Town Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Seabrook qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town, on Tuesday the twelfth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To elect a Town Clerk, one Selectman and Assessor for a term of three years, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, three Constables, Highway Agent, three Overseers of the Poor, a Chief of Police and all other town officials for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the expense of the general government, for the protection of persons and property, for health, and sanitation, for highways and bridges, for the support of the town poor and all other necessary expenditures for the year ensuing.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on anticipation of taxes, and to renew and refund town notes.
- Article 4. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.
- Article 6. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to defray the expense for collecting garbage at Seabrook Beach, the same to be left in the hands of the Selectmen.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$180.53, the state to contribute \$722.15 for Town Road Aid.

Article 8. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 10. Upon petition of Abram J. Miller and ten other legal voters. To see what action the town will take regarding the compensation of the Town Clerk, also on any other matter for the welfare of the town brought up by the Budget Committee and the financing of the same.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to deed a parcel of land now owned by the town for a community building, recreation park and garden plots, to the Ace High Youth Extension Club of Seabrook.

Article 12. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$84.00.

Article 13. To see what action the town will take in regard to the protection of our clams and clam industry, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

Article 14. To transact all other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of an Examination and Audit of the Accounts of the Town of Seabrook

October 23, 1939

Board of Selectmen, Seabrook, New Hampshire,

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the petition received from your town, as authorized by vote taken at the adjourned town meeting, an audit of the town's accounts has been made by this division and a report of such audit is submitted herewith. Schedules as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

FINANCES

Revised Balance Sheet: The Town of Seabrook, as shown by the corrected Balance Sheet (Schedule A) ended its last fiscal year, January 31, 1939, with a net Debt of \$13,211.49. This represented the difference between Total Liabilities of \$28,192.71 and Total Assets of \$14,981.22. Included in the Liabilities, however, were outstanding bonds amounting to \$16,000.00. Deducting the amount of the bonds (the annual maturities of which are met by tax assessment) from the Total Liabilities leaves a balance of \$12,192.71 in Current Liabilities. Inasmuch as the Assets amounted to \$14,981.22, the difference of \$2,788.51 represented a Current Surplus.

The Balance Sheet in the Town Report of January 31, 1939, indicated Assets of \$27,233.18. These included property deeded to the town and uncollected poll taxes over a long period of years. In municipal accounting, asset items which may properly be included in the balance sheet are "Cash" or any accounts which may be converted into cash within a reasonably short time. Such items consist of

"Accounts Receivable," "Unredeemed Taxes" and "Uncollected Taxes." In making up the revised balance sheet, as of January 31, 1939, the Assets, as shown in the Town Report, were reduced by eliminating the "deeded property" item and the "uncollected poll taxes" for 1936 and years previous to that.

The property which the town has acquired by tax deeds has a definite value and will be taken up separately later in this report. It should be included, however, in the "Schedule of Town Property" rather than in the "Balance Sheet." When such property is resold to the original owners or other purchasers the proceeds from such sales will increase the "assets" from time to time.

It is our opinion that uncollected poll taxes for the years prior to 1937 have little or no value and therefore should not be included in the "assets."

The increase in total liabilities in the corrected report by approximately \$2,000.00 over the amount shown in the town report was due to the inclusion of certain "accounts payable" and the "balance of dog licenses due the school district," which had originally been omitted.

We believe that the revised balance sheet, as presented in Schedule A, represents a true statement of the financial condition of the town of Seabrook on January 31, 1939, and that balance sheets of future years should be made on a similar basis.

Statement of Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes: Schedule B shows the outstanding notes and bonds, assessed valuation, taxes assessed, town and average state tax rates for the years ending January 31, 1930, to January 31, 1939, inclusive, and valuation and tax figures for the current year. Bonded debt on January 31, 1939, amounted to \$16,000.00 as compared to notes and bonds outstanding on January 31, 1930, of \$14,100.00 and on January 31, 1936, of \$20,100.00. It is noted that there have been no outstanding temporary loans in anticipation of taxes since January 31, 1936.

The assessed valuation of the town in 1939 was \$981,-007.00, which is approximately \$100,000.00 less than in 1930. The tax rate increased from \$3.39 in 1930, to \$3.60 in 1939. During the same period the average tax rate for the state increased from \$2.84 to \$3.45.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures: Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures for the years 1936, 1937 and 1938, are presented in Schedules C, D and E.

Property Owned by Town Acquired Through Tax Deeds: (Schedule F) At the present time the town holds about seventy pieces of property which it has acquired through tax collectors' deeds. The total valuation of this property, as shown by the last assessment records, is a little over \$23,000.00. The accumulated taxes, interest and costs on this property amount to approximately \$15,000.00.

Some of this property is marsh land which has little actual value at the present time and which the town will probably be unable to dispose of. It is noted, however, that there are six pieces of property having an assessed valuation of \$1,000.00 or more, the total valuation of which amounts to \$8,400.00. There are also ten pieces of property, having an assessed valuation of between \$500 and \$1,000.00, the total valuation of which amounts to \$7,-100.00. It is recommended that the town take action at once in order to bring back upon the tax rolls as much as possible of this property which at the present time is producing no revenue to the town.

In accordance with the vote taken at the adjourned annual meeting last April the former owners should be given notice by registered letter that they have thirty days in which to re-purchase their property. During this period it will be necessary for them to make arrangements with the Board of Selectmen to re-acquire their property either through direct purchase or on the basis of a rental-purchase plan. Failure on the part of the former owners to make such arrangements will result in their property being sold at public auction after the expiration of the thirty day period.

A card form is being prepared on which the Selectmen may record each piece of property deeded to the town. Spaces will be provided so that all expenses incident to the sale of the property, including taxes, interest and costs, may be recorded. On the reverse side of the card space is provided for data relating to the re-sale or rental of the property. A card record of this type will make available at all times information as to the total cost to the town of deeded property and the income which has been received from such property either through re-sale or rental.

Unredeemed Taxes: (Schedule G) The law provides that the tax collector, after two years from the tax sale, shall execute to the purchaser a deed of the land so sold and not redeemed. If the collector making the sale has been removed from office the tax collector then in office gives the deed. Deeds are now due on account of unredeemed taxes for the tax levies of 1934, 1935 and 1936. The owners should be notified that the town intends to take a deed to their property if redemption is not made within a reasonable time. A thirty day notice is suggested.

A substantial amount of revenue should be obtained by the town, before the end of the current fiscal year, on account of the sale of property acquired by tax deeds and through redemptions from tax sales.

TAX COLLECTOR

The Summaries of the Collector's Tax Sale Accounts for the tax levies of 1934, 1935, 1936, 1937 and 1938, are presented in Schedules H, I, J, K and L. The complete list of unredeemed taxes from sales on account of these levies, as compiled on the date of audit, is included in Schedule G.

The Collector's Warrants for the years 1937, 1938 and 1939 were balanced as indicated in Schedules M, N and O.

The failure to collect poll taxes in Seabrook is a serious problem and one which should receive more consideration than it has in the past.

While it has been previously recommended in this

report that uncollected poll taxes for 1936 and previous years be eliminated from the assets of the town, it is at the same time recommended that definite measures be taken at once to enforce the collection of poll taxes. The collection of less than 70% of the entire poll tax warrant seriously disrupts the financial planning of the town.

The law provides sufficient remedy for the collection of poll taxes. Under the provisions of Chapter 120, of the laws of 1939, "Any applicant for permit to register a motor vehicle, for a license to operate a motor vehicle or for a license to hunt or fish shall, before he receives such permit or license, furnish to the issuing officer the receipt of the tax collector of the town where he resides showing that he has paid his poll tax in said town for the tax year preceding the date of such application, or make oath that he has paid said tax or that he has been excused from such payment."

Chapter 56, of the laws of 1939, provides that, "The husband of any woman against whom a poll tax has been assessed shall be liable for the payment thereof as if the tax lawfully had been assessed against him, so long as they are living together as man and wife."

In cases where the foregoing sections of the law are not applicable the Collecter may enforce the provisions of Section 2, Chapter 66, of the New Hampshire Public Laws:

"The Collector may distrain the goods and chattels of such person, and for want of goods and chattels whereon to make distress may take his body and commit him to the county jail or house of correction, upon his neglect or refusal to pay the tax assessed upon him."

The records of Tax Collector Carter were very complete and have been kept so that they present a proper accounting of all transactions.

SELECTMEN'S AND TOWN TREASURER'S ACCOUNTS

Vouchers drawn by the Selectmen during the fiscal year ended January 31, 1939, and the current fiscal year

to September 27th, were examined as were also the supporting invoices and road agents' payrolls. The cancelled checks of the Treasurer were compared with the vouchers and found to be in agreement as to name and amount. The receipts of the Treasurer were checked by source in so far as it was possible to do so. Totals of receipts and expenditures were verified. The Treasurer's Cash Book balance as of September 27, 1939, amounted to \$2,942.40. The reconciled bank balance, plus cash on hand, as of like date was \$2,951.20, indicating an excess over Cash Book balance of \$8.80.

PUBLIC WELFARE

The method in which relief is being administered in the town of Seabrook is in my opinion unbusinesslike, cumbersome and not productive of the best results, inasmuch as the responsibility for such administration is not centered in one official but rather left in the hands of three overseers. No monthly or other periodic reports, showing in detail relief orders issued, are submitted by the overseers to the selectmen. This creates a situation whereby the selectmen do not know at any time the amount of relief orders which are outstanding against the appropriation.

It is my recommendation that the town elect or authorize the selectmen to appoint one overseer of the poor who shall be solely responsible for the administration of relief. In this connection it has been my experience that it is preferable to have the appointment of an overseer made by the board of selectmen rather than to have this an elective office.

It is furthermore recommended that the overseer furnish a monthly statement to the board of selectmen showing in detail all relief orders issued during the month as this is the only way in which the selectmen may have accurate information as to what has been charged against the appropriation.

TOWN CLERK

The Town Clerk's Motor Vehicle and Dog License Accounts were audited and balanced as shown by Schedule Q. Monthly remittances to the Treasurer, as required by law, should be made by the Town Clerk.

SCHOOL DISTRICT

Each payment made by the town to the school district from the year 1925 to the present time was compared with the corresponding receipt item in the school district treasurer's cash book. A detailed account of all transactions between the town and school district during this period, with totals for both the town and school district fiscal years, will be found in Schedule R.

The School District Treasurer's cash book record of funds received and disbursed was audited. Cancelled checks of the Treasurer were compared with cash book entries and totals of receipts and disbursements verified. The Treasurer's cash book balance on September 30, 1939, was \$997.12. The reconciled bank balance on this date amounted to \$998.10, indicating an excess of bank balance over cash book balance of ninety-eight cents (\$0.98). (Schedule S).

SUMMARY

In going over the Balance Sheets of the Town for the last ten years, we find that the Net Debt (ND) or Surplus (S) was indicated as follows:

Inasmuch as there was no material increase or decrease in the amount of outstanding notes or bonds during this period there should not have been so great a change in the "Net Debt" from year to year. The fact that the asset items of "uncollected taxes" and "unredeemed taxes" were not reported each year on a uniform basis accounts for this inconsistency. It is believed that confusion which has been caused by this situation will no longer exist if the recommendations heretofore made in this report, relative to the preparation of balance sheets, are carried out.

The two major problems which face the town at the present time are the liquidation of property acquired by tax deeds and the collection of poll taxes. Both of these subjects have previously been discussed.

The funded debt as of January 31, 1939, amounted to \$16,000.00. The legal debt limit of the town (3% of the valuation) is just over \$29,000.00.

No irregularities were discovered in any accounts and the accounting procedures in most instances conformed to those prescribed by this division.
