# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

---

To the inhabitants of the town of Brookline in the County of Hillsborough in said state, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects :

Art 1 To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

Art 2. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the poor, paying the just debts of the Town, and all other legal purposes, for the year ensuing.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the repairing of highways and bridges.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways under the law passed at the January session of 1905.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cutting brush along the highways or take any action in relation to the same.

Art 7. To see what action the Town will take in relation to destroying the brown-tail moths and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Art 8. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a snow plow or take any action relating to the same.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will accept the legacy of the late Charles A. Blodgett, which reads: I give and bequeath to the Town of Brookline in the County of Hillsborough and State of New Hampshire, the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100), the income, so much as may be needed, to be used for the perpetual care of the Blodgett family lot, in the South cemetery in said Brookline.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to accept the amount of the estate bequeathed to it, under the will of the late Charles A. Blodgett, or act anything in relation thereto.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100), to be added to like amount already appropriated to build a sidewalk beginning at the Old Town House and running to or near the West Primary school.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to establish the price of the several officers or any part of them for their services, or act anything in relation to the same.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to pay good two horse teams, Four Dollars and fifty cents(\$4 50) per day for work on highways, act or do anything in relation to the same.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salary of the members of the Engine Company to Ten Dollars (\$10) a year or to take any action relating thereto.

Art. 15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to discount on taxes for the year 1911.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow what money is needed for the fiscal year and pay the same back from taxes when collected, or act any way in relation to the same.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will raise Ten Dollars (\$10) to buy flags to decorate soldiers' graves, paint soldiers' monument, or take any action in relation thereto.

Art. 18. To see if Town will vote to raise One Hundred Dollars (\$100) to repair State Roads in Town already built or take any action in relation to the same.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to have running water put in South cemetery, raise and appropriate money to pay for the same or act anyway relating to the same.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Brookline Public Library.


Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to make a price on the several lots in the South cemetery or take any action in relation to the same.
