To the Inhabitants of the Town of Northwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Northwood on Tuesday, the 5th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment numbered Article III, Regulations, Section A. Paragraphs 3, 4, 4a, 5, and 5 a & b, Section B, Paragraph 1, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Ordinances.

TOWN WARRANT
The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Northwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Coe-Brown Northwood Academy in said Northwood on Saturday the 9th day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for interest on same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,525.00 for the Northwood Public Library.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Recreation, Parks and Playgrounds.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the care of Cemeteries.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Highways.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,750.00 for the purpose of Street Lighting.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$690.89 for the purpose of Town Road Aid, the State's share to be \$4,605.94.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$357.00 for the Concord Hospital.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Ambulance Service, to be paid to the Barnstead Center Fire Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,872.00 for the Town's per capita share of the Rural District Health Council.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,450.00 for the purpose of supporting the Northwood Community Action Program.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of increasing the Highway Construction Machinery Capital Reserve Fund.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for maintenance of the Town Dump.

15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$35,000.00 for new town offices, and authorize the withdrawal of \$25,000.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, the balance to be borrowed from a bank and repaid from Revenue Sharing Funds to be received in 1975.

As part of this proposal, it will be the duty of the Board of Selectmen to secure such plans as may be needed for contractors to bid on the above proposal. Said plans to be reviewed at two (2) or more Public Meetings before going out to bid. No bid over \$35,000.00 to be considered.

16. To see if the Town will vote to recognize and sponsor, as a volunteer organization, the Northwood Rescue Squad.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,585.00 for the Northwood Rescue Squad.

18. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of seven (7) to make plans and recommendations for the American Revolution Bicentennial. The committee to be selected: three (3)

from the Floor, two (2) by the Moderator, and two (2) by the Board of Selectmen. This committee to make reports and recommendations to the Board of Selectmen by December 31, 1974 and to also report to the 1975 Town Meeting.

19. To see if the Town of Northwood will vote to express their sincere thanks to the Northwood Bicentennial Committee for an exceptionally successful celebration.

20. To see what action the Town of Northwood will take relative to the recommendation of the Road Study Committee as requested by action at the March Town Meeting of 1973.

21. To see if the Town of Northwood will vote to rescind its action, electing a Highway Agent, and instead will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Highway Agent pursuant to N. H. R.S.A. Chapter 245, Section 6, to fulfill the duties of Highway Agent, effective forthwith and until changed by a vote at an annual or special meeting.

22. To see if the Town will vote to remove from the Truck Capital Reserve Fund and the Highway Construction Machinery Capital Reserve Fund, sufficient money to purchase a new one ton dump truck and a two yard sand spreader, together with small power tools for highway use. The total sum not to exceed \$7,500.00.

23. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new fire truck for a sum not to exceed \$35,000.00, the Town to appropriate the sum of \$11,666.67 in 1974, \$11,666.67 in 1975, and \$11,666.66 in 1976, plus interest.

24. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of R.S.A. Chapter 76, 15-A, which provides for the semi-annual collection of taxes in certain Towns and Cities.

25. To see if the Town will vote to change the compensation of Tax Collector from the present rate of 1% of the taxes collected to a new rate of $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1% of the taxes collected.

26. To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and

bars, the road beginning on the Easterly side of Route 202A, 555' Northerly of the top of Drake's Hill, so-called, and running Northeasterly by the house of William E. and Judith H. Lounsbury, formerly Evelyn Dudley, to the Strafford Line.

27. To see if the Town of Northwood will vote to receive and expend Federal Funds in any times of disaster as declared by the President of the United States and disbursed by the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration in Washington, D. C.

28. The undersigned parties being registered voters and residents of the Town of Northwood, N. H. respectfully request that the following article be placed in the Town Warrant for consideration and action by the townspeople at the next Town Meeting to be held in March, 1974.

To see if the Town will vote to accept the recommendation of the Northwood Bicentennial Committee for the expenditures of surplus funds now held by its treasurer in the amount of \$4,500.00. To be known as "Northwood Bicentennial Committee Trust Fund". The Northwood Trustees of Trust Funds to hold the original sum of money, and such additional sums as may be from time to time added to the original sum by the further transfers of money from the Northwood Bicentennial Committee, or by gifts or devise of other Committees, Firms or Individuals. The income from these monies is to be administered by the Northwood Board of Selectmen for the following purposes only.

1. The yearly repair and maintenance of the flagpole located on the Town Parade that was donated by the Northwood Bicentennial Committee, and the purchase of replacement flags and lighting.

