

## REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY AGENT

### Maintenance

During the last town meeting, our Maintenance Budget was increased to what seemed to be a sufficient amount, at that time. Little did we know of course, that we would have so much snow, ice, etc. so late in the season. According to our records, our 1967 Winter season from a Budget point of view, ran from January 1st thru April 8th and November 8th thru December 31st. Therefore showing that we had a lot more Winter Maintenance than usual. I feel our summer maintenance duties were impaired by the cost of earlier winter months. Work was done only when and where it seemed necessary; such as graveling, patching, cutting down road shoulders where there is a build-up of dead sand and turf, and sweeping sidewalks. There was a considerable amount of time spent picking up little in the section of Bean Hill, Governor Lake entrance and Old Manchester Road. I think a greater effort should be made in picking up road litter on all streets in our town, especially in the Bean Hill scetion.

### Tarring

The Tarring Budget was spent with the following sections being swept and sealed. Epping Street, Upper and Lower Main Street, Governor Lake Road, Prescott Road, Harriman Road, Old Manchester Road, Scribner Road, Lane Road, Onway Lake Road and Bill Brown Road. We did run into a problem on part of our tarring system and this was some of the above sections were excessively slippery when wet; and had to be resealed again with a different blend. The State of New Hampshire had the same problem on some of their roads.

## Lane Road

The blasting and removal while widening of the road in one section was done with thirty-eight inches of ledge removed at the highest point. There should in the future be some shoulder work done on this section.

## Town Road Aid Projects: Onway Lake Road

A distance of seven-tenths of a mile was graveled and tarred this summer making this road a complete hard surface which is a great help in the winter for plowing.

## Equipment:

Our Grader is in good condition mechanically at this time. The Snow Plows and Truck Mounted Hydraulic Systems are in very good shape. Minimum repairs on the wings should be made to keep plows operational.

## Stock:

We have several pices of culvert on hand. One culvert was bought with the intent to install it this year on Batchelder Road near the property of Walter Patrick. This old culvert, at this point should be replaced this year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank John Waterhouse for the work he has done, especially on cleaning thirty-two catch basins and the painting of the Bridges on Upper Main Street and Epping Street. Also the citizens, taxpayers, and the men who have worked with me and most of all the Town Treasurer for her continued services. I also wish to thank the Selectmen for their interest in this Department.

Library services and activities have continued at about the same level as during the past two years. The Town appropriation (\$550.00) and the Trust Fund interest used (\$300.00) plus the balance from the previous year have permitted the expenditure of over \$600.00 for books and magazines. In this the interests of our younger readers have been carefully considered.

Early in the year a State grant of \$100.00 was used for the purchase of 20 reference books to supplement the educational work of the Library. Books being purchased on a similar grant are expected in the Library during the early months of 1968.

We have continued our use of State Library advice and assistance. These have included representation at meetings of the Southeast District Library Advisory Council and its Planning group. We have also attended book meetings (one held in Raymond) where new books are available for discussion and selection. These meetings have been helpful and stimulating.

The Librarian, Mrs. Wason, and your Trustees have tried to make the Library Service helpful, interesting, and enjoyable to you. We solicit your suggestions and your patronage.

The following is a brief resume of the activities of your Fire Department for 1967. We had a total of fifty-one (51) alarms during the year. Due to the very wet summer our calls were reduced considerably from normal.

Our estimated losses for the year were buildings \$21,800. Contents \$15,800.

We answered six (6) mutual aid calls and we received mutual aid three (3) times.

The motor in Old Tank 1 finally gave out after 181,582 miles of service. We have hopes of picking up a used chasis and transferring the tank and body to this chasis.

The rest of the equipment is in good condition.

## RAYMOND POLICE DEPARTMENT

It is my privilege to prepare the seventh annual report of the activities of the Raymond Police Department.

Again as in 1966 every phase of the Police Department's work has shown an increase. Motor vehicle accidents show a sixty-one per-cent increase. Speed was not the largest factor in this increase. Much of the blame lies in inattention and the great increase in the number of motor vehicles on the highways. Unfortunately we had two fatalities within the Town of Raymond during 1967. It is expected with the granting of a night session of the Auburn District Court and a tightening of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Code and laws that 1968 will be far better in this respect.

On July 5, 1967 the Raymond Police Department received a Police Cruiser voted for by the citizens of Raymond. This vehicle was equipped with a two-way radio which allows car to car communication, communication with the Raymond Ambulance and other cruisers in every surrounding town in Rockingham County. The burden on Police Department employees was greatly reduced, in as much as of December 31, 1967 the mileage registered was 15,000 miles. The entire Police Department is extremely grateful for this equipment provided.

I would like to take this opportunity to extend my thanks and apreciation to Dep. Chief Robert Elliott, Officers Howard Cottrell, Orris Larrabee, Vance Ryan and the other Special Officers, the Raymond Ambulance, the Selectmen and the citizens of Raymond for their generous contribution of time and equipment to make this department function smoothly.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

All Departments of the Town Government were audited: The Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library and Water Department.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Exhibit A-1 contains Balance Sheets for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1966, and December 31, 1967. This Exhibit reflects the Assets and the Liabilities at the close of the year. The financial condition of the Town of Raymond shows a Net Debt of \$29,043.80.

Exhibit A-2 shows the change in financial condition and the analysis of change in financial condition.

Exhibit A-3 shows appropriations as raised by the Town vote, receipts and reimbursements of appropriations, expenditures and balances unexpended and overdrafts. The final balance of overdrafts was \$4,900.24.

Exhibit A-4 shows anticipated revenues and amounts actually received by the Town. The final excess of revenues was \$4,800.16. Net overdrafts of appropriations, \$4,900.24, less net revenue surplus shows a net budget deficit of \$100.08.

#### DEPARTMENTS

Exhibit B-1 through I shows various Town Officers' Accounts. All monies were accounted for by reconciling with depository banks. The Tax Collector's accounts were audited for the several years that had uncollected taxes. Verification notices were sent on all delinquent taxes for the 1967 Levy.

#### **GENERAL COMMENTS**

The accounts and records of all Town Officers were in excellent condition. Taxes for past years have been collected or abated and the current records are in excellent condition.

To the officials of the Town of Raymond, many thanks for the co-operation given to me and my staff. It would be impossible to complete the audit in the short time alloted without full co-operation from the officers.

# **Town Warrant for 1968**

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Raymond in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Raymond Fire Station in said Raymond on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To  $choos_e$  all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town is in favor of the adoption of the Building Code Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board as follows;

### TOWN OF RAYMOND, N. H.

Amended proposed building regulations for the Town of Raymond, N. H., Chapter 156, Sections 2-5 inclusive. New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1959 to be as follows;

## **Definitions**

1. Dwelling Unit—any dwelling house, prefab-

ricated or rebuilt home, trailer and mobile home, cottage, camp, or other structures for human habitation whether temporary or permanent. Exceptions—tents, legally registered travel trailers and campers.

2. Structures—buildings or additions to buildings whether job or factory built.

3. Foundation—the lowest walls or supports of any structure.

## **Proposed Building Regulations**

- 1. MINIMUM BUILDING AREA Every dwelling unit to be used by a single family shall have a minimum ground floor area of four hundred square feet.
- 2. FOUNDATIONS

A. All structures to be used for year-round occupancy shall be set on a continuous foundation of cement, brick, stone or other acceptable masonry.

B. All other structures may be set on wood, metal or masonry foundations.

## 3. OUTSIDE WALLS

Outside walls of all structures shall be constructed of commonly used permanent siding, and materials customarily painted shall be painted. Permanent siding shall be completely installed within two years from start of construction. Tar paper shall not be used for permanent siding.

4. SEWERAGE A private sewerage disposal system is required. The type, size and construction of all septic tanks and drainage fields shall be governed by the rules and regulations of the New Hampshire Water Pollution Commission.

## 5. CHIMNEY CONSTRUCTION

Chimneys shall extend at least three feet above the highest point where they pass through the roof of a structure and a chimney top shall not be closer than ten feet in any horizontal direction to the nearest part of a structure. No enclosed chimney shall be built so that wood or other combustable materials are within one inch of the chimney and no chimney shall have its base resting upon any floor or beam of combustible material. No chimney shall be built without a flue liner and cleanout door. Factory built chimneys that are approved as a result of tests and listed by nationally recognized laboratory shall be installed in accordance with the condition of the approval.

## 6. WELLS

All shallow wells shall be at least 75 feet from the nearest cesspool, dry well, privy, dump or road.

