Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Milan, in the County of Coos, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Milan Village School on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, at 9:00 a.m. in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all town officers for the ensuing year.
2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town officer's salaries. (\$8,000).
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town officer's expenses. (\$5,000).
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for summer and winter roads and bridge maintenance. (\$36,000).
5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$403.08 and the State will give the sum of \$2,687.22 for Town Road Aid.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Police Department. (\$6,000).
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for salary and expenses for the Dog Constable. (\$800).
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Fire Department. (\$8,000).
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Town Poor. (\$2,000).
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Old Age Assistance. (\$3,000).
11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for soldiers and their families. (\$200).
12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for libraries. (\$500).
13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the White Mountain Regions Association. (\$50.00).

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Civil Defense. (\$200).
15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the North Country Community Services. (\$500).
16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the North Country Council. (\$660).
17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Milan Home Nursing Center. (\$1,600).
18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the M & D Ambulance Service. (\$2,000).
19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Recreation Department. (\$200.00)
20. To see if the town will vote the sum of \$2,500.00 for garbage disposal.
21. To see if the town will vote to allow the Tax Collector to accept payments in advance of the Tax Warrant.
22. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing and Anti-Recession Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in the amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

23. To see if the town will vote to transfer the funds in the Old Town Building Account to the Milan Beautification Committee to expend for the continued beautification of Milan.
24. Providing that Article 22 is defeated; To see how the town will vote to expend the funds in the Old Town Building Fund Account.
25. To see if the town will vote to amend its zoning ordinances to prohibit the location of any nuclear powered electrical generating plant within its geographic boundaries, and that the zoning ordinances be amended to prohibit the storage of nuclear wastes within the geographic boundaries of the town of Milan. (By Petition).

26. To see if the town will vote to amend the zoning ordinances to make it mandatory that electrical transmission lines capable of carrying more than 115KW of electricity must be placed underground. (By Petition).
27. To see if the town will vote to immediately adopt RSA 31:39 that prohibits the transportation of nuclear materials over town roads. (By Petition).
28. To see if the town will vote to reclassify a section of the Old Mine Road from a Class VI to a Class V Highway, said section specifically being from Route 110 easterly 950' beyond the outlet of Nay Pond or a total distance of approximately 3700', and raise the sum of \$22,850 for reconstruction of said highway. (The reclassification and maintenance is by petition and the amount to be raised is the estimate of reconstruction after study by the Selectmen).
29. To see if the town will vote to accept a Class V Highway, the so called "Bryerik Road", a distance of 900 feet by 50 foot wide and accept right of way deed for same and provide summer and winter maintenance. (By Petition).
30. To see if the town will vote to accept a Class V Highway, the so called "Ward Road" a distance of 1,000 feet in length running easterly at a point approximately three tenths mile northerly of the intersection of the East Milan Road with Young Road, accept right of way deed for same and provide summer and winter maintenance. (By Petition).
31. To see if the town will vote to accept a Class V Highway, the so called "Beaudoin Road" a distance of 1,200' by 50 feet wide and accept right of way deed for same and provide summer and winter maintenance. (By petition).
32. To see if the Town will vote to change Section 7 of the Ordinance for the Regulation of Dogs as follows: "Whenever it shall be affirmed in writing by three or more persons having separate residences . . ." to read "Whenever it shall be affirmed in writing by one or more persons having separate residences."
33. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Milan Planning Board to establish and adopt Subdivision Regulations governing the subdivision of land within its jurisdiction, and to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plats showing streets, or the widening thereof, or parks, pursuant to (RSA 36:19) and (RSA 36:21). The procedure related to the adoption of said subdivision regulations shall be followed in accordance with (RSA 36:22).

