ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill in the County of Grafton qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, 1951, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following matters:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk.
- Article 2. To hear the reports of the selectmen, treasurer, cemetery commissioners and any other town officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 3. To choose one selectman for the term of three years, a town treasurer, one or more highway agents, one or more auditors, one library trustee for the term of three years, one cemetery commissioner for the term of five years, one trustee of trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary town officers.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to contribute funds for the constitution of Class V highways as provided in Chapter 188, Part 13, Laws of 1945, and to raise and appropriate the sum required for this purpose.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the town, as recommended by the finance committee in its budget report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for the purposes so determined, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to issue interest-bearing notes or orders to provide for the current year's expenses in anticipation of taxes.
 - Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the

selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks by mail or at the time they examine the taxable property.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through the collector's deeds.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to appoint or elect a budget committee to supervise the appropriations of the town and to recommend to the next annual meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 10. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SELECTMEN

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of the Town of Haverhill:

We herein submit our report for the year ending December 31, 1950. Our detailed statement will be found on the following pages of this annual report.

The Town books have been audited by D. R. Newbold and William Slight, Town Auditors, and found to be in excellent condition.

The increased costs throughout this past year in all phases of operation in Town Business have been a constant worry to your Selectmen. A constant check has been maintained to try to keep the expenses as low as possible. These increased costs were impossible to anticipate at the time of the Budget Meeting last February. It will be noted in the Treasurer's Report the balance due each school district as their budgets do not close until June 31st instead of December 31st.

The final coat of paint has been applied to the Town Hall which has restored that building to fine repair. It has also been necessary to build a stairway to the balcony and there are plans to add another this year to meet fire regulations.

During this past year the question of Civilian Defense has been growing in importance. Mr. A. P. Hill of Woodsville, has been appointed Director for this Town and has received excellent cooperation from the other communities of the Town and their Defense Leaders. Mr. Earl E. Wells, of Lynn, Mass., has cooperated wonderfully with the local leaders in giving the use of his land and electricity for the Observation Post in the Town. His letter to the Selectmen showed wholehearted understanding of the cause and was certainly appreciated by them. You will find in this year's Warrant an Article dealing with the expense of Civilian Defense.

We feel deeply the passing of George E. Mann and C. L. Bailey of Woodsville, who were both outstanding in Public Service to their Community and to the Town.

Activities

The activity program consisted of the following: Physical education for both the boys and the girls on voluntary basis: touch football, outdoor and indoor basketball; softball, baseball and track. In the fall of 1950, the annual school play was put on by Mr. Frank Woodward and Mrs. Arlie Covell. This year it was "The Family Doctor."

The records of the basketball teams were as follows: Boys. coached by Mr. Robert Perry, won 8 and lost 10. The girls, coached by Miss Lois Litz, won 12 and lost none, again being undefeated in the regular season play, although they did lose one to North Stratford in the post-season game at the Littleton Carnival.

In baseball, coached by Mr. Robert Perry, the boys won 3 and lost 6. In track, coached by Mr. Anatole Pendo, the boys again participated in the Y.M.C.A. meet at Lancaster and Blood, Crawford, Bolos, Batjiaka garnered valuable points for Woodsville High.

Curriculum

In September, 1950, upon the recommendation of Principal A. G. Pendo to the Superintendent Phil Bennett and the School Board, Woodsville High went on the so-called "one-session" day, class periods being 45 minutes. The opening of the school was changed from 9:00 A.M. to 8:30 A.M. Classes continued through to 11:30 A.M. From 11:30 A.M. to 12:00 noon there was lunch period. Classes again went into session at 12:00 noon and continued until 2:15 P.M. Because of their being under both systems, the three upper classes were surveyed, on January 5, 1951, for preference as to either the old double-session or the new single-session with the resulting vote of 84 to 8 in favor of the new system. The following reasons, in order of value to the students were given: (1) it gave them more leisure time, (2) it gave them more time for studying and athletics, and (3) it gave them more time to work at home.

Strange as it may seem, a comparison of the tardy records for the old and the new systems, show this, that up to January 2, 1950 (old system) when school began at 9:00 A.M. there were 125 tardy cases; the same period, up to January 2, 1951 (one-session) when school began at 8:30 there were only 28 tardy cases. Incidentally, most students didn't go home at 11:30 (lunch period), therefore it aided materially in keeping down the tardy cases.

Lunch was provided by the Home Economics Department, for all students who wanted it, for the price of 25 cents each. About half of the students in the school bought hot lunch while the other half brought their own.

Personally and from specific evidence at hand, I seriously feel that the one-session day has been one of the great transitional changes to come to Woodsville High in many a year.

General Information

On the faculty, Miss Florence Flint replaced Mrs. Katherine Hatch in the commercial department. Art was dropped from the curriculum.

Through the efforts of the Superintendent and the School Board, and the courtesy of Taylor's Chevrolet; a half-year Driver Education course was put in, with Mr. Robert Perry being the instructor. Twenty students took the Driver Education course which proved to be of considerable value to those students who will some day be driving their own cars and who will be safer drivers on the highways.

The Cycle, the quarterly publication, was issued by the Commercial Department under the guidance of Miss Florence Flint and Mr. Timothy Connor. The yearbook, "The Engineer," was published by the Senior Class under the supervision of Mr. Timothy Connor. Many thanks are herein expressed to the business men and other people of this and surrounding communities for their contributions, without whose help the publishing of this yearbook could not be possible.

The sincere, conscientious, and efficient efforts of Superintendent Phil Bennett and of the School Board to help and improve Woodsville High whenever help was necessary, has always been a source of constant pride and pleasure to me, and as the school years go on this interest in progress is producing tangible results, which are evident in daily living of the school and that of its graduates.

Teachers and Pupils

The teaching staff began the school year of 1950-1951 with three new members. These teachers replaced Mrs. Hatch at the High School, Miss Bishop at the Graded School, and Mrs. Perry at Kindergarten.

Miss Florence Flint, of Jackson, N. H., a graduate of the University of N. H., was employed to teach commerce at Woodsville High School. Mrs. Phyllis Streeter of Wells River, Vermont, a graduate of Lyndon Teachers College, was employed to teach Grade III at Woodsville Grade School, and Mrs. Mildred Stockheimer of Woodsville, a Plymouth Teachers' College graduate, to teach the kindergarten.

These teachers have had previous teaching experience. Miss Flint taught one year in New York State; Mrs. Streeter five years at Springfield. Vermont, and Mrs. Stockheimer eleven years in New Hampshire, including eight years in the elementary school in Woodsville.

Buildings and Grounds

Building maintenance, including minor repairs, continues under the efficient handling of the two custodians, Charles George and Francis Rock.

The lighting program was continued, and fluorescent

lights were installed in the 1st and 2nd grade rooms. This completes such installation in all classrooms at both buildings.

The High School assembly room was redecorated, as well as the walls of the domestic science and other basement rooms. All floors were resealed and refinished, and both boilers were recoated for better insulation.

At the Graded School, the first grade room was completely redecorated; the basements were refinished, and all floors of the building were treated. Four rooms had chalk boards refinished in green, which not only relieved eye strain but added to the attractiveness of the rooms. A new fence was creeted between the school yard and the property of F. C. O'Malley. A new door frame and surrounding brick work was installed at the south entrance of the building.

New moveable seat and desk units have been purchased for the first grade room, which will make this one of the best equipped rooms of the district.

General Information

The district was fortunate in having the services, in December, of a Federal Fluoride Unit, sponsored by the U.S. Public Health Department. This unit was located at the Woodsville Graded School building from November 13 to January 5th and to which approximately 125 pupils in Grades I through VII came for treatment. Each child had a cleaning and four fluoride applications to its teeth free of charge.

