REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

In conformity to the requirements of law, the undersigned present a brief statement of the workings of our schools for the year now closing, with some suggestions that seem pertinent at the present time.

There have been maintained schools in five districts, two terms each, during the year. While most of these schools have been quite successful and satisfactory, others have not attained that standard of excellence which is desirable.

The teachers' position is one of a delicate nature and their duties are at times somewhat trying and arduous. Therefore, to obtain the best results in our schools, teachers need the sympathy and hearty co-operation of parents and other friends of education. There should ever exist a cordial, good feeling between teachers and citizens, and this cordiality helps to bring pupils into more confidential relation with teachers.

There needs to be an awakening in the minds of some of our scholars, and, as a means of accomplishing this end, we would respectfully suggest that parents interest themselves so much in the educational welfare of their children as to know that they are punctual and constant in attendance upon all the sessions of the school, and whether or not they are making commendable progress in their studies.

The registers show that some, quite too many, of our scholars are late in entering school in the morning, or perhaps they are absent from the entire school sessions of the day. Irregularity of attendance, whether the result

of tardiness or absenteeism, is an evil not to be lightly considered as both work detriment, not to those only whose attendance is irregular, but to the whole school. A law known as the truant law requires the attendance in school of all children between the ages of 6 and 16 years. The best and surest way of complying with the conditions of this law is for the legal guardians of the children to execute its provisions through the force of parental discipline.

The last legislature passed a law giving State aid to small towns, complying with its provisions, one requirement being that such towns maintain at least twenty weeks of school throughout the town each year. Under its provisions Groton has already received \$229. The law contemplates a wise and judicious use of this generous aid.

In closing let us say a few words to the scholars respecting their scholarship and deportment: Your teachers will be helpful to you while you do your duty but you must not expect them to learn your lessons for you. Some teachers will interest you more than others, but, after all, we find that the students who succeed best are those who interest themselves most in their studies. It is the duty of the teacher to instruct and govern, but neither of these duties can be effectually performed without your willingness to be taught and governed. You must do your own studying and, so far as in you lies, your own governing, always conforming to the rules and requirements of the school. You should realize that there is a great responsibility resting upon you and that you have it in your power greatly to aid or retard your own progress.

We do not find so many names upon the Roll of Perfect Attendance as we would like to see. You are probably aware that the condition requisite for your names to appear upon the roll is that you be present in school during every

half day of the term without being tardy. Will you see to it, scholars, that this Roll of Honor is greatly increased in the coming year?

We wish to impress upon you the importance of greater care in the use of school books furnished you. You should remember that they are not yours but are loaned to you for your use, and that you should keep them in a condition creditable to yourselves.

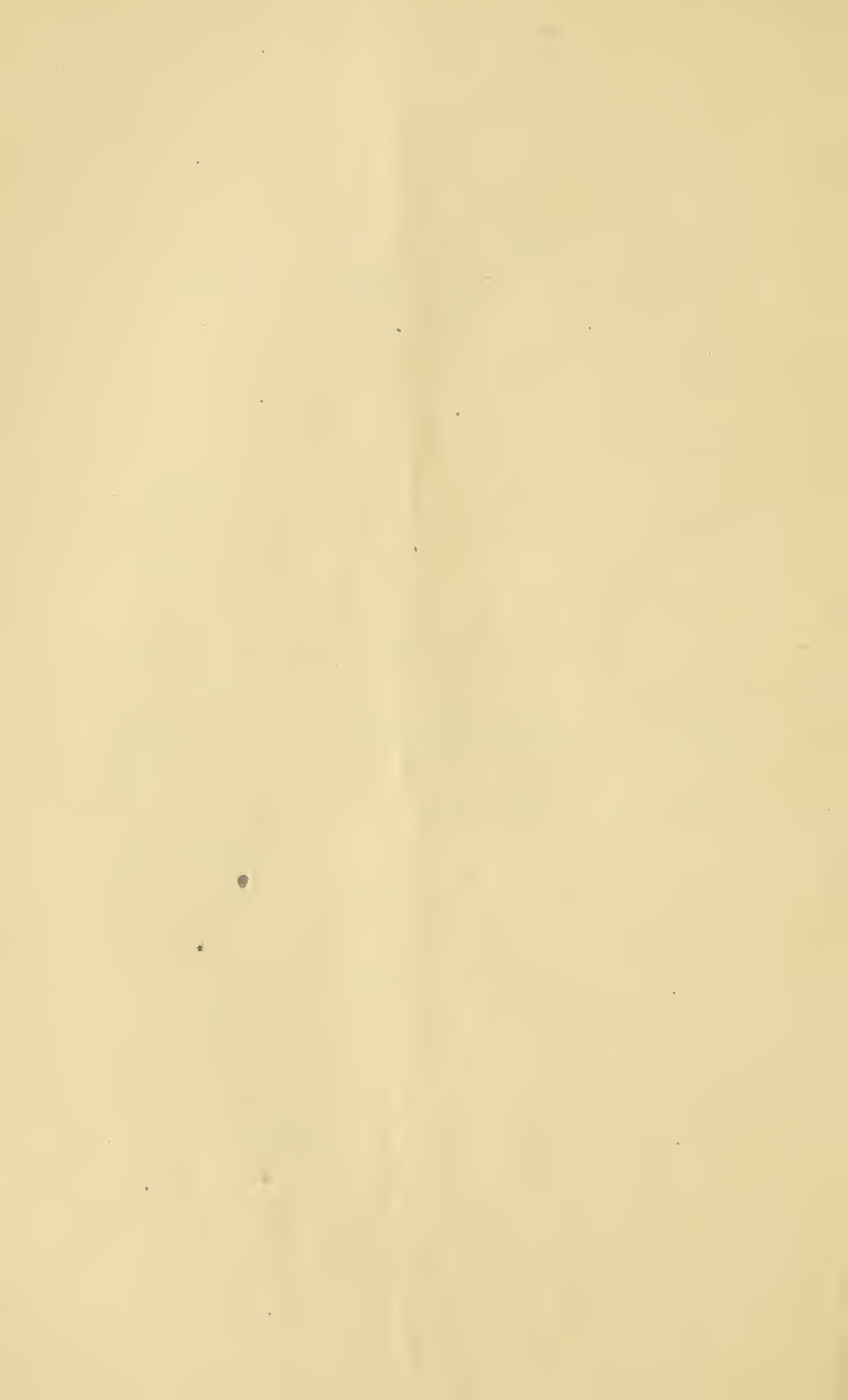
