

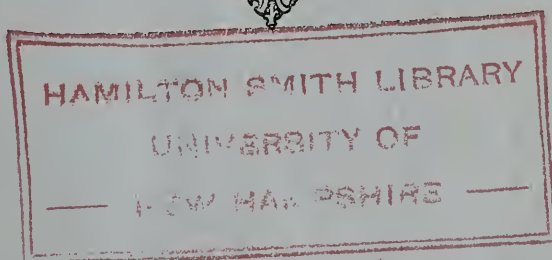

# TOWN WARRANT

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deerfield in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.*

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Deerfield on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$834.00 for the construction of the Class 2 road known as the Northwood Road, the State to contribute \$1,668.00 or to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$799.03 for Class 5 highways, the State to contribute \$3,196.15.

4. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on taxes paid in full before certain dates and fix said dates and discounts.

6. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the Town for non-payment of taxes.

7. To see what action, if any, the Town will take relative to instruct the Selectmen to hire money on long term notes for care of winter roads.

9. To transact any other business that may come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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### *To the School Board of Deerfield:*

There is presented herewith my ninth annual report. It deals chiefly with changes in teaching positions, age-grade enrollment, high school transportation, special activities, buildings and equipment.

### *Teacher Changes*

Late in the summer release from contracts were requested by Miss Anne V. Crowley and Mrs. Nancy T. Stevens of the Pond and Parade Schools respectively. Mrs. Ella A. Allen of Chester was elected teacher of the Pond School. Mrs. Allen taught for several years the grammar grades in the Severance School of Auburn and has since substituted for extended periods in the schools of Auburn and Pembroke. Mrs. Marjorie M. Buzzell of Loudon succeeded Mrs. Stevens at the Parade School. Mrs. Buzzell is a graduate of the two-year course of the normal school and for six years has been employed as teacher of the Boston Hill School in Andover, New Hampshire.

### *Age-Grade Enrollment*

Enrollment for the school year, ending in June, 1937, shows a slight decrease. However the average membership and per cent of attendance was improved. A high per cent of promotions was attained.

At the present time the West School enrolls only six children. This small enrollment accounts in a large measure for the fact that the average cost per pupil in Deerfield exceeds that of any other district in this Union. After this

year we cannot anticipate further state aid approval for the West School if the enrollment does not show a substantial increase.

As a result of recent state legislation a study was made this fall of the number of under-age as well as over-age children in the several grades. The following table shows that the Deerfield schools compare favorably with others in this respect.

#### *High School Transportation*

Under the law enacted by the last legislature a district, not maintaining a high school, is required to furnish reasonable transportation to all pupils under the age of fourteen years in grades above the eighth. Deerfield is thus required to transport three high school pupils during all or part of the present school year. We anticipate that at least two pupils will be entitled to such transportation next year. In certain districts, where consolidation of schools and facilities make it possible, these under-age children are cared for locally in a junior high school organization representing grades seven, eight, and nine. This alternative, if adopted

by a district, necessitates the employment of a teacher who is qualified to conduct classes in ninth-grade subjects. This teacher may be a normal school graduate of the three-year junior high school course. She may also teach certain subjects, including domestic science or manual training, in grades five to eight. Whenever the cost of high school transportation becomes large, this alternative is worthy of consideration.

### *Special Activities*

Funds for the dental clinic, conducted at the Grange Hall in June, were chiefly provided by local organizations. The majority of the thirty-five children treated received complete dental correction. Practically all the children paid a portion of the cost which enabled us to spread the general funds over a larger number.

The local spelling contest in May was won by the Pond School. In the Union Spelling Contest, held later in Pembroke, Deerfield was represented by Mary Ambrose and Beatrice Blais of the Pond School and Jeanette Mandigo of West Deerfield.

This year your teachers joined with some thirty others from neighboring towns in a study of the standards used in marking and reporting pupil progress in both habits of social adjustment and school subjects. As a result a more intimate and specific type of report has been adopted in the first and second grades. This follows closely the form in use in the primary grades of Grosse Point, Michigan. Parents are asked not only to examine and sign these reports but also to indicate and return to the teacher their personal observations and suggestions. For grades three to eight, a completely new form of report card has been prepared and adopted. It allows, in marking, more emphasis to be placed on the improvement in the individual's achievement than on a mere comparison of the individual with the achievement of the class. The use of such report cards

anticipates that during the year at least one visit will be made by the teacher to each home represented in her school.

### *Buildings and Equipment*

Pursuant with the action taken by the district in March, 1937, outside repainting of the Center, Parade and Pond schoolhouses was completed during the summer.

At the Pond School the double benches and desks have been completely replaced by individual chairs and desks or by movable chair-desk sets. Several of the latter type have been placed in the Center School. These units are constructed chiefly of metal. Books and materials are deposited in a metal compartment beneath the seat. These chairs with adjustable arm, controlling the height of desk top, encourage good posture.

The schoolroom windows at the Center have been fitted with adjustable shades of tan colored duck similar to those recently installed in the Pond Schoolhouse.

The teachers of the Center, Parade, and Pond Schools are in much need of new and larger desks with adequate filing space for materials and records. The sum of one hundred dollars, derived from the sale of the old Center School lot, could well be applied by the district to the purchase of this equipment.

### *In Conclusion*

Your Superintendent would suggest that, in view of your improved facilities for the transportation of pupils, and the educational and financial advantages made possible through combined classroom units, serious consideration be given to ways and means for the eventual consolidation of Deerfield's schools. He would recommend that a citizen's committee of five or more members, including the School Board, be chosen by the voters of the district to make a thorough study of rural consolidations and report to the

district at its annual meeting in 1939 their recommendation for or against a similar consolidation in Deerfield. A favorable report would necessitate time for further consideration of ways and means of achievement. By an early and thorough understanding of a future problem we may avoid excessive expenditure and realize a permanent investment.
