To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for lighting the streets with electricity.

5. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate money for same.

6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

7. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the municipal budget act.

8. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to convey land which the town took by condemnation at the request of the New Hampshire Highway Department, to Arthur J. Pierce in exchange for land which Mr. Pierce has agreed with the New Hampshire Highway Department to convey to the railroad for a relocated railroad station.

9. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of advertising the resources and natural advantages of the town, said sum to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see what action the town will take in regard to a play ground and raise and appropriate a sum of money for same or take any action thereto.

11. To see if the town will take any action in regard to plowing out door yards.

12. To see how much money the town will raise for statutory requirements and to carry the articles and the appropriations of the school meeting into effect.

13. To transact any any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS TO THE BENNINGTON SCHOOL BOARD

Herewith is presented the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools to the School Board and citizens of the Bennington, N. H. School District:

Due to the fact that the annual report covers a school year which runs from July 1 to the following June 30, your present superintendent is making the report cover-
int the superintendency of two others, and for a year in which he was not superintendent of schools.

It often seems inconvenient that a report should cover a period which has passed into history eight months before the report appears in print. Such being the case, however, we must ask you to remember that the year covered by this report closed on June 30, 1934.

Mr. Lawton Chase had been Superintendent of Schools for this district for a number of years, up to the time of his death in February, 1934. He was an able, conscientious worker, and his death was deeply regretted by his co-workers. He was followed by Mr. John Sinclair, who had had previous experience as a New Hampshire superintendent. Before the close of the year the Peterboro Supervisory Union was broken up and Bennington was joined to the Hillsboro Union.

Miss Mae Cashion returned as Principal of the building and teacher of Grades 1, 2, and 3. Miss Lulu M. Cillely again taught Grades 4, 5 and 6, Miss Ruth A. Putnam the 7th and 8th grades, and Miss Mabel Metze taught Grades 9 and 10 in the Pierce High School.

Schools were in session 179 days, almost reaching the desired standard of 180 days. I find that 21 visits were made by the Superintendent, 20 by the School Nurse, 14 by School Board members, and 116 by parents and friends.

The following table gives some desirable information worthy of preservation:

The percentage of attendance was high, especially high in Miss Cilley's room and the pupils, parents and teachers should be congratulated upon their promptness in attendance. Miss Cashion's pupils had a tardiness record per pupil of only 0.1, very near perfection.

The average attendance was 92, but there were in all 97 children in attendance during the year. I found no record of the number attending high schools in other districts, or the number attending post secondary schools, all of which would give our total school population.

Those who were neither absent nor tardy during the entire year constitute an honor roll of perfect attendance.
