# Superintendent of Schools.

······

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF HILL:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of Hill schools.

The local schools have been in competent hands and the results have been, for the most part, satisfactory. The primary room has been filled to capacity—too many for any teacher to obtain most efficient results.

In the grammar room the same plan has been carried out as last year-omitting the eighth grade and giving special work to seventh in preparation for junior high school. The eighth grade pupils going to Franklin this year have made very satisfactory records and I feel sure have been greatly benefitted by the advantages there afforded them. Perhaps the best test of what the work at junior high school has meant to these pupils would be to get their reaction in the matter. The parents of these children know, perhaps, better than I, just how the children themselves feel about it.

That the large number of pupils coming from Hill at the present time calls for a large tuition expenditure, is true. But the district in considering what is best to do with its seventh and eighth grades, must remember that the only EXTRA expense now is its eighth grade. The present eighth grade at junior high is unusually large. The next years eighth grade class would be only five at most. The average for the last five years has been six. All above the eighth grade, that desire to attend high school, would be privileged to do so under the law, whether you decided to make an addition to your present building, hire another teacher and maintain a special seventh and eighth grade room or not. The real efficiency of such an arrangement would, in my judgment, be felt more in the lower grades than in these upper grades.

I mention these facts merely for your consideration in determining just what seems best to do.

I know of no other question of serious import that calls for discussion.

I believe Hill has good schools, and good teachers. I am sure that I express the feelings of the community when I say, that we regret that illness has deprived the schools of both regular teachers at the same time, necessitating substitutes. On the other hand I feel that we may congratulate ourselves upon securing such good substitutes.

I wish to express my appreciation to you as a Board for your continued confidence and co-operation.
