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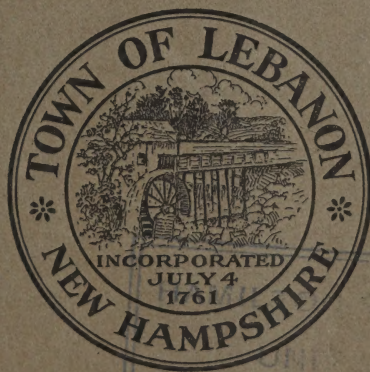

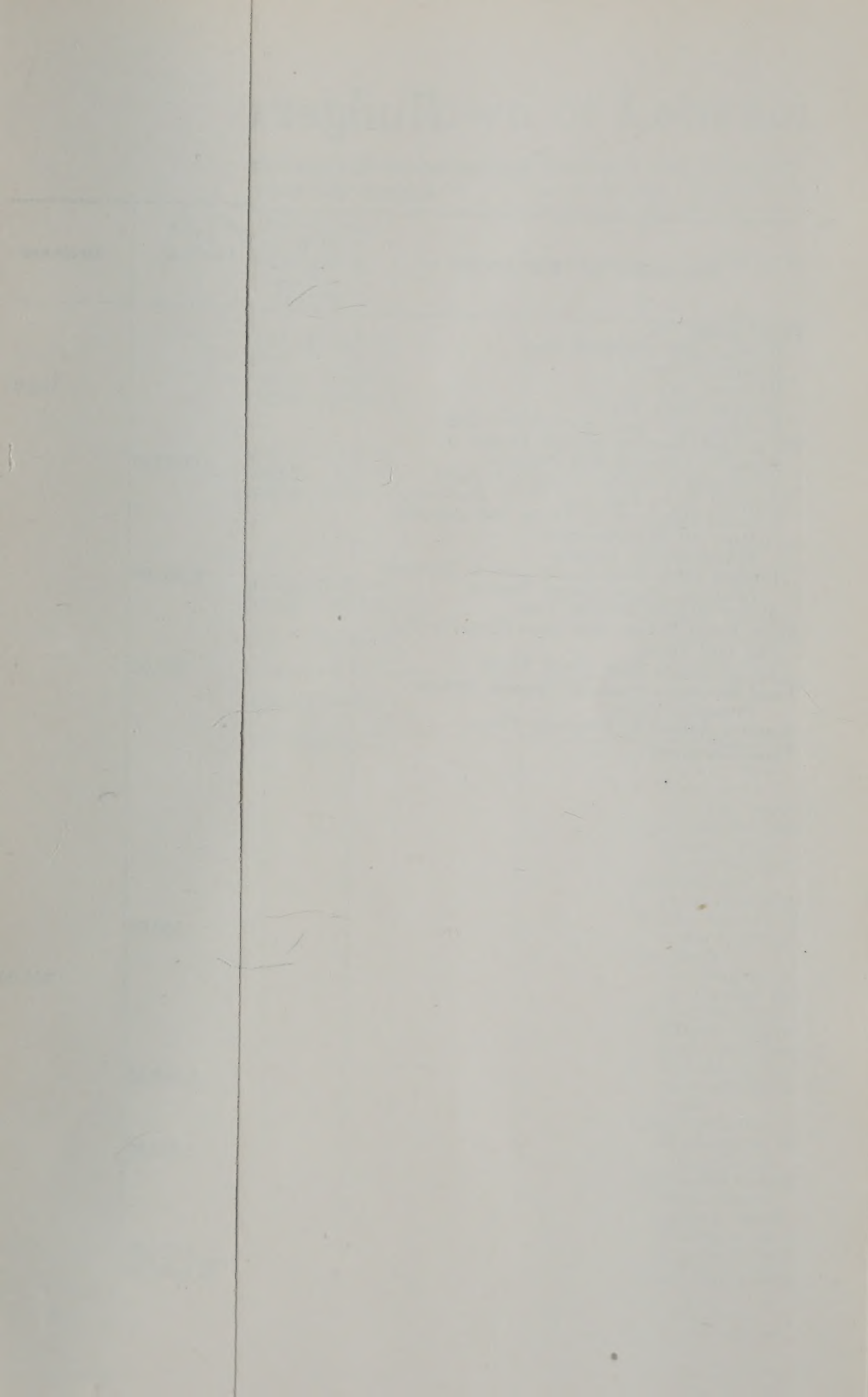

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

The State of New Hampshire

(L.S.) To the inhabitants of the Town of Lebanon qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the Second Tuesday of March next at 9 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

First—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the Budget Committee and vote to adopt their recommendations as printed.

Second—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

Third—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the construction and repair of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Fourth—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the construction and repairs of sewers and sidewalks for the ensuing year.

Fifth—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the improvement of the cemeteries of the town.

Sixth—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the proper observance of Memorial Day.

Seventh—To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise to provide free Hospital Service for needy people or act thereon.

Eighth—To see what sum on money the town will vote to raise to assist in the work of the Visiting Nurse Association.

Ninth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the benefit of the West Lebanon Library.

Tenth—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the benefit of the Lebanon Public Library.

Eleventh—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred dollars to hire Eldridge Park for a playground, or act thereon.

Twelfth—To see if the town will continue the inspection of milk and raise money therefore.

Thirteenth—To see if the town will take any action in regard to control of the White Pine Blister Rust, and raise money for same.

Fourteenth—To see if the town will vote approval of the Lebanon Improvement Society assisting in the support of the Carter Community Building from time to time as assistance is needed.

Fifteenth—To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class II Roads leading from Butmanville Road to Meriden and raise the appropriate, or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$2,892.75; the State to contribute \$2,892.75.

