TOWN WARRANT STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Lancaster qualified to vote in the town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose one Selectman for three years, a Treasurer, a Prosecuting Agent, one Trustee of trust funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, three members of the Col. Town Spending Committee for three years and other necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for—
 - A. Town officers' salaries
 - B. Town officers' expenses
 - C. Election and registration expenses
 - D. Municipal Court expenses
 - E. Expenses Town Hall
 - F. Police department
 - G. Fire department
 - H. Health department, including dental clinic
 - I. Vital statistics
 - J. Sewer maintenance
 - K. Town maintenance
 - L. Street lighting
 - M. Library
 - N. Town Poor
 - O. Old Age Assistance
 - P. Memorial Day

- Q. Parks and playgrounds
- R. Cemeteries
- S. Interest
- T. State Aid Construction
- U. Sidewalk Construction
- V. New equipment
- W. Payment on principal of town debt
- X. Expenses of Special Committee of Town.
 - Y. Civic and Trade Association
- 4. To direct how money raised for the above purposes be expended.
- 5. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class 2 road known as "Dalton Road" and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$3327.75; or will accept state aid for construction of Class 5 roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$583.85.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money on temporary notes in anticipation of taxes, covering period from March 10, 1936 to the Annual Meeting of 1937.
- 7. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to issue serial notes or bonds of the town to an amount not exceeding \$61,000 for the purpose of refunding outstanding indebtedness of a like amount, as authorized by Chapter 48 of the Laws of 1935.
- 8. To see if the town will construct a drain across the land of Nat Robicheau on Middle Street and raise money for the same.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise money for sidewalk construction, if sidewalk projects are approved by the Federal Government.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Australian Ballot System of voting for all our town officers in all future town meetings.

- 11. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.
- 12. To see what action the town will take in regard to acquiring or establishing a municipal plant for the purpose of supplying in the town electricity for the use of its citizens and others and for such other purposes as the town may from time to time authorize and direct, in accordance with an act passed by the General Court at the 1935 session thereof and raise money for the same.
- 13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- 14. To see what action the town will take to provide for a Zoning Board of Adjustment.
- 15. To bring in your votes for the Election of Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Conventions of the various political parties to be held to nominate party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.
- 16. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Reduction in the income of the Col. Town Fund has materially affected the activities and increased the responsibility of the Spending Committee. It is a comparatively simple thing to spend money when there is an abundance of it to spend. It is extremely difficult and trying to meet requests when the total amount of the requests is some two to four times the amount available for spending. Since 1933 the income of the fund left by Col. Town has been decreasing gradually in its earning power. It is the responsibility of the committee now to make 25 cents do what the dollar used to do.

Lancaster has been favored for a number of years with the income of a gift, the purpose of which was to provide luxuries and small privileges which the average citizen would not feel he could afford if he was to obtain them through taxation. This gift has been operating so long, and we have adjsted ourselves so completely to its possibilities, that the committee sometimes wonders if the people of Lancaster look upon this as the donor intended; in other words, as a gift. There is no doubt as to the privileges and opportunities this gift has afforded our townspeople. We have only to visit surrounding towns to see readily how many advantages it has provided for our people that the residents of other towns do not feel they can afford.

When the gift was first obtained, the income was such that many projects could be supported and new equipment for the town could be developed. As time went on, the available income became reduced through circumstances over which no one had control. During the prosperous period Lancaster people acquired certain habits with the Spending

Committee's fund similar, no doubt, to what they did with their personal funds. In supporting these requests, the entire fund was consumed. With a reduced income, it was only natural that the funds available for each of these projects must be proportionately cut. It was not through desire but only by absolute necessity that the committee has been compelled to make these reductions. Personalities and individual tastes on the part of the committee have been entirely eliminated and each project has been considered from two angles: first, its fitness in accordance with Col. Town's will; and second, the greatest good to the greatest number.

There is no doubt that the committee's judgment in some of these matters has not been in accord with the ideas of each individual in town. The members have, however, in as far as their human limitations permitted, functioned according to their best judgment with the welfare of the town at heart, doing as they felt Col. Town himself would do had he been alive to do it, and to proportion the income. The fact remains that whether the committee has \$20,000 available for spending or \$10,000, the money is a gift and those things purchased with it are presents to the citizens of the town of Lancaster from the late Col. F. L. Town. It should be remembered that payment on the construction account of the Community House and the maintenance of that community center requires a large part of the entire income. That is more or less a fixed charge against the income.

