### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

### TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear the reports of agents and auditors and take any action thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to apply for State Aid for State Road Construction and raise and appropriate the sum of \$825.00 (State contribution \$1,650.00) or vote for Class V assistance for Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$474.00 (State contribution \$1,896.01.) If S. A. is voted it must be expended on the East Westmoreland road.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote for snow removal and sanding or either on Class V or VI roads or take any other action relating thereto. Raise and appropriate money for the same.

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to apply Calcium Chloride or any other dust laying material to any of the gravel section of the Class V roads and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 7. To see what sum of money in addition to what is required by law the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to gravel, fill and crown road leading from the London road so-called to the residence of Richardson Morris. And raise and appropriate money for the same or take any other action relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to pay out and construct a highway and bridge beginning at a point on No. 12 highway about opposite the dwelling house of Fay R. Austin in the Town of Westmoreland and extending in a northerly direction to the northerly bank of Mill brook so-called, and if a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00) shall be raised and appropriated to construct the said highway and bridge.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for repairing the highway leading from the London road so-called to Route 12 near Hunt's lodge.
- 11. To see what sum of money if any the Town will raise and appropriate for upkeep for cemeteries, etc.
- 12. To see what sum of money if any the Town will vote to borrow and use in order to obtain State or Federal funds.
- 13. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jothan Lord fund.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$130.00 for the support of Library.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to permit the Town Hall to be used as a gymnasium for the purpose of playing basketball, badminton, etc.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to have all taxes unpaid on Jan. 31, printed in the annual town report or take any other action relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to have all poll taxes paid by July 1, of current year or uphold the tax collector in collecting the same as required by law, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 to purchase snow fence and posts.
- 20. To see what action the Town will take relative to surveying and placing permanent markers in the course of perambulation of the town lines and raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed a \$100.00 for the same or take any other action relating thereto.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Scenic New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust control in cooperation with State Forestry and Recreation Department.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to rescind or amend its vote of Article 22 of 1940 Town Warrant or take any other action relating thereto.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the use of the Austrialian ballot at Town meeting.

- 25. To see what sum of money if any the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repainting or refinishing in any way the interior of the Town Hall.
- 26. To transact any other business to come before said meeting.

### SCHOOL WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the school district in the town of Westmoreland qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said district, on the 8th day of March 1941 at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to release and convey in fee simple to Ada L. Briggs and-or her heirs, executors and-or administrators, for the consideration of one dollar, all the right, title and interest, if any, the district has in and to the school building known as No. 7 and any and all right to or over

the real estate occupied by or surrounding said building; also to authorize the school board or its chairman, or any one or more of the school board, to execute and deliver a deed in the name and behalf of said district to carry out the intentions of the foregoing vote.

- 10. To see if the district will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to continue the contract with the Brattleboro High School for the payment of High School tuition.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to continue the contract with the Union School District for the payment of high school tuition at Keene High School.
- 13. To see if the district will vote to appoint a committee of three to work in conjunction with the Corner School Parent Teacher Association to investigate the possibility of installing a permanent and adequate supply of water at the Corner School.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

### ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

Two new teachers were elected to fill vacancies on the teaching staff. Miss Rose Dempsey received appointment as teacher in the four upper elementary grades at South Village school. Miss Dempsey is a graduate of Keene Teachers' College four-year elementary curriculum. Miss Doris Williams assumed her duties as the new teacher at East Westmoreland after seventeen years of successful experience in elementary and rural schools.

I have each year devoted a portion of my report to a discussion of some of the aims of our general supervisory program. Previous reports have covered the phases of the program applying directly to the content and improvement of instruction. Since effective instruction is influenced also by a continuous program designed to strengthen the organization of our schools. I believe that a brief outline indicating the nature of some of this activity should be of general interest.

Instruction sheets to all teachers in the supervisory union have repeatedly emphasized the importance of maintaining a uniform standard practice in relation to the following details of school management:

- 1. Permanent records of personal data, attendance, and scholarship.
  - 2. Report cards, failures, and make up work.
- 3. Organization and supervision of all playground activities.

- 4. Organization and supervision of school programs, socials, entertainments, and athletic contests.
  - 5. Exhibits of school work.
  - 6. Conduct of school lunch program.
  - 7. Fire Drills and safety control measures.
  - 8. Details of class and room management.
- 9. Care, preservation, and use of equipment and reference materials.
- 10. Development of school libraries and use of circulation libraries.

The report card usually results in more misunderstanding and conflicts of opinion than any other item of school management. It is not surprising that this should be so since acceptable practices for reporting to parents are many and varied. However, regardless of the form used, I believe that pupil scholastic reports have meaning and value only when they are made by the teacher and interpreted by the parent according to some definite policy which is understood and accepted by both. It has been my experience in talking with parents to find that they usually desire a fair, truthful, and frank estimate of the actual quality of the work of the pupil as measured by the ability of the child and the standard for the grade. I believe also that our teachers generally have recognized their responsibility in this regard and try to mark pupils truthfully and fairly according to their best judgment. Teachers have been urged to consider the report card as a transcript of the pupil's school record and to report deficiencies consistently as they occur.

Although repeated failures may indicate that a pupil would profit by repeating the grade, they are more generally caused by inattention, failure to complete assignments, or careless work. Teachers and parents should make an honest attempt to ascertain the cause of pupil failures and cooperate in some effective measures to eliminate them when possible.

In most of our schools the teachers have been very conscientious in the performance of their duties in supervising playground activity during the noon or recess periods. The informal situation on the playground affords an opportunity for wholesome pupil-teacher relations and for practical instruction in proper attitudes and group conduct.

Last year many of the schools in the supervisory union conducted school programs and exhibits designed to demonstrate school work and pupil performance. Programs of this nature are very much worthwhile. They tend to promote interest and cooperation and are worthy of the encouragement and support of the community served by each school.

Two deliveries of surplus food commodities were made to the schools during the year. Apples, oranges, raisins, and canned peaches were used to supplement the hot lunch program. It is expected that this program will be continued. One shipment of surplus foods has been received this year at each school.

The Parent-Teacher Associations at the Westmoreland Depot and village schools have arranged for special music instruction by a qualified teacher. The special teacher works with the pupils once each week at the Depot school and twice a month at the village. Music is taught during the week by the regular teachers. Rote work is emphasized in the lower

grades and theory, including note reading, is taught to the pupils in the upper grades. Rhythm bands have been organized.

### HEALTH

Health inspection in Westmoreland showed the following defects:

- 89 pupils were inspected.
- 12 pupils were underweight.
  - 2 pupils showed defective vision-uncorrected.
  - 7 pupils showed poor posture.
- 67 pupils were in need of dental care.
  - 2 pupils were unvaccinated without proper excuse.
- 7 pupils were recommended to have throat and nose examination by a physician.

Dental clinics were held at South Village May 31, 1940 and December 12, 1940. East Westmoreland March 4, 1940, Westmoreland Point October 17, 1940. Dr. J. H. Grimes, Keene, N. H. dentist, with work done as follows:

Total number of cleanings,	44
Total number of extractions.	18

The above clinics were sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Associations. At the South Village each pupil paid fifty cents. The P.-T. A. paid the balance of the bill. At East Westmoreland the parents paid half the bill, the P.-T. A. the balance. At the Point the P.-T. A. paid the entire bill. The Depot program was sponsored by the P.-T. A.

- 14 pupils had their teeth cared for by their own dentist.
- 3 tonsil cases were treated at a clinic.
- 2 pupils had special eye examination and defect corrected.

Some funds were received from the local Red Cross for corrective health work.

# BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

The following repairs and improvements were made at the school buildings during the year:

The exterior of the village school building was painted. The lower section of the walls in the classrooms, hallways, and toilets was painted. The walls were lined to permit refinishing in two sections as needed. This method is economical and makes an excellent finish for the walls. The school desks and chairs were varnished. Two new link chain swings with ball bearing swivels were supplied by the P.-T. A. The swing standard was painted. A cupboard was built in the basement for the storage of school and janitor supplies. A new flag pole was purchased. The screens and storm windows were painted and the roof was patched.

At East Westmoreland one coat of paint was applied to the front and ends of the building. The ceilings and walls in the activity room and back hallway were painted. The folding doors were repaired and varnished. A new sink drain was installed.

The roof at the Corner School was patched in places found to be leaking. Repairs were made to the chemical toilet.

The roof over the kitchenette and toilets at the Depot school was shingled. A new circulation heater was installed.

More playground space at East Westmoreland and playground equipment such as swing standards and teeter boards at East Westmoreland Depot, and Corner schools, would aid in the supervision of the outside activities during the recess and noon periods.
