

## TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Peterborough, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote In Town Affairs

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at eight-thirty of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, for the laying out and repairing of the highways, and for all other charges arising within the Town, and appropriate the same.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the Fire Department and Public Library, and for Memorial Day.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward paying the Town debt and interest.
- 5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, and committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a Police officer, or as many as may be necessary, to preserve order in and about the public places of the Town, and perform other duties as may be required by the Selectmen, both day and night, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept legacies and gifts given to the Town in trust by any individual or individuals.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred and Eighty-Nine Dollars (\$389.00) to the Monadnock Region Association for calling attention to the resources of this region.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate toward paying for electricity, both for power and lighting purposes to be used at the new swimming pool on Union Street.

- 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the suppression of Gypsy and Brown Tail Moths, or any other insect or pest.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the use of the Town History Committee.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civilian Defense in Peterborough, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Thirty-One Dollars and Sixty Cents (\$431.60), provided the State gives Seventeen Hundred Twenty-Six Dollars and Thirty-Nine Cents, (\$1,726.39) for road maintenance and construction of Class Five highways.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for the reconstruction of the Four Winds Farm road, from the Old Dublin road to a point nearly opposite Robert S. Hoffman, Jr. residence, or take any action relating thereto.
- 15. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) to build up and otherwise improve Gray's Hill Road from its junction with Sandhill Road and deepen the ditch, for an approximate length of 900 feet.
- 16. To see if the Town will accept the **gift** from a citizen of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) for the special purpose of the purchase of real estate formerly of the late Mr. Sam Smith on Grove Street, Peterborough, any balance after said purchase to be applied toward expenses connected with the property, and on the condition that the Town remove the burned building thereon and leave the space open and free from buildings in perpetuo as a portion of Park development for the attractiveness of the Town and pleasure of the public.
- 17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for the construction of a new highway from Vine St. across the School District land to High Street and place the money in a special sinking fund until such time as the road can be built, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 18. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate towards the widening and rebuilding of Vine St., or take any other action relating thereto.

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- 19. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint four representative citizens to act with the Seiectmen as a Town Planning Committee on Post-War plans and projects for this community, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to place in a Capital Reserve Fund the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) from the Water Department receipts to be used for major repairs and maintenance of the Town Water System in the future or take any other action relating thereto.
- 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.
- 22. To see if the Town will transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### Report of the Budget Committee for 1944

As stated previously, the Committee believes in plans and planning now, rather than waiting until the last moment. It also believes that all post-war plans should be approved by an official Town Planning Board, representing all elements in the community, before being acted upon by the voters. First of all, this would prevent the confusion now existing in many cities and towns; in one place there are 16 different organizations, all working on the same or similar projects, wasting valuable time and effort, which should be consolidated in one Secondly mistakes could be foreseen and prevented. This procedure would give people confidence in the measures proposed. Of further value would be the fair and intelligent use of the manpower pool, the employment of the returning veterans and warworkers by a careful classification of skills, thus giving each person the best and most profitable chance to use his or her particular ability.

Money for Public Works may be provided in very limited amounts under wartime restrictions through direct appropriations, but further sums for postwar use may be accumulated under the provisions of Chapter 160 of the Acts of the N. H. Legislature of 1943, establishing the basis of reserve funds. These are under very strict controls. Each appropriation must be carefully designated for the specific purpose and be placed in the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds, who may not pay them or the interest therefrom for any other purpose. The total amount of the reserves appropriations in any one year must not exceed 1/10 of one percent of the total assessed valuation of the Town which in Peterborough would amount to only \$3895.93 plus unexpended balances of previous appropriations which may be voted into the reserve fund. The smallness of what may be voted emphasizes the urgency of starting now to accumulate these funds, so that a considerable reserve may be built up as soon as possible. Just now when our tax rate is \$26, lower than many towns, below the state average of \$30.28, we can do this without imposing any undue burden. The Selectmen will present motions for this purpose.

The School District may not establish reserve funds except for expenses of its Planning Committee, because under its School Laws it may expend appropriations for purposes other than the items against which they are voted. The appropriation must be provided by a special article in the School Warrant.

Attention is called to the fact that in 1944 and future years the Town accounts will close Dec. 31, instead of Jan. 31. This promised trouble in drawing up Budgets, but the Tax Commission and others pointed out that since many appropriations are expended in the middle of the year, we could just as well

budget on the 12 month basis as far as the actual figures were concerned.

One complication occurred in the accounts of the Trustees of Trust Funds. They have been receiving as of Jan. 1 certain interest, in amount about \$400. With the closing of year at Dec. 31, they will be deprived of this for 1944 and it will be necessary to appropriate to their account this amount to make up the loss. Next year and thereafter, they will not need this help. Due to increasing costs of cemetery work, they are asking for \$100. more than the usual \$900. making the figure with the above \$400. \$1400, instead of \$900.

For many years there has been complaint because the pupils of the schools have had to take buses at the foot of High and Vine Sts. instead of at the school buildings, resulting in considerable annoyance to property owners nearby and just as much to the pupils, in case the bus happens to be late and they have to stand out in the weather or seek shelter on nearby porches. An inspection of the location by the Selectmen, School Board, Budget Committee and Mr. Philbrick, of the State Highway Department shows the following:

Vine St. is too narrow for a bus and car to pass safely, especially in icy weather. There is not room for a safe turn in the school yard, where the bus driver says he cannot watch both ends of the bus so as to prevent injury to some pupil who may be out of sight in the rear. In the vicinity of the church and school the conditions are cramped. If wartime restrictions were off, we could build the proposed street through the new schoolhouse lot and down to High St., which cannot be done now. The most pressing problem is with the buses. could be solved by some very narrow land taking on part of one side of Vine St., and similarly on the other and a little wider taking on the north side of the school yard. This would give a 24 foot street and a sidewalk. Both street and sidewalk are in dangerous condition, worse in slippery weather. The location of the proposed new school and the road in that land are really postwar planning and cannot be done now on account of the expense, but it does not seem necessary to hold up the widening of Vine St. The Committee recommends the immediate widening of Vine St. The State would estimate the charge \$2200. but we can usually do such work for less than they can.

We shall probably have to undertake a sewerage project in the near future. It will cost a large amount of money, but this we shall be forced to do some day. The Federal government is to spend a great deal on the elimination of pollution in the Contoocook Valley and we shall be required to cooperate. One reason that we should be thinking of this is also, if possible, to prevent the tearing up of any new street improvements after we have spent the money to provide them, for the digging of the sewers. This will be an example of good or bad planning, as the case may be.

The Committee, as stated before, recommends that some definite progress be made towards establishing suitable facilities for the landing of airplanes. The need is inevitable, if we are to be in the forefront of N. H. towns, as usual and it may come sooner than we realize.

The School Budget this year calls for \$53,395, an increase of \$1,316 over last year. This is caused by an increase of \$1650 in Teachers' Salaries, partly offset by savings of Debt Interest of \$200 and \$100 less for Books and Supplies. Further saving might have been made were it not for the finishing off of the Grade School basement to provide room for lunches and exercises. The old building would not stand synchronized drills on the floors above.

The proposed Town appropriations for this year do not differ greatly from those of 1943, therefore we are not taking space to publish all now. The items changed substantially are as follows:

Town Officers' Salaries and Expenses. Last year Appropriation \$5,500, this \$6500, due to expenses of Election and Registration, Invoice and Taxes List.

Expenses of Town Hall, last year \$5700 due to rebuilding of brick work at front of building. This year \$4,500.

Trustees of Trust Funds, increase from \$900 for cemeteries to \$1400 previously explained.

Civilian Defense last year \$1000, actually spent \$497.78. This year estimated \$200 perhaps.

Town Maintenance: Last year \$23,200, this \$24,500, due to increase in Railings estimate \$300 to \$600 and Oiling estimate from \$6000 to \$7000 the latter to preserve new roads which need it. We are naturally in favor of preserving any roads built by oiling them; we understand that some owners prefer dirt roads around their estates, but the voters can decide this matter as they see fit.

The County Tax last year was \$22,760.30, estimated this year \$21,588.74 a decrease of \$1177.50. There is an estimated loss of revenue for 1944 of \$7733.95 in the taxes on Interest and Dividends, R. R. Tax, Savings Bank, Motor Vehicles, Water Department net income and Polls. It could be much less than this actually perhaps, since last year our actual revenue was \$6000 more than expected on these items.

Cash on Hand last year \$38,601.02 of which we owed the schools \$21,748.92. This year cash on hand is \$35,823.24, of which we owe the schools only \$10,453.04.

Total assessed valuation of the town (1943) \$3,895,931. Total Town and School Debt \$22,000 Tax rate \$26 per \$1000 of valuation.

The above figures do not include any sums to be voted by special articles which may be inserted in the Town or School Warrants. Small needed expenditures for these or the Reserve Funds will not greatly affect the tax rate. It would seem far better to do what is necessary now than later when it would be combined with postwar projects of larger amounts.

Both the School and Town Meetings are to be held the same day March 14, with the object of increasing the attendance. As one of our wartime duties we ought to attend them. We are all busy, but one of our most necessary jobs is to keep the wheels moving at home, to prepare for postwar problems and see to it that our country shall really be the beloved and prosperous homeland, which our boys are fighting for now and all the time, when they return. We must not fail them in anything. We must carry on the democratic, free government they are risking their lives to preserve!

# Adams Playground Committee Report

The plan of coordinating the program at the playground and the Swimming Pool was conducted again this year, in order to give the town a program similar to that of a summer camp without the necessity of the children being away from home. Miss Gertrude Clukay, who previously had charge of the Swimming Pool, was director of this program, and was assisted by Miss Nadene Nichols and Mr. Robert Livingston, who was engaged for part-time instruction on craft work. Miss Louise Rundlett and Mr. Francis Cheney of the Pool Staff also assisted in the coordination of the Playground and Pool program.

As the majority of the children over twelve years of age were working last summer, the program was organized particularly for the younger children. The activities on the Playground were made adaptable to the three important groups, namely: the pre-school children (age 3-5); the elementary school children (age 6-8); and the intermediates (age 9-11).

The average daily attendance at the Playground was twenty-five (25) as compared to thirty-five (35) in 1942. These figures are on the basis of one attendance checking a day rather than two as in previous years. We believe this gives a more accurate picture but, of course, gives a smaller figure because it eliminates the chance of the child being counted twice as in previous years.

The Playground was open from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Various activities and tournaments were held throughout the summer. The closing event, in the form of a field day in which a great

many participated, was very successful.

The fact that the same children are coming back year after year to the Pool and Playground proves that the coordinated program is successful and can be more so in the future as more children and parents become familiar with the opportunities provided.

The committee wishes to take this opportunity to thank the School Board for its cooperation in allowing the use of manual

training equipment.

Your committee feels that further coordination between the Playground and the Pool will add greatly to the furtherance of both projects, and we greatly appreciate the cooperation of the New Hampshire State Forestry and Recreational Department, given us by their Recreational Director Russell B. Tobey.

#### AUDITORS' REPORT

We the undersigned auditors of the accounts of the Town of Peterborough, New Hampshire, hereby certify that we have carefully examined the foregoing accounts of the officers, committees and others, having charge of moneys, for the year ending January 31, 1944, pages 409-448 inclusive, with the exception of the Weston Memorial Account and the James Smith Fund Account and the Amanda Richardson Account with minor exceptions for which corrections now appear in the assets and liabilities statement. We found them correctly cast and properly vouched.

We did not verify the accounts given us as uncollected taxes and water rents, assuming that their publication will provide an adequate check.

This year at the library, there have been many interesting happenings besides the usual routine work.

As stated in my last year's report, it was too early to tell how many books were collected in the second Victory Book Drive. Two hundred fifty books were left at the library. All of these held up to the standard for quality asked for. After your librarian had gone to the High School to sort over the books collected by the pupils, there were added to the above about six hundred more. The librarian arranged to have these carried to the sorting center at Keene, and this was done through the courtesy of Mr. Horace Gilbert and Mrs. William McGreal.

At the request of the Hospital Aid, librarian, with Mrs. Hunter, went to the Peterborough Hospital and sorted out the obsolete material from the library there.

During Book Week, in November, we displayed some of the books and music written by members of the MacDowell Colony, in the window of the Public Service Company. This exhibit was especially attractive and called forth many favorable comments, as well as requests to buy the material. Perhaps some people do not realize how many hours of research an author of even a simple story for children must put in, and that even more time must be spent by those who write historical or scientific books. Every fact must be verified before a book is published. Many of the Colony authors came to our library for this material when writing their books, and if we could not supply it we were able to borrow it from the State library, at Concord, or the Library of Congress at Washington. They, as well as others, have expressed their gratitude to us for the needed material.

We should be proud that because of the early founding of the library, the wisdom of trustees and librarians, generous gifts and support, we have unusual facilities for a town the size of Peterborough.

Also, during Book Week, we had an exhibit of children's books, several written by Peterborough guests or residents. Miss Jaquith visited the Center School to tell the children about them and give out bookmarks. Several of the teachers have come with their classes to visit the library and have the different methods explained to the children.

One day a week, the bus carrying tuition pupils, starts from the library so they may have an opportunity to get books. We are still supplying books for supplementary reading to the schools. This last year a total of about five hundred books were loaned. We also have loaned books to Kendall Hall School, and Sargent and Norfleet Camps.

In September, through the auspices of the librarian, Mr. Daniel Reed, of the MacDowell Colony, gave a dramatic reading from parts of The Spoon River Anthology, to the pupils of the Junior and Senior High School, which was greatly enjoyed.

In October, your librarian was asked to write an article for the News Letter of the New Hampshire Library Association, it being the first of a series about the different libraries in the state.

At the present time we are collecting all the material available about the Peterborough boys who are in service. We shall greatly appreciate any pictures or printed articles about them. This collection will be of great permanent value, not only to the library but to the town.

This is a time for straight thinking and our libraries give us a chance for such thinking. Herbert Agar, in a message to librarians, says: "If we don't profit by the chance, we may lose it. More than half the world has already lost it. So let us be glad for our libraries and for our country which allows us to have libraries and to use them freely. And for the high intelligence with which our libraries are directed."

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS TO THE PETERBOROUGH SCHOOL BOARD

I enclose with this, my tenth annual report, the schedule of teachers for 1943–1944, the financial report of the school board and school treasurer, the school board's budget, and the other reports belonging to the school department.

In view of the comprehensive reports of Headmaster Keach, Mrs. Teed, principal of the Central School, and Mrs. Nichols at West Peterborough this report will be confined to general matters not referred to in the other reports.

Teacher changes have been larger than for many years. With five new teachers in the high, four in the Central School and a new supervisor of Music the problem of adjustment has been something of a challenge to all concerned. This challenge has been met, however, and under the skilful guidance of Headmaster Keach and Mrs. Teed we feel that the work of both schools is progressing in an encouraging manner.

The enrollment of the high school shows somewhat of a decrease from last year, but the junior high has shown a slight increase, while the lower elementary grades show a loss of only four.

The enrollment for all schools for 1942–43 and for the present school year to February 1 is as follows:

Tuition receipts have held up better than we feared would be the case at the time of our last report. Transportation difficulties have reduced the expected number of high school pupils from Bennington. The loss from Harrisville and Greenfield has been offset by the increased number from Dublin where 25 pupils have been attending during the first half year.

For this period we have had a total of 55 high school tuition pupils for the semester, two for part time, and three elementary pupils.

One problem which concerned us for several years has been the matter of adjustment of seventh grade pupils to junior high work. During the last year and the present year this adjustment has been greatly helped by the sympathetic understanding of the teachers who have had charge of these pupils. The meeting of the State Teachers' Association was cancelled again this year, but on October 28th Headmaster Keach represented the County Association at the annual meeting of the Educational Council in Concord and the superintendent represented the union in the Assembly of Delegates.

On November 12th a regional association meeting was held in Keene which our teachers attended for a one day session.

Our schools responded to the call for the rationing program which took place on October 26th and 27th.

The Peterborough schools have their share of problems each year, and it is our purpose to meet and solve as many of these problems as possible. With loyal and skilful teachers, and interested parents we shall find the pupils ready and willing to respond. Only with such co-operation shall we be able to attain our objective.

# REPORT OF HEADMASTER TO SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS, LEWIS S. RECORD

I submit, herewith, my report as Headmaster of Peterborough High School:

This is the second year that our schools have been materially affected by the war and, if the schools are to be a truly functioning system, it is right that we should assume, as far as possible, the responsibilities connected with the war. It has always been a function of the schools to promote understanding of Democracy and loyalty to democratic ideals, and to offer real practice in the democratic way of life. More than ever parents, teachers, and pupils are faced with the challenge of these ideals, remembering that everyday Americans all over the world, including former members of our own school, are giving their lives so that freedom may not perish from the earth.

The school timetable operates to conform to war time again this year for the period from November first to March first. Some social events have been resumed and interscholastic competition is more nearly comparable to normal years. Our enrollment at the high school level has decreased. However, increases at the junior high school level have made our total enrollment nearly the same as that of last year.

We have experienced a comparatively large change in our teaching staff, which is detrimental to any school, as knowledge of pupils, procedure and the community is gained only by experience in the system.

We participated again this year in the nation-wide program of assistance in harvesting of crops. This year 93 boys and girls worked a total of 364 days, an average of four days for

each pupil engaged in this program.

The sale of War Savings Stamps and War Bonds is conducted again this year under the jurisdiction of the Commercial Department. Publicity and promotion of sales are conducted by the Student Advisory Council. The publicity, promotion

of sales, and patriotism have yielded \$2,360.25 to date.

A Physical Education program was inaugurated last year for the high school boys. This year the program included both boys and girls and was in operation from November first to January third, at which time it was deemed advisable to discontinue the program because of the large number that had to be excused on account of illness. An early resumption of the program is planned, as the nation needs young men and women who are physically fit to take their places in the nation's services and economy. The physical education program necessitates a nine-period day. The extra period is used for co-curricular activities and remedial work when the pupils are not engaged in the program.

We are again participating in the surplus food distribution program. The cost of a half-pint of milk has increased from one to two cents. However, the contributions by the American Guernsey Cattle Club, the local Red Cross Chapter and the Parent-Teachers' Association make it possible to dispense

free milk to those in need of additional nutrition.

The faculty and some members of the student body have participated in two more programs involving the issuance of ration books, War Ration Book No. 2 from February 22 through February 25 and War Ration Book No. 4 from October 24 through October 26.

A federally aided canning project was conducted by the Home Economics Department from July 15 to August 24. This project was in the nature of a community service and made it possible for the canning facilities at the school to be available to those interested. Approximately 1,100 jars were canned.

Home canning processes and methods have been emphasized in all home economics classes. Sugarless Christmas candies and cookies were made and packed in Christmas boxes for members of the armed forces by members of the Home Management Class. A nine-week course on "Child Care" is now incorporated as a part of the regular Junior-Senior Home Economics Course. Junior and Senior girls can now elect this

nine-week course and will receive one-fourth of a unit credit for its completion. It is hoped that a number of pupils will elect this course which is designed to help high school girls

better to understand the correct procedures of child care.

The aeronautics course gives a full credit this year. This class is indebted to Mr. Walter Boyce for the model airplanes that the Industrial Arts classes assembled and hung from the ceiling in the aeronautics class room. Three senior boys are already sworn in as army air cadets and expect to start their training after graduation. Over 117 pupils are now enrolled in the mathematics and aeronautics classes.

There has been a decided effort made this year to improve the use of leisure time during the noon-hour. The Student Advisory Council under the direction of the faculty, has worked out a game program that has provided an outlet for youthful

exuberant energies.

During the past year federally sponsored classes have once again been conducted in the evening for anyone over fourteen years of age. It has, however, become increasingly difficult to secure the needed number of enrollees. By reason of these classes it has been possible with federal funds to secure more small tools and machines for the shop. This equipment is not only used in the evening classes but it is also used to enlarge the scope of the courses for the regular day classes.

The present shop is reasonably well equipped with tools and machines, but is greatly handicapped by lack of necessary space to set up and use the equipment to advantage. Indications are that when the war is over, education along shop and technical lines will be greatly increased. A decided effort should be made to have Peterborough High School ready for

this type of education.

The program used in visual education this year is similar to the one used last year. The films that are being used for the assembly programs have been chosen from those listed by the O. W. I. and the only cost to us has been a small handling charge. This has made it possible to have more of the films available today for use in those courses presenting the fundamentals in aviation and in shop practice. As a result of having these films the courses have been able to present a great deal of material that would have been impossible to offer otherwise.

The Junior High School is very appreciative of the cooperation and interest shown by the Central School staff toward its aims.

All-Junior High School study periods are conducted in a manner designed to give a maximum of the right kind of help to the pupils. When the school is operating on the nine-period day, the ninth period is used for remedial work which has been in the nature of special assistance to those who are in need of help. Other remedial work is incorporated in the regular class

and study periods. The Junior High School boys and girls have each had one afternoon a week of basketball this year. We are indebted to the Congregational Church for the use of

facilities enabling this activity.

The war has added to the responsibilities of the schools. We are endeavoring to meet these new responsibilities, at the same time continue with as much of our regular program as is possible, and prepare for the changes that cessation of hostilities will bring.

#### REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF THE CENTRAL SCHOOL

I submit herewith my first report as principal of the Central School of Peterborough.

The present enrollment of the Central School is 170. This

number includes two tuition pupils from Sharon.

Seventy-two children are transported to and from school by bus. These, together with thirty-seven others who, for various reasons, bring their lunch to school are now eating their lunch in the basement room newly equipped for us by the School Board with the help of Mr. Sullivan and his shop workers. Cod liver oil in the morning and milk at recess are also served here. The teachers as well as the children greatly appreciate this improvement.

The other large basement room has been converted into a gymnasium and play room. As we have no physical education teacher this year each individual teacher takes her class to this room for the physical education work. A course of study and text have been adopted and the children are receiving excellent instruction in this phase of the work from their respective

teachers.

In order to obtain continuity of vocabulary and method a definite reading system extending through the grades is desirable. The Gates System of Reading Instruction has been selected for use in Central School and is being taught throughout the six grades. Already our reading has improved as shown by the results of the standardized achievement tests given in January. The fine phonetic program incorporated in this reading system is expected to raise our spelling standards as well.

We are striving to stimulate outside reading through the use of our Public Library. Ninety-eight children have library cards. During "Book Week" several grades enjoyed a trip to the library. The librarian through her explanation made the visits very much worth while as well as interesting. During this week, Miss Jaquith visited every room in the school. She talked to the children about books and presented each child with an attractive book-mark. I wish to thank the librarian, Miss Cutler, and Miss Jaquith for their help and kind cooperation.

Special attention and drill is being given to our writing this year. Children are beginning the use of ink in grade three instead of grade four as was formerly the habit. Papers from grades five and six have been submitted to "The National Board of Examiners," Bridgeport, Illinois for suggestions for improvement and grading. Fourteen children from grade six and nineteen from grade five have received certificates of acceptance. We hope, when the papers are sent to the board next time, the remaining members of both classes will receive certificates.

The remedial work this year is being done by the principal. Regular classes are scheduled each day and individual help is given in addition to the regular class periods.

The children buy stamps and bonds at school every Thursday morning. It has been our aim to get a large percentage of each class buying stamps. On January 20th both grades five and six succeeded in getting 100% of the members of the class as buyers. During this school year to date (February 10th) the children of the Central School have purchased \$1,271.15 worth of stamps and have converted \$936.25 worth of stamps into bonds. I consider this a splendid record.

Our Patrol, consisting of twelve sixth grade boys organized under a Captain and First and Second Lieutenant is functioning nicely. Besides the regular duties of escorting the lower grade children past the dangerous intersections and manning all crossings near the school at the regular dismissals it has carried on several other projects, i.e. collecting for families burned out of their homes, collecting books for service men, reporting on safety measures as found in A.L.A. Safety Magazine, etc. Mr. Picard reports good work on the part of the Patrol.

Fire drills have been given frequently throughout the fall months. It is now possible to empty the building in 48 seconds, using both doors; in 5 minutes and 10 seconds, all children going over the fire escape. This is a considerable gain in time over last year.

Attendance has been poor this year due to illness. Severe colds with numerous complications have caused much absence. There have been no epidemics of the so-called children's diseases.

We have four new teachers in the Central School this year. It is sincerely hoped that our turnover next year will not be as great. The experience and success of a teacher in her given field adds much to the efficient running of the school as a whole.

In closing I wish to commend the fine professional spirit and the untiring work done by the teachers and to thank them for their loyal cooperation which I have had at all times. It is with sincere appreciation that I thank the superintendent, the school board and the parents for their understanding support throughout this, my first school year in Peterborough.

#### MUSIC DEPARTMENT REPORT

#### February 1944

While the rest of the world is in cultural darkness, Peterborough, through its musical activities, is contributing its share toward making America the musical capital of the world. The schools are playing their part in coping with the responsibility that rests in their hands as the largest musical organization in the community.

The first special occasion at Central School was the appearance of the school choir at the Unitarian Church on November third. At this time a typical classroom scene correlating vocal and instrumental music was presented. This choir, composed of the three upper grades, has as its purpose guiding the members to be more capable of working harmoniously with others, to listen to the effect of the whole and to subordinate his own desires to the total ensemble. Choirs were formed this fall in the second and third grades, giving the members of each group a firmer foundation in anticipation of becoming a part of the choir "upstairs".

