TOWN WARRANT

Cheshire, ss.:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Walpole qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, 1941, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Auditors, Town Treasurer, Road Agent, Collectors of Taxes, Trustees of Public Funds, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Fence Viewers, and all other necessary officers.

Art. 2. To raise money for the support of the town poor, for town library, for cemeteries, to build and repair highways and bridges, and for such other current expenses as may accrue.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to raise money on notes of the town for current expenses, in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$884.88 for Class V roads, the State to contribute \$3,539.52.

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Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid, and raise and appropriate \$2,046.75, the State to contribute a like amount.

Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to improve and gravel Tiffany Hill, so-called, on the Wentworth road, beginning at Harrie Tiffany's and continuing north.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to improve and gravel the road beginning at the Florence Knight farm, continuing north to meet the Maple Grove road at Fletcher's corner.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to improve and gravel the Kingsbury road, beginning where improvement stopped two years ago and continuing north toward the Hill road.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$700 to improve and gravel the March Hill road, beginning where improvement stopped last year and continuing past George Edwards' toward the Alstead line.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500 for straightening and reconditioning the dangerous curves on the Sand Hill road, so-called, located between Route 101 and the Truscott Fuller place.

Art. 12. To see what action the town will take in regard to rebuilding and draining Depot Hill, and raise money therefor.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500 for equipment and materials to carry on W. P. A. project. Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000 for the support of the Community Hospital of Walpole, Inc., a community institution.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$360 (1/100 of one percent of the assessed valuation) to the Monadnock District Association for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising calling attention to the natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the 37 other towns of the Monadnock District.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to administer and dispose of and deed any real estate acquired by the town by tax collectors' deeds.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to accept such funds as have been left it during the past year.

Art. 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before it.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Walpole:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

The following teachers concluded varying periods of faithful work in the service of the Walpole schools: Miss Grace Graves—19 years, Miss Elizabeth Sawyer—6 years, Mr. Kenneth Bishop—3 years, and Miss Ruth Paulson—2 years. Miss Muriel Clark was transferred from Number 14 school to fill the vacancy in grades 2-3 at the village. Miss Elizabeth Baird, a graduate of the four year curriculum of Keene Teachers college, was employed to teach at Number 14 school. Miss Eva Johnson was elected as teacher of grades 3 and 4 at Walpole village. Miss Johnson is a graduate of Keene Teachers college and had seven years of elementary teaching experience before coming to Walpole.

In the Walpole High school, Miss Dorothy Plaisted was assigned to teach the courses in senior high school English. Miss Laura Russell, Keene Teachers college 1940, was elected as teacher of Latin, junior high school English, and Social Science. Mr. Roger Arnold was elected to succeed Mr. Kenneth Bishop, who resigned after the opening of school this year. Mr. Arnold, Tufts, 1939, is teaching mathematics and science and will direct the boys' physical activity program.

I have each year devoted a portion of my report to a discussion of some of the aims of our general supervisory program. Previous reports have covered the phases of the program applying directly to the content and improvement of instruction. Since effective instruction is influenced also by a continuous program designed to strengthen the organization of our schools, I believe that a brief outline indicating the nature of some of this activity should be of general interest. Instruction sheets to all teachers in the supervisory union have repeatedly emphasized the importance of maintaining a uniform standard practice in relation to the following details of school management:

1. Permanent records of personal data, attendance, and scholarships.

2. Report cards, failures, and make up work.

3. Organization and supervision of all playground activities.

4. Organization and supervision of school programs, socials, entertainments, and athletic contests.

5. Exhibits of school work.

6. Conduct of school lunch program.

7. Fire drills and safety control measures.

8. Details of class and room management.

9. Care, preservation, and use of instructional equipment and reference materials.

10. Development of school libraries and use of circulation libraries.

The report card usually results in more misunderstanding and conflicts of opinion than any other item of school management. It is not surprising that this should be so since acceptable practices for reporting to parents are many and varied. However, regardless of the form used, I believe that pupil scholastic reports have meaning and value only when they are made by the teacher and interpreted by the parent according to some definite policy which is understood and accepted by both. It has been my experience in talking with parents to find that they usually desire a fair, truthful, and frank estimate of the actual quality of the work of the pupil as measured by the ability of the child and the standard for the grade. I believe also that our teachers generally have recognized their responsibility in this regard and try to mark pupils truthfully and fairly according to their best judgment. Teachers have been urged to consider the report card as a transcript of the pupil's school record and to report deficiencies consistently as they occur.