2. The yearly care and improvement and/or replacement of trees, shrubbery and other features on the Town Parade, or any future Town Parade, and the yearly removal of all brush on the Town Parade, or any future Town Parade.

3. Any balance of the yearly income may be expended by the Northwood Board of Selectmen for the maintenance and repair of furniture and fixtures within the present Town Hall, or any future Town Hall.

Entered by petition of 15 registered voters.

29. To see if the Town of Northwood will vote to accept a deed from Paul Follansbee, increasing the width of the Old Dump Road, leading from N. H. U.S. Route 4 & 202, opposite Johnson's Dairy Bar, to the residence of Paul Follansbee. The width of this road to be increased to 25 feet, and to be as near as possible, 12 feet 6 inches on each side of the center line of the existing road.

30. To see if the Town of Northwood will vote to express their appreciation of the following gifts:

Drilled well from Robert Thomas Artesian Well Company.

Deep well pump from Saddleback Mountain Lions Club.

Concrete well pit and excavation from Robert E. Bailey

Hook-up and water lines from Joseph J. Jeffrey.

Combination Windows and Shutters on Town Hall from Northwood Bicentennial Committee.

and to notify the donors in writing of their appreciation.

31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property of the Town acquired by Tax Collectors Deed as a result of Tax Sale.

32. To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.

**ANNUAL REPORT
RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL**

January 1, 1973 – December 31, 1973

The Rural District Health Council became of age during the past year. The organization has separated from the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center and is now an independent certified Home Health agency supplying comprehensive health services to its member towns. In March, the towns of Farmington and Milton voted to join the Rural District Health Council, so the number of people covered by the organization was expanded to 14,257. The Board of Directors voted to move the office from Portsmouth to Farmington and this was accomplished on April 15, 1973.

As a result of expansion and relocation, our staff has grown to six nurses, a physical therapist and a secretary-bookkeeper. The staff nurses employed by the agency include Mrs. Cynthia Blood, Agency Supervisor; Miss Arlene Thorne who has worked faithfully and tirelessly since the program was initiated; Mrs. Ardala Houle who is now coordinating patient referrals in the area hospitals and nursing homes, and also coordinates the Well Child Clinics; Mrs. Barbara Drew who is well-known in Farmington where she has been the visiting nurse for many years; Mrs. Myrtle Walsh of Milton who has been active in nursing in the area and joined the staff on May 1st; and Mrs. Lucy Myers of Deerfield, a newcomer to the area who has had previous visiting nurse experience. Mrs. Kathleen Hansen, a registered physical therapist, has a fine varied background in her field. Mrs. Norma Davis is a very capable secretary-bookkeeper who handles much of the office detail.

The value of home care becomes increasingly evident as indicated by the size of the morbidity case load. Three Well Child Clinics are held monthly with several extra clinics scheduled throughout the year. These are sponsored by the Council in cooperation with the N. H. State Department of Public Health. An addition to the clinic program this year was a Dental clinic for children from 3 to 6 years who were enrolled in the Well Child clinics. This was possible through the cooperation of the N. H. Bureau of Dental Public Health, Division of Public Health. A total of 227 children participated in this program.

The Strafford County Prenatal and Family Planning Clinic has expanded its area of coverage and the Rural District Health Council works very closely with this group making home visits to all of the patients from the area enrolled in the clinic. The Council is also involved with the Exeter Area Family Planning Clinic.

The Seacoast Regional Counseling Center in Portsmouth has developed an Aftercare Program for Rockingham County to do follow-up for patients being seen at the Center and also patients being discharged from the N. H. State Hospital. The Rural District Health Council provides the nursing care for patients being treated from member towns. The Strafford Guidance Center is currently planning a similar program for Strafford County and the Council is represented on the planning committee for this service.

The Council is represented on a steering committee planning for Homemaker-Home Health Aide services for Strafford County. It is hoped this much needed service will be available in the coming year.

The Rural District Health Council worked in cooperation with the Milton Community Health Service in providing Tuberculosis screening, Hearing and Vision screening, and Diabetic screening which were well received by area people.

The Rural District Health Council has been supported by the funds contributed by the member towns at an annual rate of \$1.00 per capita, state grants and fees for service. Directors Ms. Susan Eldridge, Ms. Anne Barrett and Ms. Geraldine Veroneau. In addition the Board secured the services of Diane Allen, John Gallant, Brenda Brown and Robin Fife. These workers were secured from the Rockingham County Neighborhood Youth Corps at no cost to the town.

