

# TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You, are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Article 3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to insure employees of the highway department, firemen, street lighting system and other liability insurance, or take any action thereon.

- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$161.44, the State to contribute \$645.74, these amounts to be used jointly as a relief fund and to be expended on Class V highways, so-called, or will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00, the state to appropriate \$4,500.00, the money to be used as a State construction fund, and must be spent on what has been known as the Turnpike, or take any action thereon.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to petition the State tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Scenic New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to install an electric street light near the residence of Maxime Lafreniere, or take any action thereon.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds, or take any action thereon.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to appoint an expert highway agent, who under the direction of the selectmen, shall have the same power and perform the same duties as a highway agent elected by the town, or take any action thereon.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to give a rebate on taxes paid on or before a certain date to be decided upon at this meeting, or take any action thereon.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to negotiate a new contract for street lighting, said contract to succeed the present contract which expires April 1, 1941, or take any action thereon.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

# REPORT OF THE OVERSEER OF THE POOR

The past year has witnessed the continuance of the preceding year's difficulties. The anticipated absorption of labor by the mills and other sources did not materialize until late in the summer, and from that time on, our relief costs have shown a decided decrease. An abnormal amount of hospitalization and medical care caused a large expenditure which was wholly unexpected.

In April 1940 the Food stamp plan was put into effect in Greenville which has proven fairly satisfactory.

#### REPORT OF FIREWARDS

During the past year the Department responded to five signal alarms for local fires and two for out-of-town fires. The The largest damage occurred at the No. 6 Mill fire, Nov. 29. fire evidently started near the engine room from sparks left by workmen who had been using torches in taking down machinery. For a time it appeared that the whole mill was doomed, but with the assistance of the Fitchburg, Mass., and Wilton, N. H., Fire Departments the fire was confined to one end of the building and extinguished with a loss of approximately \$15,000. At the Appleton Academy fire in New Ipswich we gave all assistance possible and operated the pumper over five hours continuously. was the severest test which the pumper has been given and no defects were developed. The old batteries for operating the Signal System have been replaced by modern ones at a cost of \$58.50 and we believe will be more economical over a term of years.

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Greenville qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 11th day of March 1941, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agent, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its Annual Report.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to provide free transportation of High School pupils to Appleton Academy, and allow for pupils attending High School elsewhere an amount not exceeding one dollar per week per pupil, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action thereon.
- 10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make contracts for transportation of pupils, and for insurance for a period of three years when such a contract is advantageous to the District.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Greenville:

Although the program is overcrowded under the present plan of conducting our school with only two teachers, work progresses satisfactorily. The plan is far from ideal, but seems the only solution to the problem of a limited enrollment.

High School tuition continues to be the largest single figure in the budget, even though reduced nearly three hundred dollars this year. The Board called attention, in its last report, to the fact that many parents are finding it difficult to meet the cost of transportation to High School. The special article appearing in the school warrant brings this matter to the attention of the voters.

From the anticipated balance, the Board has made allowance for additional insurance on the school building and fixtures. This will cover the property to the extent of \$23,500. The passage of Article X would authorize the School Board to make three year contracts for insurance or transportation whenever it is to the advantage of the District to do so.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I respectfully submit my eighteenth annual report as Super-intendent of Schools:

### Supervision

In the last several annual reports I have attempted to set forth what we are doing in the primary grades with the important subject of reading. This emphasis is constantly being held, and is extended to the succeeding grades year by year. The pupils who were in Grade One when we began this special drive are now in Grade Four, except those who have had to proceed more slowly in order to receive the greatest benefit from the reading instruction.

As one observes the instruction in these grades, one sees many evidences of the superiority of modern methods in the teaching of reading. The interest of the children is more keen and real; their confidence in their own ability is greater; the progress of the timid child and of those who are by nature slower than the average is more sure and steady, because they are not forced to try to keep the pace of the faster workers.

More concrete evidences of gains in reading ability in the various grades should appear as time passes, for results in the standardized tests used should reveal what gains may be in reading and in the other subjects. Already there is some evidence of the improvement of the pupils in the upper grades, who did not have this reading program while in the primary grades, but have had the benefit of the increased attention teachers have given to reading in the middle and upper grades. The average gains of pupils in these grades, as indicated by the scores they made in the reading tests of the Stanford Achievement Tests in successive years, is shown in the following table.

This study includes all the pupils in the eight towns of this Supervisory Union.

In this table, a normal growth or gain for a full year is represented by 1.00. The pupils of Grade V in October, 1938, had gained .85 of a normal year's growth since taking the test in October, 1937, when they were in Grade IV; but in October, 1939, when they were in Grade VI, they had gained 1.11 in a year; when they had reached Grade VII (in October, 1940) they had made a gain of 1.31 in that year.

A similar study of the pupils in Grade IV in October, 1940, shows that they gained 1.25 from the time they were tested in Grade III in October, 1939. This measure may not be so reliable as those set forth in the table, however, due to the fact that we use the Metropolitan Test in Grade III and the Stanford in Grade IV, and the scores are not quite comparable.

### MEDICAL INSPECTION

The required annual medical inspection was conducted by Dr. Karr and Mrs. Gilbert in October at both the Public and Sacred Heart Schools. They report as follows:

#### BUDGET

The School Board's estimate of money required for 1941–1942 is slightly less than last year's estimate, due to reduction in the amount needed for high school tuition. A substantial balance

was carried over from last year and some savings have been made this year, particularly in high school tuition again, so that there will be a balance of at least \$822 at the end of this fiscal year; this is put in to reduce the appropriation required for 1941–1942 to the same amount as last year, \$7,500.
