REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH WORK

To the Townspeople, School Board, and Superintend-

ent of Schools:

In spite of the depression, the enthusiasm of the pupils of the Snowville School in continuing the outstanding accomplishments in Health work, achieved last year, remains unabated. It will be remembered that these children earned the money for 100% dental corrections last year as well as money for hot lunches. They succeeded in correcting all but two of their physical defects. Their work in Health Habits was excellent and they learned many lessons in caring for their

health that they will never forget.

To maintain the high standards set during the past two years, it will be necessary to check up the dental needs again this year. These defects recur from year to year as the teeth change places, and there are always new pupils who have not yet had the privilege of the yearly check on the teeth. The pupils have roughly estimated that it will cost about \$25.50 to pay for dental work to put the teeth of all of the children in good condition. The only other need seems to be the condition of the tonsils of four children. These may or may not need to come out, as the family physician decides. This defect is more difficult to correct because of the greater cost.

The progress that this school has made in health work during the past two years may be demonstrated

by the following comparison:

The pupils are anxious to better this record this year. They are prepared to work towards a dental clinic and if it proves necessary, for a tonsil clinic. It is hoped that they will be encouraged by parents, friends, and officials to keep up the good work. They will need ample support during this year of depression when money is hard to raise for their needs.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Eaton:

I herewith submit my sixth annual report, it being

the thirteenth in the series of such reports.

The Snowville School is still a source of delight. All were sorry to lose the services of Edith M. Gilman but we wish her much joy in wedded life. The school is now in the care of Alice R. Whiting, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School, and a teacher of experience.

The school still holds a good record in physical examinations. As usual there are some defects to be remedied and efforts are being made to provide money for this purpose. The school itself assisted last year. Miss Ruth Langille is still the school nurse and has

made the annual examinations.

In order to get money for the noon lunch, the school gave an entertainment with motion pictures in the hall, the use of which was kindly donated by the Odd Fellows. It is much better for the children, most of whom bring their dinners, to have a warm dish at noon.

Scholastically our pupils stand well when they go on to high school. In Kennett High School and Madison High School, where they attend, they have made good records. It is very creditable to Eaton School District that such a large number of boys and girls seek higher education. Those in high school at present are as follows: Lawrence Bean, Woodrow Allard, Eleanor Young, Myrtle DeWitt, Florence Head, Doris Nelson, Randolph Paul, Dorothy French and Frances Sanborn.

Lawrence Nelson is a student in the University of New Hampshire and Seth White is in Northeastern University. More of our high school graduates should

go on to college and normal school.

The school property is being kept up. This year the building was painted inside and the toilet walls sheathed. The room was cleaned and the furniture varnished. This is one of our most attractive schoolrooms. A bit of lawn with flowers and shrubs would add much to the outside beauty.

I renew my plea of last year that more parents

and citizens visit the school to enjoy the building and the school activities.

I wish to express my strong appreciation for the loyal way in which the Eaton School Board and citizens have supported the work of the school. It has been well said that we can afford to neglect material things better than to neglect the welfare of the boys and girls.

The School Board has prepared its budget with care and with due regard for economy. It was found possible to reduce on several items. The equalized valuation is less this year, so the \$5 tax will be less, allowing more state aid.

Eaton is paying elementary tuition on three pupils

in Madison and three in Brownfield, Maine.

For the year ending June 30, 1932, our school had an average attendance of 15.4, an average membership of 16.6 and a per cent. of 92.9.
