

TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the 9th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Highway Agents.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for the payment of the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, for the public library, for the recreation commission, for free hospital beds, toward the maintenance of a District Nurse, for observance of Memorial Day, for band concerts, and for all other town charges.

Article 3. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line construction of highways in this town under the provisions of an act to provide State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the construction of main highways throughout the State in accordance with Chap. 155, Laws of 1909, of Chaps. 158, 162, or 168, Laws of 1913, of Chaps. 51 or 93, Laws of 1915.

Article 4. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for Trunk line maintenance of highways in this town in accordance with Chap. 133, Laws of 1911, Sec. 27.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and if so, how much, to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, in cooperation with the State Forester, in the work of preventing the spread of the disease, commonly known as White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money, from time to time during the current year, on the credit of the town, to pay current indebtedness, in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the town will discontinue that part of the Mt. Eustis Road, so-called, beginning on the Southerly line of the highway from Littleton to Lisbon, at South Littleton, and running across the Ammonoosuc River, where there was formerly a highway bridge, to the Southerly line of the right of way of the Boston & Maine Railroad.

Article 8. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint an agent to act for the town in the transfer of real estate owned by the town.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the care of the Meadow Cemetery, so-called, on the Lisbon road.

Article 10. To see what action the town will take with reference to the matter of authorizing the Selectmen to give any druggist, doing business in this town, a prescription permit to sell pure spirituous and malt liquors for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and scientific purposes, as provided in Chapter 147 of the Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

Article 11. To see what action the town will take with reference to the following situation:

Israel C. Richardson, late of Littleton, N. H., de-

ceased testate, by his last will proved and allowed in the Probate Court for Grafton County on the 20th day of November, 1922, bequeathed the residue of his estate to the Town of Littleton in trust for certain purposes therein set forth and authorized the executor, or his successors in office, to turn over said residue with all accumulations to the Board of Education of said Littleton for the erection and equipment of a High School building upon certain conditions set forth in said will.

Sometime before his death, Mr. Richardson had purchased coupon bonds Nos. 30 and 31 of the face value of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) each, of the Littleton Realty Company issued by said company under and secured by a trust mortgage. These bonds have never been found, the coupons representing the interest payments due thereon have not been presented since January 1, 1920, and other circumstances relating to Mr. Richardson's affairs indicate that at his decease, he was still the owner of these bonds but that they had been lost; and they have not been found. Except for these lost bonds, the estate of Mr. Richardson has been finally administered, and the residue of the estate turned over to the residuary legatee.

The Littleton Realty Company and the trustees under said mortgage are willing to issue duplicate bonds in place of these lost bonds, and pay the back interest not heretofore paid thereon, to the Union School District of Littleton if they can obtain (1) the joint receipt of the executor of Mr. Richardson's will or his successor in office, and of the Town of Littleton and of the Union School District of Littleton and to the joint bond of the town of Littleton and of the Union School District of Littleton in the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.) conditioned to repay said interest payments and redeliver said duplicate bonds

in case said original bonds shall ever be found and to indemnify the said Company and the said Trustee against, and hold them harmless from any and all loss, cost, damage or expense which may be incurred or suffered by them or any of them by reason of their act in issuing said duplicate bonds and paying said back interest on said duplicate bonds Nos. 30 and 31 or in case said original bonds shall hereafter be found and presented for payment or it shall turn out that said bonds did not belong to said Richardson at the time of his decease or that for any reason, said duplicate bonds and said payments of interest were wrongfully issued or paid.

Article 12. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the Citizens of Littleton:

Again the School Board presents its annual report for your consideration and approval. Since the big project of last year went over the top with such tremendous force, we are encouraged to feel that great progress has been made and will continue to be made along educational lines in the town of Littleton.

We thank you for your splendid support and ask for its continuance this coming year which brings different responsibilities and many new problems to face.

Our school expenses for a few years past have seemed to be approximately \$50,000. To be sure our budget last year was only \$46,000 because in view of the fact that we had reason to look toward a new high school, we were able to cut down our many needed repairs on that building. Therefore this year with our usual budget for school maintenance plus the first installment on the new building, of \$8,000 and interest of \$6,800, and since we must protect our new building by placing a large insurance upon it, with a premium this year of approximately \$1,500, it becomes necessary to ask for an appropriation of \$66,000, which in no way increases the actual school budget. We realize that this appropriation seems large, but every great undertaking brings with it increased demands and your School Board feels that all the citizens of the town are ready to cooperate with them to make our school system one of the best in the state, that we may, by modern equipment and scientific methods of

teaching, give the youth of our town every opportunity to fit themselves for the business of life.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To. O. M. Holman, Superintendent of Schools, Littleton, N. H.

I herewith submit my annual report as headmaster of Littleton High School.

The past year has been marked by several distinct changes and improvements. The addition to Kilburn School, made during the summer, has allowed us the use of the rooms formerly occupied by the fifth and sixth grades. This year the Domestic Arts and Commercial Departments have used them, thereby bringing all of the high school work within the old building, Manual Training alone excepted. This change has resulted, not only in a saving of time, in passing from one class to another, but has helped in the maintenance of discipline. It has been possible to exercise a greater amount of supervision over the passing. The old Domestic Arts rooms have been used by the Manual Training department for the storage of lumber, for a finishing and for a drafting room.

