## Report of Selectmen.

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TO THE CITIZENS OF HENNIKER.

Another year has rolled away and we are brought again face to face with the financial conditions of the town.

We are glad to report that no serious disaster has come upon us, or accident occurred which might have involved the town in litigation.

It is as well for us to recognize our blessings as to brood over our misfortunes.

Circumstances which have cut short our source of income and expenses, which were not anticipated at our last annual town meeting, for which provision might have been made, have increased our town debt.

The loss of revenue from the Savings Bank as shown in the following financial report together with an additional aid to the poor, also the expenses incurred in the reappraisal of the real estate of the town not provide for must of necessity increase our debt.

Notwithstanding we are not cast down. Our banner "Progress" still waves and we are looking to see our beautiful town in which we pride ourselves as being "up to date" developing her resources and commanding the respect of her sister towns for her enterprise.

The New High School Building which we anticipated is realized and we are now so situated that we can educate our young

people at home and invite those who wish to cultivate their minds to come and share in our blessing.

The Electric Lights seen in our vision have burst upon us in all their glory, bringing light out of darkness. We are prepared to say the time has fully come when a demand is laid upon us for a system of Street lighting. Now it is with us ought we not to make an effort to retain it?

We embrace the opportunity to lay before the citizens the kindly interest of the Board of Trade in furthering the development of the town and while we respect those of a more conservative opinion, let us not smother the ambition of those who are in keeping with the age in which we live.

As at other times we wish to express our appreciation of the faithful manner in which the duties have been performed by those appointed to positions of trust.

The tax payers are deserving an expression of thanks for the promptness in responding to the call of the collector and he for the faithful discharge of his duty.

An investigation, as required by law upon the first Saturday of each month, of the condition of the Treasury has been made and our Treasurer has proved himself worthy of our confidence.

## Report of School Board.

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By an act of the last legislature the school boards are required to furnish a copy of their annual report to the State Superintendent of public instruction, together with answers to such questions as he may ask, on, or before the first day of August of each year, and the school year shall commence with the fall term of the schools.

The board made such report for the portion of the year remaining after the passage of the law to August first. In addition, they now make their yearly report as usual.

All the division schools have had twenty-nine weeks of schooling during the year past. This is one of the benefits arising from the town rather than the district system and yet we fear that some of the citizens do not quite realize as they should this fact, that they have as many weeks schooling, as competent teachers and as liberal a supply of books, charts, maps, etc., as the larger schools in the more compact portion of the town. But there should be the same interest, and we are glad to be able to say that there is an improvement in this respect from year to year as is shown by the larger number of persons recorded as visitors in the different schools.

The teachers during the past year, have, as a whole, been faithful in the discharge of their duties and a marked improvement has been made and the closing examinations for the year were generally highly satisfactory.

The Grammar School was unavoidably delayed in its commencement of the spring term one week, but this and the three weeks lost in consequence of the burning of the school building in January of last year will be made up to the pupils in this school the coming season.

The Grammar School is still in session at the making of this report and will have 28 weeks schooling for the year.

It becoming necessary to make a change of reading books, Harper's Readers were, after due consideration introduced which have given universal satisfaction. They were secured at exchange rates, all of the old readers on hand taken in part payment for the same.

The High School has continued in charge of Prof. F. L. Pugsley with Mrs. Lillian A. Brown assistant in the spring term, and Lena B. Merrick assistant the other two, which teachers have spared no pains to maintain the high reputation the school has attained, not only for discipline but for thoroughness of instruction.

Quite a large class will graduate at the end of the spring term and a larger one the year following.

The school has increased in numbers and the tuitions exceed those of any year.

The board has adopted a course of study requisite for admission to the high school, a copy of which will be found in each school room in town.

A new school building having been erected, (particulars of which, see Report of Building Committee,) the main building was occupied by the High School for the first time on Monday, Dec. 30th, 1895, and the north annex was occupied by the Grammar School on the same date, and the south annex by the Primary School on January 2d, 1896.

There have been some extra expenses for the past year which will reduce the amount of money on hand at the end of the year somewhat.

Rent has had to be paid for a suitable room for two terms of the grammar school. A stated amount was paid Mrs. Belle B.



Peaslee, for teaching her children at home, there not being pupils enough in the division for sessions in the school house.

The large number of pupils in the primary school required an assistant one-third of the time, and from the present outlook, one will soon be required a much larger portion of the time in this school. But it is expected that with the balance on hand, the balance of tuitions for the winter term remaining unpaid and the tuitions for the spring term of the high school, all claims against the high school will be satisfied and a very small surplus left.

