

ARTICLE 1.—To choose a moderator to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Frederick B. Pierce.

ART. 11.—To see what sum of money the town will raise to defray expenses of observing Old Home Week, or act thereon.

ART. 12.—To determine the method of collecting taxes the ensuing year.

ART. 13.—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to appoint a liquor agent for the ensuing year.

ART. 14.—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the old road, commencing at a stake and stones set in the fence of Erastus H. Cobleigh's north line, thence southerly by the old Oscar Sargent place to intersection of roads westerly from Ashbel Stoddard's, or act thereon.

ART. 15.—To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
