TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead, in the County of Rockingham in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under Law of 1933, Chapter 99, Section 22.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges including town officers' salaries, expenses of town officers, election and registration, care and supplies for town hall, police department, fire department, health department, vital statistics, snow pathing, street lights, general expenses of highway department, town poor, Soldiers' Aid, interest on temporary loans and on long term notes and on principal of trust funds used by town.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate amounts as recommended by N. H. highway department for state aid construction.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to keep the unimproved roads and bridges in repair.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to pay the note for the West Road construction.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to meet the expenses of the public library the ensuing year.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries the ensuing year.

9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money for the use of the town.

10. To hear reports of auditors and committees and act thereon.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through tax collector's deeds.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be used in the further improvement of the Brown Hill road (so called.) By request.

13. To see what sum of money that the town will raise to repair the Belfry of the Town Hall and make other alterations.

14. To see if the town will vote to accept the whole or any part of the building ordinance as printed in the Town report.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for fire equipment.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate \$250.00 to be used in improving the Wash Pond

or Page Road (so called) and what method they will adopt to expend the same. By request.

17. To see if the town will vote to close the cross road, leading from the main road, to the North end schoolhouse in Atkinson, providing the town of Atkinson close their end of the road.

18. To see if the town will vote to buy a steel plow to be attached to the snow tractor, and to raise or appropriate money for same.

19. To transact any other business that may legally some before the meeting.

**PROPOSED BUILDING LAWS FOR
THE TOWN OF HAMPSTEAD, NEW HAMPSHIRE**

SECTION 1. No person shall break or dig up, or aid in breaking or digging up, any part of any street, or remove any earth or gravel therefrom, without having first obtained a written permit from the Selectmen for that purpose.

SECTION 2. No person shall obstruct any street by placing therein any house or other building, without the license of the Selectmen in writing specifying the terms and conditions upon which such obstruction of the street shall be allowed; and the license shall fully comply with all said terms and conditions.

SECTION 3. No person shall place or cause to be placed in any public street or way of this town the contents of any sink, cesspool, or privy, nor placed or caused to be placed any stones, rubbish or garbage therein, or on land adjacent thereto except for the purpose of immediate removal therefrom.

SECTION 4. The word "dwelling" hereinafter used shall be construed to mean a building used continuously or at intervals as a dwelling.

SECTION 5. The board of Selectmen shall annually, in April, appoint an Inspector of Buildings for the term of one year, from the first day of May following or until a successor is appointed and has qualified in his stead. His compensation shall be determined by the Board of Selectmen. He shall be familiar with building construction and shall not be interested in any contract for building for the town, or for furnishing materials to the town. The Board of Selectmen shall have power to discharge the Inspector for failure to perform his duties, and to fill any vacancy in his office.

SECTION 6. The Inspector shall keep a record of the business of his office, ascertain all facts and make returns which shall be required by law. He shall report to the State Department of Public Safety any violations of the Laws of the State of New Hampshire in relation to the construction of dwellings that may come to his notice. He shall, if necessary, enter upon the premises wherein any fire has occurred, in order to investigate the origin of the fire.

SECTION 7. Every person, before erecting or altering any building for dwelling purposes, garage, stores, or filling stations shall obtain from the Inspector a building permit, first filing therefor an application, in which he shall give a description of the intended dwelling or alteration, shall submit plans and specifications for the same, if required, and state the purpose for which the same is to be used and the dimensions and the location of the site.

SECTION 8. The Inspector shall examine all dwellings, public garages, stores and filling stations under applications or permits for alterations and make a record of his examination. He shall issue permits for the erection or alteration for dwellings, public garages, stores and filling stations, in all cases where the proposed new dwelling, public garage, store or filling station or altered dwelling, public garage, store or filling station, will conform to the requirements of this article and to the laws of the State of New Hampshire, and in such cases only; but permits for his own work on any dwelling, public garage, store, or filling station in which he is interested shall be issued by some disinterested person appointed by the Selectmen for that purpose. No permit shall be valid for a longer time than one year.

SECTION 9. The Inspector shall examine all dwell-

ings, public garages, stores or filling stations in the course of erection, alteration or repair, as often as practicable and for that purpose shall have the right of entry thereto, and shall make a record of all violations of this article, with the location of the dwelling, public garage, store or filling station where such violations are found, then name of the owner, lessee, occupant, architect, and master mechanic, and all other matters relative thereto.

SECTION 10. The Inspector shall examine all buildings reported dangerous or damaged by accident or fire and make a record of such examinations, including the nature and the amount of such damage with the location of the building, the name of the owner, and lessee, and for what occupied, and report the facts to the Board of Selectmen, and for that purpose shall have right of entry thereto.