Although repeated failures may indicate that a pupil would profit by repeating the grade, they are more generally caused by inattention, failure to complete assignments, or careless work. Teachers and parents should make an honest attempt to ascertain the cause of pupil failure and cooperate in some effective measures to eliminate them when possible.

In most of our schools the teachers have been very conscientious in the performance of their duties in supervising playground activity during the noon and recess periods. The informal situation on the playground affords an opportunity for wholesome pupil-teacher relations and for practical instruction in proper attitudes and group conduct.

Last year many of the schools in the supervisory union conducted school programs and exhibits designed to demonstrate school work and pupil performance. Programs of this nature are very much worthwhile. They tend to promote interest and cooperation and are worthy of the encouragement and support of the community served by each school.

This year further improvement was made in the equipment and arrangement of the home economic rooms thus bringing this department up to date for all courses offered. New kitchen cabinets and tables have been arranged to form unit kitchens with each of the four types of ranges. From four to six girls may work in each of these units. A rotation of this plan provides an opportunity for training and experience with the various types of ranges common in the community. The Granite State Electric Co., has provided a much needed electric refrigerator.

Two deliveries of surplus food commodities were made to the schools during the year. Apples, oranges, raisins, and canned peaches were used to supplement lunches brought from home. It is expected that this program will be continued. One shipment of foods has been received this year at most of the schools.

A comparison of the January enrollments indicates enrollment increases during the last fifteen years as follows:

Walpole High School—27, Walpole Junior High—28, Walpole Elementary (grades 1-6)—24; Total increases at Walpole Village schools—79. The enrollment at Number 14 school and Drewsville have also increased considerably during this fifteenyear period.

Plans have been formulated for continuing the course in vocational agriculture which is offered to young men interested in farming as a vocation. This course, which has been conducted for two years, has enrolled a group of about fifteen adults who meet on one evening each week for fifteen weeks. The course includes lectures, discussions, and farm shop work and is planned to meet the practical interests of a majority of the group.

SCHOOL ACTIVITIES AND MUSIC

Our school activities have each year been more fully correlated and placed more definitely under the guidance and direction of members of the teaching staff. Athletics, dramatics, the social life, and the annual school publication are all considered a vital part of the school program. Our teachers cheerfully accept this extra responsibility and consider it an opportunity to teach, in a very practical manner, lessons of good sportsmanship, honesty, fair play and cooperation.

The music program in our schools aims to develop a lasting love for music-both vocal and instrumental. Classes in vocal music are available to all pupils in the elementary and high Instrumental classes have been organized for all schools. pupils interested in learning to play the violin, wind and reed instruments. The orchestra at Walpole has twenty-three players this year. This organization has grown to be one of our outstanding activity groups. Four of the orchestra members were chosen to play in the All State School Symphony Or-The All State Festival is to be held this year at chestra. Manchester. Each pupil desiring to play in the Symphony Orchestra will be given an audition at Keene before being accepted. A few of our players are now preparing for this audition. The Operetta "Sailor Maids" was presented by the Walpole High School. The North Walpole High School presented "It Happened in Holland." On Music Night at North Walpole the children from the kindergarten thru the seventh grade presented two operettas; "Peter Rabbit" and "Molly Be Jolly." A new radio-victrola was purchased with the proceeds of this program.

Music afternoons were also held at Number 14 and Drewsville. At Drewsville a Christmas Operetta, "A Fairy Conspirator" was presented instead of the usual songs and pieces. All of the children were included in this colorful one act operetta.

The Christmas program by the Walpole primary pupils (grades 1-4) consisted of a Christmas operetta, a song and dance by a first grade boy, and Christmas songs of other lands. The program was followed by the arrival of Santa and distribution of gifts and candy from the tree. The fifth-sixth grade program included a Nativity play, "The Shepherd Boy" with songs and dances depicting life in other lands and a play of knighthood and chivalry entitled, "The Quest."

All of these school programs showed development of cooperation between pupils and teachers. The audiences must in all cases have been impressed with the atmosphere of social responsibility, self-confidence, and interest. Attitudes of industry, attentiveness, initiation, obedience, and self control are encouraged by such dramatizations. The music and dancing are interesting ways of increasing the child's sense of rhythm, musical knowledge, and physical coordination.

HEALTH

Health inspection in Walpole showed the following defects:

20 pupils were recommended to have throat and nose examination by a physician.

3 pupils had tonsil and adenoid operations at clinics.

7 pupils were treated privately for tonsils and adenoids.

21 pupils had special examinations and defects corrected.

10 pupils were vaccinated during the year.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

The following improvements and repairs were made at the various schools during the year:

Walpole Village School:

A new boiler was installed in the high school building. Adjustments were made in the ventilation system. Repairs were made on the eave spouts and gutters. Ten new side arm chairs were purchased to take care of the increased high school enrollment. The walls and ceiling in grade 5-6 room were painted. The walls in the primary room were papered, the woodwork was painted, and the ceiling whitened. The walls and ceiling in the sewing room were painted. A screen door, window screens, and some new equipment were provided for the home economics room.

The side walls, woodwork, desks, and hallway in the primary (grades 2-3) building were varnished. This work as well as the varnishing of all the desks throughout the school, was done by the janitor. The wooden fence on the school property line was painted.

Hooper Building:

The exterior of the Hooper school building was painted during the summer.

North Walpole:

The plaster walls in the halls of the Keep building were painted. The woodwork in the halls was varnished. Repairs were made on the boiler.

In the Kilburn building the walls and ceiling in Room 10 were painted. The woodwork in Rooms 5 and 6 was painted. The walls and ceiling in the upper hallway were painted. The roof was tarred in several places where leaks were located.

A new 35 ft. steel flag pole was made and set in a concrete foundation.

Number 14 School:

Several new window screens were built. A new telechron electric clock was provided. The blackboards were painted. Repairs were made on the playground equipment. 'The exterior of the building was painted. When the summer repairs were being made it was discovered that the sills supporting the building had rotted and were very unsound on all sides of the building. These were replaced with new sills which are now on a solid brick foundation set on a concrete base. Windows have been provided to ventilate the dead air space under the building.

Drewsville:

A new telechron electric clock was provided. The blackboards were painted. A portion of land was purchased from Mrs. Heselton which has extended the width and depth of the school property. This provides for very satisfactory playground areas in the rear and side of the lot. The lot is now fenced on three sides with heavy mesh wire supported on stout wood posts.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Charles D. Dalzell, Superintendent of Schools. Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my annual report as Headmaster of Walpole High School.

REGISTRATION

The total high school enrollment remains the same as last year, the highest total recorded. The present enrollment is greater by four as only six pupils have withdrawn. Only two withdrawals were due to lack of interest in continuing their education, two found desirable employment and two were due to change of residence. Of interest is the fact that only two pupils have withdrawn from grade nine where the greatest drop usually occurs.

In the junior high, enrollment has increased, with the present enrollment being greater than the total of any previous year. Our tardiness record shows a combined total of 31 cases compared to 9 last year. I do not feel that is a criticism of the pupils as the majority of the cases were due to late busses over which the pupils have no control.

The record of attendance in the high school is above the state average. In the junior high the record is one percent below last year's record due mainly to the epidemic which has been so prevalent. We are indeed fortunate to have maintained this high standing when many nearby schools were closed because of illness. No time has been lost to date.

SCHOLARSHIP

The annual inspection by the agent of the State Board of Education was recently completed. His report contained very favorable comment from the standpoint of work observed in the classroom and the general attitude of the pupils.

In practically all classes the unit method of presenting class work is being used. By this method we attempt to vary our assignments so that all levels of ability may make the best of their opportunity and maintain scholarship and interest. That we have succeeded in part at least is evidenced by the fact that our percent of failures is lower than the average for the state.

Remedial work in the fundamentals is made available to many pupils.

Graduates of Walpole High now in post-secondary schools continue to maintain satisfactory standards.

We are endeavoring to maintain our school as a democracy, where pupils learn to mingle and cooperate with each other; where common problems are discussed and where each one is given the opportunity to do his part in promoting the welfare of all.

ORGANIZATION

Plans have been continued whereby all pupils of the school have an opportunity in many phases of extra-curricula activities. The very fine cooperation of teachers and pupils has, in part, overcome the handicap encountered due to lack of adequate facilities.

Our athletic program has continued to interest the great majority of our pupils. It certainly has an important place in the school and we feel that here in Walpole it is not overemphasized. Emphasis is placed on participation rather than a chosen few. In girls athletics fall tournaments were held in tenniquoi, badminton, horseshoes, softball and volleyball. Basketball continues to be the center of activities in the winter program. Games to date have been well played and interest is running high as to the probable team standings. It would be impossible to interest this large group were we to return to interscholastic competition.

Last spring we held our first Junior High play day. All seventh and eighth grade pupils in the Westmoreland schools were invited to join our group. An afternoon of wholesome play and the chance to meet new friends resulted.

In the fall a very successful intramural football program was carried on for the Senior High boys. Three teams, each captained by a senior boy, comprised the league. This provided highly competitive and enjoyable activity for a large group. In boys basketball we have regular schedules for the Senior High Varsity, Junior Varsity and Junior High. Good basketball has been exhibited, especially by the last two mentioned. The Varsity has shown improvement in fundamentals and team play.

The school safety patrol, instituted last year, has continued its efficient guidance of our pupils across the main lines of traffic. Again it is my pleasure to pay tribute to the boys and girls who, in fair weather and foul, have performed so well in line of duty. These young people have proven they are dependable and can assume responsibility, willingly and in an efficient manner. The thespian program has centered around the interpretation of reading and voice control. Approximately forty members have availed themselves of the opportunity to experiment with their voices over a broadcasting set. Two radio plays have been prepared and will be presented later in the year over our nearby radio station. In order to secure voice control, work on monologues has been planned. Three one act plays will be presented during March.

The music program has offered an opportunity for all interested pupils in both the choral and instrumental fields. The operetta presented last spring was an outstanding success. Our orchestra now numbering twenty-four pupils has made several successful public appearances. The band, with very little opportunity for practice. is making commendable progress.

Interest in our school socials. held each month, has increased to a point where the recreation room at the Hooper School is hardly adequate. Each class conducts at least one free social. The Blue and White Club has been active in these affairs planning the fall picnic at Vilas Pool, the freshman reception and the annual Christmas party. Socials are also held for the Junior High.

The Warbler Staff continued to maintain high literary standards in both the Commencement number and the midwinter issue just published.

As in the past, school assemblies, held on Friday of each week, have been under the joint direction of the several teachers and the Blue and White Club. Programs embodying the pupils are teacher supervised while the Blue and White Club assumes the responsibility of obtaining outside speakers.

HOME ECONOMICS

This year 26 girls are enrolled in the Home Economics curriculum.

The Junior and Senior girls in their course. The Family and Its Members are studying Home Membership. Community Relationship, First Aid, Home Nursing and Child Care. An opportunity to practice material learned is given in their Home Project work which consists of sixty hours of work done at home on phases of the work.

The Freshman and Sophomore girls have a course in Foods and Nutrition this year. They enjoy and greatly appreciate the new equipment that has been added to the department.

Hot lunches are being served this winter to a group averaging forty boys and girls. They are enjoying and benefiting from this hot. nutritious food with their lunch. The hot lunch is available to all pupils at a cost of three cents a day. These lunches are served by members of the Foods class.

'The Freshmen and Sophomore girls are required to do 120 hours of Home Project work during the school year. The hours are divided among three or four projects relating to the units studied. Two home visits a year are made to each of the homes of the girls in this class to check and discuss the work relating to these projects.

This fall the Home Economics girls joined with the Agricultural classes in sponsoring the Annual School Fair.

During the past year, the Home Economics club. in addition to its regular program, has joined the State Club. Last spring a group of five girls represented our club at the Annual State Home Economics Club meeting in Concord.

AGRICULTURE

The total enrollment of boys in Agriculture is twenty-six; eight in the Junior-Senior class and eighteen in the Freshman-Sophomore class.

Last spring there were four local boys who each won 50 chicks as their reward for superior poultry management in a statewide contest. These chicks were awarded by the Hubbard Farms. Hubbard Farms also awarded 175 chicks to three outstanding boys in a local contest as shown by their interest and ability in raising poultry.

The spray program in the Hooper orchard and the community, and the growing of vegetables, plants and flowers were carried on as in past years by the local chapter of the Future Farmers of America. A new activity, that of selling project grown potatoes in bags with the Future Farmer name was carried out in a small way this fall.

Our annual School Fair was held October 3 in the Town Hall. Exhibits of school work, home economics and agriculture were displayed. All exhibits were secured and arranged by boys and girls in the capacity of superintendents of their various departments. Two plays were presented in the evening by the Junior and Senior High.

Classwork during the year has been based upon the four year plan of work and includes all of the farming enterprises carried on by the nearby farms. The Hooper orchard offers the opportunity of practical experience in spraying, pruning, harvesting and other operations. 3,000 pine and spruce seedlings were planted in the Hooper pasture. Trips to Eastern States Exposition. Interscholastic Judging at Durham, Egg and Chick show at Manchester. Judging trip and Future Farmer Convention at Contoocook. Radio Broadcasting at Springfield. Vt., and the local field trips to farms all helped to stimulate interest and bring about a wider picture and more complete knowledge of New England Agriculture.

Pine lumber has been salvaged from the hurricane hit Hooper woodlot and used in the school shops, making a considerable saving in the cost of lumber. During the period devoted to the Agricultural shop, a wood turning lathe was built. It has been mounted in the manual training room where eighth grade boys have been gaining experience through the making of rolling pins, handles and other turned objects.

I am grateful for the cooperation of the School Board. Superintendent, pupils, teachers and townspeople in making our school year a success.

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REPORT OF HEADMASTER NORTH WALPOLE HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Charles D. Dalzell, Superintendent of Schools: Dear Sir:

I am enclosing herewith my annual report on the work and conditions of the North Walpole schools.

ENROLLMENT

The number of pupils registered in the various grades is: Grade 10, Boys, 7, Girls, 7, total 14; Grade 9, Boys, 7, Girls, 11, total, 18; Grade 8, Boys, 18, Girls, 6, total, 24; Grade 7, Boys, 4, Girls, 11, total, 15; Grade 6, Boys, 7, Girls, 7, total, 14; Grade 5, Boys, 9, Girls, 10, total, 19; Grade 4, Boys, 9, Girls, 6, total, 15; Grade 3, Boys, 9, Girls, 10, total, 19; Grade 2, Boys, 7, Girls, 10, total, 17; Grade 1, Boys, 7, Girls, 4, total, 11; Sub Primary, Boys, 7, Girls, 8, total, 15; grand total, 181.

There was no change in the teaching staff during the present year.

ATTENDANCE

The percentage of attendance for the first twenty weeks of the school year are: Grades 10 and 9, 96.87; Grade 8, 96.55; Grade 7, 95.96; Grade 6, 97.82; Grade 5, 98.37; Grade 4, 97.37; Grade 3, 98.34; Grade 2, 96.46; Grade 1, 94.76; Sub Primary, 95.36.

The number of tardy marks is: Grade 10 and 9, 72; Grade 8, 28; Grade 7, 25; Grade 6, 4; Grade 5, 6; Grade 4, 8; Grade 3, 5; Grade 2, 3; Grade 1, 2; Sub Primary, 2. Most of the tardy marks in the High School have been caused by pupils who have been assisting at church services.

COURSE OF STUDIES

The course of studies in the first eight grades remains unchanged. The Bookkeeping course in Grade 10 in the High School has been extended from one half year to a full year. Commercial Geography formerly given for a half year in Grade 10 has been eliminated.

Consideration is being given to a revision of the High School History courses. At present, History of Civilization is taught in Grade 9. The recently revised State History course has placed it among Grade 10 subjects. The field of study of this subject is very extensive both in time and matter. Its content presents a heavy load for Grade 9 pupils. Modern European History is now taught for a full year in Grade 10. The content of this subject is less extensive in time and matter than that of the Grade 9 history.

The advisability of combining the two courses of History of Civilization and Modern History for the Grade 10 year is being considered. An opportunity thus will be given to offer another subject in Grade 9 and relieve the history pressure.

The annual midyear diagnostic and intelligence tests have been given in Grades 3 to 10. A study of the results shows a gratifying record of achievement. We feel that the application and results obtained by our pupils in their class work is for the most part satisfactory. The spirit and attitude of the High school classes toward their work is particularly gratifying.

A radio victrola has been purchased from part of the funds obtained from the two successful operettas presented last year. The use of this instrument is available for the use of all classes. Instructive musical programs and narration of important current events and speeches can now be heard in the classroom.

The annual inspection by High School agent Russell Leavitt has been made. The health examination by Miss Edgett, school nurse, has been completed.

The 4-H club, composed of 20 girls of Grades 8, 9 and 10, has directed its efforts this year to the "Better Homes" project.
