RECORD OF TOWN MEETING
Weare, New Hampshire

March 11th, 1952

At a legal meeting of the Inhabitants of Weare, on the 11th day of March, 1952, at nine o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Scott F. Eastman.

Voted to dispense with the reading of the Warrant.

Check-list posted by the Supervisors. Whole number names on Check-list 936.

It was moved that a moment of silence be observed in respect to our former Moderator, Alfred Osborne.

Polls opened for the election of town officers. Also candidates for the office of President of the United States, Vice-President, Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, Delegates and Alternates Delegates for District No. 2.

Voted to keep polls open until 7:30 P. M., closed at 12:30 for lunch.

Article No. 1. Whole number votes cast 634.

For Town Clerk

Minnie T. Peaslee had 599, Brennan Colburn had 1.

For Town Treasurer

Henry T. Osborne had 565, Joseph Brennan had 1, Scott F. Eastman had 1.

Selectman for Three Years

J. Hardy Legge had 347, Vernon R. Wood had 258, Ren Philbrick had 1.

For Road Agent

Bernard L. Phelps, Jr. had 416, Bryan W. Sargent had 213.

For Overseer of Poor

J. Hardy Legge had 542, Scattering 11.

For Auditors

Charles F. Eastman had 566, Theodore W. Flanders had 542, William T. Stokes had 542, Scattering 4.

Minnie T. Peaslee, Town Clerk; J. Hardy Legge, Selectman and Overseer of Poor, and Bernard L. Phelps, Jr., Road Agent, in open meeting, were declared elected by the Moderator and took the oath of office by law prescribed.

Article No. 2. Recommendations of Finance Committee we raise the sum of \$16,450.00. Selectman Albert Farmer explained to the voters what this money was used for. Motion made by Gerald Hight and voted in the affirmative, we raise \$16,450.00 to defray town charges.

Article No. 3. Upon motion of George Sawyer voted the Clerk cast one ballot for George A. Waterman for Trustee of Trust Funds for three years. This being done the Moderator declared George A. Waterman elected Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

Article No. 4. Upon motion of Charles Rose voted the Clerk cast one ballot for Eva M. Sawyer for Trustee of Library for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Eva M. Sawyer elected Trustee of Weare Library for three years.

Article No. 5. Motion made by Charles F. Eastman and accepted that the collection of taxes be left with the Selectmen.

Article No. 6. Finance Committee's recommendation was that 2% be allowed on taxes paid in 30 days on presentation of bill. Motion made by Peter Hooper and accepted that 2% be allowed on taxes if paid in thirty days after the presentation of bill.

Article No. 7. Recommendation of Finance Committee. That the Selectmen and Town Treasurer be authorized on behalf of the town to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. recommendation was \$45,000. Motion made and adopted that the Selectmen and Town Treasurer be allowed to borrow, but not to exceed \$45,000.00.

Article No. 8. No recommendation by Finance Committee. Open for discussion; Selectman Charles C. Evans spoke

and explained the article. Motion by Frederic T. Whitney and carried, That the article be adopted as read.

Article No. 9. No report by Finance Committee. Motion made by Charles Rose and accepted, That the article be accepted as read.

Article No. 10. Recommendations of Finance Committee was \$100.00. Motion made by Franklin Flanders and approved. The sum of \$100.00 be appropriated to the Merrimack Valley Region Association.

Article No. 11. No recommendation by Finance Committee. Lengthy discussion. Voted the article be dismissed.

Article No. 12. Finance Committee's report was "to be left with the Selectmen." Selectman Farmer spoke. Motion made by George Sawyer to adopt Article 12. The increase of hourly rate of pay, to be left with the Selectmen. This motion carried.

Article No. 13. Recommendation of Finance Committee was \$16,000.00. Harold Flanders moved we raise \$16,000.00 for repair of highways and bridges. Discussion. Moved the motion prevail.

