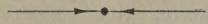

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

Each member of the School Board had the entire charge of two schools each, as follows: W. W. R. Miner, schools, Nos. 4, 5; Seth W. Miner, schools, Nos. 3, 6; Joseph F. Sherman, schools, Nos. 1, 2.

No. 1.—PARKER HILL.

The summer term was taught by Miss Carrie M. Moore. Miss Moore is one of our best teachers and the school was a perfect success. The fall term was taught by Miss Jennette Knights of Franconia, N. H. Miss Knights is a teacher of experience, and it is fortunate for the school that secures her services. Everything was satisfactory to all concerned. Number of visitors for the year, 19.

No. 2.—CLOUGH HILL.

The summer term was taught by Miss Gertrude Trevena. This was Miss Trevena's first experience in teaching, and was quite successful. School somewhat backward, but fair progress was made. Fall term was taught by Miss Florence Bishop. Miss Bishop seems to possess those qualities so necessary to success in the school-room. Discipline and progress very good. Number of visitors for the year, 33.

No. 3.—MOULTON HILL.

Summer term, taught by Miss Edith M. Child of Bath. The school was under very good discipline and practical methods were introduced. The term throughout was entirely satisfactory. All regretted that Miss Child could not return to teach a second term. Fall term, taught by Miss Grace E. Hutchins of Bath. The school passed a thorough examination, showing experience and skill on the part of the teacher, especially in the primary work. Thoroughness in all the branches taught was an especial and commendable feature. Miss Hutchins is one of our best teachers. Number of visitors for the year, 25.

No. 4.—TINKERVILLE.

Summer and fall terms, taught by Miss E. Alvie Child of Bath. Both terms were eminently successful. Number of visitors for the year, 28.

No. 5.—POND.

Summer term, taught by Miss Minnie A. Lamson of Hins-

dale. Miss Lamson is a teacher of experience. Relatively speaking, the best attendance record was made of any term for the current year. It was a very successful term. Ill health prevented her returning for the fall term, much to the regret of all parties. Fall term, taught by Mrs. Eva M. Thomas of Lisbon. This was Mrs. Thomas' fortieth term. All in all this was the most satisfactory term taught in town for a long time. Number of visitors for the year, 49.

No. 6.—UNDER THE MOUNTAIN.

Summer term, taught by Miss Douna J. Martin of Lisbon. Miss Martin was an enthusiastic worker. The success and welfare of her school and pupils was her highest aim. The term was quite satisfactory. Fall term, taught by Miss Mary F. Danforth of Lakeport. Very good progress was made in all the branches taught, excelling in elocution. Rarely have our schools enjoyed the services of one so gifted in elocution. It gives me pleasure to report the school a success. To the regret of all, the school was closed the eighth week to enable Miss Danforth to return home to accept of a position. Also, fall term taught by Miss Hattie C. Foster of Lisbon. This practically was a continuation of the previous term, the pupils all beginning where they left off in their respective studies, made excellent advancement. Miss Foster has a good faculty for governing, studying the nature and disposition of her pupils, winning their respect and confidence. The term was a very profitable one. Number of visitors for the year, 54.

The number of children in town between the ages of five and fifteen years, as reported by the selectmen, was 57 boys, 46 girls; total, 103.

It gives us pleasure to be able to report that all of our schools have been unusually successful. Perhaps we should credit this, in part, to better attendance, to better teachers, and more general interest manifested by the parents.

A word of commendation is due the citizens who showed their patriotism and aid in placing the national emblem over every school house.

Through the co-operation of the teachers and Board, each pupil was presented with a flag in memory of the grand Columbus Day celebration.

To insure the continued progress and future prosperity of the town,—demands as a public necessity—that we have a free public town library. Let us look to the best welfare of all and act like men and have it at once.
