Report of Schools for 1898

Another year in its annual round with its school duties done, or left undone, has passed and it now remains to summarize the work of our schools for the past year.

Teachers, like all other people, are differently constituted and consequently their methods of work in the school room will not always be uniform though the results may be equally beneficial to the pupils and correspondingly satisfactory to parents and supervisors. With two exceptions the schools under our charge have been successful. The teachers have been well qualified for their respective positions, both intellectually and morally, and they bestowed earnest labor in the performance of their duties in the school room.

If in respect to one of the terms, which was not quite successful nor very generally satisfactory, those who were the most vociferous in their denunciations of the teacher and her work, had exercised that charity required by the Golden Rule and heeded the injunction of the wise man "a time to keep silence," it would have been better for all concerned. Our schools are for the benefit of all the children of the town of proper age and they all need the full benefit of the educational advantages which we can give them in our little town with its burden of taxation. Hence how unwise in parents to take offense at trifling things and withdraw their children from school. Much valuable instruction is thus lost to the absentees and they

soon find by this course that they have fallen behind their classmates and are necessarily obliged to gravitate into classes of lower grade, which is quite humiliating to bright, active scholars who have justly prided themselves in being first in their respective classes.

In these later times when scholars bid adieu to the schoolroom at so early an age it has been a source of gratification to find in our schools some large pupils, mostly young ladies, at their desks intent upon gaining a more complete education which will qualify them for better positions when they assume the stern and important duties of life. The longer we are connected with our schools the more convinced are we that some of the parents are in a measure responsible for our not having better schools. If parents, before their children enter upon their school life, would instill into their minds that their duties in the school room must ever be obedience to the teacher and an untiring effort to perform the tasks allotted them, forbidding all fault finding of the teacher when at home, we should at once see a marked improvement in the schools. "Parents unfair to teachers," writes Edward Bok, and the most prominent educators of the land admit this fact. Every effort is undoubtedly made to better prevailing systems. But the fight is single handed. Teachers and educators constantly say "We are alone; parents give us no assistance, not even the benefit of ordinary interest." And this is lamentably true. Parents are too lax in regard to the methods pursued in educating their children. There is no co-operation of the parent with the teacher, without which the best results to our children cannot be obtained.

In securing teachers for our several schools it is not always easy to predict the measure of success which each will attain, but when the test of success has been proven by their work in the school-room all should wisely co-operate

with teachers in their somewhat difficult labors and at all times encourage teachers and pupils in all practicable ways, casting the mantle of charity upon all who in a measure fail to meet with the success desired.

Let us all, fellow citizens, in addition to the money so generously voted, give our aid, sympathy and encouragement to all connected with our schools and in every possible way labor to promote the efficiency of our schools and the moral and educational wellbeing of all our scholars.
