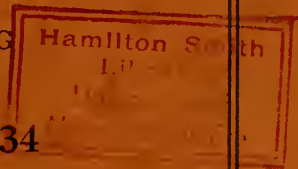

Article 1. To hear reports of committees and agents and act on same and to choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the year ensuing and to make appropriations for the same.

Article 3. To see whether Beer or other Alcoholic Beverages shall be manufactured or sold in the Town as provided under laws of 1933, Chapter 99, Section 22.

Article 4. To see how much the town will raise and appropriate for the Abbie Greenleaf Library, for the salary of the librarian; for the maintenance of the highways and bridges and for lighting our streets for the year ensuing.

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Report of the School Board

We estimate a deficit at the end of this year of about \$1,150. This is due chiefly to our failure to receive the expected income estimated in our report for last year. The Academy Trustees will contribute only \$600 this year instead of \$1,500 as estimated last February and the income from tuitions will be \$260 less than expected. These two items alone make a total approximately equal to the estimated deficit for 1933-34.

The trustees cannot promise more than \$600 next year. This fact in addition to paying this year's deficit of about \$1,150 make it necessary to ask for a larger appropriation for the coming year. We recommend that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,700 for school purposes for the next school year.

This year the total enrollment is 142 distributed as follows: Senior high school 41, Junior high school 30, grades 4 to 6, 32, and grades 1 to 4, 41.

There have been two changes in the teaching staff this year. Miss Florence Bartlett of Claremont, N. H., a graduate of New Hampshire University in 1933 takes Miss Christopher's place as teacher of domestic science and Junior high school subjects. Miss Kathleen Callahan, a graduate of the three-year course at Keene Normal School in 1931 succeeds Miss Page as teacher in grades four to six. She taught last year in the Center School at Landaff.

The increased enrollment in the Junior high school this year made it necessary to purchase additional desks. These were of the movable chair type with a drawer for books under the seat and can be used in any room.

This year we have made one change in the curriculum of the Academy. Sociology has replaced History of Commerce. The new subject is a valuable one for all students.

The efficiency of the manual training department has been greatly increased by the purchase of some power equipment. This includes a lathe, planer, band saw and a bench saw. The manual training room has been increased in size and a larger stove purchased to heat it.

We expect sometime this year to have the use of a school nurse for a week or more, and with the assistance of the Greenleaf Civics Club to have a dental clinic. This is made

possible through C. W. A. aid. Franconia is one of the few towns in the State which does not have either a district or a school nurse. It would be very much worth while if Franconia could combine with some other towns and employ a school nurse.

I expected last March that we should be able to pay last year's deficit and close the year next June with all bills paid. Unfortunately this cannot be done. Our expected income has been greatly reduced and we shall end the year with a deficit of over \$1,000. In order to keep up the standards of your schools it will be necessary to increase your appropriation for next year.

I wish to thank the members of the School Board for their support and the teachers for their cooperation.