SECTION 11. No wooden dwelling shall be built, the walls of which to the main cornice exceed thirty feet in height, and no wooden building shall have its wall placed less distance than fifteen feet from the street line, and any wall within three feet of an adjoining property line shall be a fire resisting wall.

SECTION 12. All chimneys hereafter erected shall be constructed of brick, stone or other non-conducting fireproof material laid solid in mortar at least as good as best lime mortar. Brick chimneys shall be plastered outside below the roofing, if so required by the Building Inspector, except when brick-work is exposed.

SECTION 13. All chimneys hereafter constructed shall be top out at least two feet above the highest part of the roof to which they belong or three feet above a flat roof, and shall be capped with cement or iron.

SECTION 14. No smoke pipe shall pass through a stud or wooden partition of any kind, whether the same be plastered or not, unless guarded by metal collars with suitable holes for ventilation, or by soap-stone rings. All smoke pipes passing through closets shall be enclosed in metal pipes with a ventilated air space of at least two inches all around. No earthenware pipe shall be used for horizontal flues. No woodwork shall be placed at less distance than six inches from any metal flue or smoke pipe.

SECTION 15. Every dwelling hereafter constructed shall be separately connected with the cess-pool of such material and such capacity as the Board of Health shall direct, or shall be provided with a separate suitable out-house or privy, which shall be erected not nearer than twenty-five feet to any such dwelling, well of water, brook or spring. Such out-houses or privies shall be subject to the supervision of the Board of Health, and to such reasonable rules and regulations as such Board of Health may make.

SECTION 16. The roof of every building hereafter erected or recovered in whole or in part, and the top of every wood cornice, the top and sides of every dormer window and every other projection from such roof, shall be covered with fire-resisting material.

Fire-resisting material specified above shall include slate, tile, asbestos, cement, tar and gravel, plastic slate, copper, tin, heavy asphalt-felt shingles of which the exposed surface is composed of slate chips or gravel, and such other incombustible material as may be approved by the Inspector of Buildings.

This section shall apply to the roof of any building hereafter erected or recovered in whole or in part wherever located.

Nothing in this section shall be construed to pro-

hibit the use of wood shingles in repairing any roof now covered with wood shingles, provided that the area so repaired shall not exceed one quarter of the total shingled area of the roof and provided the building is not altered in height or otherwise generally reconstructed.

SECTION 17. The Chief of Police upon application of the Inspector of Buildings shall cause complaint to be made before the proper court for any violation of these Buildings Laws.

The Board of Selectmen upon the application of the Inspector of Buildings may institute proceedings to enforce these Building Laws and to enjoin the erection, continuance or occupation of any building in violation of the provisions of these Building Laws.

SECTION 18. Whoever violates any of the provisions of the preceding sections of this article shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars for each offence.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said district on the 12th day of March, 1934, at 8 o'clock in the P. M., to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the District.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

REPORT OF THE SUPT. OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

It is with pleasure that I submit my seventh annual report as Superintendent of the Hampstead Schools.

Following will be found interesting and encouraging reports which are given by Miss Augusta M. Nichols, Headmaster of the Hampstead High School; Mrs. Eva Thompson, Supervisor of Music; and Miss Helen Thomas, the School Nurse.

This Union, of which Hampstead is a member, is comprised of the school districts of Salem, Hampstead, Atkinson, Plaistow, and Newton which is arranged by the State Board of Education acting under the school law of 1919 by which the entire state, exclusive of cities, was divided into Unions for supervisory purposes. By this law the School Boards of the districts comprising a Union form a joint board which meets annually and nominates a Superintendent of Schools who is elected by the State Board.

The enrollment of pupils in our schools this past year was 187 which is 5 less than for the year before last. The attendance averaged 95.35% of the membership. The average for the state during this period was 95.13%.

No changes have occurred in the teaching staff since my last report. The retention of experienced teachers is a valuable asset to efficient schools and a source of educational economy not to be overlooked.

The excellence of the work of our teachers is confirmed by the results of our Standard Tests given this year. That there may be a uniform rate of progress along a definite course, the State Program of Studies has been carefully followed. By a chart of this kind we are assured of no duplication of effort and of a similar method of instruction between teachers as pupils pass from grade to grade.

Twelve pupils completed the work of the 8th grade and were promoted to the Senior High School. The medal given by the Sons of the American Revolution for good citizenship was awarded to Mabel E. Emerson.

The Parent-Teachers' Association has helped the schools in many ways. Last Spring they sponsored a dental clinic for the school children. Dr. Bethel of Manchester did the work. The magazines provided at the High School and the shrubs to decorate the High School grounds were very much appreciated. Also both schools were again furnished with First Aid material.