We again call attention to the roll of honor, which is indeed a very gratifying exhibit. That so many should reach this mark shows great interest, not only by the pupils, but by their parents, who so cheerfully co-operate with them, and yet it is a serious question, whether other pupils who have striven hard to reach this honor should be deprived of having their names upon the roll by being unable from illness to be present every day, and this often when absent only one or two days. It seems an injustice that should be remedied in some way.

## REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF HENNIKER FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

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At the last examination of books, which is made annually, they were found to be in good condition, an evidence of good and faithful care. Quite a number have been rebound during the year, making them good and serviceable. The usual number of books have been taken out during the year, and the trustees would, as they have done heretofore, earnestly urge every family in town to avail themselves of this great privilege, for their educational as well as for their literary enjoyment, assuring them that if once they became patrons they will never wish to relinquish the benefits derived from so doing. The usual reports from the State have been received, a few books have been added by gift, and Mr. Emerson has given the usual reduction in rent, adding quite a little to the funds of the library.

About one hundred and fifty volumes have been added during the year by purchase, making a total now upon its shelves of 1887 bound volumes, besides magazines and books in paper covers. The responses to the invitation given the patrons one year ago, to pass into the librarian from time to time, a list of such books as they would like to see added to the library, assisted very much in the selection of the books added by purchase, and the invitation is renewed this year with a wish to make the library one of great value to all the people of this town.