The program again used the Northwood Elem. School as its base. A total of 85 children registered for the summer with an average daily attendance of 35. Again this year, Mrs. Grace Parsons drove the bus to pick up children who otherwise would not be able to attend the program.

During the summer a variety of social, cultural and physical activities were carried out. Field trips were taken to Strawberry Banke in Portsmouth, Squam Lake Science center in Holderness and Rye Beach Harbor. The children enjoyed weekly swims at

Bow Lake public beach and again participated in an instructional swimming program offered by the Northwood Recreation Commission's Red Cross Swimming Program. Some of the favorite activities of the summer were, Cooking, Bike-hiking, project Try from the University, Olympic Day and gold rush day. The children also worked on a float for the bi-centennial parade with many of the children riding in the actual parade.

We would like to thank the members of the Northwood Community who donated their time and skills to make our year a successful one. **REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND DISTRICT CHIEF**

Lest We Forget – It Can Happen Here

The New Hampshire Forest Fire Service is represented in every town, city or unorganized place in our state by the forest fire warden. Anyone wishing to kindle an outside fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the fire warden. Except for cooking fires, no fire can be kindled between 9:00 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is a commercial or industrial burn or it is raining. The fire warden is assisted in his work by the District Forest Fire Chief who works for the Department of Resources and Economic Development Forest Fire Service.

Fire prevention was, again this year, the most important part of the Forest Fire Warden's job. Fire statistics show the need with 72% of the fires caused by smoking, debris burning and children. Smokey the Bear is an important prevention tool but he still needs much help from the public. Parents should warn their children of the hazards of playing with matches. Children tend to forget that a lighted match held in their hand is a potential forest fire.

NORTHWOOD CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Northwood Conservation Commission was generally inactive during 1973, as it was very difficult to schedule meetings that did not conflict with other activities of the members.

The Commission was represented at the public hearing in Northwood relative to the relocation of Routes 4, 9 and 202 in the vicinity of Johnson's Dairy Bar and Lester's Farm Market, and testimony was presented in favor of the project. The Northwood Conservation Commission has long been interested in the concept of recycling of waste and is particularly enthusiastic about the progress in this direction at the Northwood Town Dump.

ROAD STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

The Road Study Committee travelled all the roads in Northwood during the past six months, both private and town roads, and the Committee found some of the private roads in better condition than the town roads.

It is the recommendation of the Road Study Committee, that a standing committee of 5 or more persons be duly appointed by the Board of Selectmen, to be called the Northwood Roads Committee. It shall be the function of this Committee to work with the Northwood Town Road Agent in an advisory capacity and in connection with other than normal road maintenance work. This Committee shall be required to abide by the following rules regarding road work on so-called "private" or other than town-owned roads:

1. All roads are to be graded each Spring and Fall by the Town.
2. Minimal summer maintenance shall be done on all roads.
3. All work shall be done on a matching funds basis.
4. The Committee shall receive written requests for road work until December 1st of each year for the following year. They shall review all requests and make their recommendations, in writing, to the Board of Selectmen by December 31st of each year for work to be accomplished during the next year.

The Road Study Committee recommends that the town appropriate for the year 1974, sufficient funds to bring all town roads back to good condition.

The Road Study Committee recommends that the town appropriate sufficient funds to help maintain any main stem or trunk road (not private drives leading to private property) through a matching funds program, for the year 1974, upon advice and approval of the Roads Committee.

Attached to our report is a map showing all town roads in Northwood. The Committee has named all town roads and is now in the process of having name signs printed.

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Northwood qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Northwood School in said district on the 2nd day of March 1974, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any officers or agent of the district.

2. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To choose agents and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

4. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

5. To see if the district will vote to provide a high school education for pupils who have reached the age of eighteen and who have not completed high school. (RSA 189: 1-a). The district will pay the tuition required by law for a resident of the district who has not completed high school and who has not reached the age of twenty-one, and who has an acceptable attendance record.

6. To see if the district will vote to become a member of the Strafford County Learning Disabilities Center and receive the benefits of its services at a cost to the district of two dollars per pupil. The cost to this district is projected to be \$660.00 for 1974-75.

7. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive and to expend, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for

educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or state agencies.

8. To see if the district will vote pursuant to RSA 31:105 to provide indemnification for district employees, school administrators, school board members, district officers or agents from personal loss or expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgement by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to property providing the indemnified person was at the time of the accident acting within the scope of his employment or office.

