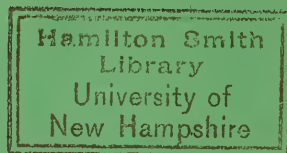

TOWN WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Gilsum in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Gilsum on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, 1937, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what action the town will take in regard to street lights and appropriate money for same.
4. To see what action the town will take in regard to snow removal and appropriate money for same.
5. To see what action the town will take in regard to the oiling of certain town roads and appropriate money for same.
6. To see what action the town will take in regard to town notes and appropriate money for same.
7. To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the town officers.
8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

9. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to look after the observance of Memorial Day and appropriate money for same.

10. To see what action the town will take in regard to Class V roads and appropriate money for same. The town must raise \$256.23 and the state will contribute \$1,024.90.

11. To see what action the town will take in regard to town roads and bridges and appropriate money for same.

12. To see what action the town will take in regard to state aid construction and appropriate money for same. The state will contribute \$1,000 provided the town will raise \$436.50.

13. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

14. To see if the town will vote to discontinue a road known as the Old Fish Road starting at a point on Belvedere Road near the sugar house belonging to the Edith Hussey Estate and running in a general northerly direction to a point on the old Gilsum road.

15. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the piece of road starting at a point near the southern end of High Street and continuing to a point opposite the Filling Station operated by Mr. E. W. Chase.

16. To see what action the town will take in regard to turning property back to Chas. A. Bates of Gilsum, N. H., subject to taxes and costs or pass any vote relating thereto.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before it.

18. To see what action the town will take in regard to the payment of all or any part of the sum of \$3,314.81 due the School District from previous years appropriations or pass any vote relating thereto.

19. Is it expedient to revise the constitution? .

TOWN ROAD FLOOD

The March flood of last year not only caused heavy damage to many of our town roads but also swept away both the Howard and Polley bridges. The town was awarded a W. P. A. grant which in cooperation with the state highway department assumed the cost of repairing the damage to the roads and also the entire cost and responsibility of replacing both the Howard and Polley bridges.

The responsibility of the W. P. A. on the town roads went no further than to put the roads back into as good condition as before the flood but we feel that the engineers in charge of the work were most considerate, with the result that much additional work was accomplished.

The total pay roll on the road project amounted to \$1,630.75 and the cost of truck hire was \$841.20.

Sixteen culverts and bridges were either entirely relaid or built new. About four miles of roads were machined, 4 3-4 miles of ditches cleaned or rebuilt and about 800 cubic yards of gravel put on the roads.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Gilsum :

I herewith submit my third report as superintendent of schools.

ORGANIZATION AND ENROLLMENT

At the opening of school in the fall the enrollment at the village school presented a serious problem. Fifty-four pupils were enrolled in the primary room. Twenty-three of these were in the first grade. There were forty-two pupils in the upper four grades. The number of pupils in each room was too large for efficient instruction.

The situation was relieved temporarily by the addition of a helping teacher.

At the recommendation of the commissioner of education and with the cooperation of the selectmen, a room was provided in the town hall to accommodate a group of pupils from the fifth, fourth, and part of the third grades. Miss Rosemary McGivney, a graduate of the three year elementary curriculum of Keene Normal School, was engaged as teacher.

The extra room was provided with very little added expense to the district. Reimbursement for the extra teacher's salary and operating expenses was received in advance from the state department.

The toilet facilities, heat, light, and playground at the town hall are not adequate for a permanent arrangement.

I recommend that the school district give serious consideration to a plan for reconstructing the present building with a view to providing another room. This plan would also provide for improving the present toilet facilities.

The district would be reimbursed through increased state aid for a large percentage of the operating expenses of the additional room.

The program of standard diagnostic tests which was begun last year will be continued with a few changes. In accordance with the program as outlined every pupil will be thoroughly examined for deficiencies in silent reading, fundamental processes in arithmetic, and language usage.

A grade standard has been established for each subject tested and the tests are especially designed to point specifically to types of deficiencies.

The real value of the testing program depends upon the thoroughness of the subsequent corrective work which is done by the teachers. Retests were given last year in several schools of the union after a period of remedial instruction. The results indicated a fair percentage of correction.

The continued use of a testing program of this nature will influence the efficiency of the instruction and will indicate where emphasis should be placed in teaching the fundamentals.

Standard tests, however, are only rough estimates of the effectiveness of the general education of our pupils. We are primarily interested in the growth of our young people in ideals, attitudes, and habits. These traits are not measurable by any tests now in use, but we know from experience that they are developed by a good teacher in a well-conducted school.

Forms of the following tests are used according to the grades for which they are especially designed:

Haggerty Reading Examination
 Shank Test in Reading Comprehension
 Spencer Diagnostic Test in Arithmetic
 Gregory Diagnostic Language Test
 Metropolitan Achievement Test

A standard graduation test is given each year to all pupils in the eighth grade.

A chest clinic for underweight and delicate children was held at the school in May. Dr. Kerr examined 23 pupils and three adults. Follow up visits were made to instruct the parents in the care and treatment of those found to have trouble.

65 school visits were made during the year.

39 home visits were made to investigate illness and to encourage parents to avail themselves of clinics for the correction of defects of their children, and to give instruction in the isolation and treatment of communicable diseases. Visits to school officials were made to confer on matters pertaining to the health work in the school and in the community.

The cod liver oil and milk, furnished by the federal government, also the correction of defects under the Child Health Recovery Program, has been very beneficial to the children. The responsibility to carry-on, now that federal assistance is no longer available, reverts to the parents and to the community. Every intelligent parent knows that no other food can replace milk in the child's diet. I hope that present conditions permit them to allow for four glasses to each child daily. It supplies calcium for the development of bone and teeth.

There is much valuable information in the following extract from a paper written by a nurse on school dental work: "The presence in the mouth of decayed and abscessed teeth, both temporary and permanent, increases the susceptibility to communicable diseases and undoubtedly helps to infect tonsils, cause enlarged glands, digestive disorders and other troubles.

The first teeth must be watched carefully and kept clean. When the baby has two or three teeth, a little cotton on a tooth-pick, or a small soft brush should be used to remove particles of food from between and around them. If through carelessness or oversight a cavity appears it should be filled immediately.

Many children who come to the clinics have previously lost or have to have extracted from one to all four of the so-called "six year molars," which most parents do not trouble about, thinking them temporary teeth."

Good nutrition, daily cleansing and having cavities filled promptly, would undoubtedly result in a much more perfect

permanent set of teeth and save the parents much unnecessary expense. Have your dentist inspect your little children's teeth for cavities which you may not have found.

Children need not have fear, usually they like to go to the dentist.

I thank the school officials, teachers, parents, pupils and others who have helped to promote the health work in the school and in the town.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT

Repairs necessary to maintain the school buildings in good condition were made as the need arose. The woodwork in both rooms at the village school was painted. The plaster in the hallway was repaired.

Fourteen single unit movable desks were purchased to take care of the increased enrollment.

The following alterations were made to accommodate a temporary school at the town hall.

A new window was added on each side of the room. The location of the stove was changed and a jacket was made to regulate the heat. Temporary blackboards were installed. The

chairs and desks were fastened to wood cleates to permit moving them in units. A cabinet for scholar supplies and books was built. The shed was partitioned for the toilet rooms. Temporary chemical toilets were installed.