Article No. 14. Recommendation of Finance Committee was \$1,606.16. Selectman Farmer explained the use of this. Moved and supported we raise \$1,606.16 to be used with the sum of \$10,707.73 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and V Construction, Reconstruction or Betterment Aid.

Article No. 15. Recommendation of Finance Committee was "to indefinitely postpone, also recommended this be for discussion." Mr. Martel, a land owner, was asked to speak. Several spoke, a lengthy discussion. Motion made by Mr. McGlenen and carried to dismiss the article.

Article No. 16. No recommendation by Finance Committee. Finance Committee asked Selectman Farmer to explain this article. Motion made to abandon part (A) the, so-called new road in Craney Hill section. Part (B) to abandon four pieces or all excepting the piece near Earl Dearborn's and Frederic Whitney's property. Part (C) to abandon (6) six pieces, excepting by Arthur Rice's and the connecting link in South Weare Village.

Article No. 17. Finance Committee's recommendation was to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 as recommended by the Selectmen. Moved by Frederic Whitney and accepted to adopt this article.

Article No. 18. Finance Committees' recommendation was to legalize the expenditure made by buying truck and snow plows. Much discussion. Motion made and accepted to legalize the expenditure.

Article No. 19. Recommendation of Finance Committee was \$2,200.00, to be raised for Weare Volunteer Fire Department. Lengthy discussion. Motion made by Harold Flanders to raise \$2,600.00. This motion carried.

Article No. 20. Recommendation of Finance Committee was \$100.00. Motion made by George Sawyer and accepted that we raise \$100.00 for water holes.

Article No. 21. Finance Committee left this open to the judgment of the Library Trustee. Recommendation of Eva M. Sawyer was \$300.00. Motion made by Mr. Glenen and approved that \$300.00 be raised.

Article No. 22. Recommendation of Finance Committee was \$300.00. Motion made by Guy Eaton that we raise \$300.00 but \$100.00 be reserved to buy markers for soldiers' graves that had no markers. This motion carried.

Article No. 23. No recommendation by Finance Committee. Discussion. Motion made by Charles F. Eastman we raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to the Town History Committee. Motion carried.

Article No. 24. Finance Committee's recommendation was \$300.00. Motion made by Bernard Phelps, Sr., that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Band Concerts. Motion carried.

Article No. 25. Finance Committee's recommendation was \$300.00. Motion made by Charles Rose that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the Chase Recreational Park. Motion carried.

Article No. 26. Recommendation of Finance Committee was not to raise any money as they had money on hand from last year. Motion made by Vernon Wood and approved we raise \$350.00 for Civil Air Defense.

Article No. 27. Finance Committee recommended \$200.00. Motion made by Vernon Wood and carried, that we raise \$200.00 for Memorial Day.

Article No. 28. Motion made by Gordon Russell, Sr., and approved that "the gates at the Weare Reservoir" be opened wide and water lowered as a prevention of another flood. Selectmen to have charge of same.

Article No. 29. Motion made by Charles F. Eastman and seconded, that four members of the Finance Committee be changed every year. The four members who had been in office the longest, be replaced. The Moderator replacing same but no member to succeed himself for one year.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Weare on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and to cast ballots in regard to licensing Beano in the Town of Weare.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, or act in relation thereto.

- (a) Town Officers' salaries.
- (b) Town Officers' expenses.
- (c) Expense of Town Hall and other buildings.
- (d) Election and registration.
- (e) Police department.
- (f) Forest fires.
- (g) Insurance.
- (h) Vital statistics.
- (i) Health department.
- (j) Town dump.
- (k) Town poor
- (l) Old age assistance.
- (m) Soldiers' aid.
- (n) Damages and legal expenses.
- (o) White pine blister rust control.
- (p) Social security.
- (q) Town well and ditch pump.

