TOWN WARRANT  
THE STATE OF NEW HAMSHIRE

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(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead, in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Hampstead on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, and to see if the Town will vote to accept the Building Ordinance.

2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges including town officers' salaries, expenses of town officers, election and registration, care and supplies for town hall, police department, fire department, health department, vital statistics, snow pathing, street lights, general expenses of highway department, town poor, Soldiers' Aid, interest on temporary loans and on long term notes and on principal of trust funds used by town.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate amounts as recommended by N. H. highway department for state aid construction.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to keep the unimproved roads and bridges in repair.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to pay the note for the West Road construction.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 to pay the note for the snow plow.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to meet the expenses of the public library the ensuing year.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries the ensuing year.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money for the use of the town in anticipation of taxes.

11. To hear reports of auditors and committees, and to act thereon.

12. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the road known as the Farm Road, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1219.50; or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$147.79.

13. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

14. To see if the town will vote to accept the Smith Land, so called, according to the will of the late Martha H. Ordway.

15. To see if the town will vote to have the windows screened in the upper hall, and raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$30.00 for the same. (By petition)

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be used in the further improvement of the Wash Pond or Page Road, so called, and what method they will adopt to expend the same. (By request)

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the erection of a new fence around the Soldiers' Monument.

18. To see if the town will vote to close the road leading from the East Road to the East Hampstead Road, same near the residence of Howard Putnam.

19. To see if the town will vote to abolish the office of Sexton. (By request)

20. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to the Hampstead Community Council for the purpose of providing a suitable athletic field for the High School and Town base ball teams, said field to be used for such other purposes as the town shall see fit. (By request)

21. To see if the town will vote to pay the Selectmen a stated salary to be paid monthly, said salary to be; for Chairman, \$300.00, and to each of the other two selectmen, \$200.00 per year. (By request)

22. To see if the town will vote to accept Daylight Saving Time. (By request)

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

FINAL REPORT OF THE ZONING ORDINANCE  
AND BUILDING COMMITTEE

To the Voters of Hampstead:

Your committee in submitting herewith its final report for approval and vote Tuesday, March 12, 1935, would emphasize the following points: (1) By state law a regulation shall not apply to existing structures nor to the existing use of any building. (2) Under these regulations there will be no new expense, no increase in your tax bill. (3) Under these regulations it is expected Hampstead will be found an attractive place to locate either a summer place or an all year home. This is about the only chance Hampstead has for increasing

its valuation and thereby lowering its tax bill.

Your committee composed of F. W. Emerson, T. J. Franklyn, E. C. Ingraham, G. M. Littlefield and C. A. Brooks, has held several meetings and public hearings to receive suggestions in preparing its final report. Great pains have been taken to make this ordinance one that is practical, simple to administer and not too burdensome. We strongly recommend its adoption as set forth below.

### Proposed

#### ZONING ORDINANCE and BUILDING CODE FOR the TOWN of HAMPSTEAD, N. H.

To promote the health, safety, convenience, and general welfare of the community by regulating and restricting the use of land and the construction of buildings thereon in the town of Hampstead, the following ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of the town of Hampstead, N. H., in annual town meeting convened:

#### ARTICLE I

##### Establishing of Zoning District

Section 1. For the purpose of this ordinance the town of Hampstead shall be considered as one district,

Section 2. No buildings or premises shall be erected, altered, or used for any purpose injurious or detrimental to a neighborhood.

#### ARTICLE II

##### Administration

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen, and the Board of Selectmen is hereby given the power and authority, to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to commence work for the erection or alteration of any

building or structure until a permit has been duly granted for such erection or alteration by the Board of Selectmen.

Section 3. Construction of small accessory buildings and the like shall be exempt from the provisions of this and following Articles, together with minor alterations, repairs, and the general upkeep of existing buildings.

### ARTICLE III

#### Building regulations

Section 1. The roof of every building hereafter erected or recovered in whole or in part shall be covered with fire resisting material except that this section shall not be construed to prohibit the use of wood shingles in repairing any roof now covered with wood shingles.

Section 2. All chimneys hereafter erected shall be constructed of brick, stone or other non-conducting fireproof material, laid solid in mortar, lined with terracotta flue lining, and topped out at least two feet above the highest part of the roof to which they belong, or three feet above a flat roof. No smoke pipe shall pass through any partition, or closet except it be guarded by suitable ventilated metal thimble or equivalent.

