COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

To the Citizens of Coos County:

In accordance with Chapter 30, Sec. 1, of the general statutes of the State of New Hampshire, we submit the following report for consideration; also the report of the Superintendent of the County Farm, County Physician, Chaplain, County Treasurer, Solicitor, Sheriff, Jailor, Clerk of Court and Auditors.

FINANCIAL CONDITION OF THE COUNTY.

The report of the Treasurer shows that the net debt of the County Jan. 1, 1895, was \$46,310.41, against \$51,136.17 Jan. 1, 1894, showing a decrease of \$4,825.76. There was in the hands of the Treasurer Jan. 1st, 1895, \$6,314.79.

COUNTY FARM.

As regards the receipts and expenditures of the farm will be found in Superintendent's report.

The reason for the increased cost of County Paupers is largely due to the fact that we have taken the inventory at the farm at an appraisal which we feel satisfied is below the real market value. Also the fact that during the last year there has been 155 weeks less board, with the expenses of running the farm practically the same as last year.

We wish to express to Mr. and Mrs. Marshall our thanks for the untiring care and interest they have taken in the inmates; and we can assure the people of the County that the unfortunates under their charge are suitably provided with everything to make them comfortable, and tenderly cared for in sickness; many of them, undoubtedly, having a better home than ever before.

COUNTY COURTS.

The unusual number of criminal cases in our courts the past year, have largely increased the expenses of the County.

To the Overseers of the Poor, of the towns who have adopted this officer, we would extend our thanks for their efficient services and aid, which they have given us in looking after our unfortunate poor in our several towns. We would recommend to those towns who have not already adopted this system, that they elect, or appoint, such an officer at the coming March election. Experience has proved to us that this officer is not only a large saving to the County financially, but procures better care for the needy.

CLERGYMAN'S REPORT.

To the Commissioners of Coos County:

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit my annual report as Chaplain of the County Farm:

As opportunity has permitted, I have conducted a praise and preaching service in the dining room at the Farm.

The inmates have the privilege of attending the regular services at the church, and those who can do so. Those who attend the services in the house seem, by their interest, to like them.

It speaks well for the County that there are fewer inmates in the Institution now, than in any previous year. Its prosperous condition and the comfort of those under the care of Mr. and Mrs. Marshall and their assistants, who have their well being at heart, is very gratifying, and wins for them the grateful appreciation of the recipients of these kindly ministries.

All who have died have had regular burial services, or been taken care of by their friends.

The Institution is a credit to Coos County and its taxpayers.

We have the following classification according to the nature of the crime: Adultery, 1; aggravated assault, 2; breaking and entering, 1; breaking, entering and stealing, 8; cruelty to animals, 1; false pretences, 4; larceny, 2; receiving stolen goods, 1; violations of liquor law, 37; attempting jail delivery, 1.

At the April term John H. Carney, indicted under my predecessor's administration for assault with intent to kill,

was tried. This case was of special interest to the people of the county and every effort was made to secure conviction. The Attorney General was present and ably conducted the case, but the jury seemed to think the evidence insufficient and the prisoner was acquitted.

The county is to be congratulated upon the conviction and punishment of the Robarge family—a dangerous family of burglars—who have been operating in the vicinity of Whitefield for the past two years. Six of this family were sentenced to varying terms of imprisonment, one of the number, Mike, being again bound over to the next term of Court on a new charge.

All liquor indictments found at the February term were continued to the April term that the cases might be tried in the Southern District where the offences were alleged to have been committed, as is customary. At the April term, I marked every case in the criminal docket for trial by jury. I found, however, that "private prosecutors" had exercised their prerogative and settled all liquor indictments.

It will be noticed that there has been one indictment for "attempting jail delivery." Among the implements found in the possession of the prisoners who were attempting to escape, was what seemed to be the steel shank which is put into shoes of a certain manufacture. One of the prisoners had on a pair of these shoes, and, undoubtedly, extracted this steel shank from them, which he had fashioned into a saw to saw the bars of his cell. This illustrates the possibility of prisoners concealing in their wearing apparel, however closely they may be searched before commitment, some instrument by which an escape might be effected, and I would recommend that jail suits be provided by the county in which to clothe all prisoners, and thus avoid this danger as well as add to the cleanliness and safety from disease of those confined in our jail.

The expenses incurred in the trial of the Carney case, and in the capture and conviction of the Robarges was necessarily heavy, but the good order of our county demands

the punishment of crime which affects the safety of property and life, without regard to expense, and this money has been well expended.