Conclusion

May I take you for a moment, as a concluding thought for this report, to look outside our district borders and view four specific tasks which triumphant faith in education has imposed on our schools during the past 150 years, as expressed by H. Commager of Columbia University. THE FIRST AND GREATEST TASK was to provide an enlightened citizenry in order that self government might work. With independence the problem of self-government became urgent. "To be long-lived," as Benjamin Rush observed, "republics must invest in education."

Has our investment succeeded? None can doubt that it has. Americans have, in short, made democracy work. Through all their history they elected some mediocre presidents but never a wicked or a dangerous one; they revealed in every crisis an ability to select able leaders. Only a people taught self-government could record these achievements.

THE SECOND GREAT TASK IMPOSED upon education and on the schools—the creation of national unity—was equally difficult.

We created unity out of diversity, nationalism out of particularism. These were the contribution of poets and novelists, editors and naturalists, historians and jurists, orators and painters—and the medium through which they worked was the school. These men gave to Americans, old and new alike, a people's common language with which to voice a people's common heritage:

"God sifted a whole nation that He might send choice grain over into this wilderness; As for me. give me liberty or give me death; If they mean to have a war, let it begin here; One if by land, and two if by sea; These are the times that try men's souls; I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country."

And then there were the songs and the pictures, too. In school and lyceum, children came to learn and remember at least snatches of the "Concord Hymn" or "Old Ironsides" or the "Midnight Ride of Paul Revere."

THE THIRD TASK IMPOSED ON EDUCATION, and particularly on the public schools, was that which we call Americanization. Each decade after 1840 saw from two to eight million immigrants pour into America.

THERE IS A FOURTH AND FINAL SERVICE the schools have rendered the cause of American democracy. This most heterogeneous of modern societies has ever seemed the most easy prey to forces of riotous privilege and ruinous division. These forces have not prevailed; they have been routed, above all, in the schoolrooms and on the playgrounds of America. In the classroom, the nation's children have lived and learned equality. On the playground and the athletic field, the same code has ruled. Who can seriously doubt that the cause of democracy is served when it is a Murphy, a Schwartz, a Groglio or a Levitsky that the cheering stands applaud?

If through the 19th and well into the 20th Century, American schools performed such magnificent service, the question remains: Do they still serve the nation well?

In a day of specialization schools are called on more and more to prepare not so much for life, citizenship or democracy as for particular tasks and competences.

Schools reflect the society they serve. Many of the failures we ascribe to contemporary education are in fact failures of our society as a whole.

For a century and a half American schools have served and strengthened the commonwealth. If society clearly defines the new duties it wishes our schools to fulfill and if it steadfastly supports them not only with money but also with faith, they will surely justify that faith in the future as they have in the past.

The acknowledgment of my appreciation to the teachers; to the School Board, collectively and individually; as well as to the citizens of the district, for their continued cooperation and support is hereby gratefully expressed.

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Haverhill qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the 13th day of March, 1951, at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of a school lunch program.
- 10. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for fire escapes for the North Haverhill School building and for Haverhill Academy.
- 11. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the support of a Dental Clinic.
- 12. To see if the District will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to be applied to unanticipated expenses.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD HAVERHILL, N. H.

We, the undersigned members of the Haverhill School Board wish to submit the following report:

Minor repairs and replacements were made at the Academy Building, Alumni Hall and the several Elementary Schools this year. The repairs and refinishing were done by Clyde Foote and Ralph Rogers of North Haverhill and the janitors at the various schools. During the Board's inspection of the buildings last Spring it was found that a new shelter and steps should be constructed at the rear entrance of Alumni Hall. The contract for this work was made with George Lavoic of Haverhill and was completed this Fall. This shelter is a fine improvement for the Alumni Hall; a good protection in time of storms, prevents crowding at the doorway and keeps out much cold.

A much needed second-hand, reconditioned piano has replaced the old one at Alumni Hall. Two new typewriters were purchased for the Commercial Department so that the Personal Typewriting course could be carried out. A new sewing machine was requested and purchased for the Domestic Science Department.

The students of the Academy are having the benefit of the Auto Driving Course for one-half of the school year. New teeterboards were purchased for all the Elementary Schools and were greatly appreciated.

