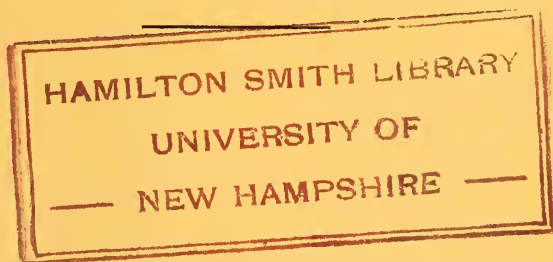

Town Warrant

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Dalton qualified to vote in Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Dalton on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.
2. To see if the Town will accept the budget for 1938 as prepared by the Selectmen and make appropriation of the amounts therein or make any changes.
3. To see if the Town will vote to change the following roads from Class 5 to Class 6 highways.
 - a. Dalton mountain road, so-called, from Raymond Rooney's to the turn leading to Alice S. Davison's.
 - b. Dean bridge road, from Henry Thayer's to turn of road below J. E. Hennessey's.
 - c. Miller road, from Union Street turn to home of Herman Wells.
 - d. Road from the James Harriman place to corner near Otis Elliott farm, so-called.
4. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the Town for non-payment of taxes.
5. To see if the Town will adopt the Australian ballot for spring elections.
6. To bring in your votes for a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
7. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to borrow needed money in anticipation of taxes.
8. To raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$45, based on 1/100 of 1% of assessed valuation, to be paid as its share of the expense of carrying on an advertising and other beneficial program for the section of the state known as the White Mountains Region, of which this town is a part, in cooperation with the state of New Hampshire and other towns in said region, to be paid by the Board of Selectmen to the Treasurer of the White Mountains Region.
9. To transact such other business as may lawfully come before said meeting.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board of Dalton:

I am pleased to submit this report relative to your schools:

The school year closing last June showed a balance of \$315.50 in the treasury. The revised budget of last October for this year's needs was \$10,086.82. The receipts to meet this budget are balance of \$315.50, school district appropriation \$5,000.00, state aid \$4,020.52, and dog licenses \$65.35, totaling \$9,401.37. That total is about \$700.00 less than the budget. Some savings may be made in the budget for this year so that the deficit will not be as much as \$700.00, but it will be considerable.

The proposed budget for next year is \$10,125.82. The state aid allotment is \$4,497.36. Allowing \$125.00 for dog licenses the total known receipts from sources other than taxation are not more than \$4,625.00. The difference between your budget for next year and the estimated receipts is \$5,500.00. It would seem that an appropriation by the school district of \$5,500.00 is necessary, and that amount makes no provision for the deficit that you will have at the close of the present school year.

The proposal made by the Commissioner of Education relative to your schools last year has been carried out. The No. 9 school has been closed and the pupils are being transported to the Union school and the high school. The Scott's school has been closed and the pupils are being transported to the No. 1 school and the high school. Mr. Tillotson and Mr.

Johnson are providing excellent transportation for these pupils. Pupils in the Scott's district preferring to attend the Whitefield school in junior and senior high grades at their own transportation expense have been allowed to do so.

A suggestion has been made that the pupils in the Kelso and Scott's districts might be transported to the No. 1 and high school building and the tuition cost at Whitefield saved. Judging from the pupils now in attendance at Whitefield you will pay next year for tuition in grades I-VIII about \$500.00 to the Whitefield district. The added cost to transport these pupils to your own schools would be only a part of that sum. The No. 1 school now is full. If additional space in this building could be provided you could take care of the pupils in the Scott's district and Kelso district in your own schools. With this transfer you might be able to pay all expenditures of next year and reduce your deficit of this year, with an appropriation of \$5,500.00.

The improvements in the town building have increased the opportunities of the high school very much. The high school pupils have a large, well heated and well lighted study room. The junior high school pupils are comfortably cared for in the room formerly used for both groups. Woodworking instruction is being offered to the boys in grades seven, eight and nine. The Normal school has bought new furniture for the school, and considerable equipment for the woodworking room. The town is to be commended for this progressive action in providing for the health and study conditions of its pupils. It has assured Plymouth Normal School and the State Board of Education of your enthusiasm for the high school. It will make your high school more attractive to your own pupils and to pupils living in the town of Lunenburg. Its influence will be increasingly realized as many of your youth complete their high school education.

Miss Taylor is continuing her good work in the administration of your high school. She is ably assisted by Mr. Bennett and an unusually good group of cadets this year.

Miss Horan, Miss Cushing and Miss Ambrose secured positions elsewhere at the close of last year. Miss Covell accepted her reelection at No. 1. Miss Macek was transferred to the primary position in No. 1, and Miss Isabel Rhôme was secured for the Union school. All of these teachers are doing good work.

The statistics of attendance show 145 Dalton pupils enrolled in school last year. In your schools the percentage of attendance was 94.94. The number of tardinesses was large. Parents should try to have their pupils at school for the beginning of each session. The number of pupils who had per-

fect attendance is a pleasing record. Doubtless many others tried just as hard for this goal but were prevented in their effort by sickness.

Mrs. Spaulding continues to do excellent work as your school nurse. She takes genuine interest in the health of all of your pupils. Her efforts for remedial treatment are reflected in the welfare of many boys and girls.

I have been deeply impressed with you efforts for progress in your schools and have enjoyed my association with you.
