**WARRANT FOR THE ONE HUNDRED AND  
SEVENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL  
TOWN MEETING**

---

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE  
(L. S.)

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Northfield, in the  
county of Merrimack in said state, qualified to vote  
in town affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Northfield  
Town House in said Northfield, on Tuesday, the  
twelfth day of March next at ten of the clock in the  
forenoon to act upon the following subjects;

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year  
ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary  
to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make  
appropriation upon the following:

- A. Town Officers' Salaries
- B. Town officers' expenses
- C. Election and Registration Expenses
- D. Expenses of Town Hall and Buildings
- E. Police Department
- F. Fire Department (out of precinct)
- G. Town Health Officer's Expenses
- H. Vital Statistics
- I. Sewer Maintenance
- J. Town Roads and Bridges
  - 1. Summer Maintenance
  - 2. Winter Maintenance
  - 3. General Expense of Highway
  - 4. Oiling
- K. Library

- L. Old Age Assistance
- M. Town Welfare and Relief
- N. Aid to Soldiers and Families
- O. Memorial Day Expenses
- P. Care of Cemeteries
- Q. Care of Beach, Northfield Pond
- R. Interest on Temporary Loans

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 to the Tilton-Northfield District Nurse Association (By request) .

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to the Franklin Hospital Association.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to the Laconia Hospital.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$570.22 for town road aid. (The State will contribute \$3,801.49)

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$158.67 to the Lakes Region Association. (By request)

8. To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the officers as printed.

9. To see if the town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof."

10. To see if the town wishes to exclude from the

plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

11. To see if the town wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

12. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed four thousand eight hundred dollars, (\$4,800.00) for a new dump truck, complete with push frame and wing box. One half price of said truck to be paid for in 1957, balance to be financed by issuance of a note payable in 1958.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council. A similar article is included in the Tilton warrant.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Civil Defense purposes for the ensuing year. (By request)

16. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate that may be acquired through tax collector's deeds.

17. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



The Polls shall be closed not earlier than six of the clock in the evening. The business meeting will be held at 7:30 of the clock in the evening.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NORTHFIELD POND PROJECT

---

The financial transactions of this project appear elsewhere in the Town Report under the heading "Northfield Pond Beach."

The project was to encompass the following:

Build a bathhouse with sanitary toilets and dressing booths; enlarge and improve the beach area; construct a picnic area with fireplaces and tables, and to provide some funds for lifeguard services.

Considerable advancement has been made on both the planning and development phases of this project.

The planning was necessarily two-fold in nature. First, the long run planning—a look toward the future—to envision what might be a reasonable overall development of the area. Our present efforts would be directed to fit into the overall plan. Second, within the limits of our authority and appropriation, the short run planning: planning the present construction so that it would prove adequate over a reasonable period of time and so that it would complement future effort.

Briefly, the planning encompassed to a greater or lesser degree the following:

Bathhouse design, detail and location, partitioning and ventilation of the bathhouse, housing of pumping plant, procurement of electrical energy for pumping and lighting, water supply for bathhouse and picnic areas, Septic disposal, precaution against bacteriological contamination of water supply and beach; and compliance with State laws in regard to safeguarding the public health.

Fireplace design and location, fuel supply, precaution against fire hazard, direction of prevailing winds, existence of natural and artificial fire breaks, design and

location of picnic tables. Compliance with State laws pertaining to lighting of fires.

Beach — cutting of trees, disposal of lumber and wood, burning of brush and removal of stumps and surface soil, and clearing the water of weeds.

Construction and placement of rafts and diving boards.

Summer and winter maintenance and supervision of the entire area.

Some thought was given to the impact of the new highway upon the area.

Throughout the planning, an effort was made to preserve and if possible to enhance the natural beauty of the area. The development was planned so that it would some day be worthy to proudly bear the formal name of Leroy Glines Park, in memory of the man to whom we are indebted for his kindness, generosity and foresight in setting aside this area for us.

The actual development work completed consists, briefly, of the following:

A 10 foot x 27 foot bathhouse has been built, roofed and prime coat painted. Six windows have been installed and four doors built and prime coated a clear seal.

A flush toilet has been installed in each bathhouse, with the necessary piping and venting, and provision has been made for future expansion, if necessary. An electric pump has been purchased and stored pending installation. Arrangements have been made with the Public Service Company whereby they will install the necessary equipment to deliver electrical energy to the bathhouse. Electrical energy charges will be made only for actual energy delivered. (No minimum or off-season charges).

A 22 foot deep well has been dug and well point set into the well. An excavation has been made for a 500

gallon Septic tank and the tank has been set into place.

A beach area 350 feet in length, by 30 feet in depth has been cleared of timber, wood, brush, stumps and topsoil, exposing a natural sandy beach.

