#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear the reports of Selectmen and other Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges, and take any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class IV roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$296.89 the State to contribute \$1,979.24.

6. To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of the Town Dump.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the care of trees.

8. To raise and appropriate money for parks and playgrounds, including band concerts.

9. To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries.

10. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.

11. To raise and appropriate money for Town Library.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of the Town Hall and Municipal Building.

13. To raise and appropriate money for Town Welfare, Old Age Assistance and Soldier's Aid.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward the maintenance of Mount Moosilaukee Health Center.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$90.53 for the White Mountain Region Association.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the benefit of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$228.00 for the Pemi Baker Home Health Agency.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or borrow the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purchase of a new Power Grader for the Highway Department.

19. To see if the Town will vote to replace the ceiling in the Town Hall and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for this purpose.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Trustee of the Warren Village Cemetery and the Se-

lectmen to market certain trees in the cemetery and to make all necessary arrangements relative to cutting of the trees and disposal of all brush so accumulated.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any parcels of tax deeded real estate and to determine any conditions of such sales.

22. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on property taxes of 1967 and determine the date and percentage of the same.

23. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate money for the same.

24. Shall the provisions of Chapter 117A of the Revised Laws, relative to playing beano be adopted in the town.

25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

26. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Again this year the Department has been very careful with expenses and arrived at the end of the year with an unexpended balance of \$350.54, out of an appropriation of \$500. This \$350.54 when added to the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund of \$1,274.60 with the income of last year of \$62.24, makes a total of \$1,687.38. This fund has been saved by the Firemen during the last few years, for the future purchase of Fire Equipment when need demands. The Firemen, themselves, out of their special fund this year have purchased a two-way radio for the Pumper, and also a very good two-way portable, which seems to reach the surrounding towns very easily. This is a needed addition to the Department, and was no expense to the voters, as the Firemen raised these funds themselves.

Our major fire this year was of course the Whitcher Saw Mill which was completely destroyed, with a great loss to Mr. Whitcher. The town is most fortunate that this gentleman had the courage and foresightedness to rebuild this mill, bigger and better than before.

#### FOREST FIRE REPORT

Fire records are made by people—those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

- 1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
- 2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres—a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

- 1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.
- 2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
- 3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
- 4. Most important—Instruct your children that matches are not playthings.

## TRULY—ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT FOREST FIRES

The Warren Warden this year issued 99 fire permits, and the Town had one forest fire burning over only one-fourth acre.

During the year it became necessary to replace the pump. The commissioners were authorized to borrow \$200.00 for this purpose. When application for the new loan was made, officials of the Concord Savings Bank suggested that we consolidate the balances of our three previous loans. This was done and one note in the amount of \$1,700.00 represents the total indebtedness of the district.

Another season without costly freezing has improved our financial position. We are still plagued by some uncollected water rents but actually this problem is less than in some previous years as water rents in 1966 were about 98% paid. Probably the reduction in water charges would be most welcome but it seems better to build up a fairly large reserve fund for the next year or two and then perhaps consider the installation of some type of rust inhibiting device. It might be well to consider the installation of a man-hole and cover at the end of the line on the east side of the highway in front of the residence of Reginald Evans. This would enable better access to the line in case of trouble.

#### **TOWN OF WARREN**

#### COMMENTS

Some questions should arise concerning a few suggested appropriations and some changes in sums asked for in regular appropriations. For the first time in many years no appropriation has been requested for the control of white pine blister rust. It appears that no work of eradication is anticipated in Warren in 1967.

After some consideration by the Selectmen, it was decided to suggest increases in salaries for various offices which are filled annually at town meeting. There was no intention to omit election officials who are elected bi-annually or whose duties are required only at biennial elections. The following schedule is the suggestion of the Board of Selectmen and can be discussed and acted upon under the second article in the warrant, which includes salaries of town officers. The increases suggested for cemetery trustees are shown but paid from cemetery appropriations. The tax collector is traditionally paid some per cent of the property taxes collected. Obviously this amount fluctuates and vet the amount of work he does to collect those taxes does not vary. Perhaps consideration could be given to a fixed salary for that office.

The Pemi Baker Home Health Agency is largely a voluntary organization but appears to have considerable merit. It seeks to provide nursing services in private homes where possible. It has the endorsement of many physicians who recognize that some hospital patients could receive adequate care from a visiting nurse. Actually the institution of Medicare makes this program almost mandatory as certain types of care are guaranteed to recipients of Medicare benefits. In an area of only minimum medical care this could be a very valuable program. Mrs. Margaret Whitcher has represented Warren since January 1, 1967. and has learned quite a lot about the program and its potential value.

Our road agent has been doing a good job in maintaining our roads, bridges and the dump. He has suggested the need of trading the Huber-road Maintainer for a slightly larger used model. The present Huber has probably paid for itself and should be replaced before costly repairs or a new motor becomes necessary. One such machine is being reserved for Warren if favorable action is taken at Town Meeting.

Thanks to some volunteer help plus available funds from last year's appropriation, the tennis court is now completed and serving its purpose as a recreational facility which increases in popularity every year. The overdraft was due to cost of welding supports for the wire. The ceiling at the town hall certainly needs to be replaced. Some investigation of materials and costs of replacement has been made. Quite obviously the ceiling must be made of some material which will be both durable and decorative. A price of \$700.00 has been estimated as the probable cost of such replacement.

