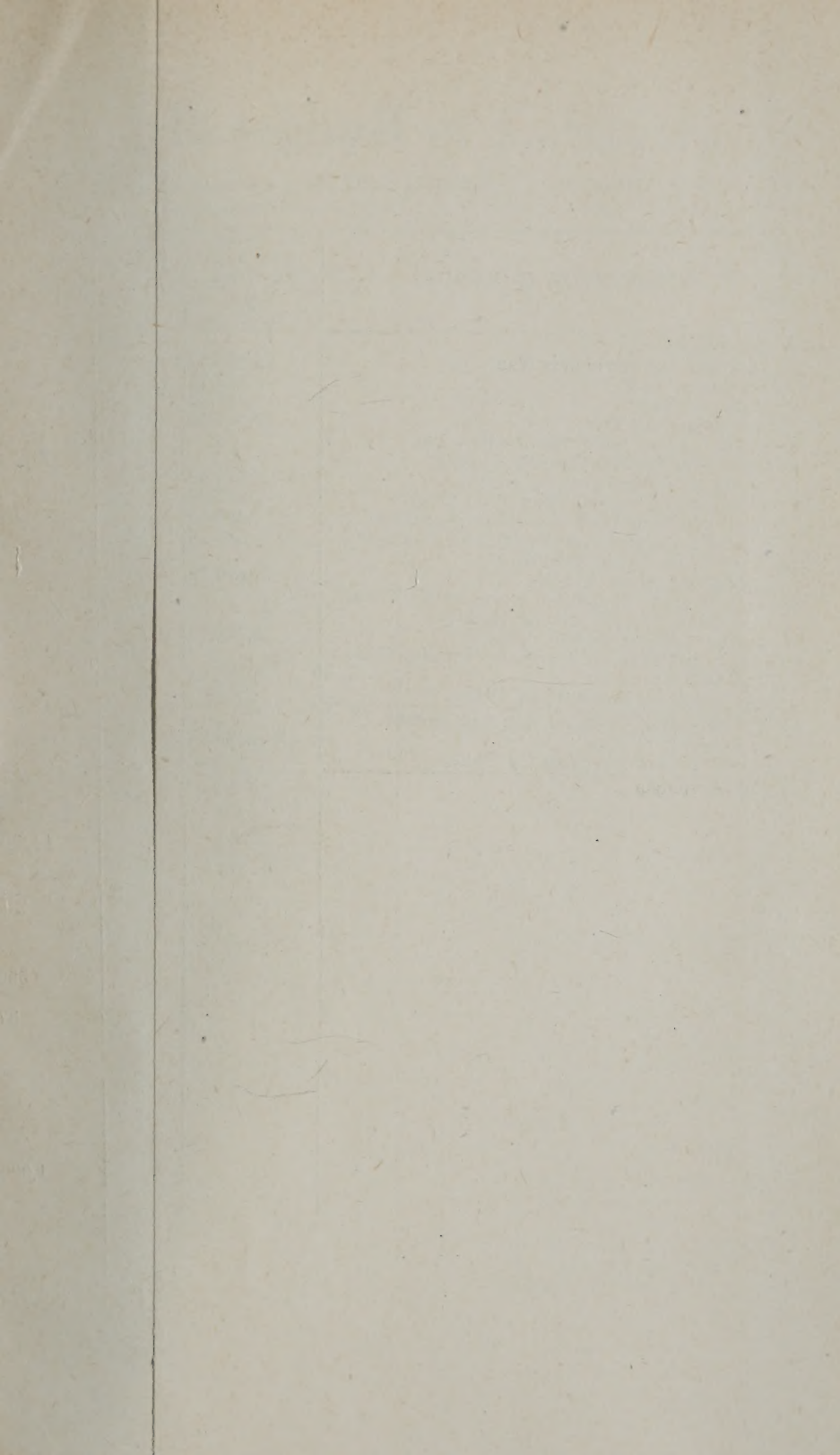

## WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

---

### The State of New Hampshire

---

(L.S.) To the inhabitants of the Town of Lebanon qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the Second Tuesday of March next at 9 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

**First**—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the Budget Committee and vote to adopt their recommendations as printed.

**Second**—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

**Third**—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the construction and repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

**Fourth**—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the construction and repairs of sewers and sidewalks for the ensuing year.

**Fifth**—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the improvement of the cemeteries of the town.

**Sixth**—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the proper observance of Memorial Day.

**Seventh**—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to provide free Hospital Service for needy people or act thereon.

**Eighth**—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to assist in the work of the Visiting Nurse Association.

**Ninth**—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the benefit of the West Lebanon Library.

**Tenth**—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the benefit of the Lebanon Public Library.

**Eleventh**—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred dollars to hire Eldridge Park for a playground, or act thereon.

**Twelfth**—To see if the town will continue the inspection of milk and raise money therefor.

**Thirteenth**—To see if the town will take any action in regard to control of the White Pine Blister Rust, and raise money for same.

**Fourteenth**—To see if the town will vote to give prescription permits from May first 1936, to May first 1937, according to Section 99, Laws of 1919, to druggists who are registered Pharmacists doing business in Lebanon, to sell liquors for medicinal, sacramental, scientific or mechanical purposes.

**Fifteenth**—To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of Gerrish Court lying northerly of and adjoining the land of Arthur W. Burnham as described in the Town Records Volume 15, Page 94-97.