3. To choose by separate ballot, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

4. To choose by separate ballot, one Trustee of the Library for three years.

5. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.
6. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.
7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer, to borrow money on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes, said loans to be payable from taxes for the year 1953, and to issue notes therefor, in the name of the Town, at such rate of interest and payable at such time, within one year, and place as the selectmen shall decide.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges, and take any other vote in relation thereto.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,587.71, to be used with the sum of \$10,584.73 to be furnished by the State, for Class IV and V construction, reconstruction and betterment aid.
10. To see if the Town will vote
 - (a) to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$4,000, the State to contribute a like amount, for the reconstruction of the two bridges on State Route No. 77 in the Tavern Village, or in the alternative,
 - (b) to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$7,000, the State to contribute a like amount, for replacing the Half Moon Meadow bridge, also on State Route No. 77.
11. To see if the Town will vote to buy a loader, or other similar equipment, for the use of the Highway Department, appoint a committee to purchase such equipment, and appropriate a sum of money for such purchase.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to continue membership in the Merrimack Valley Region Association.
13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Volunteer Fire Department.
14. To see if the Town will vote to buy a truck or trucks to replace one or both of the present trucks in the Fire

Department, now in service in South and East Weare Villages, and to appropriate a sum of money for the same.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the moneys appropriated under Articles 10, 11 and 14, by authorizing the Selectmen to borrow such sums in the name of the Town, by notes, serial notes, or bonds, as provided in Chapter 72, Revised Laws of 1942 and amendments thereto, the proceeds thereof to be used for the purposes stated in said Articles; and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the times and place of payment and rate of interest on said notes, serial notes or bonds; and to do whatever may be necessary to the issuance thereof.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for water holes and to repair the Riverdale dam.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the Concord hospital.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of neglected cemeteries.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for band concerts.

20. To see if the Town will vote to accept the bequest contained in the will of Mrs. Sarah Hazard Peaslee, of all her books for the use of the Weare Library, and the sum of \$3,000, the income only to be used for the purposes of that Library, the bequest to be named for and help in memory of her late husband, Robert J. Peaslee.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Weare Library.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to maintain the Chase Recreational Park, and to appoint a new committee to make recommendations to the Selectmen as to regulations, expenditures and feasibility of levying a fee for its use.

24. To see if the Town will vote to abandon the Class VI road that connects State Route No. 114 with the Mount William Road near the residence of Leila Buxton.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF LOCAL CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

We, of the Local Civil Defense Unit, had our first meeting August 9, 1950. Since then we have had several meetings, but not many attended them. I imagine it is hard to make yourself believe that anything serious could happen in this so-called peace time. But our military heads have a different idea of what could happen if we are not prepared. What we have done in the past, and what we are doing now has not cost us much in actual cash, only a lot of time and effort. I do not think any of us begrudge any of that either.

We are not only preparing from the military point of view, but also for any disaster that may come to our area. We have as you all know an excellent Fire Department to take care of any emergency in that line. We also have a very good First Aid Unit who could give a good account of itself if the need ever be. I would like to organize an Auxiliary Police Unit in the near future if possible.

The Ground Observer Corp took over the Observation Post on Slacks Hill, November 4, 1950. Since that date up to July 14, 1952 they have answered ten alerts of from two to thirty-three hours of duration. On July 14, 1952 the United States Air Force decided it was advisable to operate on a twenty-four hour basis. The Observation Post has been operating twenty-four hours a day since that date, and I hope it continues to do the same good job as long as the need be.

It has been made possible through the untiring effort of the Chief Observer Mrs. Iola Tenney, and the splendid cooperation of all the observers who have unselfishly given their time and effort to such a worthwhile project. I want to thank everyone for all they have done.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

Thirty-one alarms were answered by the department during 1952 as follows: Nine fires involving buildings or contents, 16 chimney fires, 5 brush or grass fires and 1 car fire.

