good way for all the citizens of Sutton to get a first hand review and be able to find it when necessary.

This is the year we are right up to the wire on the Dump situation. \$26,675.00 is the amount asked for by the budget committee. Two proposals are being presented and we hope with what information is available the best proposal will be voted on at Town Meeting.

- 1. A Transfer station and hauled to a sanitary landfill. Residents would take their rubbish to a central point, deposit it in a container which when full would be hauled to a sanitary landfill area.
- 2. An incinerator that burns the bulk of the rubbish. With this type of operation rubbish must be sorted at home or at the plant. If done at home by the user cost of operation would be less.

The Solid Waste Committee headed by Bud Harding has devoted a lot of time and effort to come up with these proposals. The Solid Waste Committee will present the pro and cons of both proposals at the town meeting.

One increase the selectmen have asked for is to have a secretary for about three days a week. The burden of paperwork imposed on town officials is snowballing rapidly and in order to get other work done some relief is needed in this area.

#### Article No.2.

An increase is asked for in the highway budget. Wages have gone up and inflation is taking its toll here also. We have asked for more money for street lighting due to rapidly raising electric rates.

#### Article No. 4.

The Sutton FAST squad is asking for \$300.00 to continue its program.

#### Article No. 5.

The town history committee is asking for \$500.00 to help in assembling its material and getting the update of Sutton's Town History off the ground.

#### Article No. 6.

The highway department is requesting a new truck. This is part of our continuing effort to keep our equipment up to date.

## Article No. 7 through 11.

Are for Capital Reserve funds to help us prepare for the future in many areas. Article No. 11 is not expected to be acted upon if Article 6 is adopted.

#### Article No. 12.

Asks for \$2,000.00 to help support the local kindergarten. This item was accepted by petition and submitted by the Budget Committee without recomendation. Currently the downstairs of the town hall is being used by this group.

#### Article No. 13.

Asks for \$625.00 to the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council. In the past, the town has been in favor of this relationship as we struggled with implementation of a Master Plan. However, last year it was voted to withold our "dues" until we received promised maps prepared by the Council. Some but not all of the maps have been received at this time.

#### Article No. 14.

Asks for \$275.00 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Assn. to help promote tourism in the area.

#### Aricle No. 16.

Included this year because of a change in reporting procedure required by the State. RSA 241:15 provides an additional higway subsidy to be used only for construction or reconstruction of Class IV and V highways. The Duncan Fund allotment provided in RSA 241:11 for the maintenance of Class V highways. These amounts are reported this year in the recommended Town Budget as appropriations and are received entirely from the State.

## Article No. 20.

Inserted by petition to designate Wadleigh Hill Road and Corporation Hill Road as Scenic Roads. In the past voters of Sutton have accepted other roads as scenic in an effort to help keep Sutton rural. This does not mean that improvements cannot be made to the traveled surface.

#### REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST WARDEN

Forest Fire control in New Hampshire is a joint state and town/city responsibility (RSA 224).

The Director, Division of Forests and Lands (State Forester) appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town/city upon the recommendation of local authorities.

The local forest fire warden is responsible for forest fire prevention and suppression activities in his town. He regulates the kindling of outside fires when the ground is not covered with snow by the issuance of written permits only when conditions are safe. He is responsible for suppression with the town/city and state sharing the cost. Surrpression costs in excess of 1/4 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town are assumed by the state.

The state provides training for the local fire organization and helps coordinate activities between towns/cities. The state also supports local forces with backup personnel, equipment, and supplies for suppression and prevention.

This combination of state and local cooperation, started in 1893, works well, for New Hampshire had enjoyed one of the smallest acreage losses due to forest fires in the United States for the past 25 years.

#### FIRST AID AND STABILIZATION TEAM REPORT

The Sutton F.A.S.T. (First Aid and Stabilization Team) Squad was formed in 1977. Funds appropriated at last years town meeting were used to cover training expenses, (most members are nationally registered Emergency Medical Technicians) and to purchase equipment.

Equipment purchased includes an oxygen setup, air splints, stethoscopes, blood pressure cuffs, slings and various types of bandaging supplies. Some additional bandaging equipment and a portable suction unit were donated to the squad.