During the last ten weeks of last year and again this year one-half pint of milk has been furnished to children in need of milk. This milk has been paid for by the State from funds furnished by the Federal Government. Eleven children are now receiving milk. The children receiving this milk have shown improvement in health.

Both the High School and Central School has been equipped with radios. The one at the High School was purchased by Miss Nichols. The other was paid for by proceeds from an Operetta. A Seth Thomas clock for the primary room and a fund with which to buy library books for the children were made possible by a recent entertainment.

Through the American School of the Air a thirty minute period is conducted on school days by experts in one of the departments of Geography, History, English Literature, Foreign Languages, Science, Music or Art. Since these broadcasts frequently correlate with our daily programs and with the pupils study and preparation, they supplement to advantage the regular classroom work.

November 6-12 was observed as American Education Week. An invitation was extended to all parents to visit the schools during the week. Our registers show that seventy visits were made by interested parents and friends. The visits not only made it possible for parents to see the accomplishments of their children in the classroom, but also to see how our schools are conducted in the classroom, but also to see how our schools are conducted at the present time. It is our wish that more parents visit the classrooms in order that they may have a closer contact with the schools.

The appended reports of Headmaster Nichols gives specific information about the High School. The general spirit of the School continues excellent. The School is gaining not merely in numbers but in quality of scholarship. The pupils are responsive; the School Spirit was never so strong and helpful. A new heating plant would be a great addition.

Nearly all pupils from the Eighth Grade enter High School. The High School has come to be an essential

part of the common School System. A High School education is practically a requisite for intelligent understanding and successful participation in the social, economic and national life of the world today.

The work of the teachers and school administration is not made less by a business depression. On the contrary it is increased. In most places there are more children rather than fewer to be cared for in the public schools. They present by reason of the depression more serious problems of adjustment and education. The need for the service which the school can render is greater than ever.

The emphasis of present day education should be on preparing pupils for successful and happy careers by stressing fundamental character traits, such as carefulness, co-operativeness, willingness to work, loyalty, honesty, and open mindedness. The teacher must be an inspirer as well as a drill master.

The American public school will carry on because it possesses that which business, banking concerns, industrial concerns and even governments have long sought after—namely, the confidence of the public. In addition to this it possesses the faith of innumerable parents who believe that through education their children may be led into fields of greater opportunities and greater service to humanity.

In conclusion I wish to thank the School Board, Teachers and Citizens for their support and co-operation.

The enrollment in the school increases gradually; each entering seventh grade being a little larger than the graduating twelfth grade. The enrollment of the present senior class is the largest in the history of the school.

Five of the nine pupils who graduated in June, 1933, are attending higher institutions, showing that the boys and girls of Hampstead are ambitious. The results of tests given by the State Department to all seniors in New Hampshire schools showed that our seniors exceeded the state median and standard median in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division, as well as in intelligence.

A very gratifying letter was received from Mr. May, Deputy Commissioner of Education, a short time ago commending the school on exceeding the standards for the year in supplementary reading in languages and history, and also in the "B and C" subjects reported. The "B and C" subjects consist of art appreciation, music, assemblies—those general cultural activities having no definite place in the daily schedule. Varied and original programs have been presented weekly.

All but one member of the orchestra graduated in June. In January, under the direction of Mrs. Thompson, another orchestra composed of piano, two violins, saxophone, and drums was organized. This affords an opportunity for the worthy use of leisure time. Parents can assist the school and help in the well-rounded development of their children by encouraging them to develop the ability to play some musical instrument. Considerable interest is also being shown in a harmonica club, directed by two senior boys.

The school operetta was given as usual in November. This year the proceeds were used in purchasing new uniforms for the boys' basket ball team and equipment for the classes in home economics.

The girls of the Home Economics class, "The Family and Its Members" have enjoyed making an attractive layette for the Red Cross. Practical skill and necessary information have been gained, as well as a neighborly attitude toward the unfortunate.

Athletics help form character traits which all schools try to develop. Frequently athletics are the only means by which these traits can be established because of individual differences. The value of athletics to a school lies in the accomplishment of these objectives rather than in the commercial terms by which values are often unjustly judged. A small school can maintain intra-mural and inter-scholastic teams which pay dividends equal to those of large schools when judged by true values. Hampstead High School has honestly tried to achieve the objectives of physical education, and at the same time has, on the average, outplayed its opponents. Since the last report, one team has made a record. Our last baseball team lost but one game in thirteen. The 1933-1934 basketball squads are striving for ideals other than scores, which are but a by-product of physical education. The parents can do much to help develop correct physical habits which effect a more complete physical education.