Two picnic areas have been cleared and a picnic table and fireplace have been completed.

The development has been protected with comprehensive insurance to the extent of \$2000.

In respect to Life Guard Service, the Committee suggests and recommends the study and installation of the "Buddy System".

In respect to supervision, the committee suggests and recommends that a responsible person be designated by the selectmen, with appropriate authority and compensation, as supervisor of the area during the summer season.

The committee wishes to acknowledge its appreciation and sincere thanks to the Foster Construction Co., Bud Murphy Construction, Tilton-Northfield Fire Dept., Whiteman-Davidson Post 49, American Legion, The Golden Rule Farm and the State Forestry and Recreation Commissions for their generous contributions to the success of this project.

## **TILTON-NORTHFIELD RECREATION COUNCIL**

---

After numerous attempts to form a recreation program, the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council was formed in 1956 with representatives from leading organizations from both Towns. We are now permanently organized and are members of the National Recreational Association.

Our programs involved hundreds of children from both towns in a wide variety of recreational activity. The program is administered by a part-time paid Director, under the supervision of the Council.

The Community Center is held at the Town Hall, and is open four nights weekly. Monday evening is devoted to games, boxing, badminton, and is open to all age groups from the third grade up. Wednesday evening is devoted to dance instruction, ballroom and square dancing. Friday evening is fifth and sixth grade social evening with games and square dancing. Saturday night is devoted to senior socials and involves grades seven through twelve.

Basketball at 10 a.m. is held at the High School gym under the direction of Mr. Robillard and Kim Perkins, our director.

An archery program was begun in February of this year and is held on Thursday afternoon, between four and six p.m. in the Thibodeau Block. Town Hall was not available due to possible property damage, and office occupancy during these hours.

In the spring of 1956, four baseball teams in a Town league were organized. Fifty uniforms were purchased at \$2.00 each, from Laconia, so that each player was properly equipped. The teams played in other towns and were successful in all attempts. Chief coach was Tom Andrews.

In the summer of 1956, a swimming program was organized with bus transportation provided to Northfield Pond. Cork markers were floated for safety and a new raft was built. A paid life guard, assisted by mothers, provided safety for the sixty to eighty children who used this service three times weekly. It is hoped that this year two life guards trained by the Red Cross will provide safety and swimming instruction. We are particularly grateful to the town of Northfield for their assistance in improving beach facilities.

A lighted skating rink was established in December of 1956 at the Union School. Unfortunately, due to continuous snow storms and ground softness, we were unable to fully make use of this facility.

Since recreation is not only the domain of children, but of all age groups, at the time of this writing, a Senior Citizen's Club is being formed, under the direction of both the Recreation Council and the Episcopal Church, which has offered the use of its Hall. The Reverend G. Stackley Hurst will help in its direction. The problem of Old Age is a serious one in this State, which has the highest percentage of this group in the entire nation. Senior Citizen's Clubs, or Golden Age Clubs answer some of the needs of our aging population by providing a meeting place where they can enjoy company, read, play at favorite games, and otherwise occupy time fruitfully.

The opportunities of recreation to express, to create, and to find satisfying uses of leisure time are limitless in our towns. It is our hope and aim to acquire a building and a full time director for this purpose. We are grateful to all the organizations which have supported us and to many citizens who have given us encouragement, time and money.

There were 78 new and 251 repeat cases that were admitted to the nursing service and 64 new and 187 repeat cases under health service.

Twenty trips were made transporting 26 patients to clinics, hospitals and specialists.

Toxoid clinics in cooperation with the State Board of Health were held in April, May, June, September, October, November, and December. Dr. Archie Grevior and Dr. Frank Robinson alternated as attending physicians at the clinics. Assistants were Mrs. Margery Robert, Mrs. Richard Sullivan, Mrs. Lois Caveney, Mrs. Lurline McCook, R.N., Miss Harriet Stone, R.N., and Mrs. Willa Downar, R.N. A total of 225 received the Triple Toxoid for protection against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus, which is given in graduated doses a month between treatments, ages 4 months to 7 years. Forty-three completed the series of three hypos. Fifty-three received Booster hypos that are given two years after the first series as an added protection. Sixty-five were vaccinated for protection against smallpox.

Mrs. Lurline McCook, R.N., substituted for the District Nurse while she had her vacation.

The nurse assisted Miss Harriet Stone, R.N. in buying, wrapping and distributing gifts in the two towns at Christmas. Money and gifts were given through the kindness of the Rotary Club, Business and Professional Women's Club, teachers of both schools and individuals.

Twenty dinners were given by the Elks, American Legion, Odd Fellows and Salvation Army.