The usual tables regarding attendance, distribution of pupils, etc., follow.

TEACHERS

As for the past two years, I again wish to urge the absolute need of keeping good teachers as long as possible. Littleton High School like any high school of its size, for good work, demands experienced teachers. Superintendents and headmasters are very largely dependent upon their teaching staff for the quality of work as well as the morale of the school. I am glad to report but two changes in the staff during the year. Miss Ryder and Miss Perry both resigned to take up work in a larger field. Their places were filled by Miss Ricker and Mr. Hutchinson, both Bates

graduates and both teachers with experience. The quality of their work this year bears out what has been written regarding the advisability of experience. I hope, that should other changes occur, that the policy of filling the vacancies with experienced teachers will be followed out, even if at a slightly higher cost.

ADMINISTRATION

This year of 1925-26 marks the first year that the new program of study adopted four years ago, has been fully operative. In other words, the class to graduate in June will be the first to have had in their course three full years of Mathematics and French, French being taken in the Sophomore, Junior and Senior years of high school.

This class will also be the first which will feel the full effect of the maximum requirement regarding grades. We now have four curricula, the Classical, the Liberal College, the Practical Arts, and the Commercial. The first two prepare for college the other two do not.

Intelligence tests and standard achievement tests have been given in many of the classes in order that the work and grades of teachers and pupils might be better checked. Teachers' monthly reports regarding work and grades have been made and carefully checked by standard practice.

The discipline in and about the building has been materially better this year.

ATHLETICS

This year, as heretofore, the control of athletics has been vested in an Athletic Advisory Board, composed of the athletic coach, headmaster, one School Board member, and two student members. The baseball league was continued and while demonstrating its advantages, it developed the need of a stronger board of

control. In football we had a most successful year, playing a difficult schedule and losing but one game, the feature game of the season being the defeat of Berlin at Littleton. The basketball season for boys and girls is well under way, with two good teams. The boys, having been undefeated to date, appear to have an especially good team.

NEW EQUIPMENT

During the year a fine new oil stove, which is greatly appreciated, has been added to the Domestic Arts department. The usual equipment for Chemistry has been procured. This year it was not necessary to add to our Physics equipment; another year it will be. I should expect to make an expenditure of about \$400 here for this department. In the Commercial department I would recommend the exchange of several of our old typewriting machines and the addition of two more to the equipment.

DEBATING

The work of this department is under the direction of Mr. Hutchinson. We are anticipating participation in the debates very soon now, as a part of the work in the state-wide debating league, organized under the auspices of the University of New Hampshire. In preparation for this there has been held at Assemblies this year a series of several debates, from which the personnel of our teams has been chosen. Some twenty-odd pupils have availed themselves of this training.

MUSIC

Mrs. Jones, replacing Miss McDonald, has directed the work in high school. She now has three distinct organizations going well: a girls' glee club, a boys' glee club and an orchestra. We are especially pleased with the response from the boys. A musical comedy for later in the year is contemplated.

PRIZES AND GIFTS

The annual prize offered by the American Legion and the Auxiliary, for leadership, etc., to the boy and girl in the graduating class, went to Miss Priscilla Lunderville and to Neil Quimby. The Lincoln Essay prize went to Miss Marion Ide. We are glad to report for record the gift to the school from the class of 1925 of \$35.00 to purchase a picture for the new building. May this practice continue.

COLLEGE ENTRANCE

Littleton High School has retained its membership on the New England College Entrance Certificating Board, and may, as heretofore, certify to all colleges which admit by certification. Representatives of the class of 1925 were admitted last fall to Bates, University of New Hampshire, Massachusetts College of Pharmacy, Emerson, and Springfield College.

My third annual report of the public schools of Littleton is respectfully submitted.

Statistics

It is a guess to know what facts are of the greatest common interest for a report. Enrollment and promotion represent in part both why and how we maintain schools.

This table shows a decrease in enrollment over the previous year of 35 children. It shows that 93.7 out of every 100 children in school at the end of the year were promoted and that 6.3 were retarded. The average retardation in the state in 1923 was 11.2 pupils out of every 100. We are glad to make a good record here for every retarded pupil means a whole year's additional expense for that pupil.

FINANCES

I would call the attention of the readers of this report to the Budget for the coming school year recommended by the School Board. The next few years will be the hardest years to meet financially that we have. This coming year they call for approximately \$16,000 more than the normal expenditure for schools. On account of the new school it is necessary to ask for \$1,250 additional this year for insurance, alone.

This will be \$500 less in succeeding years. Every three years \$1,020 will be subtracted from the interest charges. In 1933 the Sinking Fund will retire the old bond issue and this will afford a tax relief annually of \$2,000.