The committee wishes to make public recognition for the services rendered by D. M. White as Chairman of the Scholarship Committee, one of the most important projects which is being carried on. Mr. White is the only citizen that has been asked to assist who is not a member of the Spending Committee. His fairness and loyalty to both the youth

of the town and the deceased donor has established many friends for the Col. Town Fund. The committee wishes to extend appreciation also to the people of the town as a whole for, through their cooperation and assistance in meeting the emergencies which have prevailed during the past year, the labors of your Spending Committee have been made much easier.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The nine members of the Col. Town Spending Committee which served during 1935 were: Carroll Stoughton, Rev. R. P. McClintock and Mrs. Katherine Lane, whose terms expire in 1936; Louis A. Bragg, Dr. Wm. Bronson and Mrs. W. L. McCarten, whose terms expire in 1937, and Enos G. Fay, D. A. O'Brien and Miss Evelyn Moyle, whose terms expire in 1938.

The officers and committees for 1935 were: Dan O'Brien, Chairman; Miss Evelyn Moyle, Secretary; andd Enos G. Fay, Treasurer. Committee appointments for the year were, House Committee: Dr. W. M. Bronson, Chairman, Rev. R. P. McClintock, Evelyn Moyle; Field Committee: Carroll Stoughton, Chairman, Louis Bragg and Enos G. Fay; Scholarship Committee: D. M. White, Chairman, Mrs. Ethel McCarten, Carroll Stoughton; Camp Committee: Rev. R. P. McClintock, Chairman, D. A. O'Brien, Mrs. Katherine Lane. The committee engaged Frank Leavitt as Superintendent of Camp and Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Daley as Superintendent and Matron of the Community House.

Details of the appropriations are shown in the Treasurer's Report, a brief elaboration on some follows:

Money available for appropriation was only that left after fixed charges were paid. Among the other appropriations, arrangements were made pursuant to Col. Town's will whereby fresh flowers were placed on the Colonel's grave each week beginning Memorial Day and continuing during the summer.

Camp changes included putting partitions and stoves in cabins, also screens and glass windows were added which made them more practical for family use. A road was built to the cabins which enabled those using them to drive directly to them. An arch was also built in the cabin area which could be used by occupants of either cabin. Repairs were also made to the swimming pool.

Appropriations were made for Col. Town prizes at the Academy and also appropriations were made of \$100 to each of the Local Boy Scout Troops, No. 204 and No. 219.

Some repairs and improvements to the Community House were made during the year, chief among which was refinishing the floor of hall. A new mower had to be added to the field equipment.

During the year, the "free night" on Wednesdays at the Community House was continued for the ladies of the town and was very popular especially with the younger population. "Two free nights a month" was voted by the committee for men with activities under the direction of the Parson Willard Cllub. Although not started until late in the season it also proved very popular.

The only fund during the year that was not cut materially was the scholarships. The committee's feelings in this connection were very keen in that curtailment of this fund effects individuals to a point where it cannot be remedied at a later period. The individual appropriations were reduced to some extent but the number that applied were provided for in some manner or another. During the present year ten students are being aided by loans. In one year 18 students received aid, the record year. A few, however, were transferred to the Unity Club Fund to reduce the burden on the Scholarship Fund, and, as stated, the limit of loan to any one student was also reduced.

The appropriation for the rural district continued along the same lines as in the past, namely, providing transportation for high school students within the town, when located two miles or more from the school house. The appropriation was made to the golf course in consideration of the free days available to townspeople for playing golf during the summer.

One of the most important appropriations that was cut to some extent was that of the skating rink. It is safe, well managed and convenient. Mr. Grondin deserves the support of every individual in the town in his effort to provide safe, healthy and supervised entertainment during the winter period. The Spending Committee reduced this appropriation only \$50.00.

The Lancaster Hospital Auxiliary was given a small appropriation, also the activities department of the High School. Free use of the hall was extended on occasions when the purposes intended were wholly charitable. The house was opened freely as well as the camp in co-operation with the town's efforts to entertain guests following the lrst visits to our town of snow train patrons.

It is with regret that the fund has been reduced this year in that all appropriations could not be made for the amount asked, however, every request has been given some support. The committee is indebted to the Rotary Club for assuming part of the responsibility of the Skating Rink and to the Kiwanis Club for assuming all of the responsibility of the Playground.

A fairly accurate survey of the use made of the building discloses:

- (A) Patrons paid for and rolled 1630 strings on the alleys. Women rolled free of charge 562 strings. (These do not include the vast number rolled by the school pupils for which no charge is made).
- (B) The Hall has been used for basketball activities a total of 423 hours.
- (C) The building has been used for other special purposes an aggregate of 340 hours.
- (D) Parties 39, Dances 12, Basketball Games 39, Committee Meetings 131.

Boy Scout Troop No. 204 meet each week. Unity Club and Gyro Club meet twice a month except during the summer. W. C. T. U. meetings once a month. Flower Show, Prize Speaking Contest, Graduation and Reception were held in the Auditorium.

The day of the Carnival the building was used by about four hundred people, young and old. During the afternoon many enjoyed cards and the free use of the Bowling Alleys and Pool tables.

The Tennis Courts were opened May 17, 1935 and closed October 3, 1935—1450 persons played during that time.

A large number of visitors were shown through the building.

In conclusion I would like to take this opportunity to thank the citizens of the Town for the splendid co-operation shown both Mrs. Daley and myself and especially do we thank the young people who are always so courteous and considerate.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the Honorable School Board and Citizens of the Lancaster Town District:

Teachers

Miss Elizabeth Ellingwood transferred to the Grange school this year, and Mrs. Helen Martin again took charge of the Elm Ridge school. Mrs. Laura Kimball changed from No. 10 to the Stebbins Hill school.

Enrollment

The number of pupils in the district school has decreased in the last few years. In 1933, the enrollment was 133, while at the present time it is but 110. As the pupils at Martin Meadow numbered but three, this school was closed, and the pupils are being transported to Number 11 at Stebbins Hill

Repairs

The Atlantic Circulators in several of the schools were moved to the rear center of the rooms, and better results are obtained in the distribution of the heat.

4-H Work

At South Lancaster, an organized club led by Mrs. John Nadeau with the cooperation of Miss Mildred Evans carried on demonstrations in Foods and Farm Shop with the "older" (11) children, and three children under ten made forestry collections.

At Great Rock, through the co-operation of Mrs. Morse and Agent, four boys made twig collections and achieved with three excellent gardens.

At Gore, through the co-operation of Miss McGary and Club Agent, five associate, two collections and forestry tests were conducted with five boys and three girls.

Gore has recently formed a club of six girls which carried on separate from the school. East Lancaster boys and girls clubs originally started at the schools and have carried on several years of excellent project work.

The Costs of Education

That education is an expensive process, especially in rural districts, cannot be denied. Not only must the direct financial cost be considered, but the difficulties of transportation in the winter

months makes the task a real problem. The fact that so many of the parents and children are willing to make the sacrifice indicates their belief in the values of education.

Children without educational opportunities are not only handicapped in the race of life, but miss many of the better things that the world has to offer; for education opens up wide areas of enjoyment and service which make life richer and better.

Conclusion

The superintendent wishes to express his appreciation of the co-operation of the teachers, school board, and citizens in making the school year a success.

Adult Library Report

Added to the Adult department of the Library in 1935 were 128 books, 12 of them were gifts, six from the Unity Club, Library Extension. The sum of sixty-three dollars and forty-seven cents was taken in fines. While many books of popular interest are debarred from our Library, as we are not financially able to cater to the wants of the many, still, all the people are in part served. Co-operation with the schools has always been one of its interests, and the reputation of the Library for Standard and Classical works has been maintained, as well as for books in lighter vein. We have as far as possible acquired books in modern drama and poetry. Many books each year are taken from the shelves and turned over to poorer and smaller libraries than ours.

In September the District meeting met in the Community House of our town. These meetings are helpful to both trustees and librarians in interchange of ideas for their work. Last August we were favored with a call from a shining light among the creators of books of popular fiction, Lloyd Douglas. His good works had preceded him, however, in the form of "Magnificent Obsession," "Forgive Us Our Trespasses" and "Green Light."

While there are many opportunities for good reading from the many magazines and lending libraries in town, we have this last year loaned nearly 15,000 books, 2,946 being non-fiction.

Juvenile Library Report

Special events during the year were the raising of money to buy books by the Literary Committee of the Unity Club. A food sale was held in March. Six Juvenile books were added in this manner. Also money was raised in the Grammar grades of the school and four books were given.

A large number of books too worn to be of further use to the Library were given to the Stark library, which is struggling to maintain service on an appallingly small collection of books.

During the past few years, teachers from the town district have borrowed books in large numbers from the Juvenile department, for the use of girls and boys who cannot reach the Library. Last year, the teachers have been able to borrow collections of books from Plymouth Normal School, under the direction of a Rural Librarian. This has relieved somewhat the call for books from the local library and given a wider choice of material for the teacher and pupils.

Needless to say, the great need for more books is always with us. The wear and tear on an average child's book, automatically reduces the life of the book to about a year, thus creating a need to either re-buy or replace the book in a comparatively short time.

Fifty-eight new books were added during the year, 14 being gifts. Money collected from fines, turned in to treasurer, \$20.00. Total number of books loaned 5402, non-fiction 964.