The annual school carnival has become a well established custom in Warren. The amount of interest, enthusiasm and participation seems to increase each year. Warren can be justly proud of this event. Our special recognition to Irving Cushing for use of his ski slope for these annual carnival events.

We are still having some problems in the use of the town hall, but it is hoped these can be resolved without curtailing its use.

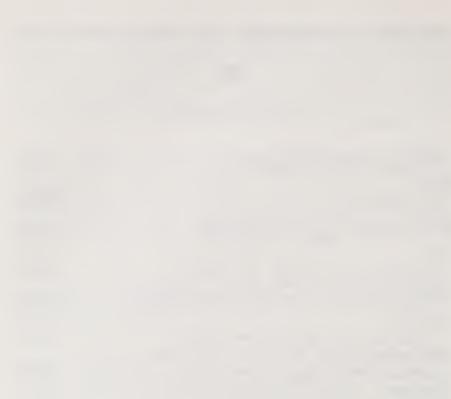
The Tree Warden has a problem in the lower Main Street area where several large trees need to be removed very soon in the interests of safety. #### **REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

When school started this year there were two changes in the faculty. Howard Wheeler, who attended Keene Normal School and later graduated from Plymouth State College, replaced Peter Thomson who has temporarily left teaching. Mr. Wheeler has previous experience as an elementary Principal and teacher in the southern part of the state.

Ruth Tilson replaced Helen Evans who retired. I am sure most of us did not want to see Mrs. Evans retire but Mrs. Tilson has proven to be a most adequate replacement. Mrs. Tilson graduated from New Paltz State Teachers College in New York and had several years of teaching experience in that state. I am satisfied at this point that the children of Warren are receiving a good education.

There are several matters that should be brought to your attention which should be of interest to you in the administration and supervision of your school system. As I mentioned in a previous report, we are in a position where many of our textbooks should be replaced. Most of the books we are using are worn out as well as outdated and far superior ones are now available. I am recommending, with school board approval, and have placed in the budget for next year enough funds to replace textbooks in reading and arithmetic throughout the school. It is my opinion that these are two of the most important areas and should be done first.

There will again be an article in the warrant regarding the hot lunch program. I would hope some time it might be possible to operate the program during more of the school year but this, of course, is dependent upon your wishes. The program is also in need of equipment and this too will appear under a separate article. The supervisor of lunches is doing an excellent job with the equipment she has but there is no question that what is being asked for is badly needed.

A report will be found elsewhere concerning the use of the Title I funds that were voted last March. As was explained in your recent special meeting, funds voted last year were used largely for equipment. This was done because time was too short to employ and use personnel with any degree of efficiency. The program for this year will consist of a Teachers' Aide to help students who are progressing more slowly or not up to their capacity three days per week and physical education conducted by Peter Thomson one day per week. As the programs progress, if you have any questions, do not hesitate to contact me.

You perhaps have read or heard that some type of study will be resumed soon either on the basis of a Cooperative or AREA school. The Warren School District is in somewhat of a different position than other districts. Many of the other towns either by geography or tradition send all their high school pupils to one place. This is not true in your case. Whether or not a committee should be elected or appointed can be discussed by you under an article in the warrant.

#### **EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S**

#### SALARY

Chapter 189, Section 48 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district, and their share of same. Said report shall be filed with the school board of each school district involved and shall be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be made for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrator, if any is in service in the union."

One half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of \$10,850.00 which was received by the Superintendent of Schools of Supervisory Union #48 during the 1965-66 school year was made up as follows: \$5,000.00 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$5,850.00 pro-rated among the several school districts which now include Warren. Allowances of \$1,300.00 for travel within the Union was also prorated as stated above. The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each of the six school districts:

Much use is being made of the Audio Visual equipment recently obtained in the school and the children are receiving considerable benefit from this equipment. With minimum instruction, many students operate the television, motion picture projector, tape recorder, record player and strip projector.

The enrollment has varied since school convened with between 81 to 85 students. A study by the teachers and various tests reveals that individual help is needed by some students in various phases and it is encouraging to have Mrs. Evans and Mr. Thomson to give us needed assistance. Our utmost and sincere desire is to upgrade the scholastic standing of our Village school.

Mrs. Wilson has given us a vast wealth of music appreciation and fundamentals. Her Christmas program was most gratifying and with every student participating. I think everyone will agree the lower grades captured everyone's heart. Mrs. Fisher has done a commendable job with a great deal of effort expended with little public knowledge. Our bus drivers continue to give their best, getting the students to school in spite of all the inclement weather we have had. The school lunch program with Mrs. Hight and Mrs. Bemis is continuing with its usual good taste and high quality. Around 90% of the enrollment participate in the hot lunch program. A word of thanks must be extended to Mr. Whitcher in the maintenance of our school and to Mr. Moody for his cooperation in the almost constant use of the Town Hall.

Above all, appreciation and thanks must be expressed to the School Board, Mr. Bowie, and the people of Warren for their help and cooperation.