**Sixteenth**—To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class II roads leading from the Butmanville Road to Meriden and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$3,858.00; the State to contribute \$2,893.50; or will accept State Aid for the Construction of Class V roads and raise the sum of \$1,016.27, the State to contribute \$4,061.11.

**Seventeenth**—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

**Eighteenth**—To see if the town will vote to amend the Zoning regulations by striking out the words "Zoning Commission" wherever the same

appears and inserting the words in place thereof "Board of Adjustment". And further to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Board of Adjustment.

**Nineteenth**—To see what action the town will take in regard to raising money for the Fourth of July Celebration.

**Twentieth**—To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

**Twenty-First**—To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.

**Twenty-Second**—To choose a Tax Collector, an Overseer of the Poor and one Highway Agent for the ensuing year. To choose two Library trustees for the ensuing three years and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

**Twenty-Third**—To choose a Trustee to administer the Trust Fund for the ensuing three years.

**Twenty-Fourth**—To choose four members to act on the Budget Committee for the ensuing three years.

**Twenty-Fifth**—To transact any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

**Comments**

Collections reported by the various departments, officers and agents of the town were compared in detail with all of the information available in regard to the monies that should have been collected. An analysis was made of the tax blotter, for the purpose of determining the amount of taxes turned over to the Collector for collection, and discounts given were investigated as to the dates on which tax payments were received. Wherever practicable the amount of money that should have been received was verified by direct correspondence, as for example, in the case of remittances from the State Treasurer and County Commissioner. The receipts of the municipal court and town clerk were verified in detail.

It is our opinion that all of the money that should have been received by the Town for the period under review had been received and properly accounted for.

All disbursements were supported by adequate and proper vouchers.

## HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

---

There have been reported by the Doctors and Nurses the following cases of contagious diseases, since my last report.

1 case of Infantigo, 1 of Undulant Fever, 3 of Typhoid Fever with 2 deaths, 5 cases of Measles, 5 of Whooping Cough, 12 of Scarlet Fever, with one death, 21 cases of German Measles, 22 of Chicken Pox, 18 cases of Venereal Diseases and 7 Infantile Paralysis, mostly of a mild nature, but all were Quarantined.

From the last of May until the middle of August there was an epidemic of Septic Sore Throat with nearly nine hundred cases. No report of these cases was made, until the epidemic had gained such headway that it was almost impossible to check it. As soon as it came to my knowledge, I called the State Board of Health, and a quarantine was put on all cases, and a careful inquiry made as to the source of the trouble. There was but one death reported, many were seriously ill, and have suffered after effects. The State Board of Health gave it as their opinion that it was not due to our Water Supply at all, but was traceable to Ice Cream or Milk.

We are still confronted with the disposal of Garbage. Dumps were reported from every direction in many places, and were attended to, as far as possible.

I have posted several bridges, where rubbish was being dumped into the river, and have posted several swimming places, warning people of the danger of bathing in polluted water. A suitable place for bathing should be provided for the public, that would be safe and clean.

The State Board of Health, division of Maternity and Child Hygiene held a Clinic here in September of which I have the following report: "Children attending 66, found with defects 50, total defects found 118, defects found corrected 17. Number held none. Cooperating agencies, were the local American

Legion Auxiliary, Board of Health, Churches and the Selectmen. Lois W. Barton, R. N.”

As usual I have answered every call, established Quarantine, wherever it was necessary, and assisted in every way I could in keeping Lebanon one of the cleanest Towns in the State. I have received the cooperation of most of the people that have made complaints, and I wish to thank all who have assisted me in carrying on this very important but disagreeable work.

## OVERSEER OF THE POOR REPORT

---

From January 1, 1935 to December 31, 1936 Town orders to the amount of \$23,486.49 were made. This amount includes also all expenses for boarding adults and extras, above board, for boarding children. Bills for board of children and Old Age Assistance were paid directly through the Selectmen's Office.

From January 1 to October 31, 1935, 50% of direct relief and administrative expenses (except overseer, who is elected) was paid by the State.

From January 1, 1935 to December 31, 1935 County orders to the amount of \$32,359.17 were made. This amount includes also board and care of adults for January and February only and extras for boarding adults for the entire year. Bills for board and care of children and board and care of adults from March through December, also Old Age Assistance, were paid directly through the Commissioners' Office.

Checks to cover County orders are made each month by the Selectmen and payments refunded by County Commissioners within thirty days.

## REPORT OF MILK INSPECTOR

---

We have had no outbreak of disease the past year that has been traced to our milk supply.

The people of Lebanon are using raw milk as we have no Pasturizing Plant.

The danger of Undulant Fever which is very great could be cut down and eliminated by two methods. 1st The Producers sign up for the Bang's test, which means that all cattle reacting to this test are at once removed from the herd, being paid for by the State and Government; 2nd Method, A central pasturizing plant whereby all of the milk sold in Lebanon is pasturized. The 1st method, in my opinion is the better of the two for this danger due to the fact that pasturization destroys a per cent of Vitamin D which is very beneficial to public health.

The general routine of past years has been carried out, such as visiting the producers and going over the proper technique of cooling, method of washing and sterilizing bottles and utensils used in the milk room. Samples were taken from the milk trucks while in the process of delivery and shipped in iced cases to the State Laboratory of Hygiene.
