## Town Warrant

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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kingston, N. H. in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Kingston on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,600.00 for tarvia.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$308.44 and the State will contribute \$1,233.76 to be used on Class 5 roads.
5. On petition of Eugene Prescott and others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to repair and tarvia Little River Road.
6. On petition of Walter H. Chubbuck and Eugene Nason, and others to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 to dig a fire well on the West Kingston Road, between Eugene Nason's and Walter Chubbuck's, they agreeing to give the land to the Town.

7. On petition of Henry E. Smith and others, to see if the Town will vote to install a light on the curve between Charles Jasper's and Leon Collins' on the West Kingston Road, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

8. On petition of Roland W. Cheney and others, to see if the Town will vote to purchase a new dump truck, and raise and appropriate money for same.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Memorial Day.

10. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money to paint the Town Hall.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum not to exceed \$16,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

**REPORT OF TOWN MEETING, MARCH 12, 1940**

Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Edward B. Clark, at 9:15 A. M. and the Warrant was read.

Prayer was offered by Rev. E. Ray Burchell, pastor of the Congregational Church.

Voted to keep the polls open until 7 P. M.

Art. 1. The Town proceeded to elect the Town Officers, by Australian Ballot, and vote for National Delegates.

The polls closed for voting at 7 P. M.

Town Meeting was called to order at 8:15 P. M. for the purpose of voting upon the articles in the warrant.

The recommendations of the Finance Committee were read as follows:

Article 2. Recommended that the sum of \$20,799.70 be appropriated to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 3. Recommended that the sum of \$2,500.00 be appropriated for tarvia.

Article 4. Recommended that the Town appropriate the sum of \$294.37 and the State contribute \$1,177.50 to be used on class 5 roads.

Article 5. Recommended the Town appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Tarvia to be used on the road from the residence of Fred Kelley to the residence of Daniel Swett.

Article 6. Recommended that the Town appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for a culvert to be put in on the Thorne Road at the bridge.

Article 7. Recommended that the Town raise the sum of \$250.00 for the purpose of building a fire well at

some point on the Newton Junction road, with an amendment that special effort be made to procure construction as a W. P. A. project.

Article 8. It is the opinion of the Finance Committee that the repairs to the culvert at the junction of the Haverhill road and Mill street is a State Highway proposition, and they recommend that the Selectmen contact the State Highway Department relative to such.

Article 9. Recommended that the Town appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 10. Recommended that article 10 be passed as written.

Article 11. Recommended that article 11 be indefinitely postponed.

Article 12. Recommended that article 12 be laid on the table.

Article 13. Recommended that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow the sum of \$16,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 2. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,149.70 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for tarvia.

Art. 4. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$294.37 and the State will contribute \$1,177.50 to be used on class 5 roads.

Art. 5. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be used for Tarvia on the road running from the residence of Fred Kelley to the residence of Daniel Swett.

Art. 6. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be used to install a culvert on Thorne road at the bridge.

Art. 7. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the construction of a fire well on the Newton Junction road; said sum, or any part thereof, to be expended, after an attempt has been made by the Selectmen, to procure the construction of said fire well as a W. P. A. project.

Art. 8. Voted that the Selectmen contact the State Highway Department relative to the repair of the culvert at the junction of the Haverhill Road and Mill Street.

Art. 9. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

Art. 10. Voted that the Town authorize the Selectmen, in behalf of the Town, to request the State of New Hampshire, and its appropriate agencies, to construct, repair and control the Trickling Falls dam in East Kingston on the Powwow River, in order to restore Trickling Falls Lake, so-called, in the Towns of East Kingston and Kingston, thereby conserving, protecting, developing and enhancing the present as well as the potential, natural and recreational resources of the said towns and State and also thereby otherwise promoting the benefits and welfare of this State, and cooperate with the State in this undertaking. Amendment voted that a committee of property owners be appointed to establish a high water line.

Art. 11. Voted to indefinitely postpone this article, relating to a vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division

and to make an appropriation to cover the cost of such audit.

Art. 12. Voted to lay on the table article 12 relating to a vote to see if the Town will buy the original town grant now in Exeter, and appropriate money for the same.

Art. 13. Voted that the Selectmen and Treasurer be authorized to borrow a sum, not to exceed \$16,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 14. Voted that the Selectmen be permitted to sell land, formerly owned by Angus Morrison, now owned by the Town, to a Mrs. Stewart.