In addition I would like to make it plain that our school expenses per pupil are unusually low. The average cost per pupil for the year 1923-1924 in New Hampshire high schools was \$123.42. The average cost in Littleton one year later, the year of this report, when costs were higher, was \$88.13 per pupil. The average cost per pupil in elementary schools in New Hampshire the year preceding this report was \$69.16. The average cost per pupil in elementary schools in Littleton during this year was \$67.29. In other words, Littleton's High School expense is \$35.29 less per pupil, and its Elementary School expense is \$1.87 less per pupil than the average expense in the entire state.

HEALTH

The health work was successfully carried on by Dr. Page and Miss Borg. A careful examination was made of all public and parochial school children. The total number of examinations was 812. Defects were recorded as follows in the public schools: Vision 17, hearing 2, cardiac 5, pulmonary 5, skin disease 6, pediculosis 10, orthopedic 8, teeth 309, tonsils 101, adenoids 10, enlarged glands 69, unvaccinated 28, treatments secured 90. This continued work is invaluable insurance for coming generations.

THE NEW HIGH SCHOOL

Since there will be no report at this time from the Building Committee, I will mention a few facts relative to the work. Two commodious and cheerful rooms have been added to the Kilburn Building, and have been in use since the beginning of the present

school year. Minor adjoining properties have been secured and the school grounds adjusted to meet the new situation and new expansions.

The main structure has advanced with remarkable success. To all who watch it closely, and to all who are in close touch with school construction, the low cost of the building and the economies that have been worked out in its construction are almost miraculous. I unhesitatingly predict that when the possibilities and service of this building become common knowledge, and when the careful and economic administration of this big project is made known, that the grateful thanks of the present and future generations will follow the work of the Building Committee.

In connection with this subject I want to bring to public attention a few needs for a big piece of constructive, public service. There are many needs for equipment that cannot be met by the appropriation. Already individuals and organizations have been offering serviceable gifts that will mean much to the functioning of the plant. We deeply hope that these gifts are but an index of many valuable contributions for the enrichment of school life. I will name certain lines of contribution that would help greatly. Library equipment for the library, drafting tables for mechanical drawing, gymnasium apparatus for our fine gymnasium, furnishings for our lady teachers' rest room, sliding partitions to separate dining-room from dress-making room and to separate library from a large class room, the equipping of the picture machine room, stage equipment, a grand piano for the auditorium, the installation of a vacuum cleaning system, pictures, subscriptions to scientific, literary and historical magazines, Keystone Educational There is every range of need.

HIGH SPOTS OF REPORT

No teacher changes during the year.

Standard test results which indicated a fair standard of accomplishment.

Manual Training work which saved many dollars in repairs and turned over nearly \$100 in cash to the District.

The graduation of a class of 45 from the High School.

The raising of scholastic requirements in the High School.

Efforts of the Special Investigating Committee and notable public service to secure the new school.

March 19, 1925, forever a red letter day in the school history of Littleton.

If I attempted to thank, individually, all persons and groups who aided in a memorable year, my memory would fail and some might be omitted. I recall, with most grateful appreciation, the cooperation of teachers and janitors, school physician and nurse, Red Cross, pastors and churches, and the great central unit of all good homes, agencies all of which were helpful in our common cause.

The work of the School Board has been so helpful, so sustaining and so far-reaching in vision and purpose, that I would like to record, not only my great personal appreciation, but my sense of privilege in working with a Committee of this caliber.

The foregoing tabulation shows that the number of books loaned from our library during 1925 is about the same as the number loaned in 1924. However unpleasant this fact may be it is one that will greet you from year to year or until a sufficient sum of money has been appropriated for the purchase of attractive reading material. The old order changeth and if we keep up with the times funds are necessary.

During Children's Book Week several cash contributions were received. The total of these plus receipts for fines and subscriptions made possible some new material for the children's room but in no way helped out the adult material. And right here it seems fitting to say that if every person incurring a fine would be conscientious about payment many more new books could and would be purchased. In time the adult, as well as the juvenile, would be benefitted.

Children's Book Week was a success. The children responded nobly to an invitation to make posters and just one hundred were exhibited in their own room.

Club ladies became responsible for prizes for the three best posters and rendered volunteer service at the book display tables four hours each day during the week. Miss Frances Heald held close attention of the children during the story telling hour which was brought to a close by the singing of America.

Christmas Week was observed by the placing of small spruce trees about our entrance, branches on the window ledges and by inside trimming. Christmas Eve lighted candles were placed in the windows.

Beginning with the second Tuesday in January a story hour has been observed each week in the children's room, Miss Frances Heald being the story teller. The attendance became so large that the room was over crowded and the older children were invited into the reading room. Miss Keir has had charge of the reading room story hour. The children are interested and appreciative and the attendance has been good, the count for the last three weeks in January and first two in February totalling 408.

St. Valentine's day was observed by the children in the younger grades making Valentines, addressing them and depositing in the library where attendants delivered to the owners. One hundred seventy-six Valentines were delivered during the day.

The resignation of Miss Jennie E. Smith, your long time librarian, became effective in July and she was succeeded by the present incumbent who desires to publicly thank all who have in any way interested themselves in library work and here asks for their future co-operation.