## 7. APPLICATION AND FEES

Building permits shall be of a year's duration from date of issue. Building permits shall be issued by the Town Building Inspector. Each application for a building permit shall be accompanied by a fee payable to the Town of Raymond in accordance with the following schedule: \$1.00 to \$5,000.00 — Fee \$3.00 to include two inspections
\$5,000.00 and over — Fee \$5.00 to include three inspections

Fees for additional inspections due to nonconformance by the applicant shall be fixed at \$2.00 per inspection. Compensation of the Building Inspector shall be fixed by the Board of Selectmen.

### 8. APPEALS

There shall be a board of three, appointed by the Selectmen, to sit as a Board of Appeals. This Board shall act in accordance with Chapter 156, Section 4a of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1959.

## 9. AMENDMENT

This Ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting when such amendment is published in the warrant calling for the meeting.

## **10. ENFORCEMENT**

Upon any well-founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, Selectmen shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other appropriate legal action. Whoever violates any of the provisions of the above regulations shall be punished upon conviction by fine not exceeding ten dollars for each day of each violation.

11. TAKES EFFECT This Ordinance shall take effect April 1, 1968. 12. If any portion of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid the valid portion shall be separable and subject to enforcement.

- 5. To see if the Town of Raymond is in favor of a three year term for the Town Clerk, as provided under the new law 41:16A.
- 6. To see if the Town of Raymond is in favor of a three year term for the Town Treasurer, as provided under the new law 41:26A.
- 7. To see what action the town will take relative to the playing of Beano in the Town of Raymond.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town maintenance including snow, cleaning Main Street and any general Highway expense.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for tarring.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums for State Highways as

recommended by the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways.

- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.
- 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Dudley-Tucker Library.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining the dump.
- 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Park.
- 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.
- 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Hydrant Rental.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell at public auction any property acquired by Tax Collector deeds.

- 21. To see if the town will hear the report of the Town Bell Committee and will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money required to fulfill their recommendations.
- To see if the town will vote to raise and ap-22. propriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for filling, grading and laying out burial spaces, walks, etc. in a section of Pine Grove Cemetery where an excavation now exists, and to authorize the issue and sale of notes or bonds of the Town therefore, under and pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act. Repayment shall be at the rate of \$1,500.00 plus interest. (the rate to be determined by the Board of Selectmen) per year and payable by the Town, reimbursement to be made to the Town from time to time from the sale of burial spaces in the above mentioned area. Burial space selling price shall be \$75.00 per single space; \$60.00 of this amount to be placed in a fund to amortize the borrowing or to reimburse the Town, and \$15.00 of this amount to be placed in a Trust Fund during the liquidation of the appropriated indebtedness, the income from this fund to be used for the perpetual care of this development.

After the proceeds from the sale of spaces has been sufficient to pay all indebtedness so that this appropriation has been entirely self-liquidated at no cost to the taxpayers, then all future proceeds from the sale of spaces in this development shall be placed in the above mentioned Trust Fund. The income from this Trust Fund shall be used for: first, the care and upkeep of all the area including sold spaces in this section allowing for the hire, lease, and/or purchase of necessary equipment; second, if and when there is sufficient income, the general beautification of the whole cemetery; and third, when this Fund produces an excess of income, some of this income may be applied by the Board of Selectmen to the general upkeep of any or all of the Town Cemeteries.

The following rules and regulations shall govern this section of the cemetery: (1) all spaces shall be graded even with the abutting spaces; (2) all gravestones or markers shall be installed flush with the grade and be of prescribed sizes; (3) there shall  $b_e$  no curbings or corner stones; and (4) the Selectmen shall from time to time make and enforce such other rules and regulations as they may deem necessary or desirable for the care and use of the cemetery.

The Selectmen shall appoint a committee of five (5) residents of the Town to have charge and supervision of the planning and completion of this project. The committee shall consist of one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, and three other residents. This committee shall choose their own Chairman and Secretary and shall have full authority to complete this project.

23. To see if the Town wishes to take part in the Community Action Program and to raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money for same.

