

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Bethlehem:

This report includes statistics on attendance and health, chart and figures showing expenditures and appropriations for a period of twelve years, rcommendations for future appropriations, comments on transportation, on courses of study and classroom instruction, recommendations for some offerings of instruction to high school graduates and adults, and appreciation.

The total enrollment in your schools last year was 231—the enrollment in the elementary grades being 170, and in the high school 61. The average membership was 186 and the percentage of attendance 95.

This year the enrollment is 226—the elementary grades having 167, and the high school 59. The attendance records have been good.

The medical inspection report shows the following figures:

Dr. Page and Miss Bryant have been alert in their efforts to maintain excellent health conditions in the school. The clinics sponsored by the Littleton-Bethlehem Nursing Association have benefitted many pupils in Bethlehem. The school district should continue to support this institution.

The following table shows in parallel columns tax receipts, total expenditures, and current expenditures, not including debt and interest, for a period of twelve school years. The new school building has increased the total appropriations and the total expenditures. The current expenditures, found by deducting payments for bonds and interest, since the construction of this building are down to the average of the years before any appropriation for the new building was made. With approximately the same pupil enrollment and with substantially the same courses of study the expenditures will not increase in the future, unless all prices radically advance. A decided increase in the number of pupils or an expansion of the program of studies to include courses in Home Economics, Mechanic Arts, special courses for high school graduates or adult education would necessitate additional teacher time and thus increase total expense slightly. The building has the room for expansion in some of these directions and the cost of equipment would not be large.

A careful study of financial reports over the period of years included in the chart shows that consolidation of your rural schools has not increased your total current expenditures. Some items like transportation, lights, and insurance have been increased whereas all instructional expense has been decreased. Administration expense and fuel expense are no greater now than formerly.

The revised budget for this school year is \$1,300.00 less than the expenditure last year. The budget for next year is \$100.00 less than the proposed expenditure this year. These budgets make possible an appropriation \$2,000.00 less than the appropriation of last March. The school board is recommending an appropriation by the school district of \$28,000.00 this year. \$8,500.00 of this amount is for payment of bonds and interest on the school building. That means an appropriation of less than \$20,000.00 for all operating expenses of the school.

Bethlehem, for several years, has taken a liberal and progressive position relative to the transportation of its school pupils, high school and elementary. The New Hampshire law provides that all pupils in grades one to eight inclusive living more than two miles from the school to which they are assigned by the school board must be transported. It also provides that they may be required to walk any part of the distance, not exceeding one and one-half miles, to a regular transportation conveyance. It further provides that the school board may furnish transportation to

pupils above grade eight. I am convinced that your school board has earnestly tried to arrange the transportation routes to require children to walk as short distances as possible and to provide as good conveyances as possible, without creating a burdensome expense to the district. To make arrangements satisfactory to all parents is of course sometimes difficult. The problem is oftentimes complicated by families moving into remote sections of the town after the contracts are let, or into sections where nearby transportation is difficult.

The present program of studies includes courses in English, language, Science, Mathematics, and Social Science sufficient to prepare pupils for college entrance, and in commercial subjects to give elementary training for office work or for advanced study in business college or normal school. The record of your high school graduates in advanced institutions is evidence of good instruction in these courses. In tests given in several subjects under the direction of the State Board of Education, Bethlehem seniors have scored high. My supervisory efforts have convinced me that the instruction for the past year has been good in all grades and in all departments of work. Your teachers are earnest, progressive and cooperative. They give due attention to the needs of individual pupils. The extra-curriculum activities of the school have been well organized and well administered. More attention to pupil guidance in the future, in Bethlehem, as in all other school systems, will be carefully studied. The problem of helping every pupil to realize his talents and to properly develop them is being regarded as a foremost mission of the school. This problem demands a wide field of activity beyond textbook instruction. It involves play activities, the wise use of leisure time, the cooperation of school and home, and all of the group associations of the pupil.

The question of school program expansion is a difficult one to discuss in times of economic depression. The depression and the relief efforts have given impetus to the study of the problem of the use of leisure time, the leisure of all classes of people of all ages. The gradual emergence from the depression will not alleviate the problem. People will have more money during the next few years than during the past few, their working hours will be shorter and their leisure hours longer than during the generation past. What will adults do with their leisure? What will high school graduates who cannot finance courses of study in

advanced institutions do with their time? That problem has led already to the beginning of many courses in adult education this year all over the country. It has sent many high school graduates back to the schools from which they have graduated to take such courses of study that would be of some help to them.

Should Bethlehem expand its program to include courses in Home Economics and in Mechanic Arts for its pupils, and for its high school graduates? Should it offer advanced courses for its high school graduates in English, Science and Mathematics? Should it open its school doors for evening school classes for the benefit of adults? These questions may not have to be decided this year but interested citizens should begin to consider them.

In conclusion, I should like to pay tribute to the memory of John Whyte. I appreciate having enjoyed his acquaintance and his friendship. For many years he was an able and wise member of your school board. He was interested in every detail for improvement of the schools. His many hours of work in behalf of the boys and girls of Bethlehem constitute a service that few people are able to give in any community.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my annual report and summary of work. Bethlehem High School ended the fiscal year of 1932-1933 with a total enrollment of sixty-one. The largest class in the history of the school was graduated in June, numbering fourteen. Three members of this class have entered the University of New Hampshire, one Colby Junior College, and two have returned for post graduate work. The results of the state tests showed this class to be above the state medial in Arithmetic Fundamentals and English forms.

The enrollment this year in the high school is fifty-nine. There are two special pupils, ten seniors, twelve juniors, eighteen sophomores and seventeen freshmen.

Twenty-seven pupils are studying Foreign Languages.

Thirty-five pupils are studying Commerce.

Thirty-one pupils are studying Natural Sciences.

Twenty-seven pupils are studying Mathematics.

Much of our extra curricula work is carried on through several clubs within the school. The Outing Club has been very active this winter in holding ski and snowshoe hikes. A Field Day was held in January in which one hundred and fifty pupils of this and surrounding schools took part. A Glee Club meets regularly once each week. This club sponsors social gatherings of the pupils as well as promoting a knowledge of and desire for good music. The Dramatic Club has been active, presenting several good entertainments to date, and at the time of this writing has plans for two spring presentations.

Basketball and baseball are the only interscholastic activities in our school. This winter thirty-seven pupils have participated in basketball. No pupil is denied the opportunity to take part in either activity.

A hot drink is served during the noon lunch period to about seventy pupils in the building. A charge of two cents per cup is levied, but underweight and needy children may obtain this at no charge. The deficit for same is made up by contributions from interested citizens of Bethlehem, supplemented by government funds. Milk is being served to children who need or desire it during the morning recess each day. All milk not paid for by the pupils is taken care of by government funds.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, the Superintendent of Schools, the teachers, pupils and citizens of the community for their hearty co-operation throughout the year.