By the last of February, a plan originally intended for the fourth grade will branch out to the fifth and sixth grades where it will take root in the form of "visual recognition" for excellence in music. Insignias will be awarded to those individuals who reach a certain degree of perfection in music, on the basis of work in class, ability on some musical instrument, participation in the choir, originality of musical expression, performing in assembly programs, etc.

Thanksgiving found all the grades "gathered together to ask the Lord's blessing" in song and story. A portion of the program was dedicated to the boys "over there". The Christmas program closed the year with music, plays, and carols from many lands.

We are inaugurating an "operetta workshop" in the three upper grades in which we work from time to time on various operettas. In the event that such an undertaking reaches the

state of excellence necessary for a public performance, their talents will be displayed in "Hansel and Gretel." Vocal instructions are now open to all students whose marks in all subjects are B's or better.

The West Peterborough School receives instruction comparable to that in Central, with special care being taken to

help each child develop his "singing voice".

The Junior High School has conducted several quiz programs this year. A contest is in progress for the best lyrics to a war savings song. Plans are in progress for an operetta workshop in the seventh and eighth grades; the first production on sched-

ule is Gilbert and Sullivan's "Pinafore".

At Christmas the High School music classes and the English Department united to present a Christmas program on the theme of "Christmas in Many Lands". The aim was to present music as the universal language. All nations have special Christmas carols which belong to them. A carol sung by a child in France means the same thing to her as a carol does to a child in America.

The Novettes have lost several of their members in last year's graduating class; nevertheless the group is continuing

In May the High School music classes will probably present "An Evening of Gilbert and Sullivan" with scenes from many

of their best-loved operettas.

We are now living in a changing world, and music has a bigger part in the world of today than ever before. It has a great deal to do with building a better world for tomorrow's youth.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

The second year of war has had its effects on the schools as well as all other phases of our national life. Whereas in former times the students of our educational institutions, the boys, mainly, were looking toward halls of higher learning, or jobs in their home communities, in war years the emphasis now is on getting a better background for actual military service, or one of the numerous army or navy training programs for high school graduates. Shop, science, mathematics and aeronautics are the fields of greatest activity in our schools today. The girls are active in numerous extra curricula activities concerned with the war, among them home nursing and junior Red Cross classes but fortunately those of them who desire to continue their education after high school are still able to do so.

Many changes in personnel were made at the beginning of the current school year. One of the men teachers was not a candidate for reelection due to his forthcoming draft call while enlistment in the Waves was the choice of one of our lady teachers. Many others left for positions of more promise, hence your school officials were faced with the necessity of finding ten replacements last spring and summer. Several of those selected had had prior teaching experience while others were from the ranks of the graduating classes in teachers colleges and universities. Such a turnover creates problems and extra supervision on the part of the principals of the two schools, obviously. However, Mr. Keach and Mrs. Teed, with the aid of Mr. Record, have successfully kept their respective programs functioning efficiently and our children are getting the high type of training typical of Peterborough schools.

For various reasons there is a large increase in the number of pupils staying for lunch at the center building. This situation made it advisable to provide space apart from the classrooms for lunch purposes. It was suggested by Mrs. Teed that a large open area in one of the school basements be made comfortable for this purpose. Storm windows, new ceilings and new doors were added to keep the heat in these rooms and Mr. Sullivan's shop classes furnished additional benches and The ninety or more pupils now bringing their lunches can eat them in an orderly, comfortable place presided over by a teacher and some six grade hostesses. Similar repairs were made on other basement space for gymnasium classes. Formerly these classes were held in hallways which were not adequate and whose proximity to class rooms caused distraction in the class rooms. These repairs were somewhat expensive but the school board felt it good business to keep the building in as good shape as possible as long as the building continues to be used.

At the high school also there are large numbers who stay during the noon hour. While no building repairs or improvements were necessary an effort has been made to make the noon hour more pleasant. A program of activities, the purchase of games and a refreshment dispenser have been inaugurated at the suggestion of and under the direction of the Student Advisory Committee. This program is working out satisfactorily.

Someone has said "the post war period is here." Some have completed their military service, others have left their war jobs so to them, at least, this is so. Consideration should be given now to plans for the future development of local education. A new building will be necessary before too many years, to house the primary grades. Whether a building for this purpose only or one with certain facilities that might be made use of by high and primary grades alike should be built, might merit consideration. An article dealing with this question appears in the school warrant and it is the school board's hope that action will be taken directing it to have proper studies made to permit the voters to take definite, intelligent action next year.