- 24. To see what action the town wishes to take about the building of a new Highway Garage and to raise and appropriate the funds for same, under and pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act.
- To see if the Town will vote to raise and ap-25. propriate a sum not exceeding \$35,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing either a grader or a loader as the Meeting shall determine and to determine how any such appropriation shall be raised from taxation, transfer of available funds, or by borrowing or otherwise, and if any part of said sum is to be by the transfer of available funds, to withdraw from the capital reserve funds the sum of \$13,387.15 deposited in said capital reserve by vote of the Town on March 12, 1946 and March 12, 1963 for this purpose, and if part or all of said appropriation is to be by borrowing, to authorize the issuance and sale of bonds or notes of the Town of Raymond under the Municipal Finance Act or any other enabling authority; and to take any other action incidental to or connected with the foregoing matters or any of them.
- 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the general improvement of the New Pine Grove Cemetery.
- 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to improve the Lane Road Cemetery and the Chester-Raymond Line Cemetery.

- 28. On petition of Richard Houle and fourteen (14) others; to see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to maintain the several abandoned cemeteries within the confines of the town; as prescribed by chapter 289, section 5, of the Revised Statutes of the State of New Hampshire.
- 29. To see what action the town wishes to take toward the expenditures of money for Christmas decorations and lighting and to raise and appropriate money for same.
- 30. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 as our contribution to the State Department of Resources and Economic Development.
- 31. To see if the town wishes to participate in the District Visiting Nurses Program and to raise and appropriate money for same.
- 32. On petition of Carl R. Armstrong and sixteen others to see if the town will vote to extend the water main from the entrance of the Water Tower on Route #156, northerly along Route #156 for a distance of approximately three hundred (300) feet and to raise and appropriate the money for same.
- 33. To see if the town will vote to accept the legacy of the late George W. Goodrich as provided in the will.
- 34. To transact any business that may legally come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

By custom and by direction of the Selectmen the duties of the Trust Fund Trustees include the care of the cemeteries. By agreement these duties have been largely divided. Ernest Cote has furnished his labor and equipment and supervised the labor of others. Miss Iber Holmes has acted as Treasurer and Norris Gove as Secretary. The Selectmen have furnished policy direction and helpful cooperation.

The Trustees were intrusted with the management of the Town appropriation of \$550.00 for the general care of the cemeteries exclusive of that care performed under the Trust Funds. This money, as indicated in the Treasurer's Report, was used for the Spring cleanup, mowing for Memorial Day, the mowing of the avenues through the year, and extensive repairs to the water piping.

The Trust Fund interest money was devoted to mowing and trimming the lots covered, the filling and seeding of 19 sunken lots, the application of fertilizer to 14 lots and lime to 19. In addition some work which should have been done under the Town appropriation was actually paid for from the Whittier Fund interest. This is permissable under the terms of the Whittier Trust. It would, however, be desirable to increase the Town appropriation somewhat to take care of the growth hay and weeds on lots which are uncared for by the owners. This growth gives a poor appearance to the cemeteries and the weed seeds contaminate the well-grassed lots.

Following agreement with the Dudley heirs, some of the accrued interest in the Dudley Funds was used to clean moss from the stones and reset several. This work, added to that done by the heirs, leaves the Dudley cemetery in a very attractive condition.

Examination of the Lane cemetery by the Selectmen and Trustees found it in poor condition. Except for one lot cared for by the heirs, the cemetery was overgrown with hardhacks. Spraying and cutting or burning and cutting are desirable. We suggest a Town appropriation of \$200.00 to cover this.

The Chester Line Cemetery, owned jointly by Chester and Raymond, is in bad condition. The Raymond section is overgrown with pine and hardwood trees. Four pines are over a foot through at the butt. Two lots there have been placed under perpetual care in 1967. An appropriation of \$300.00 is recommended to remove the tree. This should put the cemetery in condition where normal maintenance will suffice.

The Bean Hill Cemetery is overgrown with large pines and hardwoods. We consider it as gone beyond recall and suggest that no action be taken.

During 1967 18 new trusts totaling \$3,025.00 were established. We consider this a very desirable trend. We point out that some of the older families are dying out and that the younger folks of others have joined the modern migration to all parts of the country. These conditions result in uncared for graves. The sum of \$100 to \$200 will provide for a reasonable degree of care forever. Any of your Trustees will be glad to discuss this with you.

Your Trustees are distressed by certain individuals who, though physically and financially able, take no care of their lots, not even a pre-Memorial Day mowing. This may be due to lack of thought, but the failure detracts tremendously from the overall appearance of the cemeteries. We hope to discuss this condition with some of these townspeople during the coming year.