At the Pike School, the chain link fence was continued which encloses the playground and gives the children a much larger and safer space in which to play.

Due to the fact that there is a scarcity of dentists, the Dental Clinic was not held this year but transportation was furnished by the buses for the pupils of the Elementary grades to attend the Federal Dental Fluorine Clinic at Woodsville.

The Board wishes to make clear in the minds of parents the Elementary School Entrance Requirements, therefore, we state below the policy which has been adopted by the Board as of September 7, 1950 in this regard:

To enter first grade in the Haverhill Elementary Schools, a child must reach his sixth birthday by January 1 of the year of entrance with the following exceptions:

- (1) That the child may enter during his fifth year of age if he has attended, and satisfactorily completed, a year of kindergarten, and
- (2) has the physical development of a normal six-year old child, and
- (3) has the mental age of six years or more.

The matter of inadequate fire protection in some of the schools has been called to our attention by the Fire Marshal and with the hope that the necessary precautions will be taken, an article has been added to the School Warrant.

We wish to call attention to the annual reports of the School Superintendent, Mr. Phil A. Bennett, and the Headmaster of Haverhill Academy, Mr. Friend Jenkins.

The attention of the taxpayers and voters of the District is directed to the Budget covering the fiscal school year beginning July 1, 1951, which has been carefully prepared and which shows an increase over the current year of about \$4,000. This increase is due to the fact that it will be necessary to raise the salaries of all teachers, amounting to \$3,300, and to the higher cost of supplies and equipment.

The retiring member of the Board is Mrs. Gladys P. Pike of Pike.

Teachers and Pupils

A very small change in the teaching personnel occurred this year. Three replacements were necessary, all at Haverhill Corner. Miss Pauline Wright of Lisbon replaced Mrs. Ashley in Grades HI-V. At the Academy, Miss Margaret Rock of Lebanon, N. H., and Maurice Bowler of Peterboro, N. H., replaced Mrs. Evans and Mr. Dart in Commerce and Science respectively. All three new staff members hold a B. of Ed. degree, the Misses Wright and Rock from Plymouth Teachers College, Class of 1950, and Mr. Bowler from Keene Teachers College, Class of 1950. Mr. Bowler is also the coach of boys' athletics.

The total pupil enrollment of 370 in 1949-1950 is now 347. This drop off is caused by a definite decrease at Pike, there being 27 as compared to 55 pupils last year. The Haverhill Corner enrollment of 90 causes an overcrowded condition to continue to exist in the three small rooms available.

Buildings and Grounds

Quite extensive repairs were made to several buildings during the summer. Roofing was laid on the Center Haverhill building; some painting was done in various rooms of all other buildings: repairs and re-roofing of the cupola on Pearson Hall were done and a vestibule built at the side entrance of Alumni Hall.

New playground equipment was erected at North Haverhill, Center Haverhill, Haverhill Corner, and at Pike. At Pike, also, a hazardous condition was eliminated by the erection of a steel link fence from the building to the fence previously erected on the side of the playground paralleling the highway.

General Information

An item meriting special praise is that of a hot lunch program, sponsored by a group of ladies at North Haverhill, and made possible through the cooperation of the trustees of the Church. Mrs. Morrill, at Center Haverhill, also serves a hot dish at noon. Every district in this supervisory union now has a school lunch program, although not every school. It is hoped that this project will be adopted by the other communities.

The district was fortunate in having the services of a Federal Fluoride Unit, sponsored by the U. S. Public Health Department. This unit was located at the Woodsville Graded school building from November 13 to January 5th and to which 163 Haverhill pupils in Grades I through VI came for treatment. Each child had a cleaning and four fluoride applications to its teeth free of charge.

Conclusion

May I take you for a moment, as a concluding thought for this report, to look outside our district borders and view four specific tasks which triumphant faith in education has imposed on our schools during the past 150 years, as expressed by H. Commager of Columbia University. THE FIRST AND GREATEST TASK was to provide an enlightened citizenry in order that self government might work. With independence the problem of self-government became urgent. "To be long-lived," as Benjamin Rush observed, "republics must invest in education."

