• THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town's Meeting House in said Henniker, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To choose a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

4. To hear and act upon reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, and other committees.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of its State Aid and Trunk Line roads.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500 for the support of the Public Health Nursing Association, or take any action relative thereto.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, in addition to that required by law, for the support of Tucker Free Library.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action relative thereto.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense during the ensuing year of providing and maintaining hydrant service for the extinguishing of fires.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to reinsure the town buildings.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.

14. To see what action the town will take to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister Rust, raise money for same, or take any action relative thereto.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for observance of Old Home Day or take any action relative thereto.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the improvement of the Goss Cemetery, so called, or take any action relative thereto.

17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a truck for town work, exchange the old one, raise money for same, or take any action relative thereto.

18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward paying its indebtedness.

19. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to rebuilding some of its bridges, raise money for same, or take any action relative thereto.

20. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting and raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the same.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

I herewith submit my report for the year ending January 31, 1930. From March 11 I have collected and sent four samples of Henniker Spring Water to the State Laboratory of Hygiene, and all were reported good. There has been no epidemic of contagious diseases, but there has been reported eighteen cases of influenza, and one each of scarlet fever, measles, and mumps.

During the summer have received nine certificates from children who had been vaccinated against small pox.

I examined a nursery and the hospital and found everything in first class condition.

Among the guests were Miss Helen Cogswell of Concord, and Miss Blanchard also of Concord, librarian of Concord Library. Every child received a present from Miss Sawyer, who also presented Mrs. Paimenter with a beautitul set of book ends. The "Library Reading Club" presented to Miss Sawyer a large bouquet of carnations and a vote of thanks for her kindness. This year Miss Sawyer left the sum of \$30.00 in like manner and also organized the Club, instructing the members in election of officers and how to conduct their meetings according to parliamentary rules, and with Mrs. Parmenter's help they are doing very creditable work.

Miss Sawyer has taken a great interest in the young people and never misses an opportunity to help them all.

Mrs. Alice V. Colby presented two books of fiction.

Mr. John F. Gove of Bedford gave a Memorial History of Boston, Mass., in 4 volumes. This history covers a period of years from 1630-1880.

Another very interesting and valuable gift is from Miss Clara Brady and Mrs. Elizabeth Connelly and consists of nine volumes of clippings of Henniker News items from the Henniker Courier, beginning with the year 1880. The Board of Water Commissioners herewith submit their sixteenth annual report:

Pumping Station

From January 1, 1929 to January 1, 1930, 11,137.690 gallons of water were pumped into the reservoir. This represents an increase over the same period for 1928 of 3,118,439 gallons. These figures should bring forcibly to the attention of subscribers the absolute necessity for considerable care with regard to the matter of thoughtless and unnecessary waste of water. Only serious attention to this matter will keep the consumption of water, with its attendant increase in pumping cost, and the danger of exhaustion of the wells in periods of drought, within reason.

It is gratifying to note that the per cent of attendance in all but two of the Henniker schools exceeds the State average of 94%. The Brick school can be commended for an unusually fine record in this respect. The Quaker Street and Hemlock Corner schools, on the other hand, have a poor record of attendance. In the matter of tardiness, the elementary grades of Henniker village, the Brick school, and the Quaker Street school have very commendable records. The Hemlock Corner school has less than half as many tardinesses as the year before, and still there is room for improvement. The Westboro Corner school, on the other hand, has 2.4 tardinesses per pupil, while the record in 1927-28 was 1.1 per pupil. Our High School reports more tardinesses per pupil than any other high school in the State for 1928-1929. Because of this unfortunate record, the Commissioner of Education withheld his approval of the school for the present year until the close of the fall term, when an improved record was shown and approval granted.

OUR SCHOOL BUILDINGS

The Proposed New High School

For our new building, the gift of the late Leander Cogswell, preliminary plans are being made, and it seems likely to become a reality in the near future. The executors, named as a building committee, have stated emphatically that they propose to build a school that will come as near satisfying the desires of the people of Henniker as their limit of \$90,000 will allow. No specific details regarding the arrangement of rooms, etc., are definitely settled as yet.

Our Elementary Schools

Coming from a neighboring state where for several years a campaign to improve rural schools has been in progress, I find many indications that some parts of New Hampshire are not keeping up with the procession in the matter of making their one-room schools comfortable and pleasant. Henniker has made much commendable progress in improving its buildings during the past few years, especially by installing modern chemical toilets and playground equipment. In a few particulars, however, our schools do not yet meet the requirements for State approval. In order to make this criticism more specific, I am quoting here in full the regulations for the approval of school buildings in New Hampshire, as issued by the State Board of Education in 1922.

Regulations for the Approval of Schoolhouses

1. Lighting shall be principally from the pupils' left and rear and no windows shall be permitted in the front of any schoolroom. The ratio of window area to floor area shall be not less than one to five. Ceilings shall be write or light cream color, and curtains of a light tint shall be provided wherever needed.

