TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Childs' Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the Eighth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Two Delegates to the Constitutional Convention, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, Community Building, appropriations for street lights and all current expenses of the town and such amounts as may be necessary to apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and culverts.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for Memorial Day purposes.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be applied upon the salary of the District Nurse.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of band concerts for the coming season.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$216.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Said appropriation to be disbursed by the Selectmen.

Article 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of co-operating with the State and Federal governments in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust or act in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to appoint a Town Forest Committee to act in conjunction with the State Forestry and Recreation Department to develop and improve Town Forests.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

General Discussion

The town district this year conducts five schools. The Goodale school was closed owing to the fact that all the families with children old enough to go to school moved out of the district. Our enrollment at this writing is eighty-four children. Twenty-eight children of the town district attend Hillsboro high school. This makes the total school population of one hundred and twelve. It should be gratifying to the school district that almost twenty-five per cent of our boys and girls old enough to attend school continue their education in a secondary school. This is as it should be in an age when qualifications for intelligent and productive citizenship are so high.

An effort has been made during the past two years to use the same textbooks in all the schools in the district. While no particular harm may result from the use of different texts in the various schools, it is reasonable to believe that uniformity of textbooks makes for better administration, and unity in the work of the teachers and the children. Considering that the children of the town district attend Hillsboro high school, uniformity with the schools of the Special District has also been sought. The most conspicuous achievement in this respect has been accomplished in Arithmetic, Geography, History, and in Reading.

The superintendent's frequent visits to the schools reveal that our children are making good progress according to their ability, and that their achievement compares well with the children of corresponding ages and grades both in the state and the country.

The school board have kept up their excellent reputation for maintaining well repaired, presentable, and sanitary school buildings. The children, the teachers, and the superintendent appreciate the school board's willingness to authorize the purchase of the textbooks, supplies, and other material recommended for use in the schools.

The intelligent cooperation of the parents with the schools has made it possible to conduct the schools in a way which has not interfered with the work, notwithstanding the fact that contagious diseases have prevailed in our midst for several weeks. Because of this cooperation we hardly know that anything unusual has occurred.

We estimate the expenses for the current year to be the amount of the budget (\$30,900.75.)

Owing to the demand for additional work in Manual Arts, a course composed of Auto Mechanics, Forging, Mechanical Drawing and Advanced Cabinet Making has been added. Due to increased enrollment in Chemistry, it was deemed expedient to teach Physics as well as Chemistry at least for this present year.

It is the desire of the Board and also the teachers in both the High and Elementary Schools, to have parents and all others interested in the welfare of the pupils visit the classes while in session, so that they may have a better understanding of the problems confronting the teachers.

We estimate the required amount for the school year, July 1, 1938 to June 30, 1939, to be \$30,703, details of

amounts to be found in the Proposed Budget of the Hillsboro Special School District.

We expect receipts of about \$4,300 in addition to the amount to be raised by taxation. We also suggest that the sum of one thousand dollars be taken from the unexpended balance of June 30th, 1937, and recommend that the sum of \$25,403 be appropriated for the School Year, July 1, 1938 to June 30, 1939.

This represents a reduction of \$1,197.75.

It is to be borne in mind that \$197.75 of this amount is an actual reduction in the amount appropriated, one thousand dollars is being taken from unexpended balance on hand June 30, 1937.

The Board wishes to thank the Superintendent and the members of the teaching staff for their full and hearty cooperation during the past year.

We also wish to express our gratitude to Dr. H. C. Baldwin for his time devoted to the organization and development of the High School Band.

General Discussion

The public schools of Hillsboro Special School District opened on the seventh of last September with an enrollment of 212 in the elementary schools, and 155 in the high school, making a total of 365. Over fifty of the

high school pupils are tuition scholars from Bennington, Deering, Washington and the Hillsboro Town school district. Fifteen pupils from the Deering Manselville section attend elementary school in this district.

Due to the social changes which have taken place during the last quarter century in our country, boys and girls are forced to do their studying in school rather than at home. In school reference books and equipment are available, and pupils may enjoy the benefits of supervised study. We should never lose sight of the fact our schools after all are educational institutions, and that athletics, plays, and extra curricular activities in general are only secondary in importance, to the acquisition of those skills, knowledge, and culture upon which more than anything else, rests the fabric of our civilization.

The great majority of our high school pupils do their work faithfully. However, there is a substantial number who expect school credits for as little effort as possible, and in some cases, for none at all. We solicit the cooperation of those parents who receive warnings of their children's failures. Present day standards are so high in post secondary schools in particular, that the only ones who survive are those who show marked ability for scholarly accomplishment, and unusual industry and faithfulness in the performance of their work. There never was a royal road to learning. Even rich, good looking and smart boys and girls must work to reach a given goal.

The greatest effort possible is made to educate young people for present day life. In the grades emphasis is put on the teaching of fundamentals. At the same time music, drawing and physical activities are stressed. The work of the seventh and the eighth grades is enriched with training in Home Making for the girls, and Woodworking for the boys. The high school too, caters to as many types of boys and girls as possible, with its broad curriculum which offers English, foreign languages, Home Economics, Mechanic Arts, Commerce, Chemistry, Physics, Biology, Mathematics and Social Science.

Considering the additions which have been made to the high school curriculum in recent years, it seems reasonable to suggest that we stop further expansion until

such time as we can accomplish the objectives of our present courses of study, even more efficiently than we do at the present time, for it takes a number of years before an effective teaching technique can be developed in any field.

Thanks are due the School Board for their efforts in providing a broad and effective educational program for the boys and girls of the community, economically and yet along progressive lines.