F.A.S.T. squad members have taken part in two emergency drills. The first, at Wadleigh State Park, involved just our squad, while the second, a mock disaster at Colby-Sawyer College, involved rescue units and fire departments from several surrounding towns as well. In addition, our F.A.S.T. squad members have participated in a volunteer program whereby they donate time in the outpatient department at New London Hospital, helping the medical staff there, and earn credit toward recertification.

We have met with the New London Ambulancee Service and Bradford Rescue Squad people in the attempt to devise ways to better serve the town. One of our members, Jean Smith, is a board member of the C-5 Emergency Medical Service District.

In 1977, the squad answered six calls for medical aid, while the New London Ambulance had responded to approximately forty others.

We feel that the F.A.S.T. squad could have been of assistance in many, if not all, of the calls answered by both New London and Bradford. Our biggest single problem at this point is communication. Both Bradford Rescue and the New London Ambulance services have expressed a desire to have our squad participate in runs here in Sutton.

Our 1978 goals are: to develop a better means of communication; to make residents of Sutton more aware that the F.A.S.T. squad is willing to help; to continue our training program; to construct and/or purchase additional equipment i.e. an ambu-bag and a spine board; and to work at the district level to improve emergency medical service in the town of Sutton. In order to meet these goals we need the support of you, the people.

#### **COMMUNITY ACTION REPORT**

Over the past four years, the Kearsarge Valley Community Action Program has been the focal point of social services delivery in this area. It has provided through its staff and facilities assistance to the community as a whole, as well as to low income families. With the renovation of our multi-purpose center we have been able to expand our capacity to serve the needs of local residents.

In addition to maintaining "Outreach" office hours at the South Sutton Post Office from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. on the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month, we have also provided the following programs and services:

Rural Bus Transportation for Senior Citizens, Meals-on-Wheels, Winterization, Operation Green Thumb, Summer Recreation, Food Stamp assistance, Fuel Loans, Oil Burner Efficiency Testing, Adult and Well Child Clinics in conjunction with the Visiting Nurses, Manpower/Job Assistance, Housing Assistance, Congregate Meal Site for Senior Citizens in Warner and Summer Youth Employment. We have initiated a Thrift Shop and a Food Co-op, featuring produce that is available to all Kearsarge Valley residents, at the Community Center in Warner.

The Kearsarge Valley Community Action Staff appreciates the interest and support from the volunteers and residents of Sutton and anticipates working on befalf of your community again this year.

# SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL COMMITTEE Final Report

The Town of Sutton can comply with Federal Air Pollution standards, but only at an unjustified cost to the taxpayer. Since the appointment of the Solid Waste Committee in 1974, it has carefully analyzed every suggested alternative to the present burning dump. Landfill, incinceration, recycling, and transfer stations have been evaluated and cost estimated in search of a solution.

You will recall that a decision on a course of action was deferred at the 1977 Financial Town Meeting, awaiting a decision of the N.H. Pollution Control Commission to grant a further extension (to July 1, 1978) of the time we might continue to use the present dump. Town officials attended a hearing on the matter before the Pollution Control Board in Concord in June 1977, and the extension was granted.

It was the hope of your committee that between July 1977 and July 1978, a state-wide plan would develop, establishing regionalization of small towns — that within the region, Resource Recovery facilities, such as incineration and recycling, would be economically feasable and available to each of the towns. So far, there has been much talk, but no federal or state funds have been made available to carry it out.

It seems unlikely that the state will grant a third extension on the burning dump. Some positive steps must be taken at the 1978 Financial Town Meeting to replace the present dump.

An alternative, in fact the only alternative available to Sutton as of this writing, is to establish a transfer station at the present dump, or elsewhere in the town if a better location can be found, and enter into a contract with the Lakes Region Disposal Company to haul the solid waste to their landfill in Danbury, N.H., for disposal. They would require a five-year contract, would provide compaction-container equipment, and would haul the container to the landfill once a week in 42 weeks, and twice a week in ten weeks — a total of sixty pickups per year. The contract price for this service would be \$14,620.00 per year.

In addition, the town would be required to provide state-approved facilities for a transfer station, such as:

Proper access road, concrete pad for compactor-container, electric power, water, shelter for station operator, and telephone.

The estimated one-time cost of providing these facilities at the present dump site is \$6,000.00.

