THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Rumney Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways in addition to the amount required by law.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Library.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lights.
- 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Cemeteries.
- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of Common.
- 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$275.61 to secure from the State \$1,102.47 to be expended on improvement of Class V Roads.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,062.00 to secure from the State \$2,124.00 for permanent road from Rumney Village to Ellsworth line, known as State Aid Orange.
- 11. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Fire Dep't, and make appropriation for same.
- 12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to buy hose for Fire Department.

- 13. To choose Fire Commissioners.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$72.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 16. To see what action the town will take in securing the services of a resident doctor.
- 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for a resident doctor.
- 18. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to buy a snow plow and wing.
- 19. To see what action the town will take in regards to adopting the Australian ballot.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to allow a 2% discount on all taxes paid within 15 days after presentation of tax bill.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to pay the town clerk \$100.00 for his services.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to have inventory blanks distributed at time of taking appraisal of property.
- 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS To the Rumney School District:

I hereby submit my tenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools. The statistical tables follow this report.

The board closed the Stinson Lake School and is transporting approximately 14 children to the Village schools. This follows more closely the set-up for state aid and in my opinion it is a distinct advantage to the education of these children. It also enlarges the classes at the village and brings greater challenge to the teachers. No changes have occurred in the teaching staff of the district since my last report.

It is planned to hold the Primary Prize Speaking at the Town Hall on Friday evening, March 15th. The furnace at the Depot School has been repaired with funds furnished by a special appropriation. A careful survey of music supervisors in this area has been made and no one holding credentials has been found at this writing. This money should be voted back into the general fund or carried as "Reserved for Special Purposes."

Sometime ago there arose entirely in the district a sentiment for a centralized school and a committee was appointed at the last district meeting to make a survey. That committee will report at the coming district meeting.

It is incumbent on the Superintendent of Schools to set forth the facts of centralization to the district. There are numerous definitions of education today and the one accepted by the supervision is sufficiently comprehensive to include practically all. It follows;

"The ultimate objectives of education must be conceived of in terms of the development of the child, rather than in terms of mastery of the materials of instruction. The purpose of education is

to condition the future behavior of those being educated that they will be willing and able to function in ways of greater satisfaction to themselves and most conducive to the progress and welfare of others. This is done by stimulating the acquisition of information, concepts, skills, habits, attitudes, interests and tastes."

A centralized school can meet the above objectives more effectively than smaller schools of 4 and 8 grades. I do not wish to appear to disparage the present schools of the district. Within the past few years your Board has closed two rural schools and thus taken steps toward consolidation.

Your children as a group stand well in high school scholarship but as shown above forward education of today means more than academic studies. Farm magazines of National circulation give testimony of the success of centralized schools as reported by non-educators. In this state there are 30 consolidated elementary schools; 23 largely centralized. 36 consolidated high and elementary schools, and 12 one-room centralized schools. Your children will have to compete eventually in life with those having the advantages of centralized schools whether they live here or elsewhere.

The advantages of a modern centralized school can be briefly summarized as follows: The district would maintain a four-room school so that each teacher would have but two grades with special training for those grades. Modern educational procedure requires a good stock of reference books one set of which would meet the needs of a centralized school, whereas it would be unreasonable to duplicate the sets in separate schools. The prospects of a music or art supervisor would be more likely if the pupils were all in one building because such a position would probably be sufficiently inviting to attract a supervisor from a longer distance.

Visual education with educational films depicting geography, history, science, etc. is practicable in a centralized school. Regular and convenient teachers meetings can be held. Problem children and cases can be discussed by the teachers together. The group mind is more fertile than a single mind and its discussions lead to sounder decisions. A child going through the elementary schools will have contact with four teachers instead of two or even one. Every teacher has stronger points than others. Some excel in one activity and some in another. Some like to stress some phase of education while others may pass it lightly. There is a natural tendency to stress one's natural bent at the expense of other phases of education equally important. I am firmly convinced that the more competent teachers a pupil has the broader and richer will be his preparation for life.

Again a great advantage of centralization is the competition not only in study but on the playground. It does children good to "rub shoulders" with others outside of their immediate neighborhood. There is a larger opportunity for group activities, especially in supervised play. Children learn how to accept defeat with courage and victory with grace. Manual training can be offered which is beneficial for all boys. There are generally boys who have reached the height of their academic learning at the 5th or 6th grade but can do very well in manual training and derive pleasure and benefit from it. Girls likewise can be profitably engaged in elementary sewing and cooking.

At this writing no figures are available for the cost of construction and equipment of a centralized building. Preliminary investigation would lead one to believe that \$25,000 would need to be available. At present there is no prospect of federal aid. I do not believe that the district could reason-

ably anticipate very much of a reduction of the usual appropriation if it offered its children all the advantages previously set forth. The gain would come in general raising of the type of education uniform throughout the district and in offering superior school facilities to meet the trend of stable and well-to-do families who are moving into our rural communities and familiar with centralized schools.

In conclusion I state that centralization has proved its case throughout the state and country. Hundreds of rural schools are being closed every year. I believe that in a time not so far off children in one-room rural schools will be at a definate disadvantage. Whether the district can and will finance a centralized school at this time is a question for it to decide. It is a highly commendable project and one that would bring credit and honor to the town.



The children were weighed at intervals of two or three months during the year with special attention given to the under-weights. Cod Liver Oil was given to a few families. 30 children were treated at the Dental Clinics held at Plymouth. The three Granges and the Red Cross helped with some of these cases. Four children had new glasses and five pairs of glasses were changed, paid by the State Sight Conservation Department. One child was at the Balch Hospital three times for an orthopedic operation, paid by the public Welfare. Another was treated at the Shriners' Hospital. 151 home calls, 83 school calls and 56 business calls were made by the nurse in connection with the work.

At the beginning of the school year, 1939, the children were again inspected by the nurse with these findings recorded:
