# TOWN WARRANT

---

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deerfield in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.*

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Deerfield on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for construction of the Class 2 road known as the South Deerfield road the State to contribute \$4,500.00.

4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$810.25 for Class 5 highways the State to contribute \$3,240.98.

5. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for snow fence.

7. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid before certain dates and fix said dates and discounts.

8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through tax Collectors deeds.

9. To see if the Town will vote a sum not exceeding \$100.00 for the improvement of Maple Hill, so called, on the old Chester Road.

10. To see what action the Town will take in regard to widening and improving the bridge near the cottage of Edwin Cant on the Ridge Road and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a truck or tractor or take any action thereon.

12. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect one or more Road Agents to have full charge of the roads, summer and winter, and set salary of same.

13. To see if the Town will vote to appoint two assistants to the Selectmen, to make a revaluation of the real estate of the Town and set salary of same.

14. To see if the Town will vote to reduce the rate of interest on unpaid taxes from 10% to 5% or take any other action thereon.

15. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Board of Selectmen to organize and elect a Chairman and Clerk of the Board. The Clerk shall keep a record of the transactions of each and every meeting in a book. This book of records of the Town business to be available to citizens at all times. To see that all books and papers pertaining to the business of the Town be kept in the safe at the Town House.

16. To transact any other business brought before this meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

### *To the School Board of Deerfield:*

It is a pleasure to present to your Board my eighth annual report. Attention is given particularly to changes in teaching staff, attendance and promotions, improved facilities, special activities, and recommendations.

### *Changes in Teaching Staff*

During the summer, Miss Kathryn T. Reynolds, for four years teacher of the Pond School, was released from her contract with Deerfield to become principal of the Lincoln Park School in Hooksett. The vacancy in the Pond School was filled by the election of Miss Anne V. Crowley of Manchester, Miss Crowley was graduated from the three-year elementary course at Keene in the class of 1936. For three years she has been summer playground instructor in Manchester.

After a year's leave of absence, Mrs. Nancy T. Stevens returned in September to her position in the Parade School.

### *Attendance and Promotions*

The number of pupils and the percentage of attendance continue approximately the same as a year ago. The tardiness record shows an increase of sixty-nine cases. The majority of these are due to the late arrival of school buses, accounted for on several mornings by the icy roads.

Through the four methods outlined in my report last year, we are approaching the goal of 100 per cent promotion in June. Last year the percentage was raised for all schools

from 88.8 to 96.6. The Pond and West Schools had a percentage of 100 in promotion.

The co-operation of parents was of great assistance in increasing the number of promotions.

A complete record of each pupil is kept in the Superintendent's office. Parents are urged to consult with the teachers and Superintendent concerning the progress made by their children.

### *Improved Facilities*

A serious fire hazard, as well as a source of interruption to school work, has been removed at the Center Schoolhouse by replacing the former attic chimney with an entirely new chimney erected from the foundation.

The interiors of the Parade and West Schoolhouses have been repainted, making the classrooms much more attractive and cheerful.

We are indebted to an unknown donor for the gift of twenty dollars to be applied to the improvement of playground facilities at the Center School. A set of two chain-link swings, suspended from three-inch pipe frame, has been erected on the playground.

Facilities for combining instruction in geography, history, and civics of the seventh and eighth grades have been improved in the Pond and West Schools by the use of a special science series, edited by Professor Harold Rugg of Columbia University. Another year we hope to use the same series in the seventh grade of the Center School.

Music instruction in the schools has been limited by the want of facilities and the lack of a trained supervisor. This has been felt particularly in the Center and Pond Schools. This year a beginning has been made at the Pond by the purchase of material for a progressive course in music. This is a feature of education that can contribute much to the recreational life and enjoyment of a community.

*Special Activities*

Deerfield was represented in the Union spelling contest, held last May in Hooksett, by Marjorie White, grade VIII, Etta O'Neal, grade VI, both of the Center School, and Robert Pickard, grade IV, of the West School. Although the Deerfield team did not win first place, its members proved themselves superior to contestants from larger schools.

In June a class of six, all pupils of the Center School, were graduated from the eighth grade. Exercises were held in the Town Hall. Four of this number are attending high schools in this State.

Through the personal influence of the school nurse several children from Deerfield were admitted recently to the tuberculin "skin-test clinic, conducted by Dr. Robert Kerr.

Written permission is obtained from the parent of the children before the tests are made.

Since the "skin-test" clinic is not widely known, I quote from Dr. Kerr, "The tuberculin test, if positive, indicates that the child has received into his body some tubercular germs which may be dormant. The clinics are for the purpose of finding out children, presenting early symptoms and signs of the disease. In a tuberculin test only the filtration from the culture from tuberculosis germs is used. No germs alive or dead are used in the "injections."

*Recommendations*

For efficiency in management and for the convenience and health of the pupils I recommend that the remaining double desks and seats in the Pond School be replaced before next September by individual and adjustable desks and chairs similar to those used in the Center and Parade Schools. Twenty-five sets are needed to fully equip this schoolroom.

Not one of the four schools now operating has its own water supply. At the Pond School, with twenty-four pupils, water

has been brought much of the time through the kindness of one of the transporters who lives two miles distant. The Center and Parade Schools are dependent upon generous neighbors. It is suggested that the improvement of water supply be made a project for a period of years, that one school each year be provided with well or other source of water supply on the grounds.

*In Conclusion*

I wish to express, in behalf of teachers and pupils, appreciation of the improvements already made in buildings and equipment. These add much to the comfort and efficiency of those who use them.

Characteristic of the past year has been a more general co-operation by parents. I believe this is largely in response to the home visits made by your teachers. It greatly assists both the child and the teacher in making those improved adjustments that determine educative growth. The attitudes of the child, more than high marks, determine his prospects for efficient living.