34. To see if the town will vote to erect a street light on Bridge Street to provide lighting for the Municipal building and appropriate money for same.
35. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,200.00 for a 5 cu. yd. powered body spreader for the East Side Road Agent.
36. To see if the town will vote to accept the balance of the budget as prepared by the Selectmen and raise such sums of money as may be necessary.
37. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen the authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
38. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Report of Police Department

1979

Without any doubt this past year 1979 was one of the busiest years we have had in Milan. We found it necessary to patrol longer hours due to a great increase in activity during nights and weekends. We had many more breaks and thefts than usual and an increase in vandalism and harrassment. We also had an increase in domestic disturbances.

Traffic was unusually heavy on weekends in our area largely due to the gas situation which kept more people closer to home.

We regret that we had to exceed our budget as much as we did but we are sure that our activity explains this overdraft. Also a recent ruling by the Police Standards and Training Council requires part time Police to be Certified as such which means that our Officers must attend training sessions which will add to our costs for the coming year. Our Dog Officer's activities were up nearly 50% over last year. The money for this also came out of our Police Budget.

We thank you people for the support given us and we hope that we may serve you again in 1980. Following is a list of our activities for the year 1979:

- 73 dog complaints answered as of December 29, 1979.
- 56 summons issued as of December 19, 1979.
- 352 entries as of December 29, 1979.
- 31 breaks and thefts as of December 30, 1979.
- 4 cases of vandalism with damage over \$1,000.00.

Fire Chief's Report

The year 1979 was one of great accomplishment, with four of our volunteers becoming Certified Fire Fighters. This was a 100 hour course.

We are asking the town for \$8,000 this year, to be used for a Mack fire truck from Berlin, 2 breathing apparatus for West Milan station, 300 feet of new hose, and running the Department for another year.

A new law has gone into effect as of January 1, 1980, which calls for all fires to be reported to your local department, who in turn will have to report them to the State Fire Marshall's office.

Many thanks to all who have contributed a great number of hours to keep our Department up dated.

Report of Forest Fire Warden

STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town/city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town/city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municipal forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town/city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

With reference to the Ambulance report, the ambulance is in excellent condition, has approximately 35,000 miles of usage, and is maintained in top efficiency. As for equipment, it is equally as good or better than other services in the area. The training aid as shown above, is for training of ambulance personnel, firemen, policemen, teachers, or any other group of interested persons, in Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation. You can contact either Rachel Nadeau or Oneil Croteau, both are Certified Instructors. We do need help in the daytime, as in any volunteer service this is the difficult time to get assistance. In addition to the above, the Ambulance Service has a savings account in the amount of \$5,780, which is being held in reserve for the purchase of a new Chassie when same is required. Also we have held our appropriations at a figure of \$2.51 per capita, which is the same as when we started in 1973.

Thanks is extended to Donna Roberts, RN, Bernice Potter, and Flora Day who volunteered their services.

Blood pressure clinics are held monthly in varying locations in Milan, Dummer, and West Milan. This past year serviced 239 local residents with referrals made to physicians as necessary. In October a diabetic and anemia screening clinic was held with a total of 47 residents screened.

In September, Elizabeth Eastman resigned as secretary. Thanks is extended for her service and interest. We welcome Jackie Gray as our new secretary.

1979 was a busy and productive year of the Home Nursing Center. I look forward to 1980 and further service to all local residents.

Report of Superintendent

1979 - 1980

To the Citizens of the Town of Milan:

In many communities of School Administrative Unit No. 20 the 1979 - 80 school year is proving to be one of the most difficult in recent memory. Primarily this is due to increased costs, inflation, energy problems, and budget deficits. Unfortunately most of these problems face Milan this coming year.

BUDGET

The school budget for the current year amounted to \$298,918.31. This was offset by revenues of \$12,529.00 leaving an amount to be raised by taxation of \$286,398.31. At the time of this report the proposed 1980-81 budget totaled \$373,798.04 and climbing, primarily due to increasing numbers of tuition students. From the date of the first budget presentation eleven (11) students have been added to the tuition rolls, the results of which is causing the largest deficit in recent years — \$20,000.00+. This amount added to the increase for these same students next year combined with a moderate tuition increase causes an increase in the amount to be raised of \$80,000.00+ for the coming school year. How is this going to affect the tax rate? At the moment we show a tax increase of \$4.74 per \$1,000.00 of assessed value. With new students coming in almost weekly, there remains the possibility that it might be higher.