Section 3. Building lots adjacent to a public highway shall have suitable frontage, and the building area shall not exceed 25% of the lot area. Buildings hereafter erected shall set back from the street line at least thirty feet, and in no case less than the average set-back of existing buildings within 300 ft. in either direction and on both sides of the street.

Section 4. (a) The owner of any plot of ground intended for development and—or subdivision into building lots not fronting upon a public highway shall file with the Board of Selectmen a plan or map of the pro-



posed subdivision, and shall obtain the approval of the Board of Selectmen thereon before proceeding with the development or sale of lots in the said subdivision.

(b) It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen to inspect the site of such proposed subdivision, and to require such roadway and other areas for common use as will be eventually acceptable to the town for maintenance by the Town, and to approve the same when satisfied that such proposed boundaries are in harmony with the spirit and purpose of this act, conducive to the general welfare of the Town and the neighborhood, and not detrimental to existing property values.

## ARTICLE IV

### Board of Adjustment

Section 1. The Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment conforming in membership and duties to the provisions of Sections 54 to 60a inclusive of Chapter 42 of the Public Laws as amended, said Board to serve without compensation.

Section 2. The Board of Adjustment shall act on all matters within its jurisdiction under this ordinance in the manner prescribed in said statutes, and subject always to the rule that due consideration shall be given to conserving the public health, safety, convenience, welfare and property values of the neighborhood.

Section 3. PREVENTION of UNNECESSARY HARDSHIP. The Board of Adjustment shall have the power to authorize in specific cases such variance from the terms of this ordinance as will not be contrary to the public interests, where owing to special conditions, a literal enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance would result in unnecessary hardship, and so that the spirit of the ordinance shall be observed and substantial justice done.

## ARTICLE V

## General Provisions

Section 1. Amendments. The regulations, restrictions, and boundary as provided in this ordinance may from time to time be amended, supplemented, modified or repealed, by a resolution adopted at a regular meeting of the Town setting forth the proposed amendment. A public hearing shall be held thereon, after notice as required by law, and prior to the town meeting at which the amendment is to be proposed. Such amendment shall not become effective except by the favorable vote of the majority of the voting members attending and voting at a regular or special meeting of the Town.

Section 2. Penalty. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punishable upon conviction by a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each day of each violation.

Section 3. Validity. The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance shall not invalidate any other section or provision hereof.

Section 4. When effective. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

EXTRACT FROM THE PUBLIC STATUTES OF NEW  
HAMPSHIRE DESCRIBING AUTHORITY OF  
ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

54. Board of Adjustment. Such local legislative body shall provide for the appointment of a board of adjustment, and in regulations and restrictions adopted pursuant to the authority hereof shall provide that the said board may, in appropriate cases and subject to appropriate conditions and safeguards, make special exceptions to the terms of the ordinance in harmony with its general purpose and intent and in accordance with general or specific rules therein contained.

55. Members; Term. The board of adjustment shall consist of five members. On the date of the expiration of the terms of the present members of any board of adjustment the appointing authority shall appoint one member for a term of one year, one member for a term of two years, one member for a term of three years, one member for a term of four years and one member for a term of five years and thereafter shall annually appoint one member for a term of five years. Said members shall be removable by the appointing authority upon written charges and after public hearing. Vacancies shall be filled for the unexpired term.

56. Procedure. The board shall adopt rules in accordance with the provisions of the ordinances. Meetings of the board shall be held at the call of the chairman and at such other times as the board may determine. Such chairman, or in his absence the acting chairman may administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. All meetings of the board shall be open to the public. The board shall keep minutes of its proceedings, showing the vote of each member upon each question, or, if absent or failing to vote, indicating such fact, and shall keep records of its examinations and other official actions, all of which shall be immediately filed in the office of the board and shall be a public record.

57. Appeals to Board. Appeals to the board of adjustment may be taken by any person aggrieved or by any officer, department, board, or bureau of the municipality affected by any decision of the administrative officer. Such appeal shall be taken within a reasonable time as provided by the rules of the board, by filing with the officer from whom the appeal is taken and with the board a notice of appeal specifying the grounds thereof. The officer from whom the appeal

is taken shall forthwith transmit to the board all papers constituting the record upon which the action appealed from was taken.