The School Districts of Northwood, Barrington, Strafford and Nottingham have combined their resources under the Title I, ESEA guidelines to develop a Learning Disabilities program. There are also special handicapped education funds used to implement this project. Two teachers with special training for learning disabilities have been employed by the joint committee under this project. They are Mrs. Ann Grabowski and Miss Charlene Davis. There has also been a speech clinician employed to help those children with speech problems. Mrs. Margaret Demers is in charge of this aspect of the program.

The enrollment by grade levels in the Northwood Elementary School as of September 20, 1973 was as follows:

In addition, there are a number of pupils being supported in special programs at other schools or institutions. There is one child at Epsom Central School, one child at the Little Harbour School, and one at the Manchester Rehabilitation Center. At the time this report was written, there were arrangements being made to educate an aphasic child within the district with the assistance of local and state funds. This program will be transferred to another center in 1974-75.

Another matter of importance to the voters of the district is the possible effect of recent legislation on the operations of the district. To this end, a brief review of new laws and changes which are of significance is presented.

Legislation having to do with handicapped children. The school district has been made responsible for the education of handicapped children from the time of birth until these children reach the age of twenty-one. Previously, it was responsible only after the child reached age five. The tuition liability for these children is limited to the state average cost, although current advice indicates that the district may pay more should it wish to do so. Districts are liable for transportation when a handicapped

child reaches age four. Since handicapped children are learning disabled to a greater or less degree, the statutes now permit the employment by districts of learning disabilities teachers, the certification requirements of these teachers having been established by the State Board of Education. Another handicap which has been much in the news is that of children with kidney disease. A law has been passed to make the state responsible for the payment for the care and treatment of children with end stage kidney disease.

Legislation which has an effect on school finances in general.

A number of districts in the state have reconsidered rejected bond issues immediately upon their defeat. This is no longer possible because at least seven days must elapse before a vote of reconsideration must be published in a newspaper at least two days before the new vote. Each school, if it does not already, must make a lunch or breakfast available for pupils. No waiver beyond September 30, 1979 will be granted. This could cost money for equipment or facilities, as well as labor. Even though the dual enrollment program has been pretty well defeated by court actions, the child benefit program has not been ruled out, and a number of new benefits, such as driver education programs, educational television, lunch programs, have been made eligible. In order to place the sweepstakes program on a fiscal year, rather than a calendar year basis, sweepstakes benefits will be paid in September, instead of December. The first year of this operation will reduce the payment by one third, as a result as only eight months, not twelve, will have elapsed. If a foster child is placed by a state agency in a district other than the child's original home, the new district will receive a sum of money, presently \$200.00, toward the payment for the child's education. When students attend a vocational program in an AREA vocational high school, such as Dover Vocational, which is not the usual high school for the district, districts which do not maintain high schools will be responsible for tuition up to the amount the high school of regular attendance, or the state average cost, whichever is higher. In the past, districts which tuitioned high school students to other districts have been responsible for tuition only up to the state average cost. Under the new law, districts must be responsible for whatever the receiving public high school charges, unless there is a contract calling for a different payment. The state

average for high schools this year is \$931.00, but some high schools in the state charge as much as \$1,200.00 for tuition, the difference being the responsibility of the parents.

Additional programs which the schools must provide. The legislature added two more programs which school districts must include in the school curriculum. One is a mandate to provide instruction in the venereal diseases, which have become epidemic in New Hampshire, and the other is to provide instruction in nutrition education to be incorporated in the regular course of instruction.

Legislation affecting the operations of school boards and districts. Under the "right to know" law, any official who refuses a citizen access to a public document is personally liable for attorney's fees if a court order supports the citizen. School districts may adopt the absentee ballot when the Australian ballot is in use in that district, but if adopted, candidates must file at least thirty days before the election. This requires an article in the warrant. Immunity from civil suit has been granted to school board members for action taken in a legal school board meeting. A school district may vote at a district meeting to indemnify any official employed by it while acting in his/her official capacity for loss or damages resulting to them personally. The District shall indemnify its employees and officers acting in their official capacities when a suit involving civil rights is involved. The district may purchase insurance to cover its expenses in the actions mentioned above. There must be a warrant article to cover this expense if the district decides to purchase insurance.

There were, of course, other actions taken by the legislature, some of which affect all districts, and some of which affected particular districts, but, it appears that those of general interest have been summarized above.

