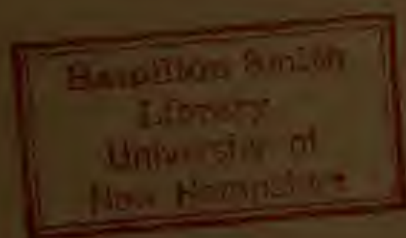

## TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the 8th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Highway Agents.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for the payment of the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, for the public library, for the recreation commission, for free hospital beds, toward the maintenance of a District Nurse, for observance of Memorial Day, for band concerts, and for all other town charges.

Article 3. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line construction of highways in this town under the provisions of an act to provide State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the construction of main highways throughout the State in accordance with Chap. 84 of the Laws of New Hampshire.

Article 4. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line maintenance of highways in this town, in accordance with Chap. 84 of the Laws of New Hampshire.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and if so, how much, to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, in cooperation with the State Forester, in the work of preventing the spread of the disease, commonly known as White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money from time to time during the current year, on the credit of the town, to pay current indebtedness, in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint an agent to act for the town in the transfer of real estate owned by the town.

Article 8. To see what action the town will take with reference to the matter of authorizing the Selectmen to give any druggist, doing business in this town, a prescription permit to sell pure spirituous and malt liquor for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and scientific purposes, as provided in Chap. 147 of the Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway leading from the Farr Hill Road four-corners to the Harold Hampson farm, as an open highway, and made subject to gates and bars, in accordance with Chap. 79 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the improvement of the road leading from the Pattenville Schoolhouse to Partridge Lake, near the Frank Lewis farm.

Article 11. To see what action the town will take towards rescinding the vote of March 13, 1906, which read:

“Resolved: That the Commissioners of the Water and Light Department be, and are hereby instructed to supply said (Littleton) Hospital with water and light whenever it is furnished to other patrons of the department, and that the same shall be free of charge to said Hospital while it is maintained as such.”

The town now has to purchase from the Bradford Electric Company all electricity used in town.

The Hospital bill for 1926 was \$1,285.72 which was paid by the town.

Article 12. To see if the town will authorize the Tax Collector to appoint deputies.

Article 13. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 14. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the Citizens of Littleton:

The School Board hereby presents for your consideration its annual report of the schools of the town.

Without your interest and co-operation, the great project which has been before us for the past two years could not have been accomplished. We thank you and ask for your continued interest in what seems to us one of the big things in our town development, the educational training of our boys and girls.

At the present time, school buildings in all parts of the town are in fairly good condition. Needed repairs have been made in the rural schools; Kilburn School has been painted and new cement steps and walk have been made, also a much needed walk has been added at Apthorp School.

Our High School building was ready for occupancy for the fall term of school beginning the second week of September, as agreed, though our formal dedication took place on October first.

As members of the School Board we wish in this report to publicly express our appreciation to the Building Committee for their valuable work and especially to the chairman, Dr. Downing, who gave so freely of time and thought.

Already we feel the influence of this new building with its modern equipment and all facilities for carrying on, not only all lines of teaching, but the social activities of our schools as well. Even now we recognize that the standard of our educational system has been raised; that the morale of our school is changed; that progress has been made in every way. For further details of our educational work, we refer you to the special reports.

Each year brings its own financial problems. This year has been largely one of adjustment to new conditions. Therefore with interest to be met, with in-

insurance premiums upon the building and also upon equipment to be paid, and with our usual budget for school maintenance, we need an appropriation of \$65,000.00 which is a little less than that of last year. As we meet these obligations, we hope and expect that in a few years' time, our appropriation may get back to more normal conditions.

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## HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To O. M. Holman, Superintendent of Schools:

I herewith submit my fifth annual report as headmaster of Littleton High School.

The teachers of Littleton High School feel that this year marks a new era in education in Littleton for we now have adequate housing facilities.

The plan and arrangements of the building are working out remarkably well. The acoustics of the

assembly hall and the recitation rooms are fine. The light is ample. Heating and ventilating seem to be entirely sufficient, and barring a few adjustments at the beginning of the winter have worked admirably. The building is unusually complete and in most cases the equipment is ample. To be sure there is and always will be some needs.

The children have shown a fine spirit in the care of the new plant. The building committee have given us a wonderfully complete building, have been remarkably fine to work with and best of all have kept well within their appropriation. These wonderful advantages which now surround the pupils are bound to have an effect on the intellectual interests of the children. We, as teachers feel that it is already noticeable in that we are getting more and a better type of work. The attitudes of the pupils have already shown a distinct change for the better. There has been to date less tardiness, less unexcused absences and less failures than at any similar period for the last four years. Withdrawals have been few to date and the registration has been four more than last year. Social gatherings have been better and much better handled.