2. Equipment for heating must be adequate to furnish a minimum temperature of 68 degrees and some provision must be made for ventilation without direct draft on the pupils.

3. Floors must be in good condition and oiled or swept with damp sawdust or some dust-laying compound. Walls must be in good repair and painted some light color. Papered walls have only temporary approval.

4. Toilets must be decent and in sanitary condition. They must be located in buildings free from obscene markings and furnishing proper privacy. The vaults must be fly-proof and properly ventilated. The seats should be provided with covers and in the boys' toilet a double seat or urinal should be provided. Single toilets for both sexes will not be approved except for small schools and then only if their entrance is from the schoolroom only.

5. Water for drinking must be provided in properly covered receptacles with faucet or bubbler. Facilities for washing hands must also be provided. Common towels or drinking cups are prohibited by regulations of the State Board of Health.

6. Every schoolhouse must be provided, as required by law, with a flag and the proper means for displaying it.

7. This list of minimum requirements is intended to cover only such changes as are necessary to make schoolhouses decent and safe for the pupils. Each district should adopt a progressive plan of schoolhouse betterment.

8. It is the duty of the school board to see that all schoolhouses are properly cleaned and that they are kept in clean and sanitary condition by suitable janitor service. Vaults should be cleaned at least twice each year and dry earth or some effective absorbent provided for constant use. Proper care of school buildings is as essential to their approval as their construction. A visit to the various school buildings in Henniker with the above points in mind would reveal the fact that our schools measure up very well in almost all points except the first one on the list. The most glaring defect of our school buildings as they stand is the presence of cross lighting (irom windows on both sides of the room) and the location of blackboards between windows, which is especially trying to the eyes. The Quaker Street school is the only building in town which is free from these objectionable features.

INSTRUCTION IN OUR SCHOOLS

It is difficult to describe clearly and briefly what goes on in school, and most parents have only a hazy notion of the processes of modern education. Instruction, however, is the thing for which we pay taxes, and as the fundamental aim of the whole school system, deserves some space in this report.

Reading is the first and most important single subject taught in our schools. Recent studies by psychologists have shown that there are distinct differences between oral reading and silent reading, and that each of these processes should be thoroughly taught in school. It is also true that the habit of moving lips (i. e., whispering the words) while reading silently, is a serious hindrance because it prevents rapid reading. Teachers today give emphasis to proper enunciation and expression in oral reading, also to drill on meanings of words and sentences, and to training in getting the thought quickly from textbooks in history, geography, etc. Even an occasional reading lesson from the arithmetic textbook is helpful, for much of the difficulty pupils have in solving problems can be traced to imperfect understanding of what they read.

Music is a subject not often classed among the "fundamentals." but one which deserves more systematic attention than it is apt to receive, especially in rural schools. This year a regular music supervisor has charge of the music teaching at the Central school. For the rural schools, new music textbooks have been purchased, and in most of them music has a regular place on the school program.

No matter how thoroughly a subject has been mastered, time will help one to forget it; and practice is necessary to keep it fresh in mind. This truth is sometimes forgotten by high school teachers, who deplore the poor spelling, arithmetic, and punctuation of their pupils but who have often neglected to attempt a cure. This year, definite time is being devoted each week to drill on these and other fundamental subjects. The new high school report card also recognizes the requirement of good usage in order to receive a mark higher than D.

In order to assist teachers in solving their problems, a series of meetings for discussion and study is being held this year. The rural teachers of Henniker deserve credit for their willingness to travel several miles to attend these meetings. The high school teachers are also ready to take the trips to Weare or Contoocook for an after-school meeting with other high school teachers. Each teacher is given the opportunity to attend three of these meetings during the year. Another institution which is proving helpful to teachers is the professional library, circulated from the superintendent's office. This consists of recent books and magazines dealing with school and classroom problems. Over sixty volumes are now in circulation among the fifty-one teachers in the union.

Recommendations for the Coming Year

(1) Less tardiness

The co-operation of parents is earnestly urged, that we may cut down the amount of tardiness which has existed, and of which we should honestly be ashamed.

(2) Remodeling of one school building

In order that the requirements quoted on a previous page shall be eventually met, it seems to me a desirable policy for Henniker to center its efforts on improving, as thoroughly as possible, one school building each year. I suggest that the Westboro Corner school should be chosen for special improvement this year. Moving the windows from the right to the left side of the pupils (leaving one on the right for ventilation), providing additional blackboard space on the right, refinishing the interior a light color, and providing chemical toilets are the chief needs in this school.

(3) A macadamized road to the Central School building

Those parents and children who must drive or wade at

times through the deep mud between Western Avenue and our village school, will appreciate the need of a better highway there. I realize that such an improvement is not to be made with school funds, but I am mentioning it here in order to bring it to the attention of the voters of the town.

CONCLUSION

I am glad of this opportunity to express my appreciation of the generous co-operation I have received during the past year from pupils, teachers, school board members and other citizens.
