1938 TOWN WARRANT
STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

STRAFFORD, SS.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Barrington qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are requested to meet at the Town House in Barrington on Tuesday, March 8, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1. To choose by ballot and major vote one Selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, and two Auditors for the ensuing year.

ART. 2. To choose by ballot and major vote a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

ART. 3. To choose all other necessary town officers.

ART. 4. To raise such sums of money as are necessary for the payment of State and County Taxes, Support of the Poor, and all other necessary Town charges.

ART. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance of Town roads and bridges.

ART. 6. To authorize the Selectmen to raise or appropriate money required to meet State or Federal money for projects in Barrington at their discretion.

ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$60.00 for the Jr. O. U. A. M. for Memorial Day.

ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and dis-

tribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with the other towns in the Lakes Region.

ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for blister rust control.

ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the celebration of the anniversary of the ratification of the Federal Constitution by the State, June 21, 1938, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen.

ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 provided the State will contribute \$3,000.00, the same to be expended on the Locke's Hill Road.

ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$793.23 provided the State will contribute \$3,172.94, the same to be expended on Class V Highways, T. R. A.

ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to join with the Towns of Northwood and Nottingham to purchase the dam at the outlet of North River Pond under the provisions of Section 4 of Chapter 42 of the Public Laws of 1926, as amended by Section 101 of Chapter 133 of the Laws of 1937, and to raise \$400.00 as its proportion of the cost thereof.

ART. 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

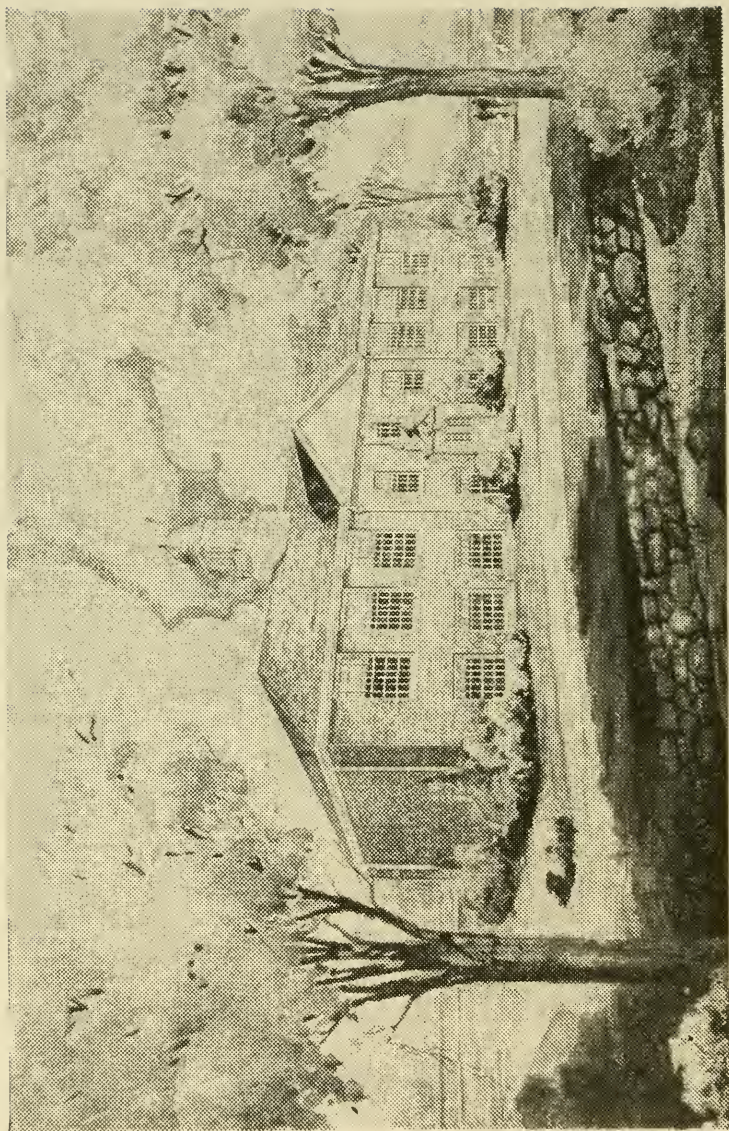

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Barrington:

With the acceptance of the new central school building by the Building Committee January 16, 1939, a project that was hardly more than a dream one year ago is now a reality. School has been conducted in the new building since September 19th. Teachers, parents, and pupils have expressed themselves as delighted with the light and airy classrooms, library, room for teachers, nurse, and reception of visitors, auditorium, practical arts rooms, and modern lavatories, including hot and cold water.