Sixteenth—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Seventeenth—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the pieces of roads running parallel to the road leading from the town dump to the Plainfield line, the above pieces are now unused owing to the new layout of the State road.

Eighteenth—To see if the town will vote to discontinue those pieces of road now unused between Albert Atherton's and the Plainfield town line, the above pieces are unused owing to the new layout of the State road.

Nineteenth—To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Twentieth—To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.

Twenty-First—To choose a Tax Collector, and Overseer of the Poor and one Highway Agent for the ensuing year. To choose two Library trustees for the ensuing three years and all other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Twenty-Second—To choose a Trustee to administer the Trust Fund for the ensuing three years.

Twenty-Third—To choose a Library Trustee for one year.

Twenty-Fourth—To choose four members to act on the Budget Committee for the ensuing three years.

Twenty-Fifth—To bring in your votes to see whether it is expedient to revise the Constitution.

Twenty-Sixth—To transact any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

Twenty-Seventh—On a petition of ten or more legal voters a request has been made to see if the town will vote to establish a voting place in West Lebanon for Biennial Election.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

Owing to the high water in March, this department was taxed to its capacity, in inspecting and fumigating dwellings, making them habitable once more. The State Board of Health was very helpful, by issuing circulars that were given to all who were in the flooded area. As a result of this there were no cases of Typhoid Fever, and no serious results for which we are thankful.

The following cases of reportable diseases have been reported by the Doctors and Nurses; 1 case of Lobar Pneumonia, 1 of Septic Sore Throat, 2 of Scarlet Fever, 3 of Undulant Fever, 7 of Chicken Pox, 12 of Mumps, 43 of German Measles, 80 of Whooping Cough, 106 of Measles. These cases were all quarantined and posted. 16 cases of Venereal Diseases were reported. I have signed 5 permits for the removal of bodies from the State.

There have been a great many Dumps reported, attended to and Notices posted. Another matter that has caused a lot of unsavory comment is the finding of bags and boxes of garbage and papers, all along our highways, that have been thrown from automobiles. People who have automobiles, ought to have pride enough in the looks of our highways, to stop this practice. Why not begin this season by taking care of your rubbish and garbage at home and not strew it along the side of the road?

The Public Health Nursing Division, have held Two "Child Health Clinics" here during the year, and report as follows—"Attendance 139, Defects found 170, Defects found corrected 22, Children receiving treatment 108, Ages from 6 months to 1 year 8, School age 39, Pre-School 61, Signed Elisabeth H. Corriel, State Nurse.

I have received fine cooperation from most of the people that I have been brought in contact with and especially the Doctors and Nurses. I wish to thank all who have in any way aided me in this worthy cause.

REPORT OF MILK INSPECTOR

The milk situation in Lebanon is much the same as in other large towns of New Hampshire in that mostly raw milk is being used with a small percent of pasteurized.

The raw milk when produced from healthy animals under sanitary conditions some think has the advantage as it is more palatable and has lost none of the vitamins from being heated, on the other hand the pasteurized milk is preferred by many people in that they consider that the Bacteria are all killed. A poor job of pasteurizing is just as dangerous as the poor handling of raw milk, both methods must be checked on frequently, a slip either way is dangerous.

The samples shipped to the State Laboratory of Hygiene Feb. 16, 1937 had some raw milk samples running as low as 3000 Bacteria per C. C. and 0 Colon organisms the state requirements being 100,000 Bacteria per C. C. as a maximum count. One sample of pasteurized milk went as high as 37,000 Bacteria per C. C. the maximum count allowed by the state in this case being 40,000. In cases of epidemics the authorities generally look to the milk and water supply in the section. If the milk supply is thought to be the cause, it is a simple matter to find the animal or animals in question providing the case is investigated in time with proper cooperation, these animals when found can be quarantined and the milk supply from this herd cut off.

The Undulant Fever question is dead open and shut, either the milk must be properly pasteurized or come from animals Accredited Bang's Free to be absolutely safe. The Tuberculosis problem Bovine is very much under control as the cattle in New Hampshire are practically free from this menace. We are constantly getting new sources of milk which must be tested and the proper method of producing and handling gone over until satisfactory with each new producer as well as checking on the old ones, frequent enough to have a satisfactory product at all times, these samples are collected from the trucks during their delivery to the consumer.

OVERSEER OF POOR'S REPORT

In this office from Jan. 1, 1936 to Dec. 31, 1936 orders were made for Town Direct Relief cases to the amount of \$21,236.26, and for Boarding Adults the amount of \$1,763.44.

The bills for Town Boarding Children and Old Age Assistance are paid through the Selectmen's office.

During the first six months of the year the State paid no part of the costs of relief, as the appropriation for that purpose was exhausted. Beginning July 1, 1936, 50% of the total cost for Direct Relief, Boarding Adults, Boarding Children and Old Age Assistance was paid, also on several Administrative costs.

County orders from Jan. 1, 1936 to Dec. 31, 1936 for County Direct Relief cases and extras (all above board and care) on Boarding Adults were issued to the amount of \$26,846.86.

Bills for Boarding Adults, Boarding Children and Old Age Assistance are paid through the County Commissioners' office.

It may be of interest to the voters to know that almost 1200 cords of wood were delivered to relief cases during 1936.

During the year January 1, 1936 through December 31, 1936, the Lebanon free bed in the Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital, Hanover, New Hampshire, has rendered 746 days' service to 36 residents of the town of Lebanon, New Hampshire.

The portion of free bed funds allotted by the trustees to the town of Lebanon was \$1,800.00, which supplemented by a cash payment of \$476.17 by the town this year, plus an over-use of \$1.17 as of June 30, 1936, brought the total amount of the fund to \$2,277.34.