Again we have had an increase in the number of building fires over the previous year but losses were much less than in 1951. The causes of these fires are interesting, namely; lightning, gasoline engine, smoking, children playing with matches, electric wiring, oil heater, defective chimney. Most of these fires could have been prevented by observing the following simple rules. Don't overload electric circuits or put pennies in fuse box. Have your oil burning equipment installed and regularly serviced by a competent serviceman. Have faulty chimneys repaired or rebuilt and keep stove pipes clean and in good conditions. Teach children the dangers of fire and to respect it.

Grass and brush fires were held to small size by prompt reporting and quick action. Most of them were started by carelessness or from burning grass or rubbish without a permit. Anyone burning in the open is liable for all costs of extinguishment and any damage done by a fire that gets away. Don't take chances. Get a permit, have sufficient help to control your fire and put it completely out before leaving it.

The value of carrying water in tank trucks was demonstrated many times during the past year. Our tank truck was definitely responsible for the saving of several buildings.

The Weare Department held 12 monthly meetings and several drills during the year. Drills are very important, not only to train our new men who are constantly coming into the Department, but to keep all the members familiar with the equipment and its use.

New equipment purchased and put into service during 1952 includes: Two new type primers for the front end pumps on South and East Weare trucks, 2 large sirens for these same trucks, a portable electric flood lighting outfit which makes night work on fires much more safe and efficient.

The Resuscitator, which was purchased with funds raised through drives and donations, is kept ready to be dispatched whenever required. Fortunately, we have not had to use it during the year. Classes were held and several persons trained in its operation.

An important accomplishment during 1952 has been the building of the new Fire Station at South Weare. The lumber for it was cut, yarded out, taken to be sawed, stuck up, dried and planed by members of the Department. A very fine site for it was given by Arthur Bailey. Members of the Department cleared the site of trees, burned the brush, and carted in gravel for the foundation to be poured on. The Redimix Cement Co., of Manchester, through the efforts of one of our firemen, very generously contributed the cement for the foundation and floor. I wish, for the Department, to thank all those who assisted in the building of this Station. It fills a real need and requires only a chimney, insulation of the interior, and painting, to make it a very practical and useful station which can be heated, and the equipment housed there, properly taken care of.

The Department started a series of fund-raising activities to get uniforms for those members who attend conventions, fire schools, firemen's entertainments, and so that the Department could take a more active part in parades and other civic functions. At the end of 1952, 11 men are being outfitted.

As of 1953 the Department has only one truck less than 20 years of age. The trucks of 1928-1930 vintage should be replaced. The brakes and lights cannot compete with modern vehicles and it is not safe to have men risking their lives in them. Parts for these old trucks can only be obtained from junked vehicles, if at all. The Department and Fire Wards both strongly advocate the replacement of any of these old trucks with a new truck similar to our tanker No. 4, but with a 500 gallon tank, the additional space and capacity being fitted for hose ladders and other equipment. The equipment at present on the old truck could all be transferred and pump, siren, suction hose, discharge hose, booster line, ladders, tools, lights, etc., would be adequate to equip it.

The meeting room at the Central Station was used as the 5th grade classroom from the beginning of school until the Christmas vacation pending completion of the new Grammar School.

The Ladies' Auxiliary to the Weare Fire Department is active and of great assistance to the Fire Department. It has served several meals to the members of the Department during and after fires.

The Department appreciates the cooperation received from the townspeople and urges everyone to take all possible measures to prevent the loss of life and property from fire.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Weare qualified to vote in district affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district upon the 6th day of March, 1952 at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate as a deficiency appropriation for the school year 1951-52, such deficiency arising from the necessary repairs made at the East Weare School.

10. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the installation of toilets and other necessary repairs at the East Weare School.

11. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for playground equipment at the East Weare School.

12. To see if the district desires to increase the amount of insurance on the several school buildings and to raise and appropriate sufficient funds therefor.

13. To see if the district will vote to amend the action taken at the annual meeting of March, 1951 so as to authorize the School Board to lay foundation and rough framing of two additional rooms to the new central school, in so far as warranted by the funds previously provided by district action.

14. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to sell any or all of the following school buildings—Riverdale, Clinton Grove, North Weare and South Weare.

15. To see if the district will vote to prohibit the compatibility of Moderator and School Board Member held by any one person at the same time, until rescinded at some future District Meeting. (by petition)

16. To see if the district will vote to keep and maintain all school records for the Town of Weare within the Town until this vote is rescinded or its legality changed by law. (by petition).

RECORD OF SCHOOL MEETING 1952

The meeting was called to order and the warrant was read by the moderator.

Article 1. Scott Eastman and Gerald Hight were nominated. Total votes cast 167. Scott Eastman received 101. Gerald Hight received 64, Lyhl Perrigo 1, blank 1. Scott Eastman was elected and in open meeting took the oath of office prescribed by law.

Article 2. Elsie Purington was nominated. On motion, duly seconded it was voted that a member of the school board cast one ballot for Elsie Purington for clerk. This was done and the said Elsie Purington was declared elected and in open meeting took the oath of office prescribed by law.

Article 3. James J. Fitzpatrick, Crandall Wallenstein, and Lyhl Perrigo were nominated. Total number of votes cast 210. James J. Fitzpatrick received 129, Crandall Wallenstein 12 and Lyhl Perrigo 67, blank 1, August Bruyneel 1. James J. Fitzpatrick was declared elected and in open meeting took the oath of office prescribed by law.

Article 4. Samuel D. Chase was nominated. On motion duly seconded it was voted that the clerk cast one ballot for Samuel D. Chase for Treasurer which was done and the said Samuel D. Chase was declared elected.

Article 5. On motion of Charles Eastman it was unanimously voted that this be left until after Town Meeting, the School Board to be paid the same as the town votes to pay other town officers.

Article 6. The report of the Building Committee was read and accepted.

Article 7. On motion of Eunice Marshall it was voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Lyhl E. Perrigo and one for Norman Chase for members of the Building Committee. On motion duly seconded it was voted that the town auditors audit the school district books.

Article 8. The Finance Committee recommends the amount in the proposed budget, \$60,428. On motion of Albert S. Farmer it was voted to increase this amount by \$100 to take care of district officers' salaries. Total appropriation to read \$60,528.

Article 9. It was moved by Albert S. Farmer that \$1,800 be raised and appropriated as a deficiency appropriation for 1951. Lyhl E. Perrigo gave a report of expenditures incurred for repairs to the East Weare Schoolhouse. The motion carried.

Article 10. On motion of George Johnson it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for the installation of toilets at the East Weare School.

Article 11. On motion of Charles Rose it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for playground equipment for the East Weare School.

Article 12. On motion of Wendell Colburn it was voted to authorize the School Board to place additional fire insurance on the High School building, \$10,000 additional on the High School building and \$2,000 additional on the shop. On motion of Hardy Legge it was voted to authorize the School Board to increase the fire insurance on the East Weare School \$3,000. On motion of George Sawyer it was voted to authorize the School Board to increase the fire insurance on South Weare and the Center Schools \$2,000.

Article 13. On motion of Charles Rose it was voted to amend the action taken at the annual meeting of March, 1951 and to authorize the School Board to lay foundation for six rooms, finishing four rooms and rough framing the two additional rooms.

Article 14. On motion of George Sawyer it was unanimously voted to sell the Clinton Grove Schoolhouse to Harold V. Flanders for \$1.00 and to preserve it as a museum to be known as the Weare Historical Society. Mr. Flanders will keep the building in repair and will set up a trust fund to continue same in future years. Rev. E. W. McGlenen read a history of the Clinton Grove Academy. On motion of Charles Eastman it was voted to postpone action on North Weare, South Weare, and Riverdale until next year.

Article 15. It was moved by Hardy Legge and seconded by Wendall Colburn that the article be dismissed. There was much discussion and Hardy Legge offered to withdraw his motion. Wendell Colburn refused to withdraw and the motion carried.