58. Effect of Appeal. An appeal stays all proceedings under the action appealed from, unless the officer from whom the appeal is taken certifies to the board of adjustment after notice of appeal shall have been filed with him that by reason of facts stated in the certificate a stay would, in his opinion, cause imminent peril to life or property. In such case proceedings shall not be stayed otherwise than by a restraining order which may be granted by the board or by the superior court on notice to the officer from whom the appeal is taken and cause shown.

59. Notice of Hearing. The board of adjustment shall fix a reasonable time for the hearing of the appeal, give public notice thereof, as well as notice to the parties in interest, and decide the same within a reasonable time. Upon the hearing any party may appear in person or by agent or attorney.

60. Powers of Board. The board of adjustment shall have the following powers:

1. To hear and decide appeals where it is alleged there is error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination made by an administrative official in the enforcement hereof or of any ordinance adopted pursuant thereto.

2. To hear and decide special exceptions to the terms of the ordinance upon which such board is required to pass under such ordinance.

3. To authorize upon appeal in specific cases such variance from the terms of the ordinance as will not be contrary to the public interest, where owing to special conditions, a literal enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance, will result in unnecessary hardship,

and so that the spirit of the ordinance shall be observed and substantial justice done.

4. In exercising the above-mentioned powers such board may, in conformity with the provisions hereof, reverse or affirm, wholly or partly, or may modify the order, requirement, decision, or determination appealed from and make such order or decision as ought to be made, and to that end shall have all the powers of the officer from whom the appeal is taken.

5. The concurring vote of four members of the board shall be necessary to reverse any action of such administrative official, or to decide in favor of the applicant or any matter upon which it is required to pass under such ordinance, or to effect any variation in such ordinance.

60-a. Disqualification. No member of the board of adjustment shall sit upon the hearing of any question which the board is to decide in a judicial capacity who would be disqualified from any cause, except exemption from service and knowledge of the facts involved gained in the performance of his official duties, to act as a juror upon the trial of the same matter in any action at law. If a member shall be disqualified or unable to act in any particular case pending before the board the appointing authority, upon application of the board, shall appoint a member to act in his place upon said case.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS  
To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

It is a pleasure to present my eighth annual report as Superintendent of Schools. Reports are also submitted by the Music Supervisor, the School Nurse, and the Headmaster of the High School.

The school organization for 1934-1935 is given in the table at the end of this report.

The enrollment of pupils last year was 193, which is 6 more than during the previous year. Our record of attendance is creditable. The attendance averaged 96.13% of the membership. The average for the state was 94.9%. 17 pupils completed the work of the eighth grade and 13 of these entered high school. The medal presented annually by the Sons of the American Revolution to the member of the graduating class who best exemplified the habits of good citizenship, was awarded to Ralph Green.

The school buildings are in good condition except for the heating plant at the High School. The improvements at the High School are a help in the conduct of the school. I am sure that we are all looking forward to the time when it will be possible to have a new heating system.

The activities of Supervision are centered in helping the children to real achievement, growth in character and citizenship, and happy living. Visits, tests, conferences, and teachers' meetings are employed in directing the work of the schools. Parents have been helpful, but more contacts with them would be welcome.

In the schools there has been an earnest endeavor to discover the needs, defects, incapacities, as well as the abilities of the pupils, and to diagnose and prescribe for the pupil as an individual. In order to make this adjustment of the school to the pupil, a testing program has been used in every grade room in all the schools. The achievement made by the children is satisfactory



Their schoolrooms are places of homelike living and of real accomplishment.

Present-day elementary and secondary school instruction demand a larger collection of books and other reading materials. When instruction was largely of the drill type, a textbook was sufficient for that method, but now that the project, the problem and the laboratory methods and unit assignments are the recognized modes of teaching, a single text book does not suffice. There should be supplementary material and some sort of school library.

Since the amount of leisure time is increasing, not only for adults because of shorter working hours, but also for children because home occupations in which they once had a part are disappearing, library service is essential, not merely for supplementary textbooks, but for providing reading material for leisure time without reference to assigned lessons. Children should read books for "the fun of it". If this is made a school objective, the reading habit for leisure time may become well established.

Children, when undernourished or insufficiently clad cannot attend school regularly or profit from instruction. While the number of such children is somewhat smaller than it has been, yet there has been need for some relief. No single feature of state and federal relief has greater bearing on the health of growing children than the daily distribution of milk to those children in need of same. Through the initiative of Ex-Governor Winant, federal funds were secured and free milk service has continued since early in 1933. At present 8 children are receiving one-half pint of milk each per day at school. Cod liver oil has also been furnished in the same way.

