## Commissioners' Report.

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TO THE CITIZENS OF SULLIVAN COUNTY:—

We herewith submit a report of the financial condition and business affairs of the county, which are under the supervision of the County Commissioners, together with the reports of the respective County Officers for the year ending Dec. 31, 1893.

### FINANCIAL CONDITION OF THE COUNTY.

The county is now out of debt, the last note having been paid in October. The amount of money voted by the County Convention to be raised in 1894 is \$4000 less than in 1893, and is for the following purposes.

There was in the hands of the Treasurer Jan. 1, 1894, \$8,628.26, with two orders outstanding amounting to \$410, leaving \$8,218.26, to pay expenses until Sept. 1, when the tax for 1894 becomes due.

### COUNTY FARM AND ALMS HOUSE.

This institution has remained in charge of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Willard, as Superintendent and Matron, who have been untiring in their labors for the comfort of the inmates, endeavoring to provide

for them all their condition demanded, having at the same time due regard to your interest as tax payers. We wish to thank them and their assistants for their interest in and kindness shown to those under their charge.

We have had the several houses painted outside and in. The large barn has also been painted and new blinds put upon the Alms House and Asylum. This has greatly improved the looks of the buildings and added to the comfort of the inmates. The expense was \$587.88, besides the labor of some of the inmates, who assisted in painting.

The water supply has been insufficient for a long time, it having been necessary for a great deal of the time to draw water in barrels from a brook for domestic purposes. We have the past summer put in a two-inch galvanized iron pipe from the reservoir to the house, with a stand pipe to the attic. Hose has been attached to this upon each floor, and is to be kept in the racks provided for immediate use in case of fire. To increase the supply of water we connected a spring that is about 90 rods above the reservoir, with the reservoir, using a three-fourth-inch lead pipe. The reservoir has been full ever since this was done, and we think there is now plenty of water for all purposes. The labor of digging the ditch, about 180 rods in all, has been done entirely by the inmates and help that is regularly employed on the farm. The whole expense of this improvement, including 450 feet of hose, with couplings, nozzles and racks, was \$557.10.

The sewers were found to be clogged up and the water setting back under the house, endangering the health of the inmates. We have had the sewers taken up and re-laid, and they are now in good order. We also had an iron ventilating pipe connected and run up through the roof of the house. This was done at an expense of \$122.16.

The buildings on the farm are now sufficient for the requirements of the farm, with the exception of the horse barn. At some time before long it would be well to build a new one.

## Chaplain's Report.

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TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF SULLIVAN COUNTY :

The usual regular religious services have been held at the County Farm during the year 1893. The Sunday school, organized in May, 1891, meets every Sunday. Mrs. Wm. H. Whitmore now has charge, as Mrs. Cora Whipple Bailey was married and left town about October. Much credit is due to these ladies for their interest in the enterprise. The different services seem to be a source of pleasure, and we hope of lasting profit to all who attend. The chaplain has been loaning books, laid aside by the North Charlestown Sunday school, in which quite a number at the Farm have been much interested. The various Sunday schools in the county are invited to contribute their rejected library books, for the purpose of making up a library for the farm. Extra picture papers, even though somewhat out of date, are also acceptable.

The W. C. T. U. ladies of Claremont and Newport visited the Farm last June, for flower mission work, bringing various gifts for the pleasure and comfort of the family. The Christmas visit was postponed for a number of reasons, but gifts contributed were sent. The superintendent and his helpers, as also the commissioners co-operate heartily with the chaplain and others in all efforts to better the condition of those under their care.

While much has been done during the past year by way of improvements of the buildings for the outer or physical conditions, something has also been accomplished for the inner or spiritual concerns of those who live at the Farm. By instruction of the members of the County Convention the commissioners authorized the chaplain to purchase an excellent chapel organ of the Estey Co., Brattleboro, last June. The organ has given good satisfaction, and has been a great help in all services, as well as a source of pleasure at other times. Mrs. Emma Wetherbee of Newport, who now lives at the Farm, is organist, and has rendered excellent service in that line.

Only two deaths have occurred for the year, which is a remarkable record. Mr. M. M. Kendall of Washington, N. H., died June 25, and Mrs. Emily Hayward, Oct. 9. Both were buried, after the usual funeral services, in the county cemetery. The patience and care of the matron and her assistants for those under their charge, especially for the sick and feeble, are certainly worthy of much commendation.