If a new access road providing one-way traffic with a new exit on Route 114 is required, this would add approximately \$8,000.00 additional to the cost.

The anticipated annual operating cost of the transfer station is as follows:

If an alternative site could be found, such as adjacent to the highway garage, the setup cost for the transfer station could be substantially reduced.

In each of the past four years, the town has set aside funds to cope with the dump problem. The total to date is \$22,780.73.

If the Lakes Region Disposal program were to be approved at this Financial Town Meeting, the cost for the year 1978 starting July 1st would be approximately:

We cannot refrain, in closing this report, from calling your attention to the fact that the need for the above recommendation comes from the failure of both state and federal governments to properly fund the many requirements they so blithly place on small towns. If they insist we do these things, they should provide the money to do so. Maybe this is just wishful thinking!

#### REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

Because Sutton covers a large area (about 35 square miles) and because most of us pass through only part of the whole town growth changes are not strikingly obvious to us. The facts are that Sutton's year round population was static from 1960 (population 708) to 1970 (709) but Sutton population from 1970 increased about 30% to 1977 (population about 900). the average number of building permits for new dwellings had been 13 to 14 over the past four years and, assuming three persons per dwelling, that rate of building would increase population about 5% per year.

Building permits for new dwellings do not reflect the present growth trend in Sutton or in other towns with seasonal dwellings that can be converted to year around use. There are at least as many seasonal, vacation dwellings in Sutton as year around dwellings and increasingly those seasonal dwellings are being converted for year around use.

During 1977 thirty-seven new building lots were approved for dwelling use by the Planning Board under existing subdivision regulations and there probably are more than 200 lots available for dwelling use that were either qualified before Sutton had a subdivision regulation or have been approved under present regulations.

The Planning Board believes that the town because of its Zoning Ordinance, Building Code, and Subdivision Regulations now has useful tools to manage the area growth trend. The Planning Board also believes that the town's Master Plan objectives would better be served with frequent review of Master Plan objectives, of all regulations and with changed regulations whenever changes seem necessary.

There are several amendments being proposes in the Zoning Ordinance to be voted on by ballot March 14, 1978. We are listing these amendments below along with brief explanations.

Article I and II changes have to do with additions in wording required to support the ordinance.

Article III - Section B is modified to provide guidelines for the Zoning Board of Adjustment and is intended to avoid the hazards of uncontrolled areas of excavations, damage to town roads and to treat Section B in the same manner as any other commercial venture.

Article III ¶ Section E has to do with the subject of signs and is an effort to avoid use of signs which distract and are otherwise detrimental to the general community. Incidentally, there are no signs presently in Sutton which do not comply with the proposed amendment.

Article III - Section K will replace present reference to non-conforming use. The intention is to provide clarification of the subject of non-conforming use.

Article IV - Section A to be amended to broaden types of uses permitted in the Residenttial District.

Article IV - Section B added to indicate permitted uses subject to Board of Adjustment approval.

Article V - Section a as in Article IV this amendment more clearly defines types of uses permitted in the Rural—Agricultural District.

The above amendments have better defined the kinds of uses permitted in both the Residential and the Rural—Agricuttural Zones and have better defined the limitations affecting some of those uses. The major affect of the changes is that more uses that would be consistent with the Master Plan are broadly defined and procedures for approval of such uses are outlined.

The Planning Board will additionally, early in 1978, hold hearings and consider Subdivision Regulation changes. The broad purpose of such changes will be to establish better legal grounds to refuse or limit the yearly rate of development of new dwelling sites where there would be a risk of deterioration of the ability to provide proper on site domestic water supply sources, waste disposal systems in the town or a section of the town or where stresses on existing town roads, municipal services might impose an unfair tax burden on all taxpayers for the benefit of a small minority or where Master Plan objectives would be adversely affected with resulting penalties on the majority and benefit to a small minority.

No Planning Board is effective without qualified willing members. The Selectmen and present members of your board have made many efforts to find good people to serve as Planning Board members. Obviously we would like new members who know the town, who are interested in its future, who support the objectives of the Master Plan, and are willing and qualified to serve. The board would be most effective if its members were from various sections of the town, represented various age, education and experience backgrounds. All of us involved would welcome volunteers. We can assure you that anyone who becomes actively involved will develop real interest in trying to help the town toward its objectives. We can also testify that there will often be frustrations and that it will be completely impossible to please everybody.