Several things have been done to improve the general appearance of the school plant; the seniors of 1933 contributed a sum of money to help buy light-proof curtains for the physics laboratory, the driveway has received a coat of tarvia, the Parent-Teacher Association has had shrubs planted on each side of the high school building and has also co-operated with the school in starting two good sized beds of perennials.

The people of Hampstead evidence an unusual interest in their schools and a great willingness to co-operate in every project for their advancement. The teaching staff wishes to express its appreciation and

thanks for this co-operation to the Superintendent, School Board, and citizens of the town.

I have the honor to submit my annual report as Supervisor of Music in the Hampstead schools. In looking back upon the year's work I find in every case co-operation and pleasant classroom associations.

During the past year music education in our schools has shown advancement which has been most gratifying. In the primary grades a repertoire of beautiful songs induces a love of music, and develops a good singing tone. Note reading is introduced in the second grade. In the intermediate grades a true sense of harmony is developed through two-part singing. In the Junior High School, still richer harmony is experienced through three-part singing.

Musical appreciation is being carried on effectively with the help of the radio, and victrola. The seventh and eighth grade pupils make a thorough study of the instruments in the symphony orchestra. The High School pupils are studying the lives of the great composers and their works.

The operetta "Crocodile Island" written by Geoffrey F. Morgan and Frederick C. Johnson was presented by the High School on November 10. The cast consisted of 12 characters; the other members of the classes acted as chorus. The operetta was well received and a success financially. Two operettas have been given by the pupils of the Central School during the year. The children did fine solo as well as chorus work. Part of the money earned was used to purchase a radio.

For the co-operation afforded me in my work, I extend my thanks to you and the teachers.

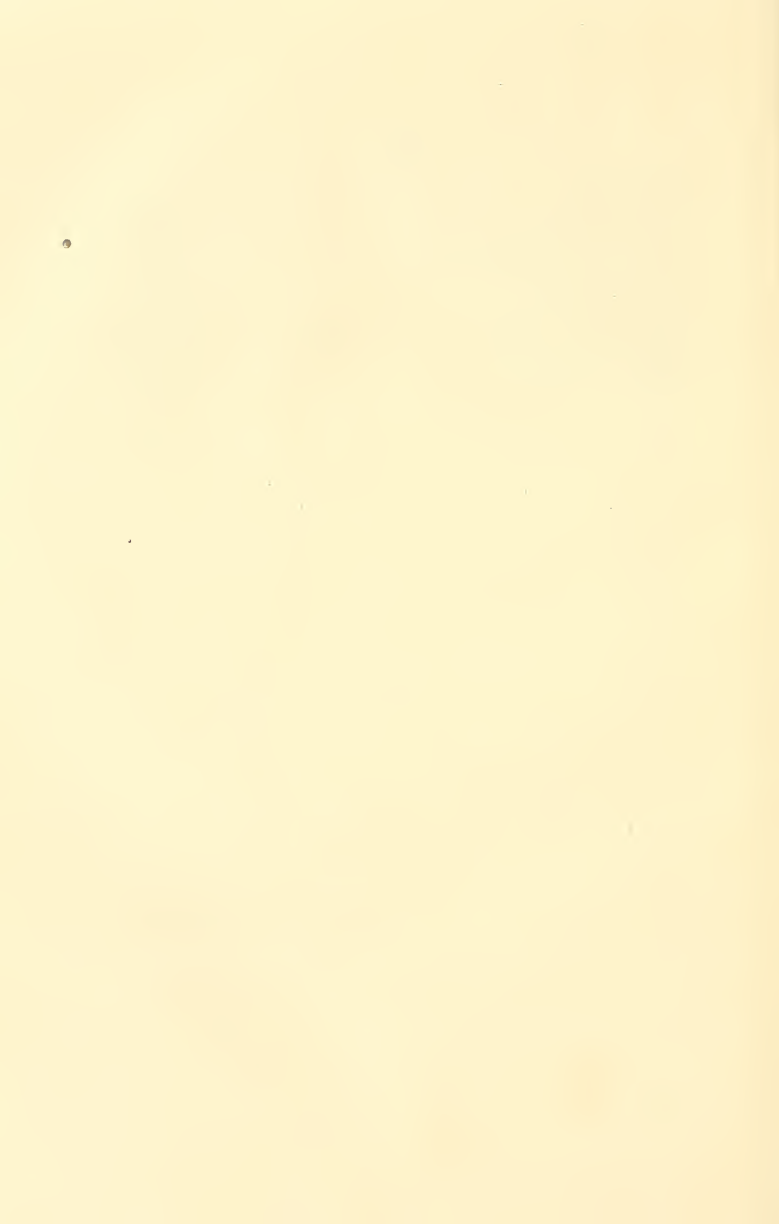