The building is of colonial style, constructed of brick, tile, concrete and steel, with wood trim, mastic tile floors over concrete, stairways of metal and concrete, lavatories having steel partitions and ceramic tile floors with drains. The hipped roof is surmounted by a beautiful cupola. Heating is by steam, with an automatic coal stoker. Ventilation is by ducts leading from the various rooms and provided with an exhaust fan.

New table-desks and chairs have been furnished for the primary room. Other equipment previously in use has been adapted to the new building. Certain items needed in the use or maintenance of the building should be furnished at the earliest opportunity, and others from time to time by district appropriation or gifts from individuals or organizations. Some generous gifts have already been made, including two connecting doors between classrooms by Mrs. Cassie C. Haley, metal flagpole by Mr. George Wormesley, outside flag by Mrs. Eva M. Chase, Bibles for classrooms by the South Barrington Baptist Society through Mr. Roy V. Swain, auditorium flag by the Woman's Re-

lief Corps of Dover through Mrs. Mae Folsom, office desk by Miss Josephine Haley, and auditorium chairs by several individuals and by entertainments held by the Building Committee and local organizations.

Although the opening of school was deferred for nearly two weeks, the close of school will be June 23, according to the school calendar, or only one week later than originally planned. Due to the greater efficiency of the new organization, it has been found possible to lengthen the noon period from one-half to one hour, giving the children extra time to play out of doors in the sunshine. Mr. Piper gives musical instruction in the four upper grades, and teaches practical arts to the boys in the same group, in cooperation with the 4-H. Mrs. Brock teaches practical arts to the girls in grades 5 to 8 making use of the 4-H program, and teaches language in the grammar and junior rooms, also supervising the hot lunch. At the time of first raising the flag on the playground, the whole school assembled out of doors and took part in patriotic exercises.

The auditorium has been put into use by the teachers with their pupils, and also by the community, including the children's Christmas entertainment, the President's Birthday Ball (for infantile paralysis) and parties to raise money for new equipment for the building. On application to the School Board (on forms now being designed), local non-profit organizations may be permitted to use the building free of

charge, provided the proceeds of admission or sales, if any, are for a recognized public cause or benevolence. Such organizations raising money for their own treasuries may be required to pay a nominal fee for the expense involved; private or commercial enterprises allowed to use the building will be charged more. The Boy Scouts have also been granted permission to meet in the building.

The problem of transportation has been handled by the use of two large new buses and a beach wagon. The transporters have agreed to come to the aid of one another under adverse conditions so as to furnish complete service; and they have faithfully carried out this provision of their contracts. Their efforts have met with general satisfaction as to schedules and service provided by the School Board. The children formerly attending North Lee School now attend in Barrington; and it is a source of satisfaction that the District can now care for all of its elementary pupils.

The report of the school nurse, Miss Margaret Macdonald, for last year shows a relatively high degree of health in the children in most respects. The one condition seeming to call for special concern on the part of parents of children affected is diseased tonsils, generally associated with defective breathing, of which there were 13 cases reported. Whooping cough was the most prevalent epidemic. Under the helpful sponsorship of the Woman's Club, Grange, and Garden Club, 29 children were treated in the Dental Clinic, with 80 treatments. Scales have been provided for frequent weighing of the children. The new building gives the nurse greatly improved facilities for carrying on her work.

The schoolyard grounds have been partially graded, enough to protect the foundation of the building, provide access to the building at all entrances,

cover the water tank, septic tank and tile field. Further grading will be necessary in order to gravel the drive, lay out the parking area, and put the playing fields into condition. I recommend that a plan of the grounds be adopted, and that all areas laid out in the future be in accordance with this plan. Room is available for the usual sports and games, as well as apparatus and free-playing areas for the different ages. The semi-circular parking area planned for the rear of the building would make an ideal outdoor stage, with the building in the background.

Barrington now has a school plant capable of almost any kind of educational development called for in years to come. Through the grant made by the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, the interest of our local, state, and national public officials, and the untiring efforts of the Building Committee and School Board members, the people of the town have given effective and enduring form to their determination to provide for their educational and related community activities a setting worthy of their importance to the happiness and welfare of the people.