#### MASTER PLAN

#### HISTORY OF THE MASTER PLAN

In the summer of 1974 the Planning Board decided to find out what the townspeople thought about the Town and what steps they thought should be taken to assure that the Town would be what they wanted it to be. The Planning Board prepared a questionnaire and distributed it to every home in the Town, with a copy to each adult occupant. Of these questionnaires, 750 were returned, which constituted over 75 percent of those distributed. The Planning Board believes this to be a remarkable response.

Answers to the questionnaire made it clear that generally the townspeople wanted the Town to retain its character as primarily a rural, residential town and to take all steps to accomplish that purpose.

After the results of the questionnaire were reviewed and after a meeting of townspeople at which the results were discussed, the Planning Board appointed Citizens Committees to help it in town planning. These Committees held a series of meetings to consider the necessary data and maps and to catalog information basic for planning.

The Master Plan, as now adopted by the Planning Board, is the result of efforts by the Selectmen, the Planning Board, the Citizens Committees and, in large measure, the townspeople themselves.

Material supporting the Master Plan and useful in its application includes:

- 1. A statistical analysis of the questionnaire mentioned in Paragraph 1.
- 2. Maps showing the location and classification of existing municipal facilities, land utilization, existing buildings, important natural resources, existing roads and their legal status, soil types and contours. Much of this graphic material is supported by written reports of the committees which did the mapping.

Some of the wishes of the townspeople expressed in their answers to the questionnaire were:

to keep Sutton primarily rural and residential to have Sutton's population growth be no more than moderate and preferably in and around th town centers,

To preserve Sutton's agricultural and forest lands, and

To limit business and commercial growth in Sutton to small home-based business and small non-polluting industry compatible in specific nature and location with the town's objectives.

#### PURPOSE OF THE MASTER PLAN

The New Hampshire law states that it is the function and duty of the town planning board to make and to improve from time to time a master plan for the development of the town.

The law further states that the general purpose of such a plan is to guide coordinated and harmonious development of the town and its environs which will promote health, safety, order, convenience, prosperity, and the general welfare in accordance with existing and probable future needs.

It is the purpose of this Master Plan to chart the future course of the Town in the areas mentioned above so that residents of the Town, present and future, will have a town that will be a good place in which to live. It is not intended that the Master Plan remain in its present form indefinitely. It will be kept under review by the Planning Board and will be subject to change and growth as the town changes and grows.

The principal objectives of the Master Plan are:

to maintain the Town's rural and residential character,

to assure that the basic needs of health, safety and housing of the townspeople are satisfied,

to control development activity in a way that is compatible with the general purposes of the Master Plan,

to reasonably control increases in Town services so as to keep their costs in line with the financial capabilities of the Town,

to encourage the continued use of lands for agriculture and forestry,

to encourage the protection of significant natural areas and locations of special educational, environmental and historic value.

to control, where possible, the location of public utility and transportation facilities so as to minimize their impact on the environment.

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#### MASTER PLAN FOR THE TOWN OF SUTTON

#### DEVELOPMENT OF LAND IN THE TOWN

#### A. FINANCES OF THE TOWN

The major part of the Town's income now comes from taxes levied upon real property. Further development in the Town will require the Town to furnish more public services. It is in the interest of the people now living in the Town, as well as those who will come here to live, that this development be subject to control so that the additional public services can be furnished without an unreasonable increase in taxes.

#### B. PROPER USE OF LAND

Before proper uses of land in the Town can be determined, it is necessary to know tha capabilities of the land in the various parts of the Town. For this purpose, the Merrimack County Soil Report prepared by the Soil Conservation Service of the United States shall be among the materials used.

It shall be recognized that certain types of land (for example: ridge top land, land having a steep slope and land with a high water table) can accommodate only very low density development or may be unsuitable for development altogether.

# C. RESOURCE VALUE OF PROPERTY in the TOWN

Certain parts of the land in the Town constitute resources of great value to the Town. Among these are: agricultural land, gravel and sand deposits, lake shores, river banks, and mountain ranges. These areas should be subject to control in such a manner that their resource value is not diminished. Great care shall be taken to protect the ability of the land to sustain individual on-site water supply and sewage disposal.

