#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Harrisville in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Eagle Hall in said Harrisville on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine forty-five of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertizing, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to be added to the amount now in the town treasury to complete the honor roll and to have a suitable dedication after it is completed.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$325.00 to purchase a wing to attach to the town truck for snow removal.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to clean and paint the interior of the library and selectmen's room, and to install a central heating plant using the discarded furnace once used at the tool house.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the short piece of road from Gilchrist's bridge toward Eastview.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any land acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deed.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the playground.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$385.00 for the purchase of a blade plow for snow removal.
- 12. To see if the town will accept, as a gift, the property of the Harrisville Association, Inc.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to publish an inventory of taxable property in the town.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to build a sand-shed and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$407.15 for T.R.A. work if the state will contribute \$1,628.61 and to see if the town will also vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,501.00 if the state will contribute \$6,004.00 for reconstruction of the state road through the town.
- 17. To see if the town will vote additional money to be used for taking proper care of the town dump.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to repair the fire-hole at the town dump and raise and appropriate money for the same.

- 19. To see if the town will vote to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.
- 20. To see what action the town will take toward improving part of the dirt road beginning at the Chesham school toward Harrisville and to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to lay aside sums of money from this year's appropriations for the Consolidated School using Chapter 35 of the sessions of 1945.
- 22. To hear reports of all town officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to make a re-appraisal of the town and to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 24. To take up any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit of the accounts of the Town of Harrisville covering the fiscal year ended December 31, 1946, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the town.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Balance Sheet—December 31, 1945—December 31, 1946: (Schedule A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1945 and December 31, 1946, are presented in Schedule A. As indicated therein a decrease in Surplus of \$2,254.41 took place during the year.

# Reconciliation of Change in Financial Condition:

(Schedule A-1)

An analysis of the change in the financial condition of the town during the year is contained in Schedule A-1. The factors which caused the decrease in Surplus are indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures— Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Schedules B & C)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended

December 31, 1946, are presented in Schedules B and C. As indicated by the budget summary a net overdraft of appropriations of \$2,421.25, less a net excess of actual over estimated revenues of \$215.53, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$2,205.72.

#### Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Schedule D)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1946, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is included in Schedule D.

#### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1946, is indicated in Schedule E.

#### TAX ACCOUNTS

Tax warrants for the levies of 1946, 1945 and 1944, and tax sale accounts for the levies of 1945 and previous years were examined. Summary statements indicating the activity in these accounts for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1946, are presented in Schedules F, G, H and I, respectively.

#### TOWN CLERK

The accounts and records of the town clerk were examined and audited. All funds received by the clerk on account of the issuance of motor vehicle permits and dog licenses were accounted for through remittances to the treasurer and fees retained. (Schedule J).

#### GENERAL COMMENTS

The accounts and records of all town officials were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Harrisville for their assistance during the course of the audit.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Harrisville:

I herein submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

One full year has passed since the end of actual combat in World War II. The end of the war has brought no relief to the deficiencies in the American public school system. The situation has become steadily more critical. The impending crisis demands action now.

An appraisal of American schools reveals many inadequacies in personnel, facilities and services that are necessary to meet the needs of children and the welfare of the nation.

Teachers leaving the profession since 1939 have formed the greatest vocational exodus in history. In relation to their numbers the loss to the profession has been more acute in the elementary schools and the rural areas have suffered most. A new policy of teachers salaries must be established with consideration for relative pay in other occupations. In 1944 the average annual pay for teachers was \$464.00 less than the average worker in private employment. If the fully qualified teachers received more pay than laborers the public schools would be staffed more adequately throughout the entire country.

Adequate health facilities and programs are non-existent in a very large proportion of rural schools. Sound health is the most valuable individual and national asset. Every child should be given complete physical examinations periodically followed by corrective measures. The health program should include organized outdoor sports and recreation for all children extended throughout the summer months.

More opportunities should be offered in the schools to practice various duties of citizenship. The financial tribute exacted by crime in general is great. Less than two percent of the population may be classed as criminal. The financial losses caused by this small percent of the population amounts to more than five times the sum spent annually for public education in the interest of all children.