TUITION RATES

The tuition rates in Berlin have continued their upward climb though the increase for 1980-81 is more moderate than in the past. The tuition chart below clearly illustrates the tuition rates over a period of two years and compares them with state average costs:

SCHOOL WARRANT

Your school warrant for the March, 1980 Annual School District Meeting contains three articles which should be clarified. The first of these, Article 5, makes a request to appropriate \$11,500.00 to enable the District to pay for the educational program of a handicapped child. Programming for the handicapped requires the District, should the child be placed outside the District, to pay twice the state average per pupil cost. Until recently the state was to pay all excess cost above twice the state average directly to the provider of services. However, we were recently advised they could not do this and requested that districts pay directly and seek reimbursement from the state. To make payments directly, however, requires that we have authority to exceed our appropriation. This can only be done with vote approval. To complicate matters further the state has run short of funds and can only insure us a reimbursement of 60% with the remainder to be paid later. If all goes as planned and as now being discussed it would not appear that we would need to raise additional funds. A shortfall, however, on the part of the state could change the picture.

Article 6 is the second of the three articles which needs clarification. Because of an ever increasing number of tuition students the 1979-80 budget will be experiencing a shortfall of \$20,000.00+ before June 30 of this year. The shortfall is composed of mostly tuition students but also includes such things as transportation for handicapped children, transportation for our regular school program, and energy. Combined they constitute one of the highest deficits in recent years.

Article 7 is the third and last of the three articles which needs to be mentioned. Since March of 1979 your school board has met with the Dummer School Board to negotiate a contract in anticipation that the AREA Agreement between Berlin and Dummer would be amended. In the event that the amendment is approved by both Berlin and Dummer then the decision must be made by the people of Milan whether Dummer students will be accepted on a tuition basis. If approved the necessary contract will be signed between both communities to cover the seven year period as indicated in the article.

Needless to say that Article 7 will commit Milan for an extended period of time to provide Dummer students with an education. That commitment, if made, must be taken seriously. Neither community can or should jeopardize the welfare of its people or the education of its children unless it is willing to live with the consequences, good and bad, of that decision.

A joining together of both communities in a tuition contract will provide benefits to both. To Milan it will mean added revenues which eventually will exceed \$50,000.00 per year during the seven year period of the contract. Further, it will provide a sufficient number of students to allow for 1 teacher per classroom and by so doing eliminate for the foreseeable future the need for multiple classes. The community will benefit financially and the children will benefit educationally.

What about Dummer? What does it gain by making this move? To Dummer, several advantages will be realized. First, there will be a financial savings which could climb as high as \$20,000.00 - \$25,000.00 per year during the life of the contract. Second, elementary children will be nearer to home. Third, elementary children will no longer need to leave home at 6:20 - 30 in the morning to attend school at 8:30 in Berlin. There could be as much as 2 hours difference between the two. Fourth, the miles the children will be transported will be less than what is currently the case.

Though it would appear on the surface that both communities could benefit, there exists the potential that both or one of the two communities could grow to the point that additional space would be needed. Though this is possible, I don't see it as probable at this time. In addition, should there be a great increase, there exists within the current building a maximum school enrollment of 210 students. With all of Dummer's students in grades 1-6 enrolled I do not see enrollments exceeding 160 at this time. This leaves us a safety factor of 50 students.

The benefits of making the move at this time are obvious and have been outlined. There are, however, some potential problems. The answer lies with you the voters. The decision should be based on one consideration; what is best for your children.