#### D. PLANNING COMMERICAL DEVELOPMENT

The Town shall take such action as is necessary to accomplish its objective of remaining a rural town, primarily a residential town, but without unreasonably restricting commercial ventures.

Commercial use for each zone shall be defined by the Zoning Ordinance. Such commercial development shall be permitted only by the Zoning Board of Adjustment with each case judged on its own merit.

Commercial development in strips along the state highways and intensive housing development away from the existing Town centers shall be subject to control and limitation. These types of development tend to add to traffic congestion and hazard, the loss of agricultural and forest lands, the overburdening of roads and of services, and a decline of business in the traditional town centers.

Any development of a commercial nature shall not be permitted unless arrangements are made for the control of its wastes in an environmentally satisfactory manner and for the contribution of an appropriate share of the Town's operating and capital costs.

#### E. TOWN CENTERS

The town centers of the various Suttons are attractive assets to the town. They provide aesthetic, residential, and social focus for Town activities. The Town shall take all action necessary to assure continuation of these assets.

## RESOURCE USE AND CONSERVATION

#### A. WATER

One of the primary functions of Town government is to protect the suppy of water for its residents. The Town shall see to it that: (a) development in the areas from which water is supplied to residents of the Town is restricted in such manner as to protect the supply, (b) development within watershed areas in the Town should be similarly restricted.

Sutton has depended and should continue to depend on individually developed and owned wells for domestic water. Centralized community supply as an alternative would be unusually expensive because of Sutton's large area, bedrock depth, marshy land, and varying contours. As long as the basic objectives of this Master Plan remain in effect, it must be generalized that any action that might lead to a need for a community water supply would be very undesirable.

# B. DISPOSAL of sanitary wastes

No building or activity shall be permitted in a locality where conditions are such as to make it possible that contamination of ground or underground water will result from wastes, human or otherwise, from such buildings or activity. Particular attention shall be given to the buildings or activities on slopes having a grade of 15 persent or more, on land consisting of peat or muck, on alluvial soils constituting the flood plain and on lands with a high water table at times during the year. The Town shall delegate an appropriate authority to determine the suitability of any site proposed for building or any other activity.

Communal waste systems are almost invariably needed where community water is provided. Unwise regulation of private disposal systems might also create such a need. Because of Sutton's geography, costs as with community water supply, would be extremely high. Therefore, every effort should be made to ensure the continuation of individual on-site waste disposal systems in the town.

#### C. SHORELINES

The shorelines of the Town's lakes, ponds and rivers are valuable scenic and recreational resources. Their use and development shall be subject to reasonable control to insure them against environmental or other harm.

#### D. RECREATIONAL AND OTHER AREAS

All existing Town parks should be maintained. Plans for the location and development of future parks and recreation areas for public use should be formulated and put into effect as the resources of the Town permit.

All historic sites and structures in the Town should be identified and suitably marked.

#### E. SCENIC RESOURCES

The Town shall act to:

- --control objectionable illumination of any type,
- --control offensive noises and odors,
- --control objectionable billboards and signs, and
- --encourage the use of screening to hide unsightly objects or activities.

#### TOWN SERVICES AND PUBLIC UTILITIES

A. The construction or expansion of Town services or public utilities that are likely to jeopardize the resource value of agricultural or forestry lands should not be permitted unless there is no feasible alternative. Such construction or expansion should normally take place within existing highways or right-of-way.

Public utilities shall be required to submit expansion and development plans to Town authorities for review and approval.

- B. No privately owned utilities, services, or streets shall be accepted by the Town unless the cost of acquiring and maintaining them is consistent with the Town's budget.
- C. Any kind of land use that may produce an unusual type or a large quantity of waste should be permitted only if it can be demonstrated that the method of disposal will not adversely affect the environment and that any services or facilities required from the Town can be financed without economic hardship.
- D. Solutions to police protection needs should be sought.

#### E. TOWN ROADS

All Class 5 town roads shall be brought to a uniform level of year 'round passability. The town road network is one key to orderly growth of the Town. Miles of new road or reopened Class 6 road will contribute adversely to town growth by permitting far flung development and adding to an already heavy road maintenance burden. Therefore, the town shall accept no road as town road except where such roads do not present an unreasonable financial burden to the town. No roads shall become town roads unless they meet town road construction standards in effect at the time of their takeover by the Town. Town Road Specifications shall be subject to periodic review.