Interest from Trust Funds for care of the Cemetery lots is due on the first day of April, July, October, and January. Costs, however, are incurred, almost entirely, in the months from May to September. Through the kindness of Henry Greenwood, we were able to borrow \$500.00 in anticipation of interest to meet our payroll. In previous years the working trustees have held back their bills until the last of the year. Neither of these expedients seem desirable. Consequently, we asked the Selectmen if they can help us out of this difficulty. One suggestion is that we be permitted to borrow from the Town Treasury in anticipation of interest so as to pay our bills promptly.

We have not spent all the money available this year from Trust Fund interest even though the heavy rainfall produced a greater than normal growth of grass. The balance will be available for 1968 work, if needed. In ddition, the Bank's increase in interest to 5% plus the new Trust accounts mentioned above will give us appreciably more funds for cemetery care. This should be helpful.

Your Trustees acknowledge the many helpful suggestions and also the few deserved "gripes" and hope for increased interest and cooperation in this portion of the Town's service.

#### SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Raymond will receive \$52,535 in State Foundation Aid next year which is \$8,596 less than that for the current year. The basic reason for this is the increase in equalized valuation from \$8,726,454 to \$11,-797,459, an increase of 35%. Since this figure is set by the Tax Commission and approved by the Legislature it becomes law. It is unfortunate when any aid program is decreased in times of increased costs.

In a 10 year period Raymond's school enrollment has increased from 398 to 684 or an average increase of 28.6 per year. If this rate continues there will be need of additional building facilities within a relatively short time. All of the possible approaches to this program must be given thorough study and analysis.

The State average teachers' salary for 67-68 is \$6,325, or \$241 higher than the year before. We are often asked by board members and others, "When is this going to end?" The only thing, in my opinion, which would stop this upward trend is a major recession. Factors working for continual increases are: 1, A critical shortage of qualified teachers which will continue, in part, due to small graduating classes; 2, An increasing school population in New Hampshire which also effects No. 1; 3, Better minimums and maximums in the states immediately south of us; 4, A slow but continuous spiral of inflation from 3 to 5 per cent a year; 5, Bigger retirement and social security deductions making take-home pay relatively, if not actually, smaller; 6, A more agressive attitude and, in some cases, action on the part of teachers. A change of one or two of these factors will not be felt to any great extent. It will take big changes in most, if not all, of the above factors to materially alter the upward trends.

Raymond's support of its schools continues to be excellent. We are most appreciative of this and look forward with confidence to continual progress.

#### ASST. SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

With an ever-increasing number of pupils to be accommodated, local school districts are confronted with the problem of trying to provide quality education in the face of a teacher shortage destined to continue for at least a few more years. Because it is nation-wide, the matter of attracting competent teachers to a comunity has had to assume a new dimension in recruiting. Compared with an era when teachers applied directly for a position, the school superintendent now must spend much time and energy in directing a campaign designed to focus the attention of teachers on a particular community. Failure to go to sources of supply leaves a town with little choice but to fill its classrooms with individuals who are teachers in name only.

In the spring of 1967, the superintendents of New Hampshire were in the process of attempting to fill nearly 1900 vacancies, over 800 of which were at the elementary level. These vacancies represented a 44% increase over 1965, when it already was apparent that the supply of teachers was critical. The problem was further compounded with relatively small classes of teachers being graduated from New Hampshire colleges; only 132 elementary teachers were granted degrees by the state colleges at Keene and Plymouth in 1967.

Never before has it been as imperative that an entire town bend its efforts in the quest for capable teachers. School boards and administrators need sympathetic support in staffing, equipping and maintaining schools. Additionally, teachers are sensitive to community attitude; they have little inclination to seek employment in a district where there is only minor regard for education. In the final analysis, all of the inhabitants of a comunity exert a direct influence on the kind of an educational program that is offered. Failure to render support will lead to inferior instruction in the school system. Ultimately, society in general will be the real loser, for those children who have ben short-changed in school will be unable to make contributions in keeping with what was their potential.

#### **COOPERATIVE SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE**

In a continuing effort to find solutions to the problems that beset the smaller school districts, a special District Meeting was called in May of 1964 and established a Planning Committee whose function was to pursue the study of a co-operative school system in our area. Similar meetings were held in Candia, Chester, Deerfield, Epping and Nottingham and committees were formed in those towns.

