

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg in the county of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget and raise money for the same.
- 1. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the Old Annie Scott road, so-called, meaning and intending the Old Road leaving the new used Arthur Scott road approximately 181 feet from the intersection of the Arthur Scott and Annie Scott roads and continuing to the new used Annie Scott road being approximately 681 feet in length.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the Old Back Lake road so-called near buildings of Rachael Scott, beginning approximately 668 feet on a southerly direction from the center line on Back Lake Brook bridge, and continuing to the new used highway, being approximately 900 feet in length.

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars the road known as the Bacon Road, meaning and intending the road which turns off from the Cheese Factory road so-called and leads to the Old George Bacon farm now owned by Hazel Bunnell.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars the road known as the Old Shatney road, meaning and intending the road which leads off from the Back Lake road near the bridge across Back Lake Brook at the outlet of Back Lake and continues to the site of the old buildings on Shatney place so-called.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to maintain and plow the Cheese Factory Road so-called from the State Highway to the house of James Cushman.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salary of the nurse \$500. and raise money for the same.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to increase the pay of Road Agents from fifty to sixty cents per hour and to increase the pay of all other Town Officers accordingly.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
- 11. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Forest Fire Warden's Report

As the tempo of America's war effort mounts, demands upon its citizens for service become more numerous and exacting. To some comes the call to arms; others to public service and still others to defense industries and organizations. No one can possibly escape if he would. All must bear a proportionate share of the burden and the sacrifice. Strong first line fronts on land, sea and in the air are needed and can be developed and maintained only if there is unity of purpose and common determination behind the home front.

As men are drawn into service the burden of carrying on rests more heavily upon those forced to remain at home. Here, team work becomes increasingly important because of constantly diminishing manpower. A general breakdown in essential local activities and law observance can only be prevented by whole hearted cooperation between citizens and leaders.

There is no field of endeavor where cooperation and compliance with law and regulation are more needed than that of forest fire control. The most effective and economical effort in this field of activity is that of prevention. The old adage "an ounce of prevention" being "worth a pound of cure" was never more aptly applied than to forest fire control.

The forest fire warden is, by law, the designated local leader in forest fire matters. He exercises his prerogatives and discharges his duties as such under the direction of the State Forester. There was never a time when the warden needed each citizen's good will and cooperation more than he does now. With manpower waning, fire prevention, through efficient preparation, care with fire and compliance with necessary regulations become a vital duty of citizenship.

For years efforts have been made to improve the usual bad Spring and Fall fire record. It was not until this year, however, that this problem was, to a great extent solved when permit burning was more rigidly restricted. Forest fire wardens were instructed not to issue permits except when it was raining and during the wet period immediately following rains. This plan worked out so well it has been decided to make it the established policy governing legal burning.

Everyone is well acquainted with the several civilian defense groups. Many of our fellow townsmen are serving in one or other of them. It is only recently, however, that the Office of Civilian Defense, recognizing the threat forest fires are to our timber facilities and resources and the possible disruption of war activities in critical areas, established the "Forest Fire Fighters Service." Its purpose is to provide fire fighters equipped and trained, to strengthen the hand of the local forest fire warden; to acquaint the people in the area with their responsibility in fire prevention and suppression and to provide an opportunity for people in and near forested areas to participate in the war effort. The State Forester is the State Coordinator: the District Fire Chiefs are District Coordinators and the Warden is the Local Coordinator. The Forest Fire Fighters Service personnel will be registered under the direction of the Office of Civilian Defense; it will be trained by the local warden and his assistants, aided by the District Chief. Individual citizens are urged to join this service group by applying to their local forest fire warden. By becoming a part of this organization locally, individuals can contribute their share toward the protection of our forest resources which are so vital to the war job.

During this critical period it is more than ever the part of good and prudent citizenship to remember:

1. That permission to burn in or near woodland or where fire may be communicated to woodland must be secured from the forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

- 2. To be careful when smoking in or near the woods and not to throw lighted cigars, cigarettes or matches from moving vehicles.
- 3. To notify your local warden promptly of any fires you see.
- 4. That fire prevention is the best and cheapest fire insurance.
- 5. To be fire-minded; be careful; be cooperative and thus help your warden prevent forest fires. This is patriotism at work.

Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Pittsburg School District:

FOREWORD

Today, we are engaged in total war. Total war reaches into every phase of a nation's ilfe. Total war is waged not only on the battle front, in the factory and in the home, but also in every schoolroom throughout the nation.

In wartime, good teaching is more important than ever. The special contribution which education can make to national defense and to the prosecution of the war is a matter of serious thought for teachers. Isn't it harder to build than to destroy?

We have our quota to meet. 27,000,000 world citizens of the decade beginning in 1950 are being prepared in our public schools. We need to train these 27 million for living as adequately as we train the 3,000,000 for war industry. We need to teach as efficiently as we gather scrap. We need to inspire and guide with as much contagious enthusiasm as we pass out rationing cards.

The part that the schools can play in educating the coming generation is great. To fail will cost us bitterly in terms of juvenile delinquency now and in the defeat of our high hopes for tomorrow. How futile our every war effort if these citizens of tomorrow are not fitted for their places.

Each teacher has his part to play. Each should strive to rise to the demands of a tremendous present, of a fateful future. The immediate war contribution of an individual teacher, in the class room, may seem slight but the combined effort of 31 million teachers and pupils who constitute the schools of our country is a force of enormous power.

Teachers

Following are the changes in the teaching personnel of the district. Barbara Kunhards, Boston University, filled the Commerce vacancy. She previously taught at Wareham, Massachusetts. Miriam MacNeill, Massachusetts State, was elected to fill the French and English vacancy.

In the elementary field, Alma Chappell was transferred from the Danforth Primary to the Village Intermediate. Leone Philbrook, Plymouth Normal, was selected to fill the Danforth position. Miss Philbrook formerly taught at West Stewartstown.

Buildings and Equipment

You will recall that money was raised by special appropriation for swings, slides and a new roof on the Danforth building. The roof was shingled and the play ground equipment installed during the summer. The other usual minor repairs were made.

The Danforth furnace continues to be unsatisfactory, and should be replaced. A coat of paint on the trimmings would greatly improve the appearance of the Village school.

Enrollment and Attendance

The total district enrollment is 142 as compared with 155, 177, and 168 for the three previous years. There are six from Pittsburg attending school at West Stewartstown and one at Canaan High. We have 10 in our High School from other towns.

The percentages of attendance are much improved over a year ago. The Elementary School average was 96% and the High School 95.83%. There were 152 tardinesses for the year. The Village Intermediate had

the best record with only 7 and High School the poorest with 74.

Health

The present emergency emphasizes the need for a citizenry that is physically fit to serve. A person is said to be physically fit when he is free from defects and disease, practices good mental hygiene, and has the knowledge, skill, strength, and endurance to engage successfully in the activities which life demands of him. Obviously, these elements of fitness have a direct relationship to national defense whether the individual is at the battle front, in industry or at home. Shouldn't we all aim to be physically fit for war and peace?

The statistical report of the School Nurse is given below.

Notes on the Budget

The School Board's total budget for 1943-44 is \$22,837.00 as compared with \$20,359.00 for last year. The estimated income is \$500.00 so that the requested appropriation is \$22,337.00. This is \$1,678.00 more than the total raised for schools a year ago.

War Bonds and Stamps

The pupils and teachers of this Union (Clarksville, Colebrook Town, Colebrook Special, Columbia Pittsburg and Stewartstown Districts) up to December 15, 1942 had invested \$22,422.50 in United States War Bonds and Stamps.

Conclusion

In this crisis the schools should devote themselves directly to the gerat fundamental purposes of education—the preparation of intelligent citizens who understand, believe in, and practice the ideals of democracy; the preservation of national unity; the safeguarding of health; the training for vocational competence; the development of a sense of responsibility for common welfare; and the maintenance of sound, wholesome community life.

I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the members of the school board, parents, teachers, and citizens for the support and cooperation they have given to the schools during the past year.