In closing, we would like to express our appreciation for the cooperation we have received from the citizens, the school board members, the pupils, and the staff.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Northwood School Board and the citizens of the Town of Northwood:

In the past year at the Northwood Elementary School, we feel that we have increased productivity and expanded our curriculum to include all students of the school.

Children with either learning problems or learning disabilities are getting special attention daily. We have added a Learning Disabilities teacher Mrs. Ann Grabowski, to our staff, and she is helping students overcome many of the early disabilities that will affect them academically in years to come. Mrs. Margaret Demers, a speech specialist, is at the school one day a week to help children with speech problems. Both of these programs are funded by the Federal government.

Our reading program has expanded under the guidance of Mrs. Ann Hinderer who has set up a program to remediate and improve some of the youngsters who have had problems in reading over the years, and we hope that this program will help these youngsters in their every day academic progress.

We have maintained a class enrollment of approximately 315-330 through the year. The spread of children throughout the school has helped our building situation. Any large increase would cause severe hardship on the facilities we have at the present time.

The new Learning Center is completed, and the students are enjoying the opportunity to go to the area for library periods, as well as for small group instruction daily. This area certainly has been a blessing to our crowded conditions while allowing the children the opportunity to have a special place to research materials and gain added knowledge.

Our music, art and elective programs are still well received by the students, and our shop boys have made many improvements in the school with some of their woodworking projects. We have

continued to provide the students with an active athletic program, including boys and girls soccer, boys and girls basketball, and boys baseball and girls softball. At the present time, we have 60 boys participating in basketball from grades 4 thru 8. The girls have 30 girls involved in cheerleading and basketball. We feel that this program is a way for many of our youngsters who are not able to achieve on a high level academically to feel that they can achieve in a given area. It improves the discipline and attitudes of the students and gives them a reason to be proud of their school.

We have added three new members to our regular teaching staff. Mrs. Eleanor Loewer is teaching Level 6. She has had over twenty years of experience in New York State. Miss Nancy Bonin is a first-year teacher and teaches language arts for the Jr. High Grades. Mr. Jack Bresnahan, with five years experience in the Manchester schools, is in charge of our science program for grades 6 thru 8.

This year, we will graduate the largest class in the history of Northwood school. There are 41 students in Grade 8, and after spending the past five years with this group, I feel very proud that they will represent the Town of Northwood when they leave in June.

In closing, I again thank the citizens of Northwood who have been wonderful people with whom to work. I would like to thank Mr. Morgan and Mr. Beaupre of the Supervisory Union office for their help in furthering the programs at our school. And, finally, to the Northwood School Board, a special thanks, because without their support many of the improvements that have taken place at our school would not have been possible.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

Northwood, N. H.

1972-1973

To the Superintendent:

The health program for the year 1972-1973 was carried out in the usual manner with an annual physical inspection of each student by the nurse. When defects were noted, the appropriate referral and followup were made.

The students received the benefit of preventative dental care through classroom visits by a hygienist sponsored by the N. H. Bureau of Dental Public Health. Due to lack of space a cleaning and fluoride clinic was not held. Eight students received dental care through Northwood Matching Funds. This money was made available through the generosity of the Harvey Lake Women's Club and the local P.T.A. Dr. Steven Ekstrom, Concord, was the participating dentist.

The Heaf Test was offered to all school personnel. A total of eighteen tests at the Elementary School and thirteen at Coe Brown were administered. Seventy-five students received the Regular Measles vaccine at a clinic in February. Dr. Alfred Mihachik generously assisted at this clinic. Thirty-four students were registered for school entry at a pre-school clinic in May. First Aid was offered to approximately ninety-seven students, eleven home visits were made and thirty ill students were transported home. Three children were transported to the dentist, one student to the hospital, one student to the doctor's office and one to the Rehabilitation Center.

The sixth grade students completed a Johnson and Johnson first aid course. The Kindergarten students were screened for possible vision and hearing problems in December.

The School Nurse participated in the following activities during the school year: attended informative workshops on vision and hearing; taught a Red Cross First Aid Course to the faculty at

Barrington Elementary School; attended a Cardic-Pulmonary Resuscitation Clinic at Concord Hospital, assisted at the Well Child Clinics in Deerfield.

The teachers viewed a film on detecting health problems in school age children. The following films were shown to the students in conjunction with the health education program for the year; dental health; first aid; smoking; personal health; drug abuse; nutrition.

I would like to express my thanks to the Superintendent, School Board Members, teachers and parents for their cooperation and support during the past year.