These Town Committees subsequently formed the Pawtuckaway Planning Board. Working with the Administrative Officials in the Supervisory Districts involved plus personnel from the State Department of Education, the Board carefully considered the various areas of concern in the formation of a cooperative school system. As provided by the law which established the Co-operative Study Program, public hearings were subsequently scheduled in each of the towns participating. The purpose of these hearings was to report to the towns on the progress of the study and to determine if each town wished to continue. Voters in Chester, Deerfield and Nottingham voted to withdraw from the study, while voters in Candia, Epping and Raymond voted to continue. The three remaining towns pursued the study but found their borrowing capacity insufficient to build a school which would provide facilities necessary to meet the demands of modern education.

A final two-town study was undertaken between Candia and Raymond and the results of this effort was presented at a public hearing in Candia and resulted in the proposal being defeated. The overall study was concluded at this point.

The formation of a co-operative school system is not a cure-all for all the problems that confront the small school district. It is our belief, however, that it would be an important step forward in upgrading the quality of education in our area. To us it seems regrettable that while we must anticipate steeply rising costs for education in the years immediately ahead, we must at the same time anticipate a diminuation in the quality of our educational offering as we fall behind the larger towns, cities, area, and cooperative schools in our unequal struggle to keep pace in providing up-to-date facilities for an ever broadening curriculum.

However, in the absence of any tangible incentives to induce our communities into co-operative effort, we must look again to expanding our present facilities to accomodate a steadily increasing population. Based on projected figures, we must anticipate an enrollment of 1,000 students within the next five years.

The many problems arising from this growth merits the immediate attention of all who are concerned with the general welfare of our community, and the careful consideration of taxpayers throughout the state, to the need of changing our present tax base lest property taxes soar to intolerable levels in our efforts to meet the ever expanding needs of our changing times.

# Report of The SCHOOL HEALTH PROGRAM

To the Superintendent of Schools and the School Board of Raymond, N. H.: I hereby submit my first annual report as School Nurse-Teacher.

The school nurse-teacher carries out a wide variety of duties. These include:

### Health Appraisal

A. Cursory Examinations. This examination includes inspection of the throat, teeth, glands, head, arms and hands of all the pupils in the elementary grades at the beginning of the school and as requested by teachers.

B. The yearly physical examination of all boys and girls participating in school sponsored baseball, basketball, softball and soccer. This examination is done by the School Doctor assisted by your school nurse-teacher.

C. Vision. All pupils in all grades are tested every year. Hearing. Beginning in Sept., 1967, all pupils will be tested every year.

D. Heights and weights are checked and recorded annually.

E. Follow-up. Unless a successful program of follow-up is carried out all the testing and examinations are useless. 1. Parents and guardians are notified of all physical defects and assistance is offered to obtain necessary corrective care. 2. Assisting teachers in making adjustments in children's programs, seating arrangements, etc., when needed.

### Emergency Care of Accidents or Illness at School

A. First aid is rendered to ill or injured pupils.

B. Parents are contacted and transportation is arranged for the child who is too ill to stay at school.

### Communicable Disease Control

A Tuberculin Skin Testing Program was held in May for all pupils and school personnel. Five hundred forty seven tests were administered by your school nurse assisted by members of the Future Nurses Club. All positive reactors were X-rayed June 7, 1967, at the school via a portable X-ray unit supplied by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis and Health Association.

#### Health Instruction

A. A personal hygiene course and film was presented to girls in grades 5 thru 8 in January, 1967. A Health Education film was presented to boys in grades 7 thru 12 in January, 1967.

B. Health guidance is a continuous process for the school nurse-teacher and even the application of a band-aid is used as an opportunity to teach the importance and methods of caring for minor wounds.

#### **Pre-School Registration**

Pre-school registration was held in April. Fortyfour children were registered. A Medical Doctor was present to give physical exams, administer small pox vaccine, measles, D.P.T. and polio immunizations and give T.B. tests. A Dental Hygienist gave floride treatments and dental instructions. The school nurse assisted by school personnel recorded the medical history of the children to be enrolled in the first grade in September. This helps the school nurse to become acquainted with incoming pupils and their parents or guardian. Any disabilities the children may have are noted at this time so that any adjustments may be made before the child starts school.

### Class Advisor

Your school nurse-teacher acted as advisor to the Future Nurses Club. Business and planning meeting was held at least once a month. Field trips were taken to the Elliot Hospital in Manchster, Crotched Mountain in Greenfield and Brentwood County Home and Hospital. An informative and enjoyable year was climaxed by a banquet for all clubs in Southeastern New Hampshire at Yoken's in Portsmouth.