Article 16. It was moved by Ernest Leeds that the article be adopted. After much discussion, Mr. Leeds withdrew his motion. It was then moved by Charles Eastman that the article be dismissed. The motion carried.

Article 17. Rev. Edward McGlenen asked all townspeople to look in their attics for old school records. Charles Eastman suggested that the finance committee be rotated, appointing four members each year. Rev. Edward McGlenen suggested that the twelve members should be reappointed as of this year, four members for one year, four members for two years, four members for three years, no member to succeed himself. Hardy Legge then moved to accept Mr. McGlenen's plan and the motion carried. It was moved by Eunice Marshall that the district be authorized to accept George Johnson's offer of land for use as a playground for the East Weare School. The motion carried.

There being no further business, it was moved to adjourn. The meeting adjourned.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Weare:

I hereby submit my annual report as superintendent of the schools of Weare.

Teaching Staff

The opening of the present school year saw several changes in our teaching staff from that of the prior school year. Mrs. Elizabeth P. Straw asked to be released from her teaching duties and was replaced in Grade 6 at the Center by Mr. Spiro Anastos of Concord, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire. Mr. Anastos was designated as principal of all elementary grades in anticipation of the centralizing of most of our elementary pupils in the new Central School.

Two other elementary teachers did not desire to return,—Mrs. Frances Gaffney and Mrs. Louise Parker, both of whom taught at East Weare last year. Mrs. Evelyn Merrill of South Weare was secured to teach the one room now in operation at East Weare, Grades 1-3.

The remaining elementary teachers,—Mrs. Reita Davis, Mrs. Doris Morse and Mrs. Esther Hight all returned for 1952-53. In addition Mrs. Mary Rosewater of Pittsfield, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, was assigned to Grade 4 at the Center.

The high school staff had two changes and one addition. Mr. Earle Gavett, a graduate of the University of Maine, was employed as teacher of Vocational Agriculture to replace Mr. Clair Paine, who resigned to enter the armed forces. Miss Beverly Proctor, teacher of Home Economics, resigned to accept a position in New Jersey, and her place was taken by Miss Elizabeth Raymond, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, and a resident of Keene. Mr. Francis Sorger, Keene 1952, was employed as an additional teacher in the High School, such additional teacher being needed to handle the ever increasing high school enrollment in both junior and senior high groups.

Enrollments

May I call your attention to the table of enrollment figures included elsewhere in the reports of the School District. You will note that in the past five years our senior high school enrollment (grades 9-12) has increased 21.6%, our junior high 62.5%, and our total elementary enrollment (Grades 1-6) 40.4%.—an increase of 39.3% for all grades in our several schools.

I should also like to call your attention to the anticipated enrollments for the next four years. You will note that, although there is but little anticipated increase in Grades 1-6, the enrollment of the junior and senior high school steadily increases during the next several years. This increase in grades 7-12 will undoubtedly necessitate our leaving the seventh grade in the new Central School within the next few years. In the fall of 1954 we may expect 137 pupils in grades 7-12 in contrast with 114 at the present time. For all practical purposes the number of pupils who can be effectively cared for in the high school building should not exceed the present figures.

New Central School

At this writing our new Central School is practically completed, and all pupils of the town with the exception of East Weare (Grades 1-3) are housed in the new unit or in the old Center School. Four units are in operation at the Central School. Three "regular" classrooms and the kitchen are completed and in use, as is a smaller room originally intended for other purposes. Two additional rooms are "in the rough" as provided in the action of the last school district meeting.

You will find elsewhere a financial report on the building program. As of December 31, 1952 we had expended \$41,924.41 of the \$47,000 provided by the last school meeting. However, as of December 31 there were several accounts outstanding which would indicate a \$1,500 deficit on the building project.

