DIVISION OF MUNICIPAL ACCOUNTING STATE TAX COMMISSION

Board of Selectmen, Roxbury, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

In accordance with the vote of the town the audit by this Division of the accounts of the Town of Roxbury for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945, has been completed. Exhibits and Schedules as hereafter listed are included as part of the report which is submitted herewith.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Revised Balance Sheet—December 31, 1944-December 31, 1945: (Exhibit I)

Revised Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1944 and December 31, 1945, are presented in Exhibit I. As indicated therein the Net Surplus increased by \$159.74 during the year. This increase in Net Surplus resulted from a net budget surplus of \$113.29, plus other items amounting to \$46.45.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures— Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits II & III)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945, are presented in Exhibits II and III. As indicated by the budget summary a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$76.06, plus an excess of actual over estimated revenue of \$37.23, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$113.29.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1945, is indicated in Schedule A-1.

TAX ACCOUNTS

Tax warrants for the levies of 1945, 1944, 1943, and the tax sale account for the levy of 1944, were examined and audited. Summaries indicating the activity in these accounts during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945, are presented in Schedules B, B-1, B-2 and B-3, respectively.

TOWN CLERK

The accounts and records of the Town Clerk were examined and audited. All funds received by the Town Clerk on account of the issuance of motor vehicle permits and dog licenses were properly accounted for through remittances to the Treasurer.

ROAD AGENT

A summary statement of the Road Agent's account is presented in Schedule D. This indicates the amounts received from the Town by the Road Agent, and the amounts expended according to his records. A balance of \$723.57 remained in the Road Agent's hands at the close of the year.

In our previous audit report we commented upon the present method of advancing funds to the Road Agent in lump sum amounts to take care of future payroll requirements. This practice is very unsatisfactory from an accounting standpoint and is not in accordance with the standard procedure followed by towns.

We again recommend that the Town of Roxbury adopt the standard and prescribed practice pertaining to road agent's accounts which is as follows:

"The road agent makes out the payrolls which are submitted to the Board of Selectmen either weekly or once in two weeks. After approval of the payroll by the Selectmen, a voucher and check is issued for the total amount of the payroll payable to the road agent.

If the road agent has an account in the bank, designated as the "road agent's" account, the check received from the town is deposited therein and checks thereafter issued to the individual employees whose names appear on the payroll. The cancelled checks thus issued, when returned by the bank, should be attached to the payroll as evidence that employees have been paid. Payrolls and cancelled checks should be filed with the Selectmen's voucher issued for the total amount of the payroll.

If the road agent cashes the payroll check which he receives from the town and pays off the employee in cash, signatures of each employee should be obtained on the payroll. When this has been done, the payroll should likewise be turned over to the Selectmen to be filed with the payroll voucher.

It is also recommended that bills for materials, equipment and supplies be approved by the road agent and given to the Selectmen for payment. Such bills should be paid by the Selectmen and Treasurer in the usual manner, i. e. by the issuance of a youcher and checks."

TRUST FUNDS

Savings bank books representing the principal and unexpended income of the trust funds were examined. A summary statement of trust fund principal and income is included in Schedule E.

NEW TOWN HALL FUND

The unexpended balance of the new town hall appropriation amounted to \$800.00 on December 31, 1945. This has accumulated over a period of years by annual appropriation. The entire amount of the fund is in the Treasurer's balance and it is also set up as a liability item in the balance sheet.

We recommend that this fund be withdrawn from the general funds of the town. It should then be deposited by the Treasurer in the savings bank and the account designated as

"Town of Roxbury—New Town Hall Account." Subsequent appropriations could be added to the account in a similar manner.

CONCLUSION:

The accounts and records of all town officials, with exceptions as herein noted, were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits and Schedules is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Roxbury for their assistance during the course of the audit.

- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the district will establish a fund for improved school facilities and raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars for this fund.

- 10. To see if the district will vote to place the money raised last year for toilets into the above fund.
- 11. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Roxbury:

I herein submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

One full year has passed since the end of combat in World War II. The end of the war brought no relief to the deficiencies in the American public school system. The situation has become steadily more critical.

An appraisal of American schools reveals many inadequacies in personnel, facilities and services that are necessary to meet the needs of children and the welfare of the nation.

Teachers leaving the profession since 1939 have formed the greatest vocational exodus in history. In relation to their numbers the loss to the profession has been more acute in the elementary schools and the rural areas have suffered most. If the fully qualified teachers received more pay than laborers the public schools would be staffed more adequately throughout the entire country.

Adequate health facilities and programs are non-existent in a very large proportion of rural schools. Sound health is the most valuable individual and national asset. Every child should be given complete physical examinations periodically followed by corrective measures.

More opportunities should be offered in the schools to practice various duties of citizenship. The financial tribute exacted by crime is great. Less than two percent of the population may be classed as criminal. The financial losses caused by this small percent amounts to more than five times the sum spent annually for public education in the interest of all children.

The Roxbury school district has been fortunate in many ways during this period of shortages. First, in retaining the

services of a fully qualified teacher, secondly; in the maintenance of satisfactory facilities and equipment including up to date textbooks and abundant scholars supplies.

The employment of a school nurse is another step in the right direction. The further provision for modern plumbing, playground equipment and organized recreation would all contribute to better health. Improvements involving installation and construction are limited at the present time due to shortages and high prices.

The usual standard tests have been administered in the school. The results indicate satisfactory achievement.



HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES—IT PAYS!

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. The importance and value of the work of the forest fire warden and his deputies is, perhaps, best appreciated during hazardous periods when fire danger is greatest. The public, however, looks to him at all times for speedy and economical suppression of going fires

To property fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matter of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record shows that an average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

Remember these rules:

- 1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
- 2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.
- 3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.
- Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to do so.
- 5. HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES—his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!