The Town shall investigate all aspects of the New Hampshire Scenic Road Law as a primary method of preserving the present rural character of the Town.

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#### CONCLUSION

It is the intent of the Planning Board that the Master Plan serve as a guide in modifying exisiting ordinances. We anticipate that many changes in existing ordinances will be required to achieve the goals set forth in the master Plan. It is also contemplated that new ordinances will be required to further the objectives of the Master Plan. Ideas for specific changes for various Town ordinances to fulfill the Master Plan should be contributed by everyone who has an interest in the future of our Town.

S.R. Savings Bank No.40375.

Motion made and seconded and voted in the affirmative to accept the Article as read and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00.

Article 10 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund for Solid Waste Disposal.

Motion made and seconded and voted in the affirmative by voice bote to adopt this Article as read.

Article 11 - To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for a Capital Reserve Fund for the Town's Bicentennial; and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the unencumbered balance of Revenue Sharing Funds.

Words of appreciation were expressed by Mr. Bristol, and thanking the townspeople for the confidence they had given him to be their Selectman for 27 years.

Motion made and seconded and voted by voice vote to amend Article 17 to read — To raise and appropriate the sum of \$641.00 as the Town's share of the annual operating expenses of the regional commission to be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes, but not to pay this sum to the Council until the maps promised to the Town are received by the Town. Voted in the affirmative.

Article 18 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 as its share of the cost of publicizing and promoting the natural attractions of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

Motion was made and seconded to table Article 18. Voted by voice vote and the motion was defeated. Motion made and seconded and voted by voice vote to accept this Article as read.

Article 19 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the continuation of services to the low-income residents of Sutton through the

Kearsarge Valley Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.

Motion was made and seconded to amend this Article to read - to raise and appropriate the sum of \$799.00 for the continuation of services to the low-income residents of Sutton through the Kearsarge Valley Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.

Article 20 - To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$262.50 from the interest available from the F.E. To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sutton in the County of Merrimack in said State, Qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Pillsbury Memorial Hall in said Sutton the fourteenth day of March next, at twelve-thirty of the clock in the afternoon, the polls to be open from twelve-thirty in the afternoon and to be closed no earlier than six-thirty of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subject:

- 1. To choose all necessary officers.
- 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town's Zoning Ordinance as follows?

#### Article 1.

Following the wording "Annotated 1955" should be inserted: "as amended in conformity with a comprehensive plan,"

Following "in town meeting convened."

Add: "The use, construction, alteration, height, area and location of Buildings and structures, and the use of premises in the Town of Sutton are regulated as hereinafter provided."

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town's Ordinance as follows?

#### Article II.

Following "February 18, 1966"

Add: "together with any amendments thereto."

4. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town's Ordinances as follows?

#### Article III.

Strike out Section B and replace with the following:

- B. The removal of soil, sand, gravel, or ledge for sale except when incidental to the construction of building or other improvements on the same premises may be permitted as a special exception by the Board of adjustments after a public hearing and subject to the following conditions:
  - 1. The applicant shall submit a 5-year plan of proposed activities on the site, including plans for removal of material and rehabilitation of the site, accompanied by a map of survey of the site showing contour lines at 5-foot intervals and indicating areas affected by removal plans.
  - 2. Any special exception granted pursuant to this ARTICLE III, Section B shall be granted for an initial period not to exceed 5 years. The ap-

plicant may apply for extensions of the special exception for periods not to exceed 2 years per extension if operations are not completed within the original time period or any extension or extensions thereof. Any such application for an extension shall be accompanied by a written report on all operations then completed and a further plan for all operations for the period of the extension requested, and a map of survey as required under ARTICLE III, Section B. 1. above contemplated future operations differ from those shown on any map previously filed with the original application or any previous application for an extension.