### Attendance at Professional Meetings

Your school nurse-teacher acts as a professional representative of the school to other health organizations. She attends meetings as requested by State, Local and Regional Organizations that concern community and school health needs.

#### Speech Therapy

Thirty children in grades 1 thru 12 received speech therapy during the school year.

I would like to thank the Superintendent of Schools, Principal, Teachers, School Personnel, and Parents for their help and cooperation in my first year as your school nurse-teacher.

Only in a fully coordinated program of health and education is it possible for a child to reach his full educational attainment.

#### **PRINCIPAL'S REPORT**

To the Superintendent and the School Board:

Curriculum reform is everywhere recognized as one of the most significantly innovative activities in education today. There are very few children who have not been exposed to new approaches in the teaching of mathematics, science, social studies and language arts, to mention but a few areas affected by curriculum changes.

Knowledge is accumulating at such a rapid rate that it is no longer possible to teach a complete body of knowledge, hence the process of education has become all important. We are therefore becoming more concerned with the "how" rather than the "what" in learning. This means that accumulations of subject matter must be structured and taught in such a way that students will be able to tackle problems they have never seen before.

Things are moving so fast that it is virtually impossible to predict with any degree of certainty the needs of today's youngsters a few years hence. Consequently, we must educate for change, for if we expect society to be self-renewing it must be composed of individuals with a capacity for self-renewal.

#### I. Instructional Improvement

To meet our goal of a systematic evaluation of curriculum, we are planning a self-evaluation in the secondary school, using the evaluative criteria of the American Council on Education. Following this self-evaluation, we plan to submit to an evaluation by the New England Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges, the accrediting agency for the northeast section of the country. Both of these studies are to be completed during the 1968-69 school year.

In the elementary school we have initiated a program of readiness testing for placement of incoming first graders. The testing included the Gesell Development Test and the Metropolitan Readiness Test. Youngsters were then placed according to test results, plus teacher recommendations. There was ninety percent agreement between the three yardsticks. Teacher judgment was allowed to prevail in the remaining ten percent of cases. We believe that time, and the program being offered, will provide youngsters in the transition room with the necessary maturity to succeed as first grade students.

We have operated two very successful summer Heard Start Programs. Following our first experience, we made application for a year-round program which was approved for the 1967-68 school year. We have seventeen youngsters enrolled in this class. We most recently made application for a "Follow-Through" program that will be designed to help the Head Start children in their adjustment to the primary grades. If this is approved, we will be one of three programs in the state of New Hampshire.

During the past school year we have broadened our program of teacher-aides where interested high school students are providing help for busy elementary teachers. In the begining these students relieved elementary teachers of recess duties. This year they are providing extra help for children needing it, in the primary grades. Both teachers and students benefit from this service. We are very proud of our teacher-aides. Through the cooperation of our secondary school staff, we have been able to provide several new courses. A new terminal course in science called Physical Science, provides experiences in Chemistry and Physics for terminal students. The technique of teaching used is one of discovery, or learning by doing. Hence, much time is spent in experimenting. We have also established courses in Remedial English and Remedial Mathematics, which allow for special help with special materials.

During the summer of 1968 we will offer a Summer School in Remedial Reading instruction for elementary school students, under a Title I Grant, approved in December of 1967. Unable to offer this during the school year because of the teacher shortage, we feel that during the summer we will be able to get the teachers and do the diagnostic testing so necessary to doing the job well. We also feel that the summer experience will provide an excellent opportunity for a follow-up program in the fall.

### **II** Materials and Resources

Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 has made it possible for us to expand our materials and resources for classroom instruction beyond our fondest dreams. It has made it possible to individualize instruction in reading at the elementary level through the use of a skill tapes porgram. It has also enabled us to provide science laboratory materials at each grade level. Title III of the National Defense Education Act has made it possible to save the district fifty percent on all materials approved under this title.

Our very successful magazine drive has made it possible for us to provide the physical education pro-

gram with almost one thousand dollars worth of equipment. We are most grateful to the students and townspeople.

Under a jointly sponsored Title III Project, Raymond is privileged to share in the Child Development Center located in Derry. This program is correlated with the Hopkinton Readiness Project and provides counseling aid to teachers with children with problems.