### TEACHERS

As for the past three years I again wish to urge the absolute need of keeping good teachers as long as possible. Littleton High School like any school demands experienced teachers for good work. Superintendents and Headmasters are entirely dependent upon their teaching staff for the quality of work and the morale of the school. I am glad to report that there are no inexperienced teachers on the staff. Our salary schedule is now more nearly at a point where we can get and retain experienced teachers. May we be able to maintain it.

## ADMINISTRATION

The class of last June was the first class to graduate that had for their full four years the benefit of the new revised program of study introduced four years ago. When I speak of revised program, I mean the studies that are now offered in our high school. I am thinking particularly of the revision in Mathematics and French. We now give Mathematics in every year of our Liberal and Classical courses. This is as much as is given in any public school in New Hampshire and more than in most of them. Instead of crowding all of high school algebra, geometry and trigonometry into the Junior and Senior years of the high school course with the result that nothing is really accomplished, we give a full year of Algebra to Freshmen, a full year of geometry and trigonometry to Sophomores, a full year of algebra and solid geometry to Juniors and a year of advanced and review algebra two times a week to Seniors. In addition to this in the Practical Arts and commercial courses we are offering a full course in vocational mathematics, which is very largely specialized arithmetic. To all Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors French is taken for three full years. Of the class that graduated last June and went to colleges or schools of higher education all have shown the advisability of this revision. Of the five, who are attending three different colleges, all have maintained a very creditable general average well above the passing grade and of the three who went to normal school not one but maintained a general average of over 82%. The maximum and minimum requirements on grades have on the whole worked advantageously. Achievement tests have been given that prove our work to be on a par with other schools throughout the state and nation. In the commercial department, particularly in typewriting, we have shown a distinct

improvement. Four years ago it was only now and then a girl who could do forty words per minute with any accuracy. Last spring Miss Evelyn West carried off third honors in the state with over sixty words per minute. Pupils who do better than fifty words with reasonable accuracy are now not uncommon. What has been done here has been done in stenography and other lines. One who remembers the work in the manual training department of a few years ago and visits the shop and examines the product today will see as great an improvement. Similar if not as showy improvements have been made along other lines, as shown by the fact that four years ago we could obtain the certificate privilege to college only from year to year. This year it has been granted for a period of four years, the longest period for which this is granted to anyone without renewal. That our pupils are maintaining an excellent standard is further borne out by the fact that out of the present Senior class of thirty-five, fifteen were elected to "Pro Merito" an honorary scholastic society, which requires an average of 85% in all of their work up to the Senior year. Chapters of this society can only be established in schools that maintain good standards. Last year saw the establishment here of the first chapter of this kind in Northern New Hampshire.

### ATHLETICS

As heretofore the control of athletics has been vested in an Athletic Advisory Board composed of two students, coach, headmaster and one member of the school board. Little needs to be said of our record in this line for the past year except that we have maintained good teams for the best development of the boys and girls concerned.

## DEBATING

Mr. Hutchinson is still carrying on the work of this department with good success. To date we have participated in eight debates. Two with Berlin, two with Lancaster, two with Whitefield and two with Groveton.

## MUSIC

Mrs. Jones has carried on the work in this department and has three distinct organizations going well, a boys' glee club, a girls' glee club and an orchestra. A musical comedy, "The Wishing Well" was given by these organizations last spring and was well done and well received. "Once in a Blue Moon" will be given this spring.

## PRIZES, GIFTS, ETC.

The annual prize offered by the American Legion and Auxiliary for leadership to the boy and girl in the graduating class went to Frances Heald and Stephen Choquette. The Andrew Bingham, Jr., cup to Claude Brusseau. The Lincoln Essay medal to Hazel Smith. We are glad to report the gift of several large framed pictures, one a gift to the school from the class of 1926, one from Miss Bessie Edson and one from Mr. and Mrs. John M. Mathes. The Elson Art Exhibit given this fall will with these gifts give us six large framed pictures for hanging in the halls of the new building.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the School Board of Littleton:

I have the honor to submit a brief resume of some features of the school year 1925-1926, in addition to details of expenditure and other reports.

Schools have been maintained for all children in town for 36 weeks in the grades and 38 weeks in the high school. There was a daily attendance of 527, a daily absence of 29 and a percent attendance of 94.7. In view of remote distances from school, minor sicknesses, etc., this record is good. Children neither absent nor tardy for the year, 42. This is excellent.

All school children had a health examination by Dr. Page and Miss Borg. General improvements and remedial treatments were secured. A vexing invasion of Scarlet Fever afflicted several homes. The untiring vigilance of the School Physician and the cooperation of other physicians made it possible to maintain schools without interruption and with a small percentage of pupils affected. In view of the experience of many towns our record was notable.