This is an opportunity for me to thank the doctors, selectmen, nursing board, and the individuals for their help in so many ways, also their cooperation and sincere friendliness to me throughout the past year.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tilton-Northfield High School in said district on the 13th day of March 1957, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
  - 3a. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years to fill the vacancy arising from the expiration of the term of office of Alexander G. MacGregor.
  - 3b. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years to fill the vacancy arising from the expiration of the term of office of Charles F. Dwinal.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the

payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to use the probable balance of one thousand three hundred seventy-three dollars and seventy-six cents (\$1,373.76) or such balance as exists on June 30, 1957 from the bond issue for Union School renovations and the appropriation for a roof at said school for the modernizing of existing classrooms at the Union School.

10. To see if the district will appropriate the sum of eight thousand six hundred forty-five dollars (\$8,645.00) to be added to the 1957-58 school budget for the conversion of the high school heating facilities to oil, zone control in the gymnasium, installation of a 6200 gallon oil tank, conversion of hot water heating system to oil, and all necessary labor and equipment; and to see if the district will authorize the School Board to use any unanticipated balance from tuition receipts for non-resident pupils and children from foster homes and such portion of said appropriation as may be necessary, not exceeding eight thousand six hundred forty-five dollars (\$8,645.00) to complete the purposes of this article.

11. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and accept in the name of the school district for district purposes, such funds or grants-in-aid as may be obtainable from the State, Federal Government, or other agencies or departments.

12. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF TILTON-NORTHFIELD SCHOOL BOARD

---

We have held three meetings to discuss the 1957-1958 school budget and believe that the real necessities to maintain good schools are in the budget and that items postponed to future years will not handicap the successful operations of the schools.

Our proposed budget for 1957-1958 shows an increase. The main increase is represented in three items. The first is in the principals' and teachers' salaries with an increase from \$131,007.44 to \$145,043.12 representing automatic increases under the salary schedule, an additional teacher at the high school, and Tilton's share of the cost of an additional music teacher. The second increase is the salary of a high school secretary so that the principal will be free for supervision, administration and guidance, — an item of \$2000. The third increase is in the principal and interest payments under bonded indebtedness, since principal payments advance from \$13,000 to \$18,850 and the interest payments are increased \$1000. Budget increases will be reduced considerably by expected increased receipts.

We are proposing a special article in the warrant for \$8,645 for an oil burner installation at the high school. We have estimates that the costs would be \$720 for conversion of the hot water, \$1725 for motorized controls in the gymnasium, \$5700 for a 6200 gallon tank and all work and equipment, and \$500 for digging. We feel that the advantages of oil are well worth the cost of this investment, and that we will secure lower bids on oil with all the schools using oil.

We are also requesting the district to allow us to use the small balance from the Union School renova-



tions bond issue and roof installation to modernize more classrooms in the old Union School.

We are very proud of the investment of \$46,850 for renovations and the \$3800 for the roof, for we gained three modern classrooms similar to the new building, new girls' and boys' restrooms, and a teachers' room. We also cleared the school of the old unsanitary basement toilet rooms, and are saving for education the time lost by pupils having to go up and down several floors all day.

The people of the district will be very pleased to have the Veterans' Memorial Field in back of the high school in operation for recreation and athletics this spring. This acquisition will improve the physical education program and the beauty of the grounds.

We appreciate the contributions from the sixth grade of the Union School, the Rotary Club, the Parent-Teacher Association, and the prize money from art pupils of Mrs. Maude Gray, to start a fund for the landscaping of the grounds of the two Union Schools.

Our policy in starting a fund for band uniforms has received contributions from the American Legion and the Class of 1956 of Tilton-Northfield High School. The Band Booster organization has worked very hard to raise funds for this same purpose.

May we thank the Journal-Transcript for its very meritorious policy of developing the annual and permanent fund for the award of scholarships to pupils of Franklin and Tilton-Northfield. We want to thank the individuals who have made contributions to this worthy cause.

We express again our appreciation to the Parent-Teacher Association for its contributions to the Scholarship Fund and the excellent work of the Room

Mothers. The Parent-Teacher Association has contributed to every worthy cause in the schools.

May we thank every organization and every individual who has helped the schools in any way during the past year. We are pleased to receive any suggestions at any time for the improvement of the schools.

We are selected to represent you and carry out policies for the best education that your money will provide. We appreciate the wonderful support we have received from the voters and the taxpayers.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board:

### Classroom Space — Union Grammar School

The renovation of the old basement rest rooms and the coal storage room to three modern classrooms, with new boys' and girls' rest rooms on the first and second floor, and a new teachers' room, was the most economical and practical step for the school district to take. The School Board deserves a great deal of commendation for recommending this logical development to save dollars for the taxpayers. The new roof on the school will save the costs each year of roof repairs and damage to ceilings.

**Teaching Staff**

The 1956-57 budget calls for one additional teacher for the high school to cover the increased enrollment.