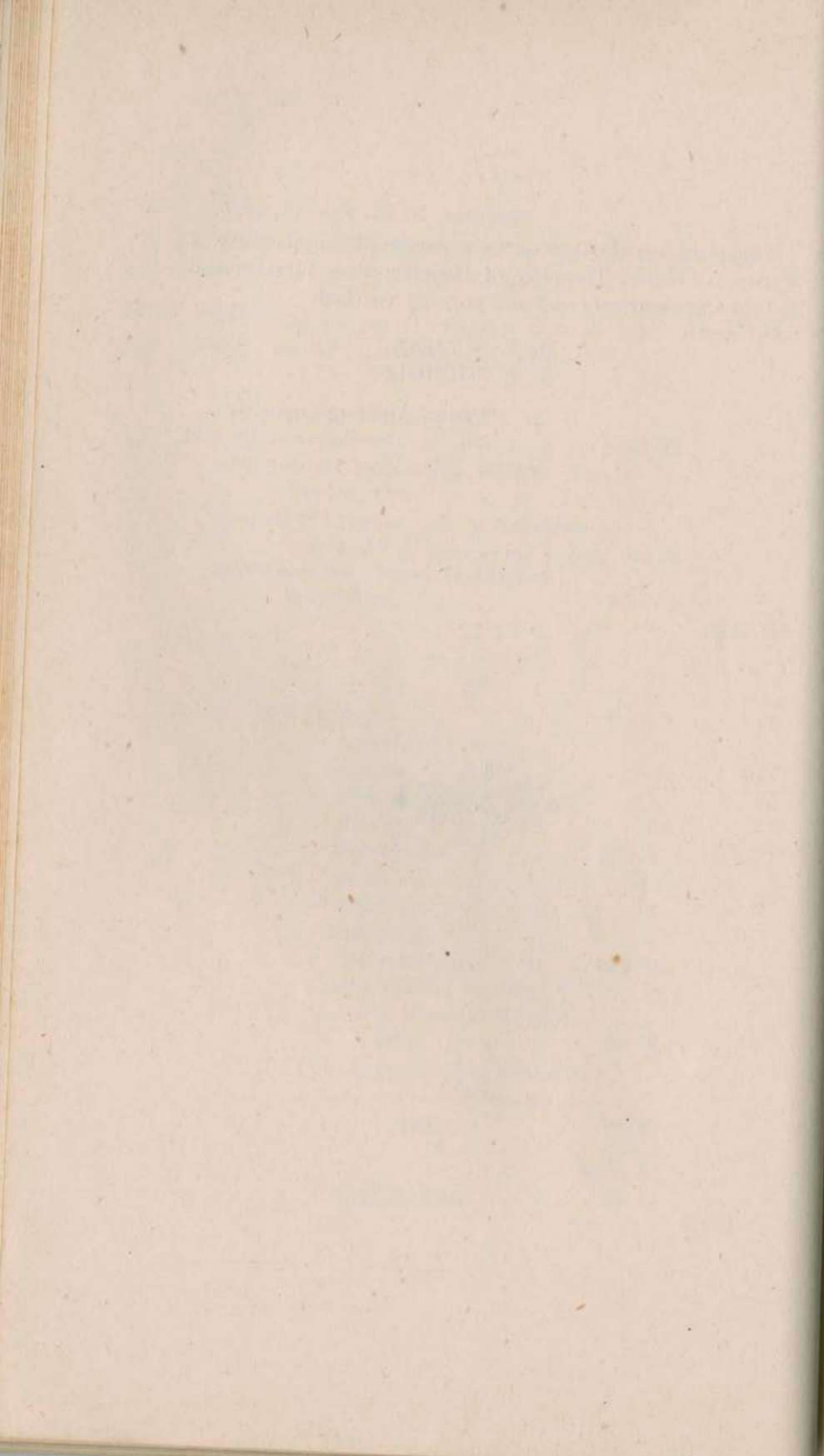

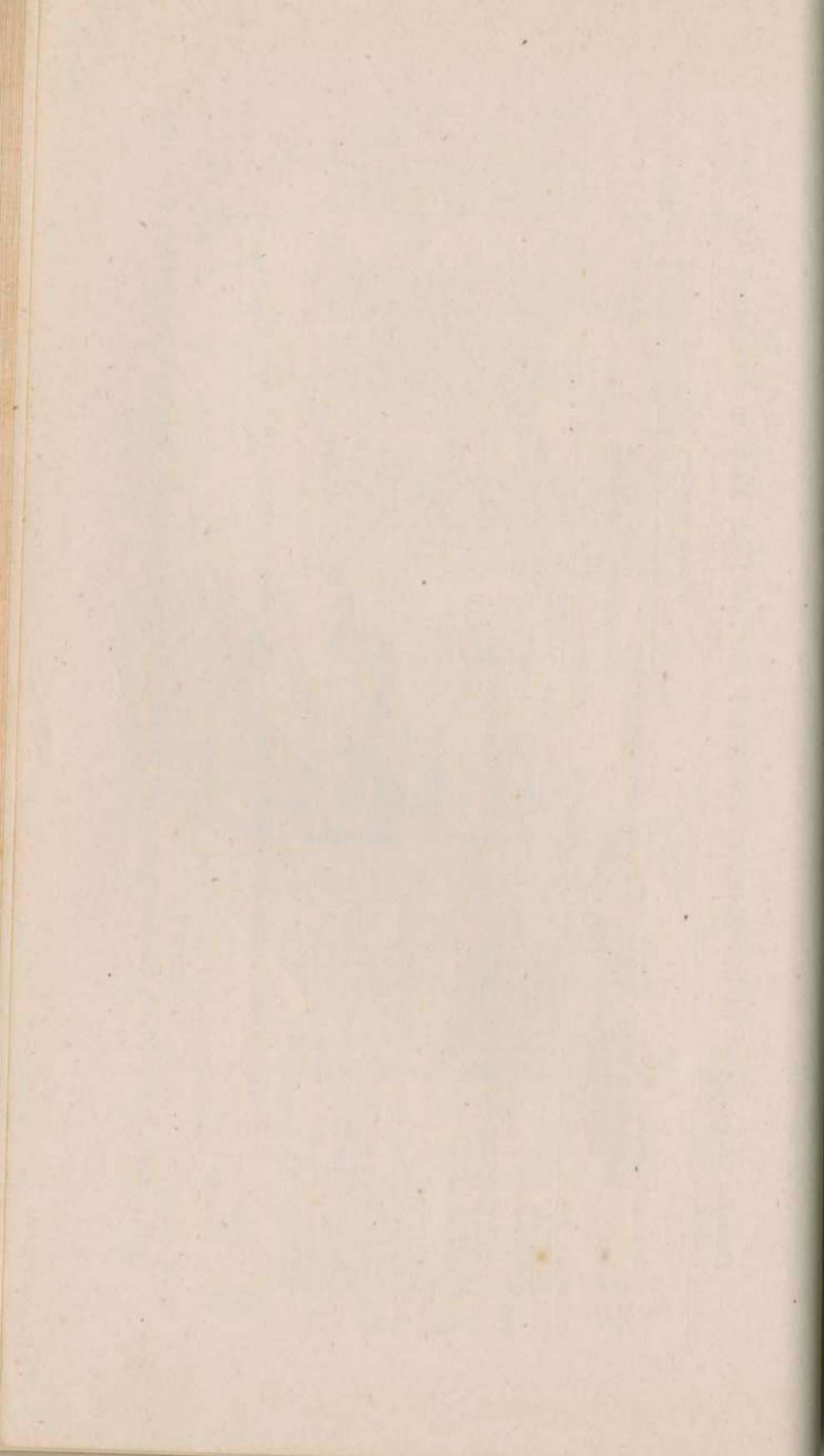