The problem of providing desks for the pupils in the new school presented a problem. To skid the old desks and chairs would necessitate a considerable expenditure for labor and materials. It was the feeling of the School Board that we should purchase desk-chair units from the School District of Derry, which units they were replacing in order to have uniform seats throughout their new school building. The

amount paid for some 155 units was \$1,950 or an average cost of \$12.60 per unit over against \$28.00 for new furniture.

Most of the above mentioned units were placed in the new Central School, some 20 were used to replace outmoded units in the Center School, and also to provide added seats for the additional pupils in that building.

The 1953-54 Budget

Elsewhere in the School Report you will find the proposed budget for the school year 1953-54. Unfortunately, but necessarily, the total appropriation of \$65,887.99 is some \$4,200 over that of 1952-53. This increase is mainly due to (1) an additional teacher on the elementary level, together with slight increases on teachers' salaries, (2) increased insurance both on existing buildings (as voted in 1952) plus insurance on the new Central School, (3) redistribution on the salary of the school nurse between the four employing districts, and (4) an increase in the transportation item to raise it to the actual expenditure for 52-53.

1953-54 Warrant

In addition to the budget items, your 53-54 Warrant includes several additional items for your consideration.

1. Sale of Unused School Houses: The Philbrick-Clement Post No. 65, American Legion is interested in securing the North Weare School, and interest has also been shown by individuals in purchasing the South Weare and Riverdale Schools.
2. Completion of the Central School: Our anticipated enrollment figures for 53-54 warrant the completion of the two unfinished rooms in the new school. It has been estimated by several persons that the completion of these rooms can be done for \$6,000.00.
3. Deficiency Appropriation: The anticipated income and expenses for the current school year show a probable deficit of \$3,000. This deficit is mainly due to—
 - a. Over-run on the new Central School.
 - b. New pupil desk-chair units.
 - c. Insurance on the new school.

The total of the above, minus unexpended balances on other items, will leave a deficit of approximately \$3,000 on the present school budget.

State Equalization Aid

These are difficult times, not only for the school district of Weare, but for all districts in the state. We all are experiencing an increasing number of pupils in our elementary schools, and we will soon feel this pressure on our high schools. We are faced with increasing operational costs on every hand, — for additional classrooms, teachers, supplies, and equipment.

For the most part the district income from sources other than taxation has not kept pace with the needs of our schools. Our income from Federal funds for agriculture and home economics is practically the same as it was ten years ago. State Aid during the present biennium is greater in total dollars than it was ten years ago, but it is not now meeting that proportionate part of the educational costs of our elementary schools which it did some years ago.

When the legislature created State Aid in 1919, some \$400,000 was appropriated annually. The figure remained unchanged until 1947 when it was increased to \$2,000,000, at which time Weare's share was \$12,000. In 1949 the total was reduced to \$400,000, and in 1951 increased to \$600,000.

In brief, we are now receiving but 50% more on a state-wide basis than we were when the aid was first established, but the number of pupils and costs of education have increased tremendously. If we are to provide our young people with that type of an education which they definitely deserve, it is mandatory that the state increase state aid to an amount commensurate with our needs. The State of New Hampshire now has the dubious honor of being 47th in the country in the amount of its aid to local districts.

Whether or not one believes in the principle that education is a function of the state, and that the state should share in the cost of such education, nevertheless, the cold fact remains that unless the state does contribute sufficient funds, the entire load will continue to rest on the landowner.

In Conclusion

The people of Weare can well be proud of their new elementary building. The road was long and rough. Your building committee and your school board spent many hours in planning the project. Undoubtedly, as is often the case in such an undertaking, you may wish that certain details had been handled differently. However, when one considers the costs of other school building projects, one realizes that

Weare has provided a building of which they can be justly proud, and that it has been built at a reasonable over-all cost.

In closing may I express my appreciation and the appreciation of the School Board, for the time, thought, and effort which was given by so many of our citizens in carrying through this project.