**Competitive Bids**

Tilton-Northfield proceeded to gain the advantages of low costs by continuing to have competitive bids on school supplies, oil, renovations, and all articles where bids were feasible.

**Finances**

The school district ended the 1955-56 school year with all bills paid and another balanced budget.

**Special Achievements by the Tilton-Northfield School Board**

The following points represent actions taken or policies adopted by the Tilton-Northfield School Board that again marked progress in education:

1. New salary schedule for teachers of \$2800 for the first year, \$3000 for the second, and \$100 a year to \$4000. Sick leave, 5 school days per year for first and second years non-cumulative then 10 days a year cumulative to 30 school days. Teachers were given two steps on the salary schedule for the 1956-57 year, representing increases of at least \$200 for everyone.
2. Renovation of the Union Grammar School to provide three additional classrooms, removal of outmoded, unsanitary rest rooms from the basement, establishment of modern rest rooms on the first and second floors, a new teachers' room, — all well within the bond issue of \$46,850.00.
3. Voted to continue the four-year course in agriculture.
4. Purchased 30 new desks and chairs for Union School.
5. Purchased 9 new electric clocks for Union School.
6. Installed new roof for Union School.

7. Sponsored a two-day Art Workshop for teachers of Union from 4 to 9 P.M.

8. Sold school bond issue for renovations at low rate of 2.75 per cent and a bonus.

9. Made plans to start landscaping program at Union Schools with funds raised by the pupils of Grade 6 from a food sale, contributions from Rotary Club and Parent-Teacher Association, and money won by art pupils of Mrs. Maude Gray, Art Supervisor, from contests.

10. Ended another school year with a balanced budget.

11. Adopted policy of establishing band uniform fund with the District Treasurer with gifts from the American Legion and the Class of 1956 Tilton-Northfield High School, with a local committee to advise School Board on selection when funds are adequate.

12. Adopted new transportation system with limits as follows:

13. Made contracts with two bus operators for 60-passenger buses instead of 48, thus with the new bus limits ending a third trip for one of the buses.

14. Approved an extension course on Improving the Teaching of Arithmetic for teachers.

15. Adopted new school lunch system under which:
  - (a) Any pupil may purchase the school lunch by the day or week
  - (b) Non-bus pupils may remain at the school
  - (c) Any pupil may remain at school all day during weather storms.
16. Accepted \$5200 building aid from the State of New Hampshire.
17. Approved engaging a high school secretary for 40 weeks a year to allow Principal time for class supervision, guidance and administration.
18. Purchased furniture for teachers' rooms at Union Schools and on December 3, 1956 authorized \$150 for high school teachers' room — thus giving each school the identical amount, with the teachers making the selection.
19. Continued for second year Saturday morning recreation and basketball from 8:30 to 12:30 Noon, for grade and high school pupils.
20. Sponsored an after-school Music Workshop for teachers.
21. Approved a four-day workshop for Art and Guidance from September 3-6 inclusive, with schools opening on September 9.
22. Studied with Public Service Company and other electrical representatives the problem of improving lighting in the gymnasium and classrooms of the high school.
23. Made a record of being the last school to close out the veterans' agricultural course, after all veterans in the area desiring instruction had graduated.
24. Continued to ask bids on equipment, supplies and services and save money for the taxpayers.

### **Additional Music Teacher**

The five towns of Supervisory Union No. 59 voted to add a second full-time music teacher for the 1957-58 school year. The district was losing the music teacher at the end of each year for five years in a row, since it was impossible for one teacher to teach 1723 pupils in five towns, a pupil growth from 1082 in 1944.

### **Building Aid Law**

Tilton-Northfield School District will receive 40 per cent of all principal payments on bond issues this year, thanks to the alertness of Representative Warren Metcalf in seeing that the law covered Tilton-Northfield as a cooperative district.

### **New Foster Homes Bill**

The school district is collecting tuition on children in foster homes this year. Representative Warren Metcalf worked to secure a fair law for three sessions of the legislature.

### **Budget for 1957-58**

The budget items for the next year are almost identically the same as this year with the following exceptions:

- (a) An increase in principals' and teachers' salaries from \$131,007.44 to \$145,043.12 to meet the costs of the salary schedule, one additional high school teacher, and Tilton's share of the cost of a second music teacher.
- (b) An additional cost of \$2000 for a high school secretary.
- (c) An increase in the bond payments on principal from \$13,000 to \$18,850.



These added costs are depreciated to some extent by increased estimated income from tuitions.

### **Appreciation**

May I express my appreciation to the members of the School Board, Selectmen, principals, teachers, office workers, custodians, bus operators, cafeteria workers, and Parent-Teacher Association for all their cooperation and help during the past year. It is a wonderful thing for a joint-community to back its schools and the School Board as the people of Tilton-Northfield have demonstrated. It is apparent that the people want good schools and are willing to pay for them.
