## FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note.

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

- 1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles use your ash tray.
- 5. Don't burn at home Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TENTATIVE WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Tamworth qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tamworth School in said district on the 2nd day of April 1960, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
  - 8. To see what sum of money the district will

raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to accept the services of a supervisory union music supervisor and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,172.60 for the purpose.
- 10. Resolved that the Tamworth school district petition the State Board of Education to become a member of a cooperative school district which may include in addition to this district the following districts: namely, Brookfield, Effingham, Madison, Ossipee, Freedom.
- 11. To elect two representatives of the district to serve on an interim committee to prepare a financial budget for the operation of the proposed cooperative school district.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and accept in the name of the school district for educational purposes such funds or grants-in-aid as may be obtainable from the State or Federal Government or any department or agency thereof, or any other sources.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Tamworth:

During the school year of 1958-59 the teachers in the Tamworth School were:

Early in the current year the school was deeply grieved by the death of Mrs. Ethel Berry. Mrs. Berry had served the schools of Tamworth faithfully and well for many years.

We are pleased to welcome back to the staff Mrs. Janet Johnston as the teacher of the first grade. Mrs. Johnston taught here two years ago. In September of the current year Mr. Thomas F. Moore, Jr., joined the staff. Mr. Moore is a graduate of Clark University. All the other teachers of last year returned to their respective positions. Tamworth is most fortunate to have an outstanding teaching staff.

During the year Tamworth School had an average enrollment of 172. In September of the current year the school opened with 184 pupils.

There were 67 high school pupils enrolled in Kennett High School and eight pupils at the Quimby School. The tuition rate in both schools was \$350.00.

In September of the current year there were 64 Tamworth pupils in Kennett High School and eight at the Quimby School. Tuition rates are \$355.00 and \$350.00 respectively.

The school health program continues under the competent supervision of the community nurse, Mrs. Thelma Roberts, R. N., with the annual physical examinations by Dr. Remick.

At the last annual district meeting an appropriation of \$15,000.00 was voted for the construction of an additional classroom. This room was completed and occupied in November. The room is attached to the south end of the building and now is the homeroom of the fourth grade.

#### COOPERATIVE SCHOOL STUDY

Six school districts presented a cooperative school district article in their warrants at the last annual district meetings. The districts voted as follows: Brookfield voted against joining a cooperative school district; Ossipee and Madison voted decisively for the cooperative; Effingham, Freedom, and Tamworth voted to continue the study for another year. At the date of this report the general committee has met and the several sub-committees are working on new reports to be made to the districts prior to the annual district meetings.

#### MUSIC SUPERVISOR

At the annual Supervisory Union meeting held in May, 1959 the union board members voted that a committee should study the feasibility of employing a music supervisor to serve the schools of the union. Serving on the committee were Mr. Raymond Kennard,

Effingham; Mrs. Mabel Davis, Freedom; Mrs. Elizabeth Brady, Madison; Mr. Harry May, Ossipee; Mrs. Dorothy Moody, Tamworth; and Mr. Howard Hobbs, Wakefield.

This committee reported that the project is entirely feasible and recommended that each district include in its warrant an article with an appropriation for the service. The supervisory union board accepted the recommendation unanimously. Our schools now have no music instruction under the direction of a trained supervisor. No provision is made for this important aspect of our pupils' education. These are the only schools in the state that do not have a supervised music program. The expense of this program will be allocated to the districts on the same basis as the other supervisory union expenses. I urge all citizens to support this project.

The Tamworth School is truly a community school. It is a good school because so many individuals and organizations take an active interest in it and are very generous in their efforts and contributions to help provide fine educational opportunities to Tamworth children. It is difficult to name all these people. Particularly worthy of commendation are the members of the school board who are untiring in their efforts to discharge the responsibilities of their office.

#### TAMWORTH SCHOOL LIBRARY REPORT

The Tamworth School Library continues to grow and to become an increasingly active and meaningful part of our children's education. Mrs. Harry Damon and Mrs. Myrick Crane, with substitute help from Mrs. Rolf Spicer and Mrs. Edward Moody, are on duty at the school every Thursday from 8:30 to 12:00. In addition to this time, all of which is volunteer service, our librarians spend many hours ordering, cataloguing, and arranging books in preparation for the weekly library periods for children.

The following facts and figures demonstrate the activity and growth of the library during the past year:

Number of books in library: over 875

Books checked out during year: 7,567, an average of 44 per pupil

Magazines: (subscriptions donated by Mrs. Crane and Mr. and Mrs. Damon) Audubon Magazine, Popular Science, Field and Stream, Children's Activities, Popular Mechanics, National Geographic, Seventeen, Hot Rod (This last is a particularly popular number with the 7th and 8th grade boys, and the issues are in well-thumbed tatters before they are two weeks old.)

#### Ethel Berry Memorial Fund:

Donations from Townspeople - \$132.50

Donations from School Children and Teachers - \$94.50

From this fund have been purchased a 20-volume World Book Encyclopedia and 101 new books, including three new copies of Webster's Collegiate Dictionary - in great demand by students (involuntary) of vocabulary in the 8th grade.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Damon contributed the new

American Heritage, Jr. Mrs. Marjory Gane Harkness has given us The American Heritage Book of Great Historic Places and the Rainbow Book of Science by Donald Culross Peattie.

In August, at a library-benefit meeting open to the public, Mrs. Crane showed slides taken during her trip to Japan, and Miss Irene Irwin sold flowers. Fifty dollars was collected for the library at this meeting, and one interested guest, Mrs. Nathan Foster of Beverly, subsequently gave \$100.00 to the library fund.

Also available to the children are books sent to the school by the Tamworth Town Library and the New Hampshire State Bookmobile, which loans about 180 books every two months.

The school children and their teachers are grateful to all those who contributed to the success of this truly remarkable school library. Its continued growth and development depend on the continued support of the many friends of the school.