Voted that the Moderator appoint a chairman of the committee to be in charge of Memorial Day exercises.

Voted that the Town accept the sum of \$5,000.00 left by the late Daniel J. Bakie, said sum to be placed in care of the Trustees of the Trust Fund, and that proper resolutions accepting the gift, be spread upon the pages of the records.

Voted that in the future the vital statistics be published in the Annual Reports, and that the 1939 vital statistics be published in the Reports for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1941.

Voted to return to Article 1, at 9:45.

The New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Department request that we again call attention to the following:

### Synopsis of Fire Permit Laws

Penalty for kindling a fire without a permit, \$200, or imprisonment not more than thirty days.

Penalty for kindling a fire wilfully, or in a careless or imprudent manner, \$500, or imprisonment not more than one year.

No person shall kindle a fire upon the land of another without permission from the owner, agent or caretaker thereof.

No person shall kindle a fire or burn any material in or near woodlands, pasture, brush, sprout, waste or cut-over lands, except when the ground is covered with snow, without the written permission of the Forest Fire Warden or the presence of the warden or person designated to superintend such burning.

Any person, firm or corporation causing or kindling a fire without a permit, when a permit is required, and also any person, by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents any fire shall be caused, is liable to the town for all expenses incurred in attending or extinguishing such fire.

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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Kingston, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 8th day of March, 1941, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school Board in its annual report.

9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the construction, from the Bakie Fund of Fifteen Thousand Dollars, of a grade school building to replace the Patten and Plains School houses, said school to be known as the "Bakie School," and to authorize a Building Committee, consisting of the School Board and two other voters of the School District to be chosen by the moderator, or a majority of said committee in connection therewith to select a site for the building, to acquire by purchase or by proceedings in accordance with the Public Laws of the State of New Hampshire such land or lands as the said committee, or a majority of them, may deem necessary for the construction of said Bakie School, to solicit bids from competent contracting firms, to accept the most advantageous bid or bids, to supervise the construction, to see that the contracts are carried out, to purchase necessary equipment for said building, to accept the project for the School District and to take any other necessary or desirable action in connection with such land acquisition, bids, contracts, construction, and all other matters in connection therewith.

10. To see if the District will vote to add a sum not exceeding Fifteen Thousand five hundred dollars to the preceding Article 9 for the construction of a grade school building to replace the Patten and Plains School houses and also to replace the South and West School houses thereby making the total amount of money to be spent under article 9, Thirty thousand five hundred dollars.

11. To see if the School District will vote to borrow a sum not exceeding Fifteen Thousand five hundred dollars, and to issue and to sell in connection with such borrowing notes and/or bonds of the School District of the Town of Kingston in the principal amount not exceeding Fifteen thousand five hundred dollars, such notes and/or bonds to be issued pursuant to Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of 1926 as amended, payable exclusively from funds to be raised from taxation to bear interest at a rate not exceeding five per cent (5%) per annum, payable semi-annually, maturing during a ten year period, the first installment to be

payable one year from date of said notes and/or bonds, to be sold for not less than par, the time and place of payment of principal and interest, the fixing of the rate of interest, the provisions for the sale of the notes and/or bonds, and all other matters in connection therewith to be left to the discretion of the School Board, subject however, to the foregoing limitations.

12. To see if the School District will vote to authorize the School Board to dispose of the land and buildings of such school houses as may be abandoned.

13. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

## Report of Superintendent of Schools

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To the School Board and Citizens of Kingston:

I herewith present my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The statistics and financial report deal with the school year 1939-40.

Things moved along very smoothly and profitably during this 1939-40 school year. Miss Winn of Hudson, N. H. replaced Miss Colcord of Plaistow, in the South Kingston School in September 1940.

It is interesting to note that out of 146 pupils registered in the various schools during the year, only 12 failed to be promoted. This indicates two things, first, that the teachers are doing an excellent job of instructing and secondly, that the program of studies is shaped to meet the needs of the boys and girls at the various grade levels. These conclusions are supported by the showing made in the Achievement Tests given to all the 7th and 8th graders in the early spring.

The Honor Roll of pupils with perfect attendance during the school year 1939-40 is an exceptionally long one and I believe these pupils are worthy of special mention along with their parents.