Has our investment succeeded? None can doubt that it has. Americans have, in short, made democracy work. Through all their history they elected some mediocre presidents but never a wicked or a dangerous one; they revealed in every crisis an ability to select able leaders. Only a people taught self-government could record these achievements.

THE SECOND GREAT TASK imposed upon education and on the schools—the creation of national unity—was equally difficult.

We created unity out of diversity, nationalism out of particularism. These were the contribution of poets and novelist, editors and naturalists, historians and jurists, orators and painters—and the medium through which they worked was the school. These men gave to Americans, old and new alike, a people's common language with which to voice a people's common heritage:

"God sifted a whole nation that He might send choice grain over into this wilderness; As for me, give me liberty or give me death; If they mean to have a war, let it begin here; One if by land, and two if by sea; These are the times that try men's souls; I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country."

And then there were the songs and the pictures, too. In school and lyceum, children came to learn and remember at least snatches of the "Concord Hymn" or "Old Ironsides" or the "Midnight Ride of Paul Revere."

THE THIRD TASK IMPOSED ON EDUCATION, and particularly on the public schools, was that which we call Americanization. Each decade after 1840 saw from two to eight million immigrants pour into America.

THERE IS A FOURTH AND FINAL SERVICE the schools have rendered the cause of American democracy. This most heterogeneous of modern societies has ever seemed the most easy prey to forces of riotous privilege and ruinous division. These forces have not prevailed; they have been routed, above all, in the school-rooms and on the playgrounds of America. In the classroom, the nation's children have lived and learned equality. On the playground and the athletic field, the same code has ruled. Who can seriously doubt that the cause of democracy is served when

it is a Murphy, a Schwartz, a Groglio or a Levitsky that the cheering stands applaud?

If, through the 19th and well into the 20th Century, American schools performed such magnificent service, the question remains: do they still serve the nation well?

In a day of specialization schools are called on more and more to prepare not so much for life, citizenship or democracy as for particular tasks and competences.

Schools reflect the society they serve. Many of the failures we ascribe to contemporary education are in fact failures of our society as a whole.

For a century and a half American schools have served and strengthened the commonwealth. If society clearly defines the new duties it wishes our schools to fulfill and if it steadfastly supports them not only with money but also with faith, they will surely justify that faith in the future as they have in the past.

Your attention is directed to the reports of Mr. Swan, Chairman of the School Board, and of Headmaster Jenkins for other administrative details.

The acknowledgment of my appreciation to the teachers; to the School Board, collectively and individually; as well as to the citizens of the district, for their continued cooperation and support is hereby gratefully expressed.

The total enrollment to date for the school year 1950-1951 is ninety-one. The resident address of the ninety-one pupils show that there are from—

Six have left school to date leaving a present enrollment of eighty-five. There are sixteen tuition pupils.

Diplomas were awarded to the following graduates in June:

Erland Ames, Dorothy Bruce, Patricia Clark, Marcia Gay, Edith Hall, Leslie Kimball, Patricia Maxfield, Roland Moore, Merrill Sawyer, and Robert Swan.

Scholarship honors were won by Edith Hall, Leslie Kimball, Patricia Maxfield, and Marcia Gay in the order named. The Scholarship, Loyalty, and Achievement Medal was won by Leslie Kimball.

The usual program of extra-curricula activities has been carried on. The boys basketball team won the league championship and an invitation to the state tournament where they dropped their opening game to a strong Charlestown team by one point. The baseball team won second place in the league losing but one game. The glee club of fortyfour voices took part in the baccalaureate services and commencement program in June and also presented a Christmas cantata at the close of the fall term. There were fifty-seven voices in the cantata. Three semi-formal dances, the annual junior prom, the senior reception dance, and sophomore hop were held in addition to several party dances. William Pike and Connie Willis represented the school at the annual Boys State and Girls State respectively held at the University during the summer vacation. The Rotary and Lions Clubs were the sponsoring organizations.