Plans are being made for the serving of hot cocoa at luncheon time to those children that wish the same.

It will be possible to do so at a very small cost to each child.

Contributions by the Parent Teachers' Association the Red Cross and the church have made it possible to furnish clothing to children in need. Federal funds have been available which have made it possible for Miss Thomas to do considerable remedial work with defective teeth, eyes, and tonsils in children where the homes could not pay for such work. The Parent Teachers' Association is continuing to do much for education in Hampstead. We wish to express our appreciation to this Association for sponsoring the Dental Clinic which was held last fall. This clinic does a great deal of good each year. It is certain that the relief that is being furnished will do much to prevent the distress of the present period from leaving its mark upon the next generation.

It is more evident than ever that better opportunities come to boys and girls that attend high school for four years. Today the child that does not go through high school is the exception, as in former times, those that did complete high school were the exception.

The Superintendent feels a real pleasure in commending the work of the Headmaster, Miss Nichols. She has demonstrated her ability as administrator and teacher. Her relation with the pupils are firm but kindly, and her leadership of the staff of teachers progressive. The high school is operating upon the fifty-minute-period plan this year. The purpose of this plan is to enable the teacher to give more time to the backward pupils as an opportunity is given to study in class under the supervision of the teacher. The teacher is able to help pupils at the time when it is most needed, and will do the most good.

November 4th to the 10th was observed as American Education Week in our schools. All children were asked to extend invitations to their parents to visit

school during that week. Afternoon sessions were visited by large numbers of interested parents. Parents were thus able to see how our classes are conducted and to learn what their children were accomplishing in the classroom. In order to have a closer contact with our schools, more parents should avail themselves of opportunities to visit the classroom.

Mrs. Thompson continues her effective work in music instruction. She has made the children love good music and happy while studying it. The music at programs in the schools and at graduation is concrete evidence of her effectiveness in this capacity.

In conclusion I wish again to express my appreciation for the fine co-operation and support of the School Board, Townspeople, Parents, Teachers, and Pupils during the year.

The above report is based on the attendance from September 1934 to January 1935. The total enrollment remains fairly constant.

New Hampshire has conducted a state-wide testing program for high school seniors over a long period of time. Hampstead can be very proud of the record made by the class of 1934. The Otis Test of Mental Ability, the Haggerty Reading Examination which tests in various kinds of silent reading and the Iowa Placement Examination designed to test command of fundamental skills in the use of the mechanics of English were given. The following table gives the results.

Each year scholarship contests conducted by the State Board of Education are held at the two normal Schools. Hampstead High School was fortunate last May in winning the state championship in spelling.

Twelve recent graduates of the school are continuing their education in higher institutions. Four members of the class of 1934 are doing excellent work in the state normal schools.

The high school buildings are in good condition. The painting both interior and exterior added much to the general appearance of the plant. A very necessary general supply closet has been constructed in the eighth grade room and new cupboards have been built in the laboratory. The main room has been equipped with new window curtains purchased with a gift of money from the class of 1934 and from funds from the annual operetta. Mr. Frye has made several improvements in the Manual Arts shop. An oil burner in the laboratory and a new wood stove in the shop are appreciated.

The aims of the school are four-fold: ethical, physical, social and mental development. To achieve the first of these aims pupils are given every opportunity to take responsibility, to show initiative, and to cooperate not only with one another in school but in the affairs of the town. The Executive Council elects pupils who care for practically all general routine mat-

ters. Programs are presented for local organizations, assistance has been given the P. T. A. in preparing for whist parties and in collecting recipes for its cook book. The pupils also assisted in the Red Cross drive. Provisions at Christmas time were collected by the class in History and Citizenship for deserving people.

Participation in organized play and games assists both physical and ethical development so all pupils are encouraged to take part. During the past year interscholastic games were played with the following schools: Woodbury, Raymond, Hampton and Epping. There were base ball games with several other organizations. More than half the basket ball games were won by both girls and boys. During the past two years only one game out of twenty-seven has been lost and that by only one point. Due to the graduation of many of its outstanding athletes, Hampstead is at the beginning of another "athletic cycle" and must gradually build up championship teams.

Social development is sought through supervised socials, friendly intercourse, and association with other schools.