Every child should have an opportunity to acquire in his school career some of the skills of a vocation including the arts of the kitchen, the sewing room and the shop. Courses in general science and more emphasis on individual hygiene are desirable in the upper grades of the elementary school. The school lunch program as operated by the United States Department of Agriculture and sponsored by the State Board of Education is a desirable project. This program has become a definite part of the day's work in many schools and is maintained as an educational need rather than a "feeding station."

The building committee for the new consolidated school in Harrisville has investigated quite carefully the facilities necessary for an enriched program. The selection of a spacious site for the Wells' Memorial School and playground with careful consideration for these recommended activities, as determined by the plans of the building itself, will insure good eduational opportunities for the children of this area in the years ahead.

# REPORT OF THE HARRISVILLE SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

In order to bring the town up to date with the progress of the Wells Memorial School project, the following report of the activities of the school building committee is submitted.

On April 25, 1946, the committee held a meeting at the home of Mrs. Turner to discuss what steps could be taken to advance the project. It was decided to have a meeting to discuss the school plans as soon as Mr. Wells returned in the spring. It was agreed that all the funds available for the school should be placed in one bank account. The possibility of using Federal Funds available to finance plans was discussed. Mr. Turner and Mr. Frye agreed to look into the matter. The advisability of having a survey made of the building lot was talked over.

On May 13, 1946 a meeting was held at the home of Mr. Wells. Building materials were discussed, and the committee expressed itself in favor of cinder block and brick construction. It was decided that a contract should be drawn with the architect. It was agreed that construction in 1946 was out of the question due to government regulations prohibiting all but construction of veteran's housing. Construction was also deemed unadvisable due to the unavailability of such vital materials as flooring and many other items.

On May 22, 1946, a meeting was held at Mr. Well's home with Mr. Paul Farnum, Field Director of the State Board of Education, present. The committee members in charge of the purchase of land, John Clark, Charles M. Bergeron, and John Colony, reported that the Johnson land had been purchased and a deed signed under the guidance of the school building committee council, Mr. Gardner Turner. The orientation of the school building on the land was discussed, also details of construction. Mr. Farnum gave the committee the benefit of his

advice on special features advised by the State Board of Education. It was decided to have the architect, Mr. Randlett, draw a new set of sketches to incorporate new ideas suggested. The committee planned a trip with Mr. Randlett to look over the Dublin, Fuller and Cleveland schools.

On July 17, 1946, Mr. Randlett submitted new plans at a committee meeting at Mr. Wells house. The new sketches were discussed and studied. It was decided to have the land surveyed and a contour map drawn by Mr. Reed Chaplin of Keene.

At a meeting at Mr. Well's house on Nov. 2, 1946 the committee agreed to authorize Attorney Turner to draw and sign a contract with the architect. It was agreed that the new plans should be sent to Mr. Farnum for his suggestions.

It was reported by Charles Bergeron, John Clark, and John Colony that test pits had been dug on the school land to discover the amount of ledge present. No ledge was discovered by this digging.

During the Fall, extensive land clearing work was done in preparation for the moving of the Johnson barn in the spring. The committee wishes to heartily thank those who worked so hard to get this job done; thereby saving considerable funds for the school project. Special thanks go to Charles Bergeron, John Clark, Leon Record, Jack Saari, John Johnson, Charlie Bergeron, Russell Clark, Alfred Dietze, John Silk and John Colony for their time and work.

On Jan. 31, 1947 a meeting was held in Harrisville with Mr. Farnum present to discuss school plans and the possibility of construction. Mr. Farnum advised strongly against any thought of building this year. He reported that although there are many towns throughout New Hampshire planning new schools, none but emergency construction will go ahead in the coming year. The State Tax Commissioner has gone on record with the State Department of Education, against any towns starting construction due to the high cost of materials for the quality received. The Tax Commission advises at least one year.

The committee is unanimously in favor of going ahead with construction as soon as it is possible. It was decided to

wait until mid-summer, unless building conditions change materially between now and then, at which time the matter will be looked into again. In the meantime the committee will continue its work on the plans so that everything possible can be done in preparation for the time when it will be possible to build.

### HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES—IT PAYS!

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. The importance and value of the work of the forest fire warden and his deputies is, perhaps, best appreciated during hazardous periods when fire danger is greatest. The public, however, looks to him at all times for speedy and economical suppression of going fires

To property fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matter of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record shows that an average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

### Remember these rules:

- 1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
- Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.
- 3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.
- 4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to
- 5. HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES—his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!