### III Pupil Personnel Services

Guidance—This is one of the most valuable pupil services we have to offer. It is also a parent service, and we hope that more parents will find the time to avail themselves of it. Our guidance program includes: individual and group guidance; individual and group testing; test result interpretation for teachers, students and parents; lectures by visiting professionals on occupations; job placement through the N. H. State Employment Office, the Neighborhood Youth Corps, and the Manpower Training Program; a guidance library including educational, occupational and social materials; and through research and follow-up of student records, we hope that this department will make its contribution to curriculum revision. Our thanks to Mr. Holt.

Health—A sound body to house a sound mind is the objective of this service. To achieve our objective we are very ably aided and abetted by Doctors Blaisdell, Dionne and Kennedy, plus our own school nurse, Mrs. Augusta Gibbs. We are deeply indebted to each of them.

Library—During the past year our library has almost doubled in use, with a total of 13,696 teacherstudent visits as compared to 7,897 visits the previous year. Circulation has jumped from 2,689 to 3,835 books during the past year. Our congratulations to Miss Marjorie Yeaton and her library aides.

Arts Exposure—The Center for Arts Exposure in Manchester, operating under Title III funds, originally sponsored by Supervisory Union No. 53 (Raymond, Candia, Deerfield, Allenstown, Hooksett and Pembroke) provides monthly assembly programs for our elementary school children. This project was selected as exemplary by the Federal Government and has been refunded. It provides exposure to dance, symphonic music, art, pottery-making and repertory theatre for our children.

Food Service—Our food service program, under the capable direction of Mrs. Rose Cross, continues to win the plaudits of students and the state supervision. We are most happy that many groups within the community have chosen to avail themselves of the cafeteria for special occasions. Each of these groups has been high in its praise of our fine staff.

# **IV** Student Activities

Extra-curricular activities are an important adjunct to any sound educational program. As a member school in the Southeastern League and the N. H. I.A.A our boys and girls participate in soccer, volleyball, boys' basketball, girls' basketball, softball and baseball. We also have a mathematics team competing against league schools.

We have an excellent a cappella choir which has provided countless hours of relaxation for shut-ins at the County Home and the Masonic Home for the Aged in Manchester. In state-wide competition for band and chorus, the following students were selected and will represent Raymond: Junior High, Diane Cammett, Sally Cronin, Barry Cottrell and Robert Moulton; High School, John Bove, Shirley Colligan, Carlene Mc-Kinley and Audrey Renaud.

Many youngsters have engaged in service to their school as Teacher Aides, as Library Aides, as members of the Future Nurses Club, and as Office Aides. Still others have contributed service as workers on the school newspaper.

Probably the most important service group in the school is an elected group, the Student Council. Finances for the activities program is the important contribution of this group, as well as the planning and conducting of many student activities. Our sincere thanks to Mrs. Lord for her wise counsel to this active group.

The extra-curricular activities of the Art class, under the direction of Mrs. Dannis, offer one of the most constructive effects on school morale, and contribute much to school spirit. We are most grateful for their efforts.

Our sincere congratulations to all participants in all extra-curricular activities and especially to their teachers: Miss Rock, Mr. Baker, Mr. Day, Mr. Mason, Mr. Raymond and Mr. Carrier. You have brought us a kind of honor that money cannot buy.

### V. Community - School Relations

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Raymond School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1967, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1966 and June 30, 1967, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$24,994.24 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1967. Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30,, 1967, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net revenue surplus of \$12,404.84, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$9,445.41, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$2,959.43.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1967, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1967, is indicated in Exhibit E-2.

Statement of School Lunch Account: (Exhibit F)

A summary statement of the School Lunch account for the fiscal year is included in Exhibit F.

Student Activities Fund Account: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the Student Activities Fund account is presented in Exhibit G.

Statement of Building Fund Account: (Exhibit H)

A statement showing the activity in the Building Fund account during the fiscal year is presented in Exhibit H.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit 1)

A statement of the School Tax account with the Town of Raymond is included in Exhibit I. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1967, the School District had received from the Town the total of the 1966-67 School Tax in the amount of \$226,320.97.

Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtednes of the School District as of June 30, 1967, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit J.

#### **GENERAL COMMENTS**

Current Surplus:

The current financial condition of the School District changed from a current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) of \$1,184.27 to a current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) of \$809.97, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1967, as shown herewith:
