#### **TOWN WARRANT**

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Cheshire, ss.

To the inhabitants of Alstead qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the eighth day of March, A. D. 1938, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles.

- Art. 1. To choose one delegate to a convention to revise the State Constitution, town clerk, town treasurer, selectmen, tax collector, overseer of poor, one or more road agents, auditors, constables, library trustees, trustees of trust funds, fence viewers, sextons, cemetery committee, measurers of wood and surveyors of lumber, and other town officers as the voters may direct.
- Art. 2. To see what sum of money the town will raise for ordinary town charges and for the support of the poor.
- Art. 3. To see what sum of money the town will raise for highways and bridges.
- Art. 4. To see if the town will raise \$750.00 for state aid construction bond.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise to oil the village streets.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will raise \$850.00 for street lights.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the control of white pine blister rust.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will raise \$1,179.00 for state aid construction and apply for state aid.

- Art. 9. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell real estate acquired by tax sale.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the care of cemeteries.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will raise \$25.00 for water rent for town hall and watering trough.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the library.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for control of tent caterpillar in Alstead streets.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to accept a trust fund of \$100.00 from Ella Dinsmore for the care of the William Cheever cemetery lot.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to accept a trust fund of \$100.00 from Charles Linsley for the care of his lot.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to accept a trust fund of \$100.00 from Mrs. Flora Frisbie for care of the Samuel Watts cemetery lot.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will raise \$627.65 for class V roads and call for state assistance.
- Art. 18 To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will raise \$30.00 for Memorial Day.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to observe and celebrate the anniversary of the ratification of the federal constitution by the state, June 21, 1938, and raise money for the same.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the Monadnock Region.

Art. 21a. To see if the town will vote to buy a kitchen stove for the town hall and a stove for the jail, and raise money for the same.

Art. 21b. To see if the town will take any action on the matter of purchasing fire extinguishers for the town hall, and raise money for the same.

Art. 21c. To see what action the town will take in regard to a town history and what sum of money will be raised for the same.

Art. 22. To hear and allow accounts.

Art. 23. To transact any other business that may come before the meeting.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Alstead:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of School.

#### ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

Several changes were made in the teaching positions. Miss Alison Boright, a graduate of Boston University, was elected to fill the vacancy in the commercial department which was caused by the resignation of Miss Miley. In addition to teaching the commercial courses, Miss Boright gives instruction on the violin and assists with the school orchestra. Miss Evelyn Brinton was elected to conduct the activity and instruction in music. The work of this department, which was so well organized under the guidance of Mrs. Alice Moore, includes instruction in vocal music in the high and village elementary schools, instrumental music, class work in music appreciation, and the conduct of the school orchestra, band, operettas, etc.

Mr. Donald Tryon, University of New Hampshire 1937, succeeded Mr. Richard Martin as teacher of mathematics and science in the Vilas High School.

Miss Eva Johnson, a graduate of Keene Normal School, is teaching at East Alstead in the position vacated by Miss Doris Hitchcock. Miss Johnson had several years of successful teaching experience in the schools of Vermont before coming to Alstead.

The quality of instruction in the schools of the district is of a high standard. The teachers are well qualified by education and professional training and they are interested in the welfare of the pupils as well as in the work of the school. Reading is the most important single subject of the elementary school and it is the basis for the successful development of the other fundamentals. Investigation has revealed that many children fail in new subjects principally because of their inability to read with understanding in these subjects.

It is now recognized that intelligent reading in such specialized subjects as mathematics, science, history and geography may be developed by gradually building up a vocabulary and establishing simple fundamental concepts. This is the aim in much of the newer reading material which is supplied in the elementary grades.

The program of standard and diagnostic tests, as outlined in previous reports, will be continued. These tests together with the remedial instruction designed to correct deficiencies in the fundamental processes have become established as an important part of our instructional procedure.

The school alone cannot carry the full responsibility for the education of children. Education consists principally of mental growth and social adjustment. The mere accumulation of knowledge is only one phase of education. Much more important is the modification in behavior tendencies and the proper adaptation of the individual to social and civic situations. There are many factors, agencies, and influences affecting the life of the child and these combined influences over a comparatively brief period of time determine the character and stamina of the individual. It is our responsibility as teachers and parents to encourage those influences which are desirable and to discourage any factors or agencies which may be detrimental to the interests of our children.

The two institutions of outstanding importance in the education of the child are the home and the school. Each must have an understanding and a sympathy with the work of the other. The basis of this cooperation is an understanding of each others problems. Misunderstandings frequently occur because of a difference in point of view. The parent very naturally regards his child as an individual and singles him out for preferred treatment. The teacher,

however, must regard each child as a member of the school who must learn to adjust himself socially and to subordinate his interests to those of the group.

#### REPORT OF HEADMASTER

#### VILAS HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Charles D. Dalzell, Superintendent of Schools, Dear sir:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as headmaster of Vilas High School.

The attendance record of the senior high school has been excellent. There have been several severe colds and cases of grippe in the junior high which has seriously affected the attendance record. We hope it will be possible for the attendance record of the junior high school to improve. Continued absence even though work is made up is sure to affect the standing and promotion of pupils.

#### SCHOLARSHIP

Special periods are set aside each day for make-up work. The teachers are glad at all times to assist pupils in their work and the pupils for the most part are conscientious in preparing their assignments. The scholarship is in general good. Last spring when the state tests were given in English, our pupils were above the average for seniors in New Hampshire.

## ORGANIZATION ENGLISH

The work in English has been carried on much as in former years. We are using the new English program which is on trial this year throughout the state. It emphasizes the practical value of instruction, such as conversation, letter writing, newspaper, magazine, and radio appreciation, and increased skill in reading. A unit in the literature of New Hampshire is being taught for the first time this year.

Since it has been recognized that the high school must teach reading, at least one class will be given instruction in this fundamental skill. Teachers in all classes are attempting to coordinate the emphasis on correct oral and written English usage.

The French students particularly enjoy their correspondence with French boys and girls.

## COMMERCIAL COURSE

The Commercial course is being continued the same as in other years. The courses taught are Junior Business Training, Bookkeeping, Shorthand, Typing, and Office Practice. Members of the department have done much practical work such as filing, taking letters, and mimeographing.

## MATHEMATICS

Concrete algebra, geometry, and elementary business methods are being taught in the junior high school.

First year algebra and geometry are offered this year in the high school. A few students are taking special work in mathematics but there was not enough interest to warrant giving the regular advanced course.

#### SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

The basic course, General Science, is offered in the two years of Junior High School.

The more advanced sciences—chemistry, biology, physiography, and physics are presented this current year in the High School. In chemistry, a soil testing program is being originated which will enable the student to test soils for mineral content, sulphates, nitrotes, and phosphates. Failure to find certain valuable and necessary ingredients in the soil tested will suggest the proper fertilizer to be used on that soil.

#### SOCIAL STUDIES

Constitutional History—The purpose of constitutional history is to trace the main lines of constitutional development for more than a hundred and fifty years, beginning with the middle of the eighteenth century. State and town government are studied thoroughly as during the year the class attended the town meeting, conducted a town meeting within the school, and visited the last session of legislature.

History of Civilization—History of civilization serves as a source of obtaining the fundamentals of our present day organization. A narrative of human progress in all branches of civilization from its beginning in Ancient Egypt to the present civilization.

Sociology—In sociology, a study is made of present conditions, with an ethical purpose of finding some means for improving conditions. To develop in the individual an interest in bettering social conditions, a willingness to aid in betterment, and to attack social problems with an intelligent skill. A varied amount of reading is required.

#### HOME ECONOMICS

The work in Home Economics has been carried on much the same as in previous years of school.

The Family Relationship class has studied the following units: Historical Background of the Family, Present setting of Family Life, Family Finances, The Family Employed and Some Laws Related to Family Life, Leisure Time and Child Care.

The units to be studied are: Family Life Today, The Art of Everyday Living, The Family and the Community, Home Care of the Sick, and Vocations.

Each member of this class added to the attractiveness of the school fair by showing a fall flower arrangement. Prizes were given for the three best arrangements. Nearly every member of the Foods and Nutrition class completed a home project in canning this fall. Girls who completed requirements exhibited canned goods at the fair.

The foods and nutrition class has studied the breakfast unit. This included the following topics: fruits, cereals, millk, eggs, quick bread, and table etiquette.

Each girl planned, prepared and served a breakfast family style in the laboratory.

New cooking aprons have been made by the class.

The department made colonial costumes for the class night pageant.

A fashion show was given for the mothers, at the gathering in May of mothers and daughters. A supper served by the girls preceded the show.

The Merry Mens Club continues to meet every two weeks.

## AGRICULTURE COURSE

This year we have 27 boys taking agriculture. In addition to their school work these boys have home projects in poultry, dairy and general agriculture.

In the school shop many articles have been made for farmers in the community as well as the regular projects the boys made for themselves. The older boys have specialized in farm machinery repair this year including projects such as completely overhauling a hay loader.

Our school was represented in the State Public Speaking contest, and three boys exhibited eggs in the egg and baby chick show at Concord.

Several of the boys taking agriculture went to the Eastern States Exposition last September. It is felt they gained a great deal from their trip and we hope it can be repeated again.

In the egg and baby chick show Carl Fox won 25 baby chicks.

At the Interscholastic Judging contest Maytent Feuer was first in the state in fruit judging and William Mitchell had the highest total score of anyone in the state.

The boys taking agriculture assisted in getting and setting up many of the exhibits for the school fair.

#### GIRLS' PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Pupil leaders have been elected for each of ten sports scheduled throughout the year. Elected team captains cooperate with the sport leader and the teacher.

The sports leaders comprise an Athletic Council which adopted a tentative yearly schedule and set standards for earning a "letter."

Intra-mural competition in each sport is enthusiastically supported.

The girls have been encouraged to get more out-door exercise since the skating rink was built on the field; and a faculty member has organized a ski group.

The annual basketball play day, when Walpole is entertained is being arranged. The night of the boys' Keene game at home, two girls' teams played a close game.

The percentage of participants in activities is rising. Four classes of the six have 100% participation this year. It is encouraging that these are the younger four.

Just before Mothers' Day we entertained more than fifty mothers with an afternoon gym exhibit, a supper, and style show.

#### BOYS' PHYSICAL EDUCATION

The program carried out during the past year has been to stress above all, good sportsmanship, ability to meet situations in life as well as on the field of play. Fair play and individual cooperation are the major points stressed in all activities. Much improvement has been noted in the ability of the boy as to muscular development.

Outdoor activities are strongly stressed in the spring and fall terms. During the winter term, those not interested in basketball, have been skiing and skating.

In the fall a touch football team was organized and two games were played with Simonds High School. Volleyball, and soccer were other activities played during the fall.

The basketball team acquired that necessary cooperation as a unit and a successful season was enjoyed.

The second annual father and son night was held on March 5th. These get-to-gethers are important and influential to the school and community as a whole. Fifty boys with their father or a friend attended.

On June 4th one hundred and sixty-five children from the grade schools of Acworth, Alstead, East Alstead, Langdon, and Marlow participated in games on Vilas Field under the supervision of capable boys taking physical education in the high school. The purpose of this field day is to give the younger pupils that poise and desire to enter in and learn to mix with other individuals.

#### SOCIAL PROGRAM

The social programs are directed to a large extent by the students themselves. Once a month we have a social sponsored by one of the classes. These socials are directed and planned by a student committee with the help of a faculty advisor. Various classes put on an assembly program once every two weeks and occasionally an outside speaker is heard. Devotional exercises under the direction of the Senior class are held twice each week.

Last year our school band played in Langdon, Acworth, and Alstead on Memorial Day.

Hot lunches have been served during the winter term but only a few pupils have been able to purchase them.

Many parents have come to the school to talk over their children's problems. It is felt that this is very helpful and hope many more such visits by parents will be made.

The Vilas F. F. A. this year sent one boy to Kansas City to the National F. F. A. convention.

There has recently been organized a Hobby Club which meets noons and gives many pupils a chance to work at their favorite pastime.

This year the student body purchased and placed in operation a phonograph amplifier system in the school gym. This was financed by the dramatic club, the Girls' A. A., and the social fund. Some of the boys in the school shop installed it—building a table, record cabinet etc. This has been used many times in gym classes, noon dancing periods and at school parties.

Several books have been given to the library by organizations and interested citizens.

I would like to acknowledge the cordial cooperation of the Shedd-Porter library trustees and librarian.

In behalf of the school, I wish to thank the people of Alstead, Acworth, Langdon, and Marlow who have supported our work and cooperated in making it more effective. May I also express appreciation to the superintendent, teachers, pupils and parents for their whole-hearted cooperation.

# REPORT OF SPECIAL TEACHER OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herewith my first annual report as special teacher of music at Alstead.

The chief aim in teaching music in the public schools is to teach artistic singing with beautiful tone quality. In working toward this goal we try to do three things. First, develop the desire to sing, second, to teach the child to sing, and third but not least, to teach the child how to express his feelings through music.

The matter of expression is of the greatest importance, and as one writer has so nobly put it, "The heights of music are reached only in the expression of feeling, its supreme significance is spiritual and its most glorious medium is the human voice."

We hope through this plan of study to arouse in the children a desire to hear good music, the ability to appreciate good music, acquiring an increasing skill as a singer and learning the use of singing as a means of self expression.

The Junior High and High School chorus have been given training in reading, in voice production, ennuciation, expression, and interpretation.

The orchestra has a membership of 20 this year. We feel that the bass section will greatly decrease next year as many of the members are graduating in June. In the brass class we are preparing pupils to take the place of some of those who are graduating but the brass instruments are expensive and the young people feel that they cannot afford to buy these bass instruments. A gift of any instruments would be greatly appreciated by this department. The string group in the orchestra will be supplemented next year

by violinists from Miss Boright's violin class. Miss Boright is also helping with the orchestra.

The band has a membership of 18. The band is very appreciative of its new drums. They add so much to the organization. The group has several engagements for the spring.

Chorus groups and leads have begun rehearsals for "Bobby," an operetta to be presented in March.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to Superintendent Dalzell, Mr. Fenton, Miss Boright and other teachers for the cooperation that has been accorded this department.

- 16 pupils were recommended to have throat and nose examinations by a physician.