RECOGNITION

Margaret Nichols, after many years of teaching in Milan, will be retiring at the end of this school year. She will have taught at that time a total of 34 years, 27 of which have been spent in Milan working with your children. It is impossible to cover in this short space all she has contributed to the children of Milan and the impact she has had on their lives. I can only surmise that it has been great and I can not help but believe that to many she has made the difference, that they will be all the better for having been exposed to her good influence. Therefore, with some sadness for those of us who have worked with her,

and yet wishing her all the happiness and joy in her years of retirement we express our gratitude and appreciation.

SUMMARY

I wish to express to all of those who have and continue to share the responsibility of providing your children a quality education my sincere thanks and appreciation.

Milan Village School opened on September 5, 1979 with an enrollment of 107 students:

Mrs. Loretta Galuszka joined the staff in October as the second grade teacher. Mrs. Kristin Young is in charge of the student tutorial program. Mrs. Donna Roberts, R.N. supervises the health program. Art, music, and physical education classes are conducted by special teachers from the Gorham schools.

During the summer our library was moved to a larger room. Several volunteers assisted Mrs. Lydia Westerberg, Gorham school librarian, in cataloging all books using the Dewey Decimal System. Our book inventory is increasing and improving each year. New additions include animal encyclopedias, World Book Encyclopedia set, fiction and non-fiction selections. The library is open all day Monday and on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons. We give special thanks to the local volunteers for supervising the library program.

Mrs. Catherine Waninger and the fifth grade students sponsor the school store — "The Mini-Mart". Pupils may purchase our school T-shirts, pens, pencils, erasers and other items. The fifth graders are planning to donate a set of reference books to the library, purchased with profits from the store.

Students in the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades have the opportunity to participate in basketball practice and games every Wednesday afternoon during the fall and winter months. Miss Susan Kelley and Miss Debra Rosenberg are in charge of this successful program. Their willingness to give of their time and effort is appreciated by all.

The Parent-Teacher's Organization meets on the second Monday of each month at the school. This year the officers and members of the P.T.O. have focused on student-parent-teacher activities. The students presented Christmas plays in December and a family Talent Show, "Staircase To The Stars", was the highlight of the February meeting. Other activities planned for the year include basketball competition, a family-staff supper, and a cook-out with field-day events. The P.T.O.

promotes a close relationship between school and community and also provide financial aid for special projects at the school. We would encourage all parents to actively support the P.T.O.

The teaching staff invites all parents and citizens of Milan to visit your school during "Open Classrooms" in November, to become involved in the volunteer programs, and to support the school activities and program. Close home-school-community cooperation will provide a more rewarding educational experience for all students.

Report of School Nurse

The 1979 school year was busy with few problems. Again the Milan School participated in the 5-8 week nutrition Education Program sponsored by the Extension Service of U.N.H. The N.H. state dental hygienist presented a brushing and flossing program to the 4-5 grade room. In the fall representatives from the Association for the Blind provided an excellent educational program on dealing with blindness. Educational field trips included the Milan Fire Station and Cordwell's farm for grade one; the Berlin Fire Station and MacDonald's for grade two; potatoe field, Tankard's potatoe house and Robert's Greenhouse for grade three; Toishan, Kentucky Fried Chicken and Pleasant St. Pharmacy for grade four-five; fish hatchery and Berlin Jericho Road Water Filtering Plant for grade five-six. The children's educational experiences are greatly increased by the local businesses that so willingly sponsor tours for our children.

School physicals produced twelve referrals, all of which are being followed by the parents. Several visual referrals were made with funding for three by sight conservation. Three hearing referrals to the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center were made with one yearly follow-up. The Pre-School Vision and Hearing Clinic was held in October jointly with the Milan Home Nursing Center. First graders are more easily tested with the equipment from Concord.

Medication is still time consuming but with the fine cooperation of the involved parents, there are no problems.

5. One school immunization clinic (T.B. tests included)

Spring activities:

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING
OF THE TOWN OF MILAN, NEW HAMPSHIRE
March 12, 1979

The Annual School District Meeting of the town of Milan, N.H. was held on the 12th day of March, 1979, at 7:00 P.M. in the evening at the Milan Village School. The Meeting was conducted by Rodney Young, Moderator, and was opened with the reading of the School Warrant, at 7:05.