An attempt is made to secure conscientious preparation of daily work. The class period has been lengthened that teachers may supervise study and assist more easily. The emphasis is placed on advance work but fundamentals are not neglected so classes in remedial penmanship, spelling, geography, and arithmetic are held regularly. Pupils are excused from these classes as soon as they attain a standard score. Aside from regular classes are groups studying art, music appreciation and dramatics. The Harmonica Club has been reorganized.

This support is responsible for an achievement which the school makes. To the superintendent, school board, Mrs. Thompson, the music supervisor, the P. T. A., Miss Thomas, the school nurse, and citizens of the town, the teaching staff expresses its appreciation and thanks.

"Rose of the Danube" an operetta in two acts by Geoffrey F. Morgan and Frederick C. Johnson was presented by the High School pupils on November 3rd. The operetta was well received and a success financially.

## MUNICIPAL BUDGET ACT

1. MUNICIPAL BUDGET ACT. At the annual town meeting next after the taking effect of this act, each town in the state shall by ballot vote on the following article to be inserted in the warrant: "To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act." If the majority of those present and voting at said meeting vote for its adoption, this act shall be in force at the next annual town meeting and remain in force in said town until by proper article in the warrant the town shall at a regular town meeting by majority vote rescind such action. In towns where this act is not adopted as above provided, on petition of ten legal voters of said town the selectmen shall insert in the warrant for any subsequent annual town meeting a similar article, which shall be voted on in the manner above provided, and if adopted said act shall remain in force until rescinded by a majority vote at a regular town meeting.

2. BUDGET COMMITTEE. In towns adopting the provisions of this act the budget committee shall consist of three, six, nine or twelve members at large as the meeting adopting the provisions of this act shall by vote determine and one member chosen by the school committee of each school district in said town and one member of the board of selectmen to be designated by said board. The members at large may either be appointed by the moderator or elected by the town meeting adopting this act as said meeting may by vote determine. The majority of the members at large shall be property taxpayers. If said members at large are selected by election it shall be by a majority vote by ballot or acclamation of those present and voting. Where said members at large are appointive such appointment shall be made within thirty days after the adoption of this act by the town meeting. One third of the members at large so elected or appointed shall hold office for one year, one third for two years, and one third for three years, or until their successors are elected

and qualified.

3. PREPARATION OF BUDGET. It shall be the duty of the budget committee to prepare a budget according to forms prescribed by the tax commission for town and school expenditures, and for this purpose to hold public hearings, notice of which shall be given at least seven days in advance. The budget committee shall consult the selectmen, school committee, and other town officers and departments as to the costs of government, revenue anticipated and services performed, and it shall be the duty of any town or school officer or employee to furnish information required by said committee. It shall also be the duty of all boards of selectmen and of school committees of each town to prepare and submit to the budget committee of the town an itemized statement of expected receipts and expenditures for the ensuing year at such time as said budget committee shall fix. When completed the budget shall be printed in the town report or separately and distributed or published in some newspaper printed or circulated in said town at least one week before the town or school meeting. In any town where a budget committee has not been authorized, the selectmen shall perform the duties of said committee in relation to town expenditures.

4. LIMITATIONS. So long as the provisions of this act shall remain in force in any town the total amount appropriated at any annual town or school meeting shall not exceed by more than ten per cent the total amount specified in the budget for town or school purposes and no appropriation shall be made for any purpose not included in said budget.

5. EXCEEDING APPROPRIATIONS. In towns adopting the provisions of this act, no board of selectmen, school board or other spending agency shall pay or agree to pay any money or incur any liability involving the expenditure of money for any purpose

for which an appropriation has not been made, or in excess of any appropriation or allotment made to it except for the purpose of paying judgments rendered against a town or school district, provided, however, that in case of sudden and unexpected emergency the selectmen may on application to the tax commission and the school board on application to the state board of education after hearing be given a certificate of emergency authorizing them to make such expenditure or incur such liability; provided, further, that in cases arising during the year following a town meeting where changes occur which make it unnecessary to use the amount appropriated for a specific purpose, an unexpended balance may be transferred by boards of selectmen or school boards from one appropriation to another, provided the total amount expended for all purposes does not exceed the total amount appropriated at town or school meetings for all purposes.

6. PENALTY. Any person or persons violating the provisions of the preceding section shall be subject to removal from office on proper petition brought before the superior court. Such petition shall take precedence of other actions pending in said court, and shall be heard and decided as speedily as possible.

7. TAKES EFFECT. All acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed and this act shall take effect upon its passage.