### TEACHERS

We had one teacher change during the year. Our teachers were a creditable and cooperative group. Practically all were college and normal trained or held state certificates, the highest credential given in New Hampshire. Professional examinations, required by all who have not previously passed them in normal school, have been met with commendable spirit and marked success. A good teacher, who develops and inspires the good side of human nature is a community asset beyond monetary value.

## FINANCES

Littleton schools are run with the strictest devotion to economy consistent with good schools. The median cost per pupil in the elementary schools of New Hampshire for the year of this report was \$78.94. The total cost per pupil for average membership in our elementary schools was \$80.18. In high schools in the State the median cost per pupil was \$130.53. In Littleton High School the total cost per pupil was \$92.99. It can be seen then that we are close to the middle point in pupil expense in our elementary schools. In the high school we are \$37 per pupil less than the median expense in the state. It is also a fact that our salary schedule is lower than the salary schedule of the majority of our neighboring towns.

## ACHIEVEMENT

Results count. In the high school you are referred to the Headmaster's report, which covers the accomplishments of a successful school year. In the Elementary schools, standard achievement tests were given in grades 2 to 8 inclusive. Results in these tests are standardized by ages. A clever pupil may obtain a result considerably in advance of his real age. A slow pupil may obtain a result less than his age. The following results are quoted. Of course this is relative.

## ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

We approached the work of the year anticipating a year of interruption, owing to the big building operation so near the school. It is fitting to record that the kind cooperation of Mr. Hunter, the contractor, and the year-long vigilance of Mr. Carter, the Foreman, were so effective that our inconveniences were reduced to as near the vanishing point as possible.

The outstanding achievement of the year was the growth of the high school building, now completed. In view of the predictions that always follow a public structure of such magnitude it is a satisfaction to record that this building, beautiful in design and place; equipped with a clock that continues the usage of a long established habit; furnished in all departments so that it functions as few buildings in Northern New Hampshire can function; was completed by a conscientious committee without asking for an additional penny of appropriation. I would also include Mr. Wells, the architect, the Colonial Club, and all who gave time and thought to the project. The completed work represents a fine public achievement that will be appreciated for generations.

I should like to give my personal thanks to janitors and teachers, to health officers and all cooperating agencies, to citizens and School Board for friendship and counsel in a great enterprise. If we can teach children to be courteous and tolerant in their relationships, to be dependable and industrious in their activities, we are building a safe democracy. If we cannot inspire these humble characteristics, statistics of mental reactions will not make a good school.

## HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

To the Voters of Union School District:

The committee elected two years ago to build and equip a high school building in the town of Littleton is now ready to submit its report and ask for its discharge. Your committee has supervised the erection and equipment of a modern school plant, complete in every detail. Since the dedication there has been added some \$2,200 of modern wood working machinery to the Manual Training Department, the clock has been installed and a mechanical ash hoist has been added to the heating plant. The Riley Strong Post of the American Legion has erected a fine flag pole. To the Baldwin gift for furnishings has been added one from Mrs. G. A. Edson and one from Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Gosselin.

The entire plant has been built and equipped and paid for with the funds originally given the committee. No additional funds have been asked and none will be asked for. There is now a balance of cash on hand of nearly \$5,000. From this will be deducted some \$1,900 for clock, telephones in the school rooms and the ash hoist, now in process of erection, and perhaps \$1,000 for the building of cement walks and steps in the Spring. This will leave a balance of about \$2,000 the committee will turn over to the School Board. The financial statement of February 24, 1927 is appended.

The foregoing tabulation speaks for itself. The increase in circulation is very encouraging.

Beginning October 1, a radical change in library service was made. The hours now are, every afternoon 2 to 5:30 and every evening, except Friday, 7 to 8:30, Sundays and holidays excepted. The library now gives 28 hours service each week. The afternoon circulation has exceeded the evening circulation since the first of November.

The usual library events have been observed during the year. We were represented in the Carnival Parade by "Pollyanna," who gave her time and services; March 30, at the close of the story hour,, a candy party was held; in June, the New Hampshire Library Association met with us; in November, Children's Book Week was observed at which time they made and hung upon the walls of their room 179 posters when the Friday Club became responsible for three prizes to be awarded for originality, workmanship and poster quality—the three judges gave their services. Money was given at different times sufficient to allow the purchase of 52 new books for their room which were on display during the week and then put into immediate circulation; at Christmas time, a tree was



placed in their room and all second grade pupils were invited to attend. Santa Claus did his work, as well as Mrs. Varney, who was the Christmas story teller.

The thoughtfulness of the public during the year is appreciated.