ARTICLE 1. To determine the salaries of the school board, truant officer, auditors, treasurer, moderator and clerk.

It was moved by Roma Labrecque and seconded by Robert Biggart, and voted in the affirmative, that the salaries of the school board, truant officer and other district officers and agents be set as listed below :

ARTICLE 2. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

It was moved by Alger Stiles, seconded by Beverly Hawkins, that the District vote to accept the report of agents, auditors, and officers heretofore chosen, as printed in the Town Report. There was no discussion. Vote, affirmative; motion carried.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the District will vote to authorize the Milan School Board to negotiate with the Dummer School Board a tuition agreement; said agreement and conditions of same to be placed before the voters at the next annual meeting.

Motion was made by Donna Roberts, seconded by Clifford Tankard, that we accept the provisions of Article 3 as read.

Rodney Hawkins, School Board Member, explained that a Committee consisting of five members from Milan and five from Dummer — with Kristin Young as Chairman — have studied extensively the proposal of a tuition agreement with the Town of

Dummer. This involved studying the schedules and curriculum of Milan vs. Berlin, and involved a great deal of time. The Committee feels that it would be to the advantage of both Milan and Dummer to accept Dummer children in a tuition agreement. Any such agreement would then come back to the voters next year.

It was voted in the affirmative to accept the report of the School Study Committee. Motion on Article 3, carried.

ARTICLE 4. Motion to object to consideration of Article 4 was made by Janet Woodward and seconded by Robert Vashaw. Show of hands was called for and Motion was carried, with 14 supporting Motion and 4 against. Article 4 not considered.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept on behalf of the District, any or all gratis grants or other gratis funds for educational purposes which may now or hereinafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, private individuals, corporations, or any federal or state agency and to expend same for such projects as it may designate..

Motion by Sarah Cordwell, seconded by Beverly Hawkins, to accept Article 5 as read. Brief explanation of Article by School Board Chairman, Robert Vashaw. Vote on Article, affirmative. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the District will vote to accept the provisions of Title I, Title IV (P.L. 89-10 ESEA,) National Forest Reserve, and school lunch, and appropriate such funds as may be made available to the District under such federal acts for such particular projects as may be determined by the School Board. Further, to see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for such funds and to expend same for such projects as it may designate.

Motion to accept Article 6, as read, made by Alta Campbell, seconded by Robert Biggart. Mr. Bellavance explained briefly what funds would be available under Title I and Title IV, and how these funds could be used to our advantage.

Vote, affirmative; motion carried.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school officials, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.

Motion was made by Beverly Hawkins that we raise the sum of \$298,918.37 for the support of schools, for the payment of

salaries for school officials, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Motion seconded by Robert Biggart.

In answer to a question from the floor, Mr. Bellavance explained the increase over the 1977 appropriation. One of the items he mentioned is that money must be raised locally to support a teacher-aide. A program for handicapped children is required and the services of a teacher-aide would be used to help these children.

Vote on Article 7, affirmative. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 8. Under this Article a motion was made by Robert Vashaw that we extend our thanks to the Milan-Dummer Study Committee for their willingness to serve on this Committee. Motion was seconded unanimously. Mr. Bellavance mentioned at this time that copies of the Study Committee Report are available to those who wish to have one.

It was also moved at this time that Ronald Hawkins explain Article 4, (which had been given "no consideration.") Motion seconded by Roma Labrecque.

The explanation was simply that Article 4 was intended as a replacement for Article 3, if Article 3 had been voted down.

A motion was requested that the starting time for next year's Annual School Meeting be 7:30 P.M. Motion so made by Janet Woodward and seconded by Roma Labrecque. The School Board recognizes request, motion was carried.

No further business under Article 8. Motion to adjourn made and seconded, time 7:48 P.M. Motion carried.