- 3. Restoration of the site to an attractive condition as nearly approximating the appearance before removal operations were undertaken as is practical shall be completed within 6 months after completion of the project.
- 4. No excavation shall take place within 200 feet of any public street or highway or property line.
- 5. Stripping of top soil from a proposed gravel pit for sale or use on other premises shall be prohibited.
- 6. The removal of all materials shall be conducted so as not to result in damage to abutting land.
- 7. Such other conditions as the Board of Adjustment may deem necessary to safeguard the neighborhood or otherwise serve the purpose of this ordinance, and suject to the provisions of ARTICLE VI of this Ordinance (Special Exceptions and Variances)."
- 5. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town's Zoning Ordinance as follows?

#### Article III.

Section E — Following the wording "square feet in area."

Add: "Illuminated signs shall be shielded in such a way to produce no glare, undue distraction, confusion, or hazard to the surrounding area or to vehicular traffic. Signs which are animated, flashing or with intermittent illumination are prohibited. Signs shall not project over the public right-of-way or property lines. Any sign which becomes in disrepair may be removed upon order of the building inspector if not repaired after 30 days' notice."

6. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town's Zoning Ordinance as follows?

#### Article III.

Add Section K.

"K. Non-conforming use.

Any lawful non-conforming use of structures or land in existence at the Time of adoption of this ordinance or any amendment to this ordinance which causes such use to be non-conforming may be continued but shall not be:

- 1. Moved, enlarged, altered, extended, or restored (except as provided below.)
- 2. Change to another non-conforming use without approval by the Board of Adjustment and then only to a use which, in the opinion of the Board of Adjustment, is of the same or of a more-restricted nature.
- 3. Re-established if such use has been discontinued for a period of one year or has been changed to, or replaced by, a conforming use regardless of the period of discontinuance.
- 4. Restored to other than a conforming use after damage from any cause, unless the non-confroming use is reinstated within one year of such damage.

Nothing in this section shall be deemed to prevent normal maintenance and repair of a non-confroming building or improvement provided that such action does not increase the degree of non-coompliance."

7. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town's Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Strike out Section A. 1., 2., 3., 4., and substitute the following:

- "A. The following uses shall be deemed Residential uses and be permitted in the Residential district:
  - 1. Single-family dwelling and buildings accessory thereto, but excluding tents, cabins and trailer coaches, except that not more than one trailer coach may be temporarily used as a residence on a lot while a dwelling is being constructed thereon, but such excluded use shall not be continued for more than twelve consecutive months.
  - 2. Rooming or boarding houses for not over four guests.
  - 3. Church or other religious institution, Public Library, Publicly owned municipal buildings, park or playground, Public museum, Educational institution.
  - 4. Customary home occupation, such as a professional office, studio, or workshop accommodating an occupation customarily conducted in a dwelling or building accessory thereto by a person residing on the premises provided that:
    - a. Such use is clearly incidental and secondary to the use of the premises for residential purposes and does not involve modification of such dwelling which will alter its outward appearance.
    - b. The number of persons employed at any such location shall number no more than a total of three permanent on-site employees in addition to the owner or tenant.
    - c. Off-street parking for employees and customers shall be provided.
    - d. No offensive noise, vibration, smoke, dust, odors, heat, glare, or unsightliness is produced.
    - e. There is no exterior storage of material or equipment and except for a sign no other exterior indication of such use or variation from the residential character of the premises.

8. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town's Zoning Ordinance as follows?

#### Article IV.

- B. The following uses in the Residential District may be granted as a special exception by the Board of Adjustment after a public hearing:
  - 1. Conversion of a single-family dwelling to a two-family dwelling.
  - 2. Nursing homes, private clubs, kindergarten."

[Article IV present SectionB and C shall be re-numbered C and D.]

9. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 8 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town's Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Article V.

Strike out Section A. 1., 2., 3., 4., and substitute the following:

- "A. Uses permitted:
  - 1. Any use permitted in the Residential District.
  - 2. It shall be a district of farms and residences.
  - 3. Home produce may be bought and sold and exposed for sale in this district.
  - 4. Forestry (except sawmills.)
  - 5. Accessory buildings.

Uses permitted as a special exception subject to the approval of the Board of Adjustment after a public hearing:

- 1. Two-family dwelling.
- 2. Essential service.
- 3. Sawmill (temporary).
- 4. Automobile repair garage.
- 5. Golf course and country club.
- 6. Riding stables or dog kennels.
- 7. The establishment of any industrial, commercial or agricultural use, subject to the approval of the Board of Adjustment after a public hearing.