Driver Education has been added to the program of studies. The course is offered for a half year. Stated in somewhat general terms, the objectives of the course are:

- 1. To create a conscientious sense of social responsibility in drivers
 - 2. To set up standards of safe sportsmanlike driving
- 3. To equip drivers with the information, skills, practices, and habits needed for such driving
 - 4. To orient the driver and pedestrian to the motor age
- 5. To reduce traffic emergencies and accidents to a minimum

Any pupil fifteen years of age or over is eligible for the course. At the end of the course the State Motor Vehicle Department gives each member of the class a written and road test. Those passing the tests are given their private operator's license provided they are sixteen and those under sixteen receive their license upon becoming sixteen. Twenty

members of the school are taking the course. Since not all who want to take the course can, owing to the limitations of the daily timetable and insufficient number of instructors available, preference is given to the upper classes. The dual-control car used in the course is being furnished through the courtesy of the H. O. Taylor Chevrolet Company. We herein gratefully express our appreciation of Mr. Taylor's generosity.

Again I wish to express my appreciation for the continued cooperation of all connected with the school.

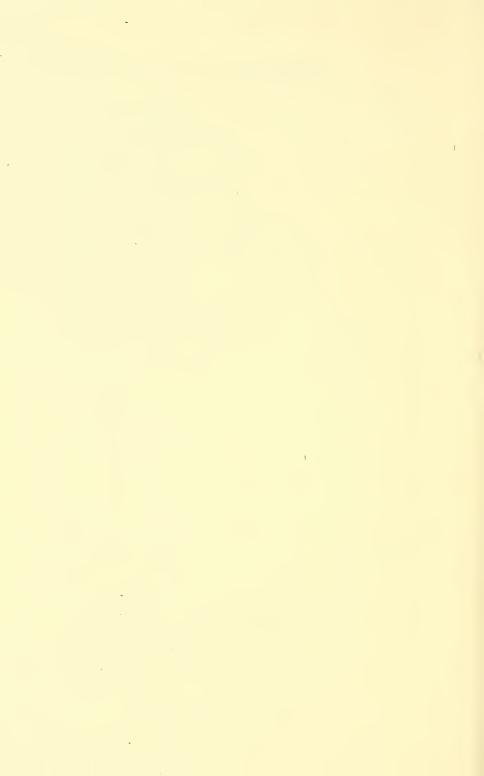

Gentlemen:

On behalf of the State, I desire to express my thanks to the people of the Town of Haverhill and publicly to indicate the profound appreciation I have for the steady and complete cooperation which your Board and the people of the Town have given me, and the National Guard of New Hampshire, in connection with the procurement of an armory site, the organization of a military unit, and its maintenance in the Town.

This has been an accomplishment of no small dimensions, requiring the demonstration in tangible manner of the real interest of the people of the community in national defense. The Town of Haverhill presented the State a wonderful site for a State Armory, one which in my judgment is more beautiful in its location than any other in the State. It is my intention and earnest hope that, at the earliest possible opportunity, upon which Federal funds become available to match those already on hand in the Department, to undertake the construction of an armory building proper on the reservation at North Haverhill.

Beyond this important assistance, however, the Town has continuously manifested its interest in various other ways, such as by turning out in large numbers regularly to observe the training of the unit, and by assisting the officers and men in their recruiting efforts. I have been so delighted with the affection, and the interest taken by the people of the Town of Haverhill in the Heavy Mortar Company, of the 195th Infantry Regiment, of our National Guard of New Hampshire, that I approached the editors of the "Life Magazine" a short time ago and proposed that it would be highly interesting to the readers of that great magazine, both from a written and a pictorial standpoint, if a special feature could be written around the National Guard unit in Haverhill and the interest in which the Town takes in this, "Its Own" military unit. While nothing as yet has developed with respect to this suggestion, it is my hope that sometime it will be possible to accomplish it.

With many thanks to you, the members of the Board of Selectmen, and to all the good people of Haverhill for their fine demonstration of patriotism far above the requirements normally made upon the people of a community, I am
